October 15, 1976 SCREWWORM CASES INCREASE IN COKE

Screwworm cases in Coke County increased sharply this past week with nine cases recorded. Sixteen of the yearly total for the county have been recorded during the past three weeks.

The new cases were scattered in several areas over the county. North of Bronte cases were found on the Bill McDonald Ranch and the Lee Ranch Co. In the Silver area. Myrle Jameson, Raymond Bloodworth, Clayton Bloodworth and Foster Sims Price had confirmed cases. To the west, Vida Peays reported a case, as did Frank Demere Jr. near Water Valley. On the south side of the county, Clyde Bowen reported one case. The ninth case came from north of Sanco on the Arledge Ranch, their fourth case of the year.





It's not so important to me right now Whether the merchant at home will stay, or how, I find it so easy to lose sight and forget The merchant at home needs me and yet ...


Surely he knows I must save all I can, He would do the same as another man. I don't remember how handy it was He would come to my aid what ever the cause.


