WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. - Some gossip is being indulged in as to the probability of further immediate gold ship ments. In view of the fact that the average loss of gold to the treasury in January the past twelve years has been \$9,600,000, some of the treasury officials do not believe there is any prospect of such shipments, while there hold to the opinion that with the stiffening of rates of exchange such exports are altogether probable. The belief is general, however, that if such shipments are indulged in the New York banks will not come to the relief of the treasury to any considerable extent, and thus prevent the depletion of the gold reserve.





WIVES AND WIDOWS.

European Idads Permeating the Iron-Bound Castes of Brahminism—The Great Work of Pundita Ramabai Among Her Countrywomen.

"The unchanging Fast" will soon be a misnomer. It is indeed already such. The Fast is now changing. and will presently be wholly trans-formed. India no longer lies slumbering in the lethargy that comes from ages of superstition and a worn-out civilization. Its politics, industries, society, religion, a'l show the workings of a vigorous European leaven. English education. English methods of thought and action. English inventions and English ideas in general are steadily and not slowly extending their sway throughout the whole empire and effecting what Hindoos themselves dec'are to be a renaissance of Indian civilization, 2 renewal of that earlier and better social order that prevailed in the golden era of their history, before the Mohammedan conquest crushed out their vital forces and made them the inert and impuissant people they have since beeft.

Perhaps the most significant characteristic of Indian civilization, since the Mohammedan conquest, has been the degradation of women, es-pecially in the form of child mar-riages and enforced widowhood. These conditions did not prevail in Sanskrit light and leading the women of India were free They were educated equally with the men, and participated as openly in social doings. But after the conquest all this was changed. In order to protect them from invaders, the Hindoos began shutting their women up closely in their homes. This, of course, de-prived the women of all facilities for ducation. Next, the custom arose of marrying the girls in early childhood, even in infancy; and finally it was decreed that a woman or girl, becoming a widow, should not be allowed to remarry, but must for the rest of her life be practicably the shave of her husband's or her own family.

and compulsory widowhood system that the strongest efforts for reform have been directed, both by English missionaries and by native Hindoos who have caught the spirit of European civilization. The work of the Pundita Ramabai, who recently visited the United States, is still fresh in mind. As this campaign has been directed against the very center and citadel of Hindoo conservatism, and especially against the great Brahmin caste itself, its success has until lately been much doubted. Now, however, it is seen that decided progress is being made, and that this "peculiar institution" is dodmed and is rapidly passing away.

The difficulty of converting a Brahmin to Christianity, or even to European social ideas, is still enormous "Our fathers worshiped and believed thus," they say; "and it is impossible that they were wrong. Had they been wrong they must have found it out. If we believe you, we must disbelieve them. How can we do so?" Moreover, the doctrine of caste is so ingrained into them that they unhesitatingly prefer to be wrong with their own people than to be right with others. If their ancestors are in hell, they wish to go there too, rather than suffer the contamination of mingling in heaven with people of other castes. "How many Brahmins have you baptized?" a veteran missionary was asked. "Ten," was his reply. "And how long have you been at work among them?" "Thirty years!" While, however, the Brahmins,

and, in a slightly less degree, the Rajput and Kayastha castes, hold out like veritable Bourbons against reform, in the other castes and tribes sweeping changes are taking place. It was, indeed, high time, unless the Hindoos were to become extinct. For their numbers were steadily decreasing, while the Mohammedans were increasing at a startling rate. As an example in Bengal itself, in 1872, the Hindoos outnumbered the Mo-hammedans by 500,000; while to-day. according to the sensus just taken, the Mohammedans outnumber the Hindoos by 1,500,000. There is no question but that this is due chiefly to the Hindoo system of enforced widowhood. The Hindoos themselves realize it, and accordingly are now; for the most practical of reasons, abandoning that system.
