## "COW PUNCHERS" HAVE EASY SAILING THROUGH F'D'BG LINE

The Mason High School Football team ran up a score of 72 to 0 over the Fredericksburg High School team on the local gridiron last Saturday afternoon, recording the largest score ever made on the local grounds.

At no time during the game did the visitors threaten the goal of the "Cow Punchers", and only once during the game did Fredericksburg make 1st downs, and this happen when some of the Mason linemen went to sleep and let the little quarterback for the visitors slip through for a ten yard gain, (but they'll be awake at Llano).

Mason scored forty-five points in the first half, of twenty-two minutes. The first touchdown came when Zesch got away on right end for a fifty yard dash.

There were no particular stars in the game Saturday, but every man on the Mason squad was used, and some of the substitutes showed some good stuff.

The game started with Mason kicking off and Fredericksburg returned the ball to their own 25 yard line. 1st down, failed to gain through center, made 1 yd off right tackle, punted and Mason returned to their 44 yd. line; 1st down, Doell smashed thru center for a five yard gain, then Zesch got away on right end for a fifty yard dash for the first touchdown, a pass for an extra point, failed, score 6 to 0 in favor of Mason.

Fredericksburg kicked off and Mason returned the ball to their 45 yard line, 1st down, Sanders made 3 off center, pass incomplete, McDougall to Fostel, Zesch went round left end for 23 yds, Doell made 10 yds off left tackle; 1st down, Sanders gained 2 yds on center, Sanders made 8 1-2 yds on right end, Doell made 5 yds off left tackle, 1st down on Fredericksburg 3 yd line, Zesch went thru right tackle for touch down; McDougall kicked goal for extra point, score 13 to 0.

Mason kicked off and F'dbg returned to their 31 yd line, 1st down, lost 2 yds on left end attempt, failed on right tackle, ball snapped over fullback's head and Mason recovered on F'dbg's 1 yard line; 1st down, Sanders went through line for touchdown, pass for extra point failed; score 19 to 0.

Fredericksburg kicked off and Mason returned to Fredericksburg's 47 yd line; 1st down, Zesch went around left end for 17 yd gain; 1st down, pass, McDougall to McLerran, completed for 17 yd gain and McLerran carried the pig skin across for the fourth touchdown; "Slick" kicked goal for extra point; score 26 to 0. Quarter up.

Fredericksburg kicked off and Mason returned to their 45 yd. line; 1st down, Doell made 5 yds on left end, Sanders made 6 yds on center; 1st down, Sanders made 12 yds on right end, 1st down, McDougall lost 2 yds on left end attempt; Zesch made 16 yds on left end, time out for Fostel; 1st down, Doell went thru center for 8 yds., Doell went thru center for 7 yds; 1st down, Doell made 1 yd off left tackle, McDougall went thru center for touchdown, pass incomplete for extra point, score 32 to 0. Mason penalized 45 yds for substitute talking.

Mason kicked off and F'dbg returned to their 37 yd line; 1st down, made 1 yd on left end, pass incomplete, pass incomplete, punted and Sanders received and returned to the 50 yd line, time out for F'dbg; 1st down for Mason, Doell made 3 off right tackle, pass completed for 20 yd gain, McDougall to Schmidt, pass, McDougall to Doell for a touchdown, try for extra point failed on drop kick, score 38 to 0.

Mason kicked off and F'dbg returned to their 22 yd line, 1st down, pass intercepted by Doell, Mason 1st down on F'dbg 24 yd line, Zesch went around right end for 18 yds, Sanders made 4 yds off left tackle, Sanders carried ball across for touchdown and McDougall kicked goal for extra point, score 45 to 0. Half up.

### Second Half

Mason kicked off and Fredericksburg returned to their 30 yd line, time out for F'dbg; 1st down, made 10 yds off right tackle, time out for F'dbg; 1st down, lost 37 yds on fumble, but recovered the ball; failed on left end, pass incomplete, pass incomplete, punted and McDougall returned to 50 yd line, 1st down, Zesch made 5 yds off



## MRS. W. G. ALLISON DIED AT HOME OF DAUGHTER THURS.

Mrs. W. G. Allison died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. R. Kirkpatrick in this city, last Thursday morning at 5:15 o'clock.

Mrs. Allison had been ill only a few days, having been stricken with paralysis on the previous Sunday.

Funeral services were held Friday morning at Bethel and were conducted by Rev. J. J. Ray, pastor of the local Christian Church. Interment was made in the Bethel cemetery in the presence of a large crowd who gather to pay last respects to this pioneer citizen.

Deceased had lived in Mason County for more than forty years, and at the time of death, had attained the age of 74 years.

She is survived by six children, all of whom were present for the funeral, namely, W. W. Allison of Cherokee, Will Allison of Menard, John Allison of Uvalde, Baxter Allison of Mason, Mrs. R. R. Kirkpatrick, of Mason, Mrs. Eva Wilson, of Eden.

## HOT BATH EQUIPMENT INSTALLED AT WELLS OPEN FOR B'NESS

The Hot Wells Bath House is a new institution started here at Hot Wells by W. A. Burney and W. Y. Evans, formerly of Mineral Wells, who have moved here and become permanent citizens. Both men and Mrs. Evans, who is a sister of Mr. Burney, thoroughly understand every detail of hot bath application and they declare that there is no other place in Texas that has such fine medicinal opportunities as is found at Hot Wells.

Electrical beds have been installed and are used following hot baths, and after leaving the electrical beds the patient is given a scientific massage. Mrs. Evans is in charge of the women's department at all times and Mr. Burney is in charge of the department for men. A large sum of money has been invested in order to get ready for these features and they are permanent, being in operation in all seasons.

The gas which has heretofore been escaping at the main well has been so arranged that it is now collected and carried by pipe to the sitting room of the bath house where it furnishes heat for the entire building. This is a big institution and will grow as the years pass, meaning much for Brownwood and the Brownwood country because it will no doubt be the means of bringing hundreds of people to this locality. The fixtures which the proprietors have put in are of a costly nature and are first class in every respect.—Brownwood Banner-Bulletin.

## INSTRUCTIONS FOR PAYMENT OF AUTO LICENSE TAX

Issuance of 1924 automobile license seals will begin December 1st.

Attention was called to the new law passed by the last Legislature in regard to auto licenses. Registration will be based on both weight and horsepower of a motor vehicle, and the fee will be much larger than heretofore. The auto license department has the weights of all passenger motor vehicles, but it will be necessary to weigh all commercial motor vehicles before a license can be obtained.

### Must Know Car Model

Applicants must know the exact model and year in which their car was made in order for the department to ascertain the correct weight. Operators of service cars, whether bus or passenger, will have to pay, in addition to the weight fee and the horsepower fee an additional fee of four dollars for each passenger the bus or car will seat.

If the following rules are observed, applicants will have no trouble in securing a license:

"Bring your last license receipt if possible, as this will save much time for both you and the clerk.

If your car was registered in the county for 1923 and you have lost your receipt, copy the license number of your car.

If your car was registered in some other county and you have lost your receipt, write the State Highway Department of Austin for a duplicate.

If your car was registered in some other state you must have registration papers. If these have been lost, write the Highway Department of that state for a duplicate.

Find out the model and the year in which your car was made. If you are in doubt consult some dealer.

If you have a truck, have it weighed and bring the weight slip with you.

If you have purchased a car which was registered by some one else, bring your bill of sale and the license receipt also. If you have filed your bill of sale previously, bring transfer receipt.

If you operate a service car don't fail to tell the clerk, for it will cause trouble later.

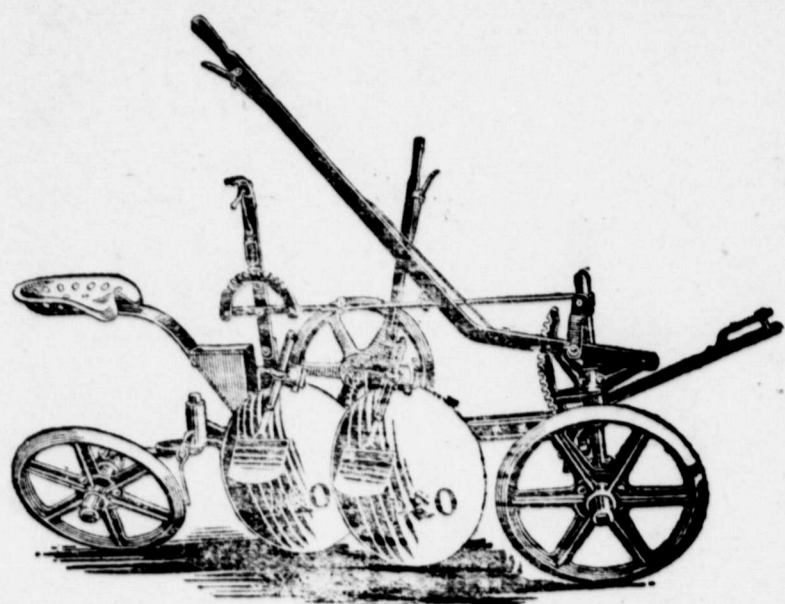

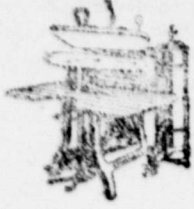

### TURKISH CAPITAL NOISY CITY

According to Accounts, It Is by No Means to Be Recommended as Residence for the Nervous.

There is more noise per cubic foot of night in Constantinople than in any other city in Europe. Independently of a highly varied symphony of casual sounds, one's sleep is broken by officially organized disturbances due to the fact that for policing the city after dark the municipality maintains a number of watchmen armed with long, thick clubs.

Lying abed in the small hours, one has full cause to recognize their zeal, for at frequent intervals the nearest watchman awakens you by beating heavily upon the stones with a resounding cudgel.

It needs a fire, however, to give the watchman full scope for making night hideous. Constantinople, being mainly built of wood and heated by open charcoal stoves, this opportunity comes all too often. As soon as a fire is sighted from the high lookout post on Galata tower word is sent to every quarter of the city.

Till ten years ago this was done by picturesque red-coated runners armed with javelins, but now it goes by telephone, and, for the night watchman, the real fun of the evening begins. Beating a double volley on the pavement, each in turn fills his lungs to capacity and in a tone of long-winded, lugubrious despair wails out fortissimo at frequent intervals: "Yaghlin var!" ("A fire there is!"), following on with an announcement of its situation, and ending with more battering of the flagstones.

As this cry is taken up and repeated from street to street it swells to an appalling clamor.

With cats, dogs and discordant "drunks," Constantinople is well supplied throughout the dark hours, and then, just after daybreak, when sleep is precious because it is precarious, an army of food-peddlers begins to fill the air with clamor.

The Greek housewives of Constantinople are lazy in their habits and rarely get beyond the dressing-gown stage until the afternoon. Their morning marketing is therefore done from the half-opened shutter of an upper window, so that by seven o'clock a shrill chatter of haggling over the price of fish and eggs begins to keep company to the diversified howls of the hawkers, the hoarse shouts of drivers urging overloaded horses up Constantinople's seven hills, the cracking of whips, the rumble of springless carts, the jangling even of camel-bells, the constant hooting of unimportant but fussy steamers on the Golden Horn, the klaxons of Pera chauffeurs, whose Levantine vanity makes them the noisiest and worst drivers in the world, and the clanging, growling and screeching of Constantinople tramway cars twisting round the sharp corners of its narrow streets.

College Station, Nov. 17.—Conferences here between Sir Arnold Theiler, noted British veterinarian of the experiment station at the college, have led to an agreement between them and J. E. Boog-Scott, chairman of the State Livestock Sanitary Commission, and the association of their scientists of the college who have participated in the conferences, that the South African disease of cattle known as "lamsiekte," and for which Sir Arnold has discovered a cure, is identical with the "down in the back" or "loin" disease prevalent in Southern Texas and which has killed thousands of cattle in recent years and effectively baffled all the attempts of scientists to overcome.

Dr. Smith has been in charge of the work at the experiment station in research on the disease and from information which he was able to obtain about the African disease had calculated its identity but he was not able to obtain full information about curative methods until the arrival of Sir Arnold, who is responsible for the discoveries on lamsiekte.

But most important is the nature of the cure. In its broadest aspect the problem is simply one of malnutrition, or the absence of phosphorus from the diet. It has led the animals in the pastures to eat of dead carcasses which furnished a toxin, which caused complete paralysis. Mortality among struck animals has been practically 100 per cent. There are two methods of prevention: removal of carcasses from the pasture or administration of three ounces of bone meal to each stricken animal.

Of course both steps will be followed by cattlemen. But in the discovery of the bone meal diet rests the important thing for the cattlemen. At the price of 80¢ a ton a dose of three ounces of bone meal for one year will represent a cost of \$1.50, and by experiments conducted by Sir Arnold it will give the animal a gain of about 180 pounds a year over the animal that has pasture alone for feed. Sir Arnold left with a committee from the A. & M. College for Houston, where he will lecture to the cattlemen and veterinarians of that district.

### Good Work of Scientists.

It requires more than 6,000,000 tiny dust particles to cover a glass plate one inch square, according to investigators at the structural materials research laboratory of the Lewis Institute, in Chicago. Although it would seem a hopeless task to count these millions of dust particles and measure their exact size, these Lewis institute investigators have carried out a series of tests in which these operations were performed.

### Trackless Trolley Cars.

To distribute the weight more evenly trackless trolley cars have been designed in England having six wheels, one pair carrying the rear half of the load and the other four the front half.

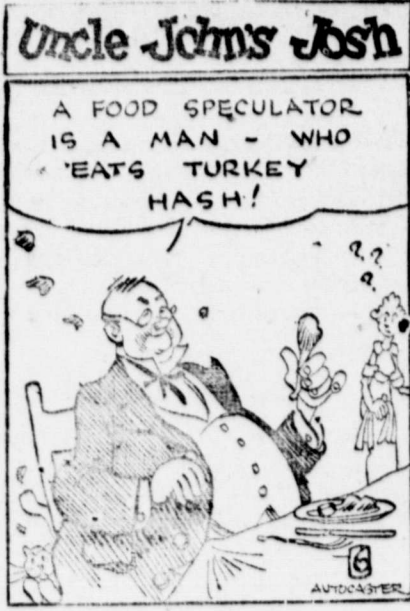
