WASHINGTON, April 11 .- The coinage and bond bill recently introduced by Representative Meyer [Dem.] of Louisiana is bringing out much discussion between the silver and antisilver Democrats of the house. Mayer was oppose to Bland throughout the seigniorage bill struggle and voted against it. For this reason his proposition to coin the seigniorage under certain conditions is regarded as an overture from anti-silver men to Bland followers. Meyer says it was suggested by the clause in the president's veto message reading as follows: "I am not insensible to arguments in favor of coining the bullion seigniorage now in the treasury, and I be-lieve it could be done safely and with advantage if the secretary of the treasury had the power to issue bonds at a low rate of interest under authority in substitution for that now existing and better suited to the pro-tection of the government." Mr. Meyer's bill follows closely the president's suggestion in the foregoing clause. It provides for the coinage of the seignlorage and gives the secretary of bonds of small denominations in substitution for old bonds.

WASHINGTON, April 16. - Secretary Carlisle appeared before the subcommittee of the house committee on appropriations which is considering ciary appropriation bills. He was interrogated by the committee as to work at the mints in order get the proper estimates appropriations to carry them He said that the mints at Philadelphia, San Francisco and New Orleans were to be continued in the work of coining gold and subsidiary coin, while that at Carson, Nev. was discontinued as a mint and re mained only as an assay office. When asked if he intended to discontinue the coinage of silver dollars, though authorized to do so by the act of 1890, he stated that he would coin no more silver dollars unless congress passed a law instructing him to do so.

WASHINGTON, April 13. - The Nicaragua canal question is receiving ome attention at the hands of the house committee on railways and ca-It has been discussed by the committee at the last two meetings and an opinion was expressed that the subject was properly within its jurisdiction. A bill giving the govrnment a hand in the control of affairs of the canal is now before the committee on interstate and foreign commerce and a resolution will b presented in the house by Representative Hudson with the sanction of the committee asking that the bill be taken from the commerce committee and referred to the committee on railways and canais.

WASHINGTON, April 14. -- There were but thirteen Democratic senators present when the senate met yesterday and half as many more Republicans. Mr. George gave notice that on Tuesday Mr. McLaurin would address the senate on the tariff bill.

The Rouse Deadlock. WASHINGTON, April 12.—Mr. Reed held the house at bay for an hour and a half yesterday on a motion to discharge the warrant issued to the sergeant at arms during the fight over the contested election cases to arrest absentees. The Republicans under his leadership refused to vote, and the Democrats being unable to muster a quorum, yielding to an adjournment. The Democrats fear that this move on the part of Mr. Reed is in pursuance of a carefully formulated plan to force the constant attendance of a Democratic quorum hereafter. The Republicans deny that any such plan has been agreed upon. The business of the house is well advanced and if such a scheme were carried into effect the Democrats say they will have ample time to transact their routine business before the senate disposes of the tariff bill. Immediately after the reading of the journal yesterday the house got into a deadlock over a technical parliamentary question, the Republicans not voting and the Democrats lacking thirty-three of a quorum.
