Absentee Voting Gets Underway

Voters of Coke County are reminded this week that the General Election of 1976 is drawing near. The election will give local voters the opportunity to vote for candidates for President and Vice President on Nov. 2. Absentee voting started on Wednesday, Oct. 13, and continues through Oct. 28.

Persons who wish to vote absentee will have to go to or contact the office of the county clerk for ballots and absentee forms. Those eligible to vote absentee are persons who are going to be out of the county on election day.

Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, county clerk, reported that there is a new law for persons over 65. The new ruling states that anyone in this age group may come to the clerk's office and cast his ballot anytime during the period of absentee voting instead of waiting until election day.

Ballots for the election were delivered this week and mailing of requested absentee ballots was planned for Wednesday.

Candidates nominated by six political parties are listed on this year's ballot. They are Democratic, Republican, Raza Unida, American, Socialist Workers, and Independents.

In addition this year's ballot will carry two amendments to the State Constitution which will be decided by voters.

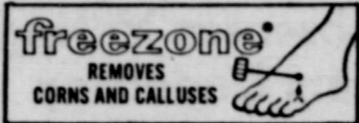
SCREWWORM CASES INCREASE IN COKE

Screwworm cases in Coke County increased sharply this past week with nine cases recorded. Sixteen of the yearly total for the county have been recorded during the past three weeks.

The new cases were scattered in several areas over the county. North of Bronte cases were found on the Bill McDonald Ranch and the Lee Ranch Co. In the Silver area, Myrtle Jameson, Raymond Bloodworth, Clayton Bloodworth and Foster Sims Price had confirmed cases. To the west, Vida Peays reported a case, as did Frank Demere Jr. near Water Valley. On the south side of the county, Clyde Bowen reported one case. The ninth case came from north of Sango on the Arledge Ranch, their fourth case of the year.

Horns Down Mertzson For First 1976 Win

The Bronte Longhorns who had not scored all year, broke the opening kickoff for six points and then recorded their first win of the season by trouncing Mertzson, 31-8. The game was played at Mertzson last Friday night and opened District 6-B action for the Longhorns.

The game saw the return of several Longhorns who had been out with injuries or for other reasons. Among the returnees was Turney Coulter, outstanding running back, who had not seen a down of action this season. With the return of these players Coach Gerald Sandusky's Longhorns could still finish high in district standings.

First Quarter

Wayne Coalson took the kickoff on the 23 yard line and ran it all the way back 77 yards for a touchdown. PAT failed and the score was 6-0.

The Hornets took the kickoff on their 30 and returned to their 38. Felix Savala made a yard, Jodie Martin added another, then a 5 yard penalty on the Longhorns gave Mertzson a 3rd and 3 yards to go. A tough Longhorn defense held Savala for no gain and Mertzson had to punt. The Horns got their hands on the ball on a blocked punt, but they were unable to recover and the Hornets covered it.

Randy Searcy ran for 3, then a penalty on Mertzson set the Hornets back 15 yards. They got it right back however, as an interference call on the Horns gave the Hornets a 1st down. After running three plays, they were a yard short of a 1st and had to punt.

Coulter went 12 yards in three plays for a 1st down. Then a 15 yard penalty set Bronte back. Randy Joe Parker passed to Coulter for 6, then to Donnie Hamilton for 5 yards. A big penalty on the Mertzson lads gave Bronte a 1st down. Coulter ran for 8 and Parker picked up the 1st down. Coulter ran 15 yards for another 1st. Parker passed to Coalson for 20 yards and just as Coalson caught the ball he was hit and Mertzson recovered. Mertzson ran two plays and gained 5 yards before the quarter ended. Bronte 6, Mertzson 0.

Second Quarter

Savala ran for 1 more yard, then the Hornets had to punt. Bronte got the ball on the Hornet 41 yard line. The Horns couldn't get going and Coalson punted for 33 yards to the Mertzson 13.

Clif Scannell passed to George Rainey for 10 yards and Mertzson

didn't do much after that and were forced to punt. The punt went straight up and bounced backwards 3 yards. The Hornets retained possession because of a penalty called on Bronte for roughing the kicker. On the next play Mertzson fumbled and the Horns pounced on it. Bronte ran two plays and fumbled it right back to Mertzson. But then the picture changed as Joe Bob Ragsdale intercepted a Scannell pass. Coulter ran for 3 more before Coalson broke loose for a 60 yard TD run. The PAT failed. With 4:27 left in the first half the Horns led 12-0.

Rodney Robertson took the kickoff for the Hornets and returned to his 35. On the next play, Donnie Jackson intercepted another Scannell pass. The Horns marched down field 30 yards in eight plays to score, with Coulter, Coalson, Parker and Hamilton doing the running. Coulter ran the final yard for paydirt. Coalson kicked the point after TD and the score was Bronte 19 Mertzson 0.

Searcy handled the kickoff on the 14 and returned it to the 32 and Mertzson picked up a 1st before the half ended.

Third Quarter

Robertson returned the kickoff to the 38. Mertzson couldn't do anything and punted 30 yards to the Bronte 30. Two major penalties and two incomplete passes forced the Horns to punt. Mertzson made 10 yards in four plays for a 1st down. But the Horns got tough and Mertzson had to punt. Coulter ran 36 yards for the Horns' first 1st down of the second half. A major penalty set the Horns back 15 yards but a Parker to Coalson pass for 17 yards gained it right back.

Coulter picked up 11 yards in two carries for another 1st down. Parker passed to Ragsdale for 15 yards, then Ragsdale fumbled and Mertzson recovered. The Horns picked up three 1st downs before the quarter ended with the score reading: Bronte 19: Mertzson 0.

Fourth Quarter

The Horns got tough and forced Mertzson to give the ball on downs. The Bronte offense couldn't get going and Coalson punted 27 yards.

Scannell picked up 11 yards and a 1st down. Randy Parker intercepted another Scannell pass. The Horns moved downfield 52 yards in five plays with Coulter running the final 33 yards to score. PAT failed and it was 25-0.

Savala took the kickoff on the 30 and ran it back to the Mertzson 37. Donnie Jackson intercepted a Mark Sanders pass on the next play. Coulter ran 21 yards and picked up a 1st down. Coulter again carried the ball but the Hornets knocked it loose from him and recovered it. Scannell passed to Robertson for 8 yards. Then Scannell picked up the 1st down.

Joe Bob Ragsdale intercepted another Scannell pass and ran it 20 yards for a touchdown with 2:33 left in the game.

Scannell returned the kickoff to the Horn 46 yard line. Mertzson picked up 10 yards in two plays for a 1st down. A major penalty set the Hornets back 15 yards. Rainey passed to Mark Sanders 50 yards for a TD with 49 seconds to go. They ran for 2 points.

Jeff Easterley covered the kickoff. The Horns ran two plays before the final buzzer sounded. It was Bronte 31, Mertzson 8.

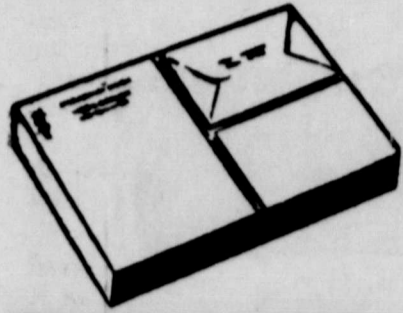

When Skaggs and B-W are out of sight.

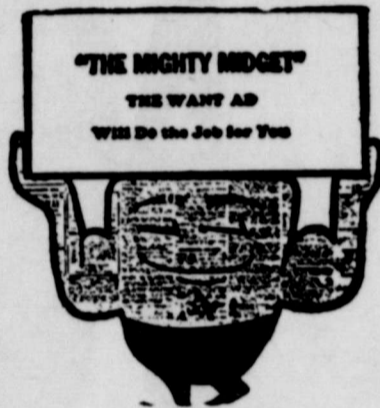

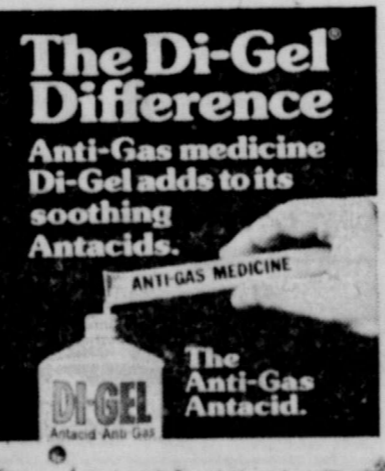
