### JEFF MEERS WILL DRILL ZELLE RANCH FOR OIL—IS CONFIDENT OF OPENING RICH OIL FIELD

Jeff Meers arrived Monday from San Angelo and announces the formation of a trust for the drilling for oil on the Zelle, or McKnight ranch just northwest of Lohn. Mr. Meers has just secured a lease on this entire ranch formerly held by the Prairie Oil & Gas Co. and is now placing drilling machinery on the ground offsetting the gas well drilled by the Prairie Company some time ago.

Mr. Meers has all the information gained by the Prairie Co. in their operations on the ranch and feels assured that a new and rich field will be opened up in the very near future. Mr. Meers stated yesterday that he expected to be ready to start drilling Monday and it was his purpose to give McCulloch county a sure enough oil well for a Christmas present.

Mr. Meers is organizing a trust which will be known as the Jeff Meers Oil Company, the details of which he explains more fully in a signed article in this issue of the Sentinel, but states that drilling will be begun at once without waiting the outcome of the company proposition, and so if not given financial support on the company venture will drill on his own accord.

As is well known here Mr. Meers is the pioneer oil man of this county, and has done more than any other man toward the opening of a field here. Mr. Meers is also quite proficient in geology and with his own knowledge and with the information gained from the Prairie Co. feels that he cannot miss the oil on the Zelle ranch.—Brady Sentinel.

### CRIMINALS HELP PUT BROOKE SMITH BANK OF BROWNWOOD UPON FEET

Brook Smith & Co., Inc., bankers, who suspended business Nov. 22, Monday agreed to leave the liquidation of the bank's affairs in the hands of Brooke Smith, president of the bank here this afternoon. No court action will be taken. Smith will have a legal advisory board to collaborate with him, but there will be no interference with closing out of the bank's affairs.

More than 2,000 creditors have claims, individual deposits being considerably more than half a million. Eastern creditors, one of whom has a claim of \$110,000, said it was the greatest exposure of confidence in an individual banker they had ever known. The bank was the oldest in Brownwood, Brown county, Brooke Smith having carried the banking business here in the early seventies.

### BEGAN CRIME RECORD AS YOUTH IN DALLAS

Dallas, Dec. 10.—Tom Slaughter, notorious bandit, who was killed Friday night in his spectacular escape from the Arkansas State prison, was born in Dallas twenty-seven years ago.

He has a crime record that dates back to his early youth and covers activities in several States and many cities. His operations first were brought to the attention of authorities here when he perpetrated a series of automobile thefts several years ago. His operations extended throughout North Texas and into Oklahoma.

In 1916 Slaughter escaped from the Dallas County jail liberating seven other prisoners at the same time. He later was arrested in Oklahoma and sent to the Texas penitentiary, but shortly after made his escape. He was arrested a second time and sent back to the penitentiary, only again to escape.

In March, 1918, Slaughter made one of the most spectacular escapes of his career. He had been arrested a few days before in Oklahoma and with his brother, Dave Slaughter, was being returned to Dallas by two detectives in automobiles. When they stopped at Greenville, Texas, to replenish their oil supply, Slaughter dashed away in one of the automobiles.

Several bank robberies during the last few years have been charged to him. It is alleged that he figured in the Athens, Texas, bank robbery a few years ago and also is said to have led in the robberies of various banks in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Kansas and Kentucky.

One of his most daring escapes was made four years ago when he held up the jailor while a prisoner at Nowata, Okla. He was recaptured and placed in the Bartlesville, Okla., jail, escaping three days later. He also is reported to have escaped from a county jail near Louisville, Ky. Slaughter married a Dallas woman when he was 20.

**Oklahoma Record Began in Oil Field**  
Tom Slaughter, alias Curley Stone, referred to by his Oklahoma acquaintances as "Curley," was a pioneer of the Healdton oil field and spent some time, at the beginning of the great oil rush there, as a driller, according to information on file here in the Criminal Court of Appeals.

His Oklahoma history centers mostly about Ragtown, one of the boom centers of the original Healdton field in Carter County. His first recorded escapade was one with the proprietor of a hamburger stand in Ragtown. He and his companions, the story has it, were thrown out of employment and they contracted with the proprietor to dig a "slush" hole for him. Then they finished an argument about pay ensued and the hamburger man was warned to leave town. He did, but not until that night, when his stand was "lifted" and all Ragtown was invited to participate in a feast "on" Curley.

As in the case of many earlier Oklahoma bandits, Curley's only irrefutable crime, left to work out their own salvation, were those in which a killing had been consummated. Several stories are told of how Slaughter left the Healdton field, the one given most credence being that of how he took an automobile, drove it to Fort Worth and told a garage proprietor there to write the owner at Ragtown and let him know where his automobile was.

He was captured on his way back to the field in another automobile with a load of liquor. Pleading with the officer that he was tired, but would prove his identity when they returned to Ft.

AN AMUSING story of how Santa Claus frightened the black children at a mission station when he first appeared to them a few years ago, is told by the wife of a missionary stationed at Ballunda, Africa. They had celebrated Christmas at Ballunda before, but they never had had Santa Claus; so Mr. Stover, the missionary, dressed up as good Saint Nick.

"He had been padded and powdered and packed until his own mother would not have known him," Mrs. Stover afterward related. "Presently we gave the signal, the door flew open and in walked Santa Claus. But, dear me! What consternation! He was greeted with shrieks and groans and cries of 'Let me out! It is the evil one. It is the day of judgment!'"

"The urchins, catching the infection of terror from the older black people, fled to their bedrooms, fell down upon their faces, crept under chairs and tables—anywhere to hide themselves. Poor old Santa Claus never had such a greeting before. As soon as he realized the panic he had caused, he tore off his 'all hat and white cotton beard. Then from the bags on his back he began to throw

gifts right and left and to tell who he was.

One man wondered which end up he was to hold the fork Santa Claus had given him. Another immediately tried on his new shirt. **CAPTAIN JOHN WIESHOFFER WILL SALVAGE COLON'S WHALE-GUEST**

Whale Will be Taken to Cold Storage Plant, Cristobal and There Relieved of its Blubber and Whalebone

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Ellebracht, who reside in Mason, are in receipt of a letter from their son, Herman, who is in the Panama Canal Zone, stating that he recently viewed the large whale which is described in an article reproduced below, and which we feel sure will be of interest to News readers, because of the unusual size of the whale, and the fact that it was viewed by a former Mason inhabitant:

Christobal, Nov. 18.—The monster whale which came into the harbor last night breathed his last shortly before four o'clock this afternoon when Captain John G. Wieshofer drove a spike through his "air hole" in the presence of a number of launches crowded with sight seeing people.

What a whale loves to do most is to spout or blow which is an exhalation of air from the lungs and when he cannot do that he usually dies of grief, but his grief was tempered with a tap on the spouter this afternoon and Mister Whale will soon be placed on a flat car by help of a 75 ton crane and shipped to the cold storage plant where he will be salvaged by Captain Wieshofer and the ho and whalebone disposed of.

**Hundred Feet Long**

An 85 foot whale is a monster but this one measures at least 100 feet long. The port captain's launch the Rodman measures 40 feet and this afternoon it was seen that the whale measured more than twice the length of the launch.

Some seven feet of the body was sticking out of the water and the whale was lying in eight feet of water.

Captain McNair said that the thumb rule for weighing a whale of this kind was one ton to the foot and he considered it a conservative estimate to say that the whale was 100 feet in length and weighed at least 100 tons.

The whale's arrival in Isthmian waters was heralded by a radio received on Saturday from Captain Rees, the master of the Cedar Branch who wired to the port captain as follows:

"In position 9.51 N 79.53 W, 28 miles N 5 E true off Atlantic breakwater, I passed obstruction at 1 a. m. today 120 feet long three feet above water, not sufficient light to determine nature but apparently a derelict. At one end raised erection probably poop deck, dangerous to navigation."

Captain McNair said that the captain of the vessel had unquestionably seen the whale and mistaken it for a derelict.

**Knocks Over Cayuca**

Two coconut gatherers from the San Blas coast reported this afternoon that their boat had been completely overturned and they had been thrown into the sea, losing their nuts.

One of them who gave his name as Rodrigo Jimenez said that they were sailing along peacefully about half past two o'clock yesterday afternoon when, as they approached the east breakwater they saw a monster coming very slowly towards them.

They both paddled hard for the breakwater, but were not in time, for the whale "roughed" them and over they went. They swam for the breakwater and made it all right and eventually secured their overturned canoe about half a mile further down. The whale did not molest them but he seemed to be shimmying towards them and they took the boat up on the breakwater and waited until he was out of sight.

**Nearly Upsets Ship**

As the Eastern Prince was coming in the channel last evening the whale was spotted in front of the steamer and the captain for a moment wondered whether a steering clear of her he might land on the bank of the channel, but luckily the whale itself cleared round just as if it was rounding one of Dec Taylor's street corner signs and the gallant Prince liner wended its way onwards.

Last night the whale was encountered near the Pacific Line's hulk Arica and it seemed to get all tangled up with the telephone cables and was eventually pulled up to the shallow water where it remained all night and the greater part of the day all done to and tired out for Captain Wieshofer, Captain Spirling, P. Miller, William H. Stone, John Kinnon and a host of others were all out with guns and harpoons bent on sending the monster to kingdom come.

Every available launch went out last night to see the monster and many estimates were made about its length which varied from 45 feet to 150 feet. But it was only when the chief measurer F. E. Williams had made a survey

was the result accurately known. Mr. Williams estimated it as follows: Panama Canal measurement, 104.99 feet; 15.63 feet to 8.67 feet. Gross tons, 87,641. Net tons, 66,817.

**Specie Sulphur Bottom**

**NEW QUADRUPLE TREATY PLACES ANGLO-JAP ALLIANCE BY DEFENSIVE AND OFFENSIVE**

Washington, Dec. 10.—The terms of the treaty entered into by the United States, the British Empire, Japan and France are as follows:  
Draft of Treaty—Terms agreed upon Dec. 9, 1921:

"The United States of America, the British Empire, France and Japan with a view to the preservation of the general peace and the maintenance of their rights in relation to their insular possessions and insular dominions in the region of the Pacific Ocean, have determined to conclude a treaty to this effect and have appointed as their plenipotentiaries:

"The President of the United States of America.

"His majesty, the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and for the Dominion of Canada, for the Commonwealth of Australia, for New Zealand and for India.

"The President of the French Republic.

"His majesty, the Emperor of Japan. "Who, having communicated their full powers found in good and due form have agreed as follows:

"1. The high contracting parties agree, as between themselves, to respect their rights in relation to their insular possessions and insular dominions in the region of the Pacific Ocean. If there should develop between any of the high contracting parties a controversy, arising out of any Pacific question and involving their said rights, which is not satisfactorily settled by diplomacy and is likely to affect the harmonious accord now happily subsisting between them, they shall invite the other high contracting parties to a joint conference to which the whole subject will be referred for consideration and adjustment.

"2. If the said rights are threatened by the aggressive action of any other power, the high contracting parties shall communicate with one another fully and frankly in order to arrive at an understanding as to the most efficient measures to be taken, jointly or separately, to meet the exigencies of the particular situation.

"3. This agreement shall remain in force for ten years from the time it shall take effect and, after the expiration of said period, it shall continue to be in force subject to the right of any of the high contracting parties to terminate it upon twelve months' notice.

"4. This agreement shall be ratified as soon as possible in accordance with the constitutional methods of the high contracting parties and shall take effect on the deposit of ratifications, which shall take place at Washington, and thereupon the agreement between Great Britain and Japan, which was concluded at London on July 13, 1911, shall terminate."

**CANT TRANSPORT LIQUOR IN TEXAS**

Austin—Regardless of the recent ruling of the Court of Criminal Appeals that it is not unlawful to possess intoxicating liquors unless for the purpose of sale, persons cannot transport the liquor from one place to another, even if for their own personal use, Assistant Attorney General L. C. Sutton held in an opinion given Saturday.

He was answering a question regarding a man who had been found with two bottles of whiskey in his automobile.

Although under the court's recent ruling, it hardly is possible to charge the defendant with having liquor for sale, Sutton pointed out, he could be charged with transporting liquor, as the Legislature left that provision of the Dean law intact, but took out the clause on possession for personal use.

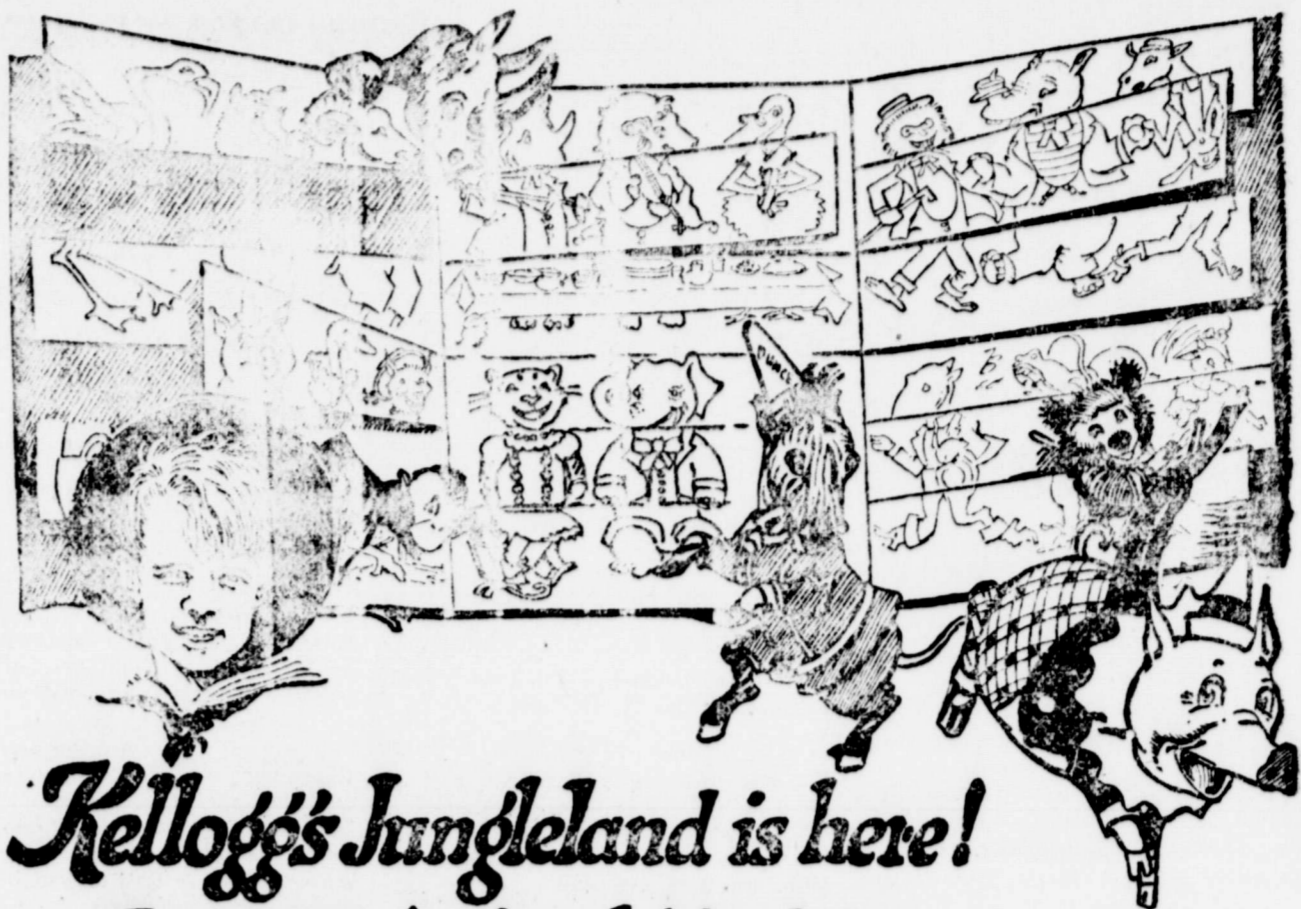

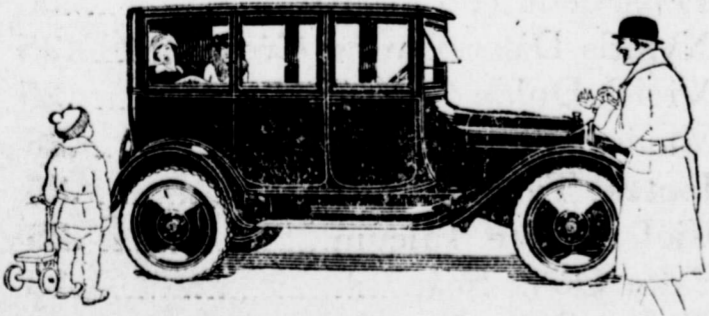

## Texas News

The annual meeting of the Panhandle Swine Breeders' Association will be held in Hereford January 18 and 19.

Quail hunters near Rockdale are beginning to bring in bags of the best game birds, fat and plump this year, owing to much mast and long, dry autumn.

The government ginning report credits Lampasas county with 5,988 bales of cotton for 1921. This includes both round and square bales, of which 2,760 were round.

A railroad from Breckenridge to Caddo and the Hart-Seaman-Hughes area, or from Parks to Caddo and on to the Hart-Seaman-Hughes area, will be built in the near future.

An extra large timber wolf, measuring 28x54 inches and weighing 42½ pounds, which has been killing sheep, turkeys and poultry for the past two years, was killed recently about six miles north of Brandon.

As a step towards the standardization of cotton in De Witt County a series of meetings to be held throughout the county were planned at a meeting of the De Witt County agricultural board at Cuero.

The state capitol will close two days for the Christmas holidays, it was decided at a meeting of the department heads this week. The departments will be closed December 24 and 25 and on January 2 to celebrate New Year's Day.

Exports from the Port Arthur customs district in November totaled \$7,133,748, and imports \$1,556,433. The records indicate about \$500,000 increase over the previous month. Imports of Mexican crude oil were largely increased in November.

For some time past home grown tomatoes have been on sale at El Campo. This is rather unusual for a fall crop to be grown. The vines were old ones that had been cut and kept alive with the result that a new growth was made and a new crop put on.

Over 200,000 pounds of decayed foodstuffs were destroyed by representatives of the state health department during November, State Health Officer Manton M. Carrick announced this week. The food was declared unfit for human consumption. It was found in stores of various towns and cities of Texas.

Pipelines operating in Texas gathered during October, 8,189,035 barrels of crude oil, the railroad commission reported this week. The greatest number of barrels were gathered from the Burkburnett field, amounting to 1,503,407 barrels. Columbia was second with 1,078,211 barrels, and Breckenridge third, with 613,478 barrels.

The attorney general's department in an opinion given Friday held that it still is unlawful under the Dean prohibition act to transport intoxicating liquor, whether for sale or not. The court of criminal appeals has held that it is not an offense under the Dean law to possess liquor, except for the purpose of sale. The court, however, has not held that the transportation of liquor is lawful, even where it is not for the purpose of sale.

A ruling has been given by the attorney general's department to Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, that there is no law in Texas authorizing payment of school teachers while attending county institutes, will, according to Miss Blanton, result in abolishment of the annual county teachers' institutes, which have since 1911 been held in the counties of Texas one week prior to the opening of the county schools.

The railroad commission of Texas has ruled that all oil operators drilling for oil or gas in Texas shall keep a painted sign of the name of the person, corporation or company drilling the well in conspicuous place on the derrick or near the derrick. This sign shall also have the name of the farm and the number of the well painted on it. This ruling was adopted because of the difficulty experienced by the commission's field men in identifying wells that were being drilled.

With the receipt of new tax money it will be unnecessary for the State depository board to press any of the State depositories which have secured an extension of the time for returning the State's deposits. This year's taxes are now being collected and heavy payments will be made in January and February. At this time a total of \$1,200,000 of State funds are tied up in depository banks, which were unable to repay fully, and which were granted an extension under the emergency law passed hurriedly at the recent special session of the legislature.

## STATE WINS APPEAL IN LARGE LAND SUIT

### Higher Court Affirms Decision Against Capitol Syndicate.

Austin, Tex.—In an opinion by Associate Justice Charles H. Jenkins the third court of civil appeals today affirmed the well-known Capitol Syndicate case, carrying a judgment for 60,000 acres, recovered by the state of Texas in the Travis County district court. The proceedings were styled Findley et al vs. State of Texas.

The land recovered is part of the original grant of 3,000,000 acres to the Capitol Syndicate of Chicago in payment for the granite capitol of Texas, in which today's decision was rendered. By action begun two years ago the state, after the capitol had been completed thirty-one years, instituted suit to recover land alleged to be vacant and excessive within the original boundaries of the grant, and obtained judgment for an aggregate of 60,000 acres. While civil appellate courts are usually the tribunals of last jurisdictional resort in land boundary matters, there are other questions in the instant case which will cause application for writ of error to the supreme court to be filed.

If the judgment is made final the state will have 60,000 acres of land for sale in the row of counties along the western side of the Panhandle.

One phase of the litigation that is supposed to be final with today's decision is for three tracts of defined vacant land, one of 1,560 acres in Hartley County and two of 2,600 and 320 acres in Oldham County. The excess judgment is for 55,089 acres scattered through the two counties and Dallam, Parmer and Deaf Smith.

The district court appointed a partition commission of three to segregate the 55,089 acres from the present 500,000 acres of land still owned by the trustees of the syndicate, Findley, et al. This commission consists of William Balfour of Oldham County, Frank M. Tatum of Dallam County and Captain R. S. Dod of Brewster County.

### TWO SETS OF TRIPLETS AND 48 SETS OF TWINS

Austin, Tex.—In November two sets of triplets and forty-eight sets of twins were born in Texas, according to a report on vital statistics just completed by State Health Officer Manton M. Carrick. This is an increase of twelve sets of twins compared with the October report. No triplets were reported last month. Of the twins born in November, all except four sets were white, and all of the triplets were white.

Births in November totaled 7,437 against 6,909 for October. Of the births reported 6,519 were white and 564 negroes. Dr. Carrick estimates that only 20 per cent of negro births were reported. Deaths numbered 2,777 against 2,456 the preceding month. As usual, tuberculosis caused the greatest number of deaths, 260. Of the deaths 25 were between 90 and 100 years of age; 5 were over 100 years old, the oldest being a white man 104 years.

Twenty-five victims of homicides were reported; suicides numbered 29 victims of automobile accidents, 21; railroad accidents, 13; drowning, 12; pneumonia, 42, an increase of 50 per cent over October. Homicides increased 11 over October.

**Death of Judge Thomas Maxey.**  
Austin, Texas.—Judge Thomas S. Maxey, 75 years old, formerly United States district judge for the Western district of Texas, died suddenly Monday at his home in Austin. Judge Maxey was born in Brandon, Miss., September 1, 1846. He entered the University of Mississippi, where he remained until he enlisted in the army of the Confederacy, in which he served with distinction until the close of the civil war. He later entered the University of Virginia, where he was graduated in law in 1869.

**Airship Uses Helium Gas.**  
Washington, D. C.—The initial flight of a big navy airship by the use of helium over Washington Monday was brought to the attention of the house of representatives in a speech by Representative Lanham of the Fort Worth district where the helium is being extracted. Mr. Lanham pointed out that the United States has a monopoly of the non-inflammable gas in the world, and the necessities of continuing the government's activities in extracting this element from Texas natural gas obtained at Petrolia.

From the Brady papers we notice that the price paid for turkeys in that city during the past week reached a high mark of 34 cents a pound. The Standard told of a farmer residing near Nina McCulloch county, who marketed 105 of the birds and received a grand total of more than \$400 for the bunch.
