If it takes congress so long to agree on the tariff and other methods of raising revenue, as it has the ways and means committee, numbers considered, it will be late in the season before it is accomplished.

The unemployed of the large cities are figured up about as follows: New York, 120,000; Washington City, 12,000; Chicago, 100,000; Philadelphia, 40,000; St. Louis, 18,000; Milwaukee, 17,000; Cincinnati, 10,000; Baltimore, 8,000; and a proportionate number in every other city in the country. Only think of this condition of the people and the president with a coxeyal abscess, and congress down with the do-nothings!—Advance.

Did you ever think and figure on the pay of congressmen, estimated in farm products? The salaries of each is \$5,000, besides the mileage and other appropriations made to themselves, which if paid on cotton bales at \$35, each, would require about 143 bales. If paid in corn at 40 cents per bushel, it would take 12,500 bushels. It will equal the present value 10,000 bushels of wheat. Where is the farmer that, with his capital invested in farm, machinery and other necessary expenses, will make this amount of stuff?

Many democratic congressmen want to allow national banks to issue bank notes to the par value of bonds deposited to secure circulation. That is to say a banking company may organize, purchase \$100,000 worth of government bonds, take them to the comptroller of the currency at Washington and receive \$100,000 in bank notes with which to loan to the "dear people" at the best possible advantage to the company. In addition they will receive interest on the \$100,000 bonds deposited, thus drawing interest both from the government treasury and from the individual borrowers. It means a capital of \$200,000 where just one half that sum is invested. Great is the democratic idea of "reform."—Exponent.

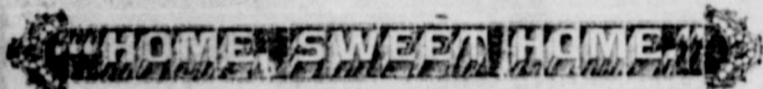
