WASHINGTON, Jan, 19 .- The most significant event in the senate yesterday was the announcement of the resignation of Senator Walthall of Mississippi. It was totally unexpected, and when the presiding officer laid before the senate the letter of the senator announcing that he had for warded his resignation to the gov ernor of Mississippi, the greatest surprise was expressed on all sides. Senator Walthall is 63 years old and necceded the late L. Q. C. Lamar in the senate nine years ago. Ill health is given as the reason.




