SCREWWORM CASES INCREASING IN COKE

Coke County screwworm cases for the year jumped to a total of 21 with four new cases scattered over the county last week.

James Arrott reported one case from his place four miles southwest of Tennyson; a second case from Bryan Gartman eight miles northwest of Robert Lee. The other two cases were from the same proximity between Bronte and Blackwell. O. B. Raper sent in a positive case from his place four miles south of Blackwell and the Chadbourne Ranch, 12 miles north of Bronte, was the site of the other confirmed screwworm case.

During the previous week two cases were reported on the Arledge Ranch 12 miles north of Robert Lee. The other two cases were found in calves by Douglas Gartman, five miles north of Robert Lee, and by David and Joe David Key, from their place 12 miles west of Robert Lee.

Help from cool weather is still several weeks away. All operators are encouraged to check animals regularly for signs of screwworms. Newborn calves and lambs seem to be favored target and need special attention.

Recently, a new and larger sterile fly plant was opened in Mexico. With the addition of this new plant and by making a more narrow buffer zone in Mexico, the program officials hope to eradicate the screwworm from the United States. They anticipate, on the present schedule, eradication will take five to seven years to accomplish.

of 1966 to the Quang Tin Providence. He served as commanding officer of a 1-00 bed field hospital. Medicine Chief and Chief of Staff for the 450 bed Province Hospital, attending physician for the government employees of the Province Headquarters, Province Public Health Officer (400,000 inhabitants), Expert for the local court on medical legal expertise and worked daily for five years with the U. S. Navy Milhap Team.

Dr. Do received numerous decorations while serving in the service, including three Purple Hearts. He is the founder of the Public Library in Quang Tin and has written and published several medical papers.

In 1970, Dr. Do moved to Saigon where he taught in the Military Medical School, was Chairman of Internal Medicine and Chief of Staff, Medical Battalion Commander for 400 cadets, worked part time for the civilian medical school (American built and supervised medical school) as chief of the laboratory in the Department of Parasitology and Mycology. In 1972 he resumed private practice in Saigon and remained there until he came to the United States.

Dr. Do came to the United States in May of 1975, working for a time with Neil C. Christopher, M.D., of Gunterville, Ala. Since that time he has been practicing GP in the Motley General Clinic in Matador.

In January of this year Dr. Do passed the ECFMG in Dallas with the high score of 465. Passing score is 290. In June he took the FLEX in Houston and received his full license to practice surgery and medicine from the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners.

Dr. Do and his wife, Simone, have five children, three boys and two girls, ranging in age from 3 to 10. Plans were made earlier this week for moving Dr. Do and his family to Robert Lee on Wednesday.

CONSERVE AND SAVE ON ELECTRIC COOKING



★ For best results, use flat bottom utensils with tight fitting covers. Utensils of medium or heavy weight aluminum conduct heat faster, transfer heat evenly and respond quickly to temperature changes.

★ Match the utensil to the size of the unit. Use 8 inch units for large utensils. Use 6 inch units for small to average sized pans.

★ Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.

★ Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.

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Sterling City Topples Longhorns, 33 - 0

The Bronte Longhorns traveled to Sterling City last Friday night to taken on the Eagles. Even though the Horns came up on the short end of a 33-0 score, they are still improving, as they made 160 for total yardage.

1st Quarter

The Eagles took the kickoff on the 25 and returned it to the 38. They marched down the field 62 yards in 14 plays to score with Scott Davis and Kenneth Gaston doing most of the running. PAT failed so the score was 6-0 in favor of Sterling City.

Joe Bob Ragsdale handled the kickoff for the Horns. He got it on the 20 and ran to the 35. The Horns couldn't get going and Ragsdale had to punt. A poor punt gave Sterling City excellent field position on the Bronte 46. Davis ran for 8 then Lee Fleming ran around the end 38 yards for 6 more points. Again the PAT failed, 12-0.

Ragsdale took the kickoff again and returned it 13 yards to the 33. Bronte still couldn't get going and Ragsdale punted for 30 yards. Sterling City made 18 yards in 4 plays before the buzzer sounded.

2nd Quarter

Sterling City then bogged down and Mickey Dodds punted for 24 yards to the Bronte 20 but Bronte fumbled the punt back to the 15 and the Eagles recovered. Davis went 15 yards in three plays to score. Gaston ran for 2 points. The score, Sterling City 20, Bronte 0.

Ragsdale again handled the KO and returned it 14 yards to the Bronte 45. On the first play from scrimmage the Horns fumbled again and the Eagles recovered on their 48-yard line. They went 44 yards in 5 plays with Gaston and Davis doing the running again before a 5-yard penalty on the Horns gave the Eagles a 1st down on the 4-yard line. Davis went over from the 4 for 6 points. PAT failed.

Randy Joe Parker took the kickoff this time to the 35. Donnie Jackson ran for 4 and Ragsdale ran for 2. Then Parker completed a 13-yard pass to Billy Hamilton for the Horns first 1st down of the night. Ragsdale ran for 2, and Hamilton ran for 10 and another 1st down. Ragsdale ran for 3 then a penalty set the Horns back 5 yards, but a Parker to Hamilton pass for 10 yards almost got them a 1st down. Hamilton ran for 2 and a 1st down, he then picked up 10 yards in two carries for another Bronte 1st down. Parker tried another pass but the Eagles intercepted it.

Very little else happened before the half ended with the score Sterling City 26, Bronte 0.

3rd Quarter

Parker took the kickoff on the 30 and returned it 5 yards. However with two successful running plays and an incomplete pass, Ragsdale was called on to punt. He kicked it 31 yards to the Eagle 30 yard line.

Davis picked up 7 yards in two carries and Gaston picked up the 1st down, he then went for 4 and Fleming ran for 10 and another 1st down. Davis ran for 15 and a 1st down. After three unsuccessful plays the Eagles had to give the ball up on downs.

Ragsdale ran for 12, then Parker threw to Jackson for 20 yards and another 1st down. Ragsdale picked up 8. Parker a 1st down. The Horns then bogged down and the Eagles got the ball back on downs.

Gaston ran for 6 yards, a 15-yard penalty on Bronte gave the Eagles a 1st down. They picked up two yards before the quarter ended.

4th Quarter

The Eagles went 43 yards in seven plays for a TD with Davis and Gaston doing the running. PAT good, 33-0.

Parker took the kickoff on the 20 and ran it back to the 37. Ragsdale ran for 3, Hamilton for 5, then Parker ran for 27 and a 1st down. Ragsdale ran for 6, then Parker picked up the 1st down. The Horns made 7 yards in four tries and

Sterling City took the ball over on downs on their own 10 yard line. Gaston ran 1 yard then Davis for 60 yards, plus 15 yards was added by a penalty on Bronte.
