Hunting Season to Open November 13

Coke County Game Warden R. L. Flanagan has released the following information concerning the forthcoming hunting seasons.

Deer and turkey season will open Saturday, Nov. 13, and will continue through January 2. Bag limit on deer, three. This includes two bucks and the third by antlerless permit only. Bag limit on turkey, two of either sex.

No person may take antlerless deer without first obtaining a permit from the land owner where

Angelo Rites for Dr. R. J. Warren

Dr. R. J. Warren, 85, of San Angelo died Friday, Nov. 5, in Shannon Hospital after a short illness.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in Robert Massie Riverside Chapel in San Angelo with Masonic graveside services at 3:30 p.m. in Fairview Cemetery in Bronte.

He was born Jan. 27, 1891, in Brenham and was married to Callie Mae Hickman July 15, 1926. He graduated from Baylor University School of Dentistry in 1926. He moved to San Angelo in 1927 and remained active as a dentist, farmer and rancher until about two weeks before his death. He had ranch property west of Bronte.

He was a life member of the Texas Dental Association and had received an award for 50 years of dental service from that organization. He was a member of the San Angelo Dental Society, the American Dental Society, the First Baptist Church in San Angelo and the Scottish Rite bodies in Dallas.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Dr. Joe B. Warren of Midland; and two grandchildren.

such animal is killed. All tags and permits must be attached to animals immediately upon possession and remain attached until the carcass has been finally processed. Recommended procedure is to fasten tags and permits to antlers or forelegs with string or wire.

It is unlawful for any person to kill and possess a turkey without attaching the turkey tag from their valid hunting license to the bird and this tag must remain attached to the bird until arrival at its final destination.

Quail season also opens Nov. 13 and will continue through Feb. 13. Bag limit is 12 per day, 36 in possession.

The javelina season opened Oct. 1 and will go through Jan. 2. Bag limit is two.

Legal shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Flanagan also noted that the sandhill crane season for Coke County opens Dec. 4 and continues through Jan. 30. Persons interested in hunting the crane need to write to Parks and Wildlife Department H, Reagan Bldg., Austin, Tex. 78701 requesting the permits. The season is open on a line lying west of a line from San Angelo along Highway 277 to Abilene. Hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Anyone leasing property for hunting is required to buy a shooting preserve license. This can be obtained from Parks and Wildlife Dept. in San Angelo.

Persons between ages 17 and 65 are required to buy resident hunting licenses while those under 17 and over 65 need to obtain exempt licenses.

Virus Illness Hits Nursing Home

A virus type infection has just about reached epidemic proportions during the past week at the Bronte Nursing Home. Eight of the residents of the home have been hospitalized at West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee, and most of the other residents have been affected by the ailment to a lesser degree and have been treated at the home.

L. O. Clark, administrator, said the public has been very cooperative in not visiting at the home while the residents are ill; thus taking less chance on spreading the infection.

Clark noted this time of the year some of the common of the more than 200 different viruses may infect man no matter how many precautions are taken to prevent it. He said, however, that persons who are ill should stay away from crowds and such places as schools, nursing homes, hospitals, churches, etc. Likewise, persons who are not ill should avoid places where persons are known to be infected. Symptoms which are common with the ailment include fever, nausea, dysentery and vomiting.

Clark said it is impossible to isolate oneself from daily living in a community, but added that all reasonable precautions should be taken.

He said officials of Bronte Nursing Home appreciate the cooperation of the public in helping prevent further spread of the infections and asked continued cooperation until "everyone is feeling better."

Horns Edge Miles In Season's Finale, 8-6

The Bronte Longhorns ended a rather unimpressive season on a winning note by downing the Miles Bulldogs 8-6 in a District 6-B west zone game. The final contest was played last Friday night on the Bulldogs' home ground.

First Quarter

Miles won the coin toss and chose to receive. Donald Rowoldt took Donnie Jackson's kickoff at the 20 and returned it to the 35.

Miles picked up one first before drawing a 5 yard offside penalty that required a punt to the Bronte 34.

Turney Coulter's three carries

failed to net a first down and Jackson punted to the Miles 20.

Miles could not move and a holding penalty forced the Bulldogs to punt from deep in their own territory. The Longhorns had good field position on the Miles 42 but Quarterback Randy Parker lost 10 on a roll and Coulter lost the handle on the ball at the 50.

Some good defensive work, led by Joe McCarty, held the Bulldogs to deficit yardage, and the ensuing punt died on the Bronte 35. It was from this point that the Longhorns had their best drive. Senior Joe Bob Ragsdale got 7 and Coul-

ter picked up Bronte's first down with an 8 yard burst.

Ragsdale got 6, Coulter 1, Ragsdale 1, and then Coulter hit the left side on a quick opener, and his speed propelled him 40 yards into the end zone untouched. Coach Sandusky chose to run the conversion and Coulter proved worthy for the occasion. The Longhorns led 8-0 with 50 seconds remaining on the clock. The Bulldogs took the kickoff and made one first down before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

A clipping penalty immobilized the Bulldogs and they punted to

the Bronte 48. Ragsdale and Coulter combined to give the Longhorns a couple of first downs but a bad exchange between the center and quarterback gave the ball to Miles on their own 5. The Bulldogs could not pick up a first down and the punt was returned to the Bronte 37.

A Parker-Coulter pass was intercepted on the 20. Modesto Salinas, the Bulldogs' quarterback picked up 15 to the Bronte 5. The Bulldogs carried it across the goal line from there but an offside penalty nullified it. Bronte finally got possession on the 17 and two plays

later Parker burst out to the 35. One uncompleted pass and one 7 yard run by Ragsdale ended the first half play.

Third Quarter

The Longhorns took the kickoff at the 20 and immediately set sail for the far end. Ragsdale got 3, 7, 7 and 9, while Coulter got 25. The drive was ended when Parker fumbled at the Miles 26. Miles immediately picked up two first downs and 42 yards.

The Longhorns held the Bulldogs held and just when the Horns started moving the old nemesis —

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CHRISTMAS SEALS STILL FIGHTING LUNG DISEASES

Christmas Seals fight lung disease and are still doing so after 70 years. In 1907 a volunteer worker named Emily Bissell designed and sold the first Christmas Seals in the United States to raise \$300 to keep open a TB hospital in Delaware. Selling the seals in the post office lobby, Miss Bissell exceeded her goal and raised \$3,000 that first year.

In 1976, volunteers continue to work to raise needed funds. Coke County Volunteer Advisor is Mrs. Billy Joe Luckett of Bronte.

The Lung Association's fight against tuberculosis began in 1907, and that successful battle is the medical miracle of the 20th century. Now, 70 years later, Christmas Seals are still fighting TB, and have responded to the need to work with other lung diseases such as emphysema, asthma and bronchitis. This year's seals picture scenes of rural America spanning the years of the Lung Association's existence.

In the 32 county Big Country Area of the American Lung Association of Texas, Christmas Seal money is used to initiate programs teaching better breathing to chil-

dren with asthma; to conduct training workshops for medical professionals that improve lung care services; to provide informational programs on tuberculosis, emphysema, asthma, and other crippling lung diseases; to furnish educational materials on the respiratory system and on lung disease to teachers, students and the public.

Nationally, Christmas Seals fund education and research programs to find new ways to treat these diseases. Ideas generated by Christmas Seal research come back to the local community to help the lung disease patient.

Lungs are lovely, and you can help keep them that way by contributing generously to Christmas Seals this holiday season, said a spokesman for the association.

But complications of the disease, although slow and subtle in their onset, ultimately affect most individuals with the disorder.

The fact that many diabetics under proper control lead active lives and are gainfully employed should

not lead to public complacency. Diabetes is a major personal and public health problem and there is no cure or preventive for the disease.

In this country diabetes now ranks as fifth leading cause of death by disease, the leading cause of heart attacks, strokes, high blood pressure, gangrene and kidney failure.

Anyone, at any age, can become diabetic; or can have the disease and not know it, for the symptoms are not always present. Those most likely to get it, however, are children of diabetics, relatives of diabetics and people who are over 40 or overweight.

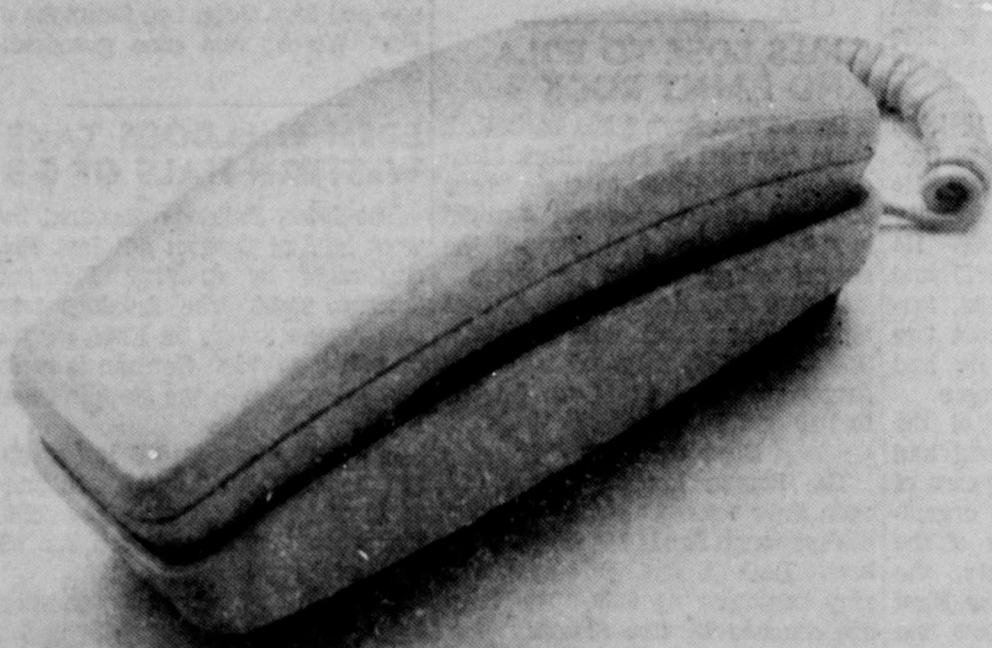

fumble — caught them at the Miles 24. Miles had some big gainers, including a 50 yard pass, but a clipping penalty and good Horn defense gave the ball back to Bronte.

Fourth Quarter

On the first play Parker got his biggest gainer of the night, a 36 yarder, that placed the ball mid-field. Here it comes again — a fumble by Coulter — at the Miles 49.

The Bulldogs were stymied, mostly by Senior Billy Hamilton, and punted to the Bronte 10. Ragsdale, on a fine 35 yard sprint, placed the ball on the 45. It happened again — a Bronte fumble.

Miles took to the air and assisted by the running of their 210 pound fullback, moved the ball to the one foot line from which it was sneaked across on a fourth down try. The Bulldogs' attempt to tie the game by running the conversion failed. Longhorns 8, Bulldogs 6.

The Horns took the kickoff but could not move. On their first try Miles again took to the air but Freshman Danny Aquero snuffed the threat with an interception at the Bronte 35. Some short yardage and a pass completion had the Longhorns at mid-field again.

Yep, a fumble on the Miles 47, a couple of long pass completions and the Bulldogs were knocking at the door again.

Both sides were penalized and confusion reigned. When game officials finally got things squared Miles had the ball on the Longhorns' 5 yard line, fourth down, and four seconds to go. The attempted field goal, which would have given the Bulldogs a 9-8 victory, was wide of its mark, much to the delight of the Bronte fans and the 14 Longhorn football players.

Final score: Bronte 8; Miles 6.

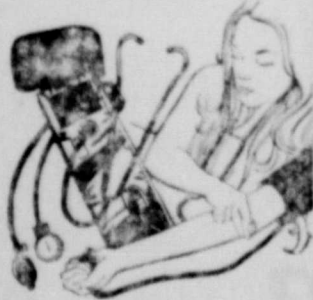

The members of Congress have declared that a potential public health emergency exists; and taxpayers' monies have been appropriated for the development and distribution of an effective vaccine against "swine" influenza.

The Texas Department of Health Resources and the First Lady's Volunteer Program, Office of the Governor, have joined in a cooperative effort to deliver effectively the "swine" flu vaccine to every Texan desiring protection.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the months of October, November and December, 1976, as

INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION MONTHS in Texas, and urge all Texans to avail themselves of the free protection from the flu.

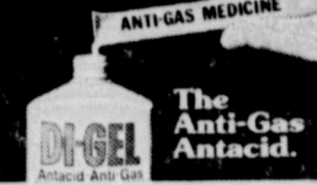

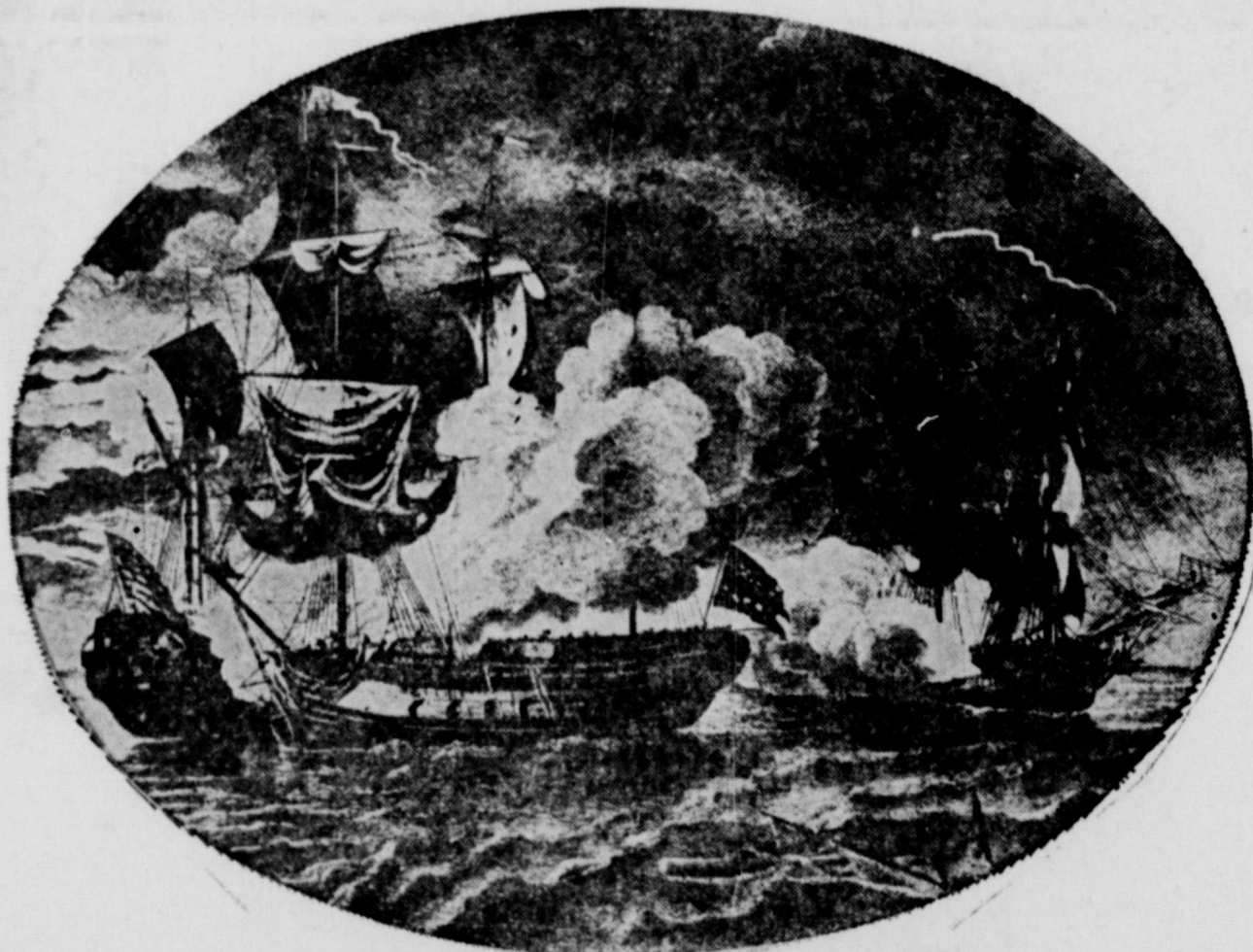

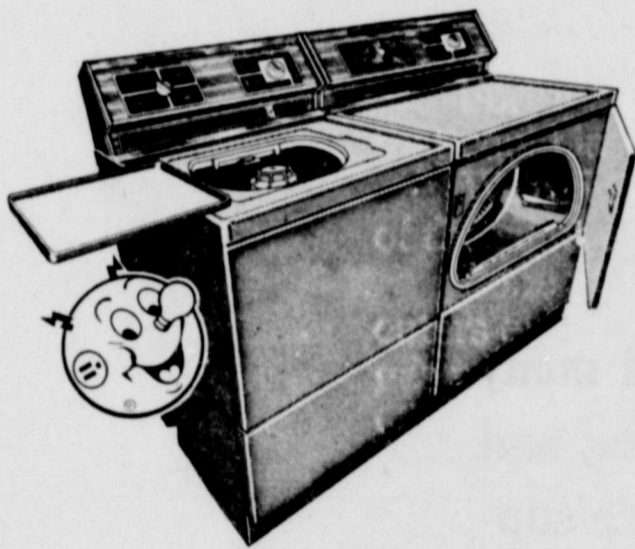
