### MORE SCREWORM CASES REPORTED

The screwworm threat no doubt has been lessened by the onset of cooler weather, but six additional cases have been confirmed in Coke County during the past 10 days. The yearly total for the county now stands at 48 cases, most of which came in October.

The most recent cases were reported by Paul Burns, from his place on the north side of Lake Spence; Roy Tinkler, 12 miles southwest of Robert Lee; and Bobby Roberts, from his place six miles south of Robert Lee. Also, Bryan Gartman, from eight miles north of Robert Lee near Sanco; Barton Waldrop, from his place near Hayrick; and one case by Bill Blair from his place 3 1/2 miles west of Bronte.

The threat of screwworms has been lessened by the cool weather, but probably not stopped. During the warm part of the day temperatures will climb high enough to activate insects. We still need to watch for and report possible screwworm cases.

The Longhorns looked good for a half last Friday night against Richland Springs. They scored first and only trailed 16-8 at half-time, but fell far behind in the third quarter. The Horns, who are small in size and numbers, have been hurt by key injuries this year and have struggled through one of their worst seasons ever.

Miles has been even less fortunate than the Longhorns. Playing 11-man football for the first time in many years, the Bulldogs have dropped nine contests in a row. They were defeated by Mertzon last week, 8-0. The Bulldogs have only scored 6 points this year while giving up 277.

### BITES HELD FOR MRS. ERVIN LITTLE, 93

Mrs. Ervin B. (Montie Ray) Little, 93, of Bronte died at 7:50 p.m. Tuesday at West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee. Services were held at 3 p.m. Thursday at Tennyson Baptist Church at Tennyson.

Burial was in Mule Creek Cemetery, directed by Newby Funeral Home.

Born Feb. 20, 1883, in Dallas, she moved to Coke County as a small child and had lived here since. She was a resident of the Bronte Nursing Home at the time of her death. She married Ervin B. Little in 1903 in Coke County. He died in June 1969. She was a Baptist.

Survivors include a daughter, Myrtle Reeves of Bronte; three brothers, Neal Baker and Clifford Baker, both of San Angelo, and Hubert Baker of Ozona; a sister, Annie Butler of San Angelo; five grandchildren, 14 great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grandchildren.

## Democrats Carry Coke In Record Voter Turnout

Democrats made a clean sweep from the top to the bottom of the ballot in Coke County, in the general election held Tuesday.

In what was termed as a record turnout, a total of 1389 ballots were counted in the five voting boxes and in the absentee box.

Coke County voters approved both of the Constitutional Amendments on the ballot.

Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale received 844 votes in their race for President and Vice President, while Republican incumbent President Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole received 517 and American Party candidate Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford received 25. Eugene McCarthy, Independent, received 4 and Socialist Workers Party, Peter Camejo and Willie Mae Reid, received none.

### Historical Group Receives Award

The Coke County Historical Commission (CCHC) received a Distinguished Service Award (DSA) at the 1976 Annual Historic Preservation Conference, held in Galveston Oct. 29 and 30.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, CCHC chairman, accepted the DSA during awards ceremonies of the conference, which was cosponsored by the Texas Historical Commission and Texas Historical Foundation.

The state commission (THC) administers the DSA program, designed to recognize those county historical commissions who have made outstanding local contributions to preservation within the past year.

In presenting the award, THC Chairman Mrs. Wesley B. Blankenship cited the CCHC for, among other accomplishments, collecting histories of county families and preparing them for publication in the forthcoming HISTORY OF COKE COUNTY.

Commissions receiving the DSA must meet 16 different requirements. These include presenting at least six programs on local history to other civic groups; sponsoring or helping plan a minimum of three guided historical tours; conducting at least one phase of an oral history program; and completing at least one facet of a significant historic preservation project such as a restoration, a written county history, or the creation of county archives.

The THC presents Distinguished Service Awards annually to all county commissions who achieve these standards. The group also sponsors other competitions for the county organizations, including "Best Program of Work," "Best Newsletter," and "Outstanding County Chairman."

Senator Lloyd Benton, the Democratic incumbent, won easily in his race with 980 votes compared to Republican Alan Steelman's 364. American Party, Marjorie P. Gallion, 7 and Socialist Workers Party, Pedro Vasquez, 0.

In a bid for Railroad Commissioner, Jon Newton won handily with 1053 votes compared to his opponents, Walter Wendlandt, 219, Fred Rodriguez Garza, 4, and Pat O'Reilly 0.

The State Board of Education was the other contested race with Jimmy L. Elrod, Democratic candidate, receiving 1010 votes while H. Dell Foster, Republican candidate, received 208.

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# Longhorns Lose, 42-8

The Bronte Longhorns scored first last Friday night but Richland Springs came back to dominate the Horns and carry a 42-8 win home. The Longhorns looked good in the first half, trailing 16-8 at halftime, but fell quickly behind in the third quarter and were never in the ball game after intermission.

### FIRST QUARTER

Richland Springs' John Gibson kicked off to Donnie Jackson, who took the ball on his 30 and returned it to the 44. The Longhorns marched downfield in 2:45, 56 yards in 7 plays, to score. Turney Coulter made 54 of the 56 yards. Coulter ran for 2 points.

Barry Fikes took the kickoff on his 33 and returned to the 35. Wayne Reynolds made 5, Maurice Lusty made 2, then an incomplete pass forced the Coyotes to punt. Robert Burleson punted 40 yards to the Bronte 18. Coulter made 5 yards in 3 tries and Parker punted to the Coyote 44 yard line. Ricky Willborn made 1, then Richland Springs was set back 15 yards on a clipping penalty. Burleson made 22 yards and Willborn made 1. An incomplete pass turned the ball over on downs.

Parker made 4, Coulter made 1, and Coulter was injured on this play and didn't play the rest of the game. Billy Hamilton made 11 and a first down. The Horns made 9 yards in 4 tries and the Coyotes took over on downs. Joe Bob Ragsdale intercepted a Coyote pass, then the Horns gained 15 yards on a face mask call on Richland Springs. On the next play, Ragsdale fumbled and Coyotes recovered. The Coyotes marched downfield 66 yards in 5 plays to score just as time ran out in the first quarter with Joe Cook and Ricky Willborn doing the running. Willborn carried it over 1 yard to score. Reynolds ran for 2, 8-8.

### SECOND QUARTER

Hamilton took the kickoff on the 29 and returned it to the 35. Parker made 3 and Hamilton made 2, then Parker passed to Hamilton 8 yards for a first. The Horns bogged down and Parker punted to the Coyote 15. Willborn made 1, Reynolds made 11 in 2 tries for a first. Cook made 6, Lusty made 23 and another 1st. Cook made 20 and another first. A pass interference call on Bronte in the end zone gave the Coyotes a first down on the 1 yard line. Max Cox ran 1 yard to score. Cook ran for two points. 8-16.

Parker took the kickoff and returned it to the 42. The Horns couldn't move and Parker punted to the Coyote 25. The ball changed

hands three times before the half ended with neither team moving the ball.

### THIRD QUARTER

Cook took the kickoff on the 15 and returned to the 28. The Coyotes went downfield in 2:50, 77 yards in 7 plays, to score. PAT failed. 8-22.

Parker took the kickoff on the 30 and returned to the 40. Jackson made 2. The Coyotes stopped Ragsdale for a 6-yard loss. An incomplete pass forced the Horns to punt. Jackson punted to the Coyote 24. The Coyotes scored in 4 plays with Cook running the final 54 yards. Terry Till kicked the extra point. 8-29. Ragsdale fumbled the kickoff, Richland Springs recovering on the Horn 39. The Coyotes scored in 2:48, 7 plays with Willborn running the final yard. Till kicked the extra point. 8-36. Ragsdale handled the kickoff on the 30 and returned to the 44. Hamilton made 5 yards in two tries. Then Jackson, who took over the quarterback job after Parker was injured, tried a pass but it fell incomplete. Jackson punted 36 yards to the Coyote 15 yard line.

Reynolds made 5, Cook made 5 more and a first. Rankin made 4, then Reynolds passed to T. Till for 18 yards and another first. An off-side penalty set Richland Springs back 5, making it first and 15. Reynolds made 5 before the quarter ended.

### FOURTH QUARTER

The Horns kept them from moving and the Coyotes were forced to punt. Burleson punted to the Bronte 10. Hamilton made 1, then Keith Till intercepted a Jackson pass and returned it 20 yards for a TD. PAT failed. 8-42.

Jackson fielded the kickoff on the 29 yard line. Jackson passed to Ragsdale for 15 yards and a 1st. A major penalty on Richland Springs gave the Horns 15 more and another 1st. Then the Horns couldn't move and Jackson punted to the Coyote 20. Richland Springs fumbled and Bronte recovered. Hamilton made 3, then Jackson was thrown for a loss. The Coyotes intercepted another Jackson pass. The Horns held the Coyotes on this series to minus 4 yards so Burleson punted to the Bronte 28. Hamilton made 2, then the Horns fumbled. The ball changed hands twice before the game ended with the score Bronte 8, Richland Springs 42.

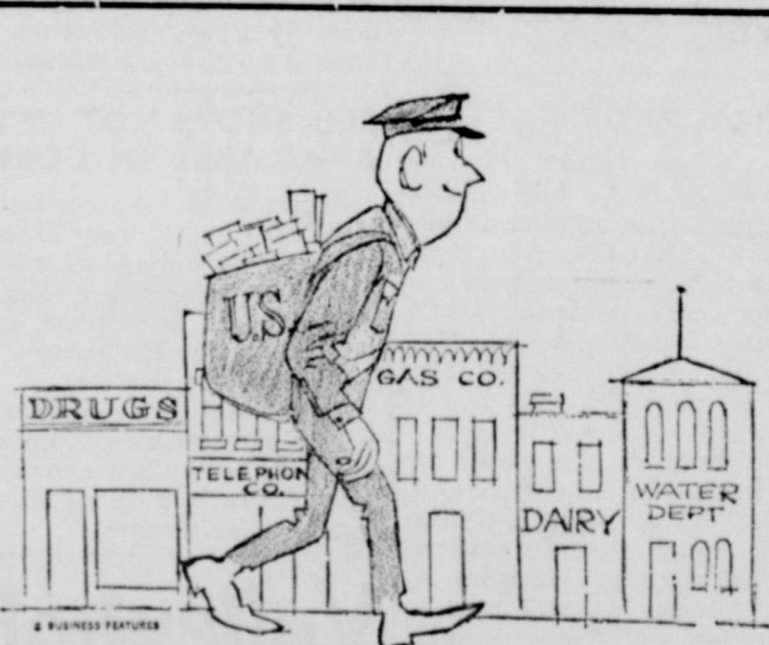
