Miss Gonzales Named Gold Star Winner

Martha Gonzales of Bronte and William Simpson of Robert Lee have been named as the 1976 4-H Club Gold Star honorees.

Martha has been a 4-H member for 11 years. Foods, Clothing and Leadership have been her major projects. Food ranks first, as her hobby is cooking. Junior Leader-

ship is next and she has done a fine job with helping younger members, according to her supervisors. She has assisted in many county activities and helped whenever called upon.

Martha was chosen delegate to District and State Council in 1973 and served well her two year term. Her most meaningful experiences in 4-H have been attending State Congress, being a State Fair Honor Award recipient; also being a member of the County, District and State Council.

Martha has attended District Leadership Camp four years and has made many friends while here. She said she stayed in 4-H all these 11 years because she liked the things she has done and learned.

Martha's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Mike Gonzales of Bronte. William Simpson, the 1976 Coke County 4-H Club Gold Star boy, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin A. Simpson of Robert Lee.

William has been a 4-H Club member for nine years with lamb projects for eight years. He exhibited a champion lamb at the County Stock Show and was high individual livestock judge in District 7 competition in 1973.

He was a member of one district winning livestock judging team and a member of two district winning soils judging teams. He was 10th high individual in the state in 1975 and won a wrist watch.

William has been active in all phases of 4-H work and presently is boy vice chairman of the County 4-H Council.

County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs said there had been approximately 1900 persons who registered to vote.

Persons who will be out of the county on election day may vote in the office of the county clerk between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday or may request a ballot by mail. Persons over 65 are eligible to vote at the clerk's office anytime during this period.

Three Bronte Residents Hurt In Headon Collision

Three Bronte men were injured, two critically, in a grinding head on collision near Winters last Friday afternoon. The three are James Carl Blair, William Howard Hail, both of whom remain in serious condition in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, and Mike Dyess who is now listed in satisfactory condition.

Dead from injuries received in the accident is Teri Michelle Stathem, 18, of Andrews and a student at Texas A&M University.

Also injured was a passenger in Miss Stathem's automobile, John Ivey, of Pecos, also a student from A&M. The two were on their way home when the accident occurred at 2:25 p.m.

Horns to Travel To Eden Friday

The Bronte Longhorns will be facing one of their toughest foes of the year Friday when they travel to Eden to take on the powerful Bulldogs. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. for the 6-B game.

The Bulldogs were the pre-season pick to win the west half of District 6-B. Nothing so far has changed the pick. The Bulldogs suffered two non-district losses early in the season but have come on strong and are now 5-2 on the season and 2-0 in loop action.

They smashed Mertzon last week 58-6. The Bulldogs have run up 233 points in seven games while allowing only 42 to their opponents. Richland Springs appears to be the only team in 6-B capable of topping the Bulldogs and they don't meet until the final game of the season.

The Longhorns played poorly in last Friday night's 20-6 Homecoming loss to Santa Anna. The Horns suffered their sixth loss of the season against only one win. It left them at 1-1 in league action.

The two men underwent surgery Tuesday afternoon and were reported to be doing as well as could be expected. Physicians said both of them have a long period of recovery ahead of them.

Dyess is suffering from a crushed vertebrae. He is to be fitted with a back brace and expects to be home soon.

Blair is a longtime resident of Coke County while Hail, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. McGuire, had only recently moved here. Dyess is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Dyess.

DEER CENSUS FINISHED IN COKE COUNTY FOR '76

Parks and Wildlife Department biologists have finished their deer census work and doe permits for the forthcoming season will be available to land owners in Coke County on Oct. 28 at the County Courthouse in Robert Lee.

Don Davis, biologist, of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said that an official of the P&WD would be at the Courthouse all day on Thursday, Oct. 28, to answer any questions and to assist with the issuance of the permits.

Doe permits this year are based on current deer censuses by designated compartments in the county. Maps outlining the compartments and rates of issuance will be posted at the County Courthouse prior to the issuance date. R. L. Flanagan, game warden of Coke County, noted that there would be a limited number of doe permits.

Most of the Coke County area consists of one doe permit per 236 acres with the exception of the northwest corner around Oak Creek Lake which has one permit for each 110 acres and the southwest corner along the Concho River showing one permit for 114 acres.

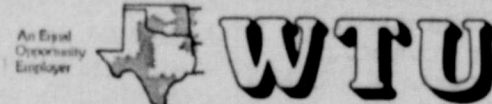

Mountaineers Whip Longhorns, 20-6

Bronte Longhorn fans had their hopes dashed last Friday night when the Santa Anna Mountaineers defeated the Horns 20-6. The Homecoming contest was played here last Friday night.

First Quarter

Wayne Coalson took the opening kickoff on the Bronte 15 and returned it to the 30. Randy Parker ran six yards and then Turney Coulter picked up 8 for a 1st. Coulter ran for 11 more yards on the next play for another 1st. The Horns bogged down and Coalson punted 34 yards to the Santa Anna 10 yard line.

Jody Brusenhan made 3. Loris Lewis, who did most of the Mountaineers' work, made 5, then Salvador Salazar picked up the 1st. Salazar made 3. Brusenhan passed to Norris for 20 yards and another 1st. The Horns got tough however, and forced Santa Anna to punt. Bobby Permenter punted and his teammates killed the ball on the Bronte 8 yard line.

The Horns couldn't get going. They lost 3 yards in two plays. An incomplete pass set up 4th down and a punting situation. Coalson boomed a 55 yarder.

Lewis made 11 for a 1st. Salazar made 3, Lewis then picked up

a 1st down, but then Bronte got tough and Santa Anna was forced to give up the ball on downs. Coulter ran for 5 before the quarter ended. The first quarter was mostly a defensive battle.

Second Quarter

Bronte was penalized 5 yards on the first play of the second quarter. The Horns couldn't move the ball and Coalson was called on to punt again. This one went 23 yards to the Mountaineer 49.

Brusenhan picked up 5. Lewis marched 44 yards for 6 points 1:40 seconds deep in the second quarter. David Chaffin kicked the extra point to make it 7-0.

Coalson returned the kickoff to the Bronte 48. Parker picked up 7, then a bad handoff caused Coulter to fumble and Santa Anna recovered. They then marched 56 yards in four plays with Salazar running the final 44 yards to score. PAT failed and the score was 13-0.

Coulter handled the kickoff on the 16 and returned it 14 yards. However, the run was nullified by a 15 yard penalty. Coulter made 5 and a 5 yard penalty gave the Horns a 1st down. Parker lost 3. Then the Horns fumbled. Santa Anna recovered but decided they didn't want it and fumbled right back to

the Horns. Bronte didn't want it either and once again Santa recovered on the Bronte 20. It took the Mountaineers only three plays to go 20 yards to paydirt. Chaffin kicked the extra point and the score was 20-0.

Coalson handled the kickoff on the 16. He returned it to the 36. Another major penalty nullified the return. Joe Bob Ragsdale made 2. Coulter picked up 9 and a 1st down. Coulter then made 16 yards in two plays for another 1st. Coulter again got the call and picked up 11 yards in two plays for another 1st. Coulter made only 7 yards in three plays. Parker threw an incomplete pass on 4th down play, so Bronte had to give up the ball on downs. Santa Anna ran one play before the half ended. Santa Anna 20, Bronte 0.

Third Quarter

Alex DeLeon took the kickoff on the Santa Anna 20 and returned to his 44. Lewis made 5 yards, then the Mountaineers fumbled and the Bronte boys recovered. Coulter made 4, then fumbled back to Santa Anna. The Mountaineers couldn't move the ball and were forced to punt. The ball was kill-

ed on the Bronte 10 yard line. Coulter made 9 yards in three tries so Coalson had to punt. Brusenhan passed to Terry Day for 32 yards. But on the next play they fumbled and Bronte recovered. Coulter ran for 3 yards in three tries. Coalson was standing in his own end zone to punt. Santa Anna was coming hard to try to block Coalson's punt, but instead they hit Coalson and it gave Bronte a 1st down. Donnie Jackson ran 3 yards, then Parker had a pass intercepted. Salazar made 1 and a penalty on Santa Anna set them back 5 yards. They fumbled again and once again Bronte fell on it. Coulter spurred 45 yards doing most of the running on his own. Coulter then made 4 yards in three tries before the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Coulter tried to pick up the 1st down, but made only 2 yards, so the ball went over to Santa Anna. Salazar made 13 and a 1st. A major penalty on the Horns gave Santa Anna another 1st down. Then the Mountaineers were penalized 5

yards. Salazar made 1 and again the Mountaineers were penalized this time for 15 yards. Lewis made 2. The Horns stopped Salazar for a 2 yard loss. Permenter got off a 47 yard punt to the Longhorn 10 yard line.

Coulter made 11 yards in three tries for a 1st. The Horns couldn't move after that and Coalson had to punt.

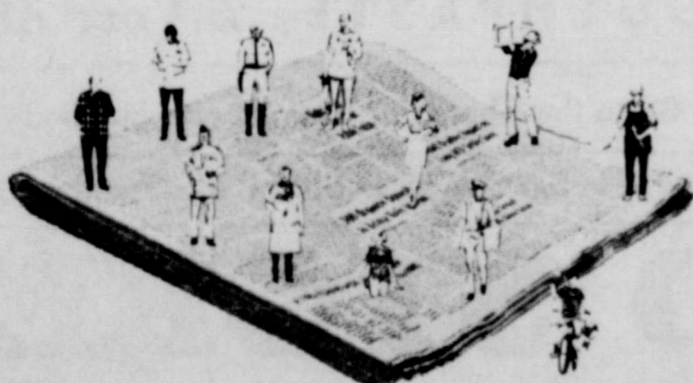

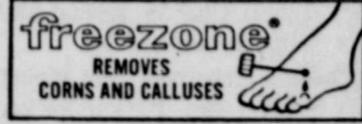
