LIVE STOCK NEXT FARMER PROBLEM

American Farm Bureau Committee Adopts Report on Marketing of Meat Animals

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 3.—The farmers' Live Stock Committee of Fifteen appointed by President J. R. Howard of the American Farm Bureau Federation has completed its report on live stock marketing investigation and recommends the organization of a great National Live Stock Producers Organization with the establishment of the terminals of Producers' Live Stock Commission Associations with allied stocker-and-feeder companies; the working out for an orderly marketing program by the Board of Directors of the National Live Stock Producers Association; the establishment by the same agencies of a Transportation Department to co-operate with the American Farm Bureau Federation and the State Farm Bureau; the interpretation of Live Stock Certificates, and co-operation with the American Farm Bureau Federation in extending the market for meat. Ratification of the marketing plan will be considered November 10, by a meeting of representative live stock men from all over the United States.

The committee desired early in its investigation that the problems which it needed to consider involved co-operative marketing, orderly marketing, live stock production and marketing information, transportation and financing.

Existing live stock organizations were studied carefully by the committee and the most of a National Association was seen early in the proceedings. Memberships will be sold to Co-operative Live Stock Shipping Associations and to individuals. None but bona fide livestock producers may become members.

The directors of the Terrestrial Commission Association must be chosen at the time of election.

Earnings of the Association will be distributed to the membership in the form of patronage dividends. It is hoped thereby to get meat from the producer into the big markets at actual cost.

SIXTY-THREE CENTS A POUND OBTAINED FOR WOOL

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 3.—A telegram from Geo. E. Retan, sales manager of the Southwestern Farm Bureau Wool and Mohair Pool concentrated at Houston states that he has sold a hundred bags of scoured wool at 63c a pound wool sold in smaller lots not bringing quite as good a price.

The Southwestern Wool and Mohair Pool has nearly a million pounds of wool in Houston which has been graded, classed and prepared for the factory. The sales manager is selling direct to the factory and cutting out the intermediate dealers in wool, according to officials in the Texas Farm Bureau headquarters at Dallas.

CHILDREN POOL EGGS TO RAISE SCHOOL FUNDS

Georgetown, Texas.—The children of Concord, one of the progressive rural schools of Williamson County, observing the success of their fathers in pooling cotton and other products for market, have adopted similar methods for the purpose of more speedily raising funds for improvements.

They have set aside Friday of each week as egg day and every Friday morning every child brings to school any number obtainable, pool them and sell to the nearest market. They have already raised a considerable sum toward a fund for equipping their play ground and the purchase of a piano for the school.

ROADS TO CONTINUE MOVE FOR WAGE CUT

Union Chiefs Depending on Labor Board to Stave it Off.

Chicago. — Railroad heads Friday night declared the nation's carriers would go right ahead with their plans to seek new wage cuts through railroad labor board hearings despite the announcement from the unions that their action in calling off the strike scheduled for October 30, had been influenced by the board's announcement that pay reduction petitions for any class would not be considered until working conditions for that class had been settled.

"The calling off of the strike will have no effect on the plans announced by the carriers October 14 to seek immediate wage reductions so that rates could be reduced," said Samuel Felton, president of the Chicago Great Western, and chairman of the Association of Railroad Executives.

"I don't know how long, under the board's ruling, it will take to reach a decision on any pay cut petition, but these petitions undoubtedly will be presented within a very short time. It will be up to the board then to decide what action should be taken.

"I want it made plain, however, that we will seek these petitions in accordance with the law, posting notices of cuts, then discussing the matter with the employees, then, if no agreement is reached, appealing to the board to settle the dispute."

Dr. Hadley Given Death Penalty.

Richmond, Va.—A verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree was returned by a jury in Henrico County circuit court Wednesday in the case of Dr. Wilmarth A. Hadley, former United States army surgeon, charged with the murder of his wife, Mrs. Sue Kathleen Tinsley Hadley. The body of Mrs. Hadley was found in the James River near Richmond about three years ago.

Washington. — Approximately seven million pounds of wool, held in the army warehouse at South Boston, Mass., will be offered for sale there November 3, the War Department announced this week.

Milan.—Earthquake shocks were felt in the cities of Massa and Carnara, on the Tuscan coast of Italy, Wednesday. Considerable damage was done and the frightened people of both cities camped during the night in the open fields.



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THERE WILL BE NO RAILROAD STRIKE

Union Leaders Vote to Recall Strike Order After Conference.

Chicago.—The rail strike scheduled for Oct. 30 was averted Thursday when leaders of the switchmen, trainmen, conductors and engineers and firemen at a joint meeting adopted resolutions withdrawing authorization of a walkout and officials of the railroad telegraphers' organization announced they would take similar action. These were the only unions which have authorized a strike.

The vote calling off the strike was unanimous by organizations, W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, announced. The official wording of the resolution adopted was "that the resolution be declared now effective."

L. E. Shepperd, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, said that the unions had decided to call off the strike because of growing public opinion that the strike would be against the labor board and consequently the government and not against the railroads.

"This railroad propaganda found its way to the United States railroad labor board. This governmental agency told us that it would look on a strike as against it and the government and not against the roads and that the full force of the government would be brought to bear against us if we walked out. Under such circumstances there was nothing to do but annul our orders for the Oct. 30 walkout."

The first announcement of the executives' action was made by Mr. Lee. Rushing to the floor below the hotel meeting room where dozens of newspaper reporters were congregated, he smilingly shouted:

"The strike is off, boys, but I've only got one copy of the resolution and I'll show that to you tomorrow."

All of the union men were smiling as they came out and many of them jocularly pushed and shoved each other down the stairs. To all queries, most of them merely replied:

"It's all settled, see you tomorrow."

Union leaders said that the resolution adopted by the labor board announcing that no further wage reduction petitions for any one group of employees would be considered until rules and working conditions for that group had been settled, "was decidedly instrumental" in bringing about the action calling off the walkout.

CYCLE GUARDS FOR N. Y. MAIL

New York.—Fifteen motorcycles with sidecar attachments, driven by armed postal employees, were put into service today to accompany wagons loaded with valuable mail. The machines were ordered by Postmaster Morgan at the instance of Postmaster General Hays, because of the sensational mail truck robbery last Monday in which bandits escaped with \$1,500,000 worth of money and securities. The side cars were unoccupied today, but it was announced that armed guards will ride in them in a few days.

Door Broken Open and Postage Stamp Drawer Ransacked; Safe Left Unmolested

Thursday morning when Postmaster A. R. Gold and his assistants Monroe Wahl and Harry Kusenberger arrived for their day's work they found the door open. Investigation disclosed the fact that some one had pried the door open, probably with a crow bar, breaking the door lock. After this lock was broken there was sufficient play to allow the robber to open the door despite of the Yale lock, which had been left intact. The marks clearly indicate that some heavy iron instrument was used in opening the door.

**850 DISASTER DEATH
 TOLL FOR ONE YEAR**

Red Cross Gives \$1,871,000 Relief When 65,000 Families Are Made Homeless.

Forty-three disasters, resulting in the death in the United States of 850 persons and the injury of 2,500 called for emergency relief measures and the expenditure of \$1,871,000 by the American Red Cross during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, says an announcement based upon the forthcoming annual report of the Red Cross. These disasters caused property damage estimated at \$30,000,000, affected sixty-seven communities and rendered 65,000 families homeless.

The year's disasters were of varying types, including several which previously had never been thought of as falling within that classification. The Red Cross furnished relief in seventeen fires of magnitude, five floods, seven tornadoes or cyclones, one devastating storm, three explosions, including the one in Wall street; one building accident, two typhoid epidemics, the most serious being that at Salem, Ohio, which affected 9 per cent of the population; one smallpox epidemic, in the republic of Haiti; one train wreck, the race riot at Tulsa, Okla.; the famine in China, emergency relief in famine among the Indians of Alaska, the grasshopper plague in North Dakota and an earthquake in Italy.

Pueblo Most Serious

By far the most severe of the disasters in the United States during the period covered by the Red Cross report was the Pueblo flood early in June, 1921. The rehabilitation problem confronting the Red Cross in Pueblo was one of the most difficult in recent years. When the first news of the horror was flashed throughout the country, the American Red Cross National Headquarters responded with a grant of \$103,000 for relief work. Governor Shoup of Colorado, appreciating the long and successful experience of the Red Cross in organizing disaster relief work, placed the entire responsibility for the administration of relief in its hands.

In response to appeals from President Harding, Governor Shoup and other governors of western states and through local chapters of the Red Cross and other community organizations, public-spirited citizens brought the total contributed for Pueblo's rehabilitation to more than \$325,000.

The terrible havoc wrought by the flood waters is a matter of record. More than 2,300 homes were affected and 7,351 persons were left homeless. Estimates of \$500,000 as an absolute minimum for rehabilitation were made by Red Cross officials in charge of the relief work.

Fast Work in Wall Street

The Wall street explosion was notable in that relief workers of the Red Cross were on the scene twenty minutes after the disaster occurred. The race riot at Tulsa also was unique in disaster relief annals in that outside of a small emergency relief fund contributed by the Red Cross, the only relief measures outside the city consisted of the service of social workers, nurses and a trained executive whose object was to assist local forces in directing their own efforts.

In decided contrast with the previous year, only one tornado assumed the proportions of a major disaster. This occurred on April 15, in the border sections of Texas and Arkansas with the city of Texarkana as the center. The significant feature of this disaster relief work was the fact that it covered so much rural territory as to make necessary a large number of relief workers.

The famine in China, necessitating relief expenditures totalling more than \$1,000,000 by the American Red Cross was by far the most serious of the foreign disasters in which the Red Cross gave aid.

Builds Up Its Machinery

In connection with the administration of disaster relief measures, an increasing effectiveness on the part of

the Red Cross to deal with emergencies was manifested during the past year. In 328 Chapters of the American Red Cross there have been formed special committees to survey the resources of their respective communities and to be prepared in case of disaster. In others of the 3,402 active Chapters, a network of communication has been formed through which instantaneous relief may be dispatched to any part of the United States.

That its work in this field may be continued with ever greater effectiveness, the American Red Cross is appealing for widespread renewal of membership during its Annual Roll Call, to be conducted this year from November 11 to 24.

LIFE SAVING CORPS ENROLLMENT 10,000

Growth of Red Cross Life Saving Corps throughout the country continued unabated during the last fiscal year, a summary of the year's achievements by that Red Cross Service shows. There are now 100 Corps with a total membership of more than 10,000 members, of which 1,276 are sufficiently skilled in the work to act as examiners. Among the outstanding achievements of the Red Cross in this field during the last year was the organization at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, of what is perhaps the largest life saving corps in the world.

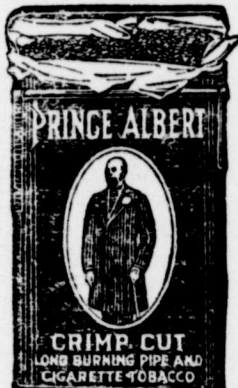

FINAL SCHOOL APPORTIONMENT MADE FOR 1920-21 TERM

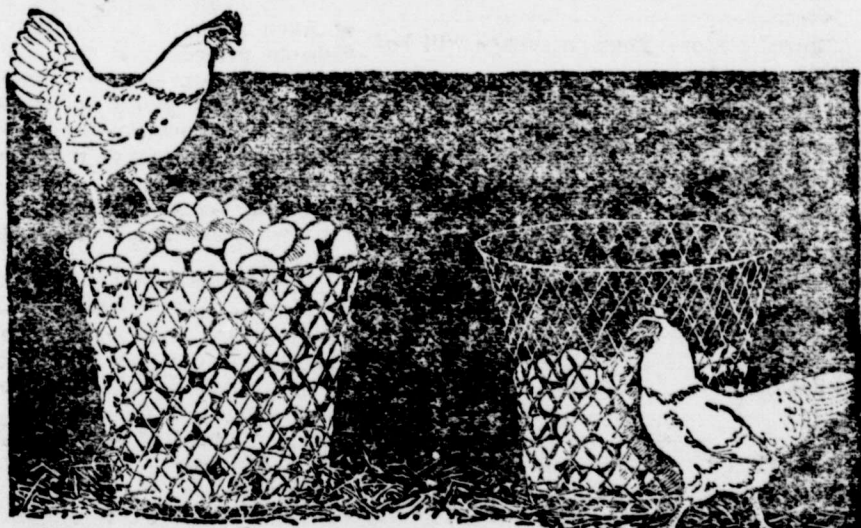
