FARMERS ORGANIZE AND GO TO WORK

The Second Meeting of the Roosevelt County Farmer's Agricultural Club is a Rouser and if YOU Missed You Are the Only Loser

The farmers of Roosevelt county held another one of their "get-together" meetings last Saturday at one thirty o'clock. A goodly bunch of representative farmers were present and from expressions heard on all sides this is one thing that is going to go from the start.

Meeting was called to order at one-thirty o'clock, Pres. Brown presiding. Committee on organization not being ready to report R.G. Bryant made a motion that committee be retained until next date of meeting, motion carried.

Carl Johnson reported for the program committee and offered Dr. Stout and Dr. Bailey as the speakers of the meeting. Dr. Stout being unable to be present at this meeting his speech was retained until next regular day of meeting.

Dr. Bailey was then called upon and delivered a talk on organization educational value of cooperation that was received with the undivided attention of all that were present. The Doctor grew reminiscent in his talk and gave his experience as a "Yankee" among cross timber farmers of Texas. In all his talk was a treat.

The chair then called for suggestions from the members as to bettering the conditions custom among the farmers of Roosevelt county and the suggestions given were worth remembering and doing.

The committee on program has the following to offer for the meeting to take place next Saturday week February the 22th. Talk on cultivation, planting and marketing cabbage by Dr. Stout who has successfully raised and sold cabbage in Texas. Then J. W. Thompson, an old timer here will talk the subject "From New Ranch to a Farm," showing the fall of the cattle kings and how they have been seen that very thing happen in Roosevelt county.

Then one of the treats of the evening will be "How to Raise Cantaloupes Not in Rocky Ford

But in Roosevelt County" by Carl Mueller, who demonstrated last year that there was money in cantaloupes at 25 cents a crate. The committee chose Mr. Mueller instead of a high priced, salaried cantaloupe man because Mr. Mueller is a farmer and knows from his own experience how to raise cantaloupes here. If you intend planting an acre of cantaloupes come out and hear how Mr. Mueller raised 2200 crates of number one choice cantaloupes from 8 acres of ground.

Then Mr. L. W. Carlton will tell us how he took a few head of ordinary cows like we all have and has paid for them, improved himself financially and has made an all-round success by selling the cream from those cattle. You will be sure to enjoy this talk.

As a side issue and to give you an idea of what a new-comer experiences in helping to develop this country the committee has prevailed upon Carl Johnson to give his experience while here. All of you who know Carl know that his experiences would fill a book so the committee has limited his talk to five minutes.

An innovation to be added at the next meeting will be a bulletin board of trades and swaps that the farmers want to make. Some of these trades that are already listed are as follows:

A Marlin Repeating 12 ga. shot gun in good order for a riding lister planter.
A gelding for a cow.
Two cows and one calf for sale.
An organ for a calf.
Mexican seed beans for seed sweet potatoes.

A 6 in. centrifugal pump in good shape for a 4 inch pump.

The meeting will commence at one-thirty o'clock and the speakers will talk for fifteen minutes each and in all the meeting won't take very much of your time and if you come up at the next meeting and don't think you have learned something at no expense except your time you will fool the editor. CHICK! CHICK! CHICK!

Portales has again come to the front with a man who will possibly be the first in the state to establish the custom hatchery industry.

As mentioned in a recent editorial of this paper a gentleman, Dr. John Reid by name, has been here for the past several months figuring on opening up a custom hatchery and he has at last decided to open one which will be first class in every particular and will give good service to the citizens and farmers of Roosevelt county.

Mr. Reid says that he has had much experience with this business and that he will if given the support that is needed, make of it one of the principal industries of the valley. He takes the stand that this paper has taken several times that the chicken and egg business is one of the best in the state and getting better every year. He also believes in the custom hatchery system because of the fact that many people who would not otherwise raise chickens would raise a few at least through this method and thereby make more for the country as a whole.

Here is the question that the editor wants to put up to the people. Why can't Roosevelt county at one of her many or rather now regular get-together meetings make up a subscription list for chickens and every one who can raise as many as a dozen sign up for that many and those who can raise fifty dozen sign up for their number. If five hundred inhabitants of Roosevelt county would sign up for one hundred chickens apiece to be raised the next year that would mean that Roosevelt county would have to her credit next fall fifty thousand chickens worth at least twenty-five thousand dollars. We could do this very easy if we would only get behind the matter and push it so why not some one and it is up to the farmers meetings to do it. It would be some record for Roosevelt county to send out over the states of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Texas the fact that she was going to raise so many chickens and it is not necessary to state the number is as small as we stated for the fact is evident that it could be made larger if the farmers will push the matter.

The best thing is to get you an incubator of your own if you can afford it and begin to turn the chickens off by the hundred but if you can not afford it then have the custom hatchery turn them off for you and at least raise what you can eat so that the farmers can send theirs out of the country and get new money back.

POULTRY RAISING IN ROOSEVELT CO.

Did YOU Ever Stop to Think That if 1,000 Farmers in Roosevelt County Would Raise 200 Chickens Apiece that Roosevelt "Sabe Roosevelt?"

COUNTY WOULD HAVE A POULTRY INCOME OF \$100,000

If You Are A Farmer Why Not Come In and Get an Incubator and Be One of 400 Farmers Who Will Raise 500 Chickens Apiece?

For the amount of capital required, poultry raising in Roosevelt county offers the city man, the homeseeker or the farmer who sees an opportunity to reap big profits through widespread, high-priced markets for chickens and eggs, the most interesting, profitable and healthful business he could acquire.

Roosevelt county needs about 5,000 poultry raisers to supply nearby markets which are at present furnished with poultry and eggs by Nebraska and Kansas. Colorado alone imports annually over \$4,000,000 worth of poultry meat and eggs that, for reasons that are evident, should be raised by poultrymen within the boundaries of Roosevelt county.

If a practical poultry raiser familiar with the conditions in Roosevelt county should place in two columns the advantages and disadvantages of the business as it may be practiced in this county, he would find that he had a long column of advantages and a column of but one or two items of disadvantages. This is very nearly an ideal county in which to raise poultry; the climate is dry, the winters are short and sunny, so that the hens lay right through the period when eggs are highest priced; we have none of the poultry diseases which are caused dampness or cold; moisture is light and dew are rare; the soil with some exceptions is a warm loam; the county receives on an average of or more than 320 days of sunshine a year; the feed for chickens when it is raised by the poultryman or bought from the farmers, is cheap; the irrigated lands yield huge crops, necessitating but a comparatively small tract of land to raise an abundance of feed.

Another of the great advantages is the feed which the poultry raiser has at his command all during the winter. Alfalfa, grown on irrigated land, makes one of the richest chicken foods and egg producers known. It

is just as valuable in the dried condition all through the winter, and chickens find it appetizing. The mild winters permit the chickens to be fed outside nearly every day.

Poultry raising can be combined with dairying, hog raising, truck gardening or fruit raising to good advantage. Fruit trees require several years to attain a size that will bear a profitable crop, and during this time, as well as afterward, poultry can be kept in the orchard. The ideal poultry farm is of a size of ten acres, more or less, and planted to fruit trees after the poultry farm has been started. The house, barn and corral will occupy about three-quarters of an acre, movable poultry houses can be located between the rows of trees, and part of the farm, say three to six acres, can be fenced off and garden truck planted between the trees, while another acre can be planted to alfalfa.

When coupled with dairying and hog raising there is always a large quantity of waste products, such as skim milk, and grains and alfalfa, that means cheap feed for the chickens. The farmer of today is utilizing everything, and making one acre do the work that two acres have done before. The combination of poultry raising with dairying and hog feeding, and poultry and bees together with truck gardening and fruit growing, will make any family a good living if as much care and attention is given it as would be given any business representing the same amount of capital.

Write the Plymouth Rock Squab company and you will have a different view of the pigeon situation. There are many people at the present time who are making a living from a very small space out of pigeons alone. Merely write the above mentioned people and ask them for information about the squab business. A post card will do this we are good for at least fifty pigeon farmers who will bring another resource of over five thousand dollars per year at the least into the country. Wake up and get some stock.

And what do you know about that? The new wrinkle is for the girls to have poultry clubs. The idea is just being started by the agriculture, so why not the Roosevelt county girls be the first to take advantage of it. Some of you girls write your ideas on the subject and let the Herald man publish them for you.

If you haven't one, by all means put a telephone into your home. With the parcels post you can make it pay for itself in a very short while. You find out this morning that you have more fresh eggs than you can use, an extra pound of butter, some good country sausage to spare. Well, go to the phone and ring up Mrs. Smith in town or Mrs. Green, and the chances are that in a few minutes she will tell you that she will be mighty glad to get them. Then give them the carrier when he comes by and do a day's work.

Don't forget that if you used it rightly the parcels post will be of greater benefit to the farmer than to any other class of people. There is no excuse now for your selling your eggs to the middle man for is there any reason why every egg should not be sold while it is fresh and at the best of prices.

How are the boys' corn clubs coming in Roosevelt county? If the boys and girls will both wake up and show the older men what they can do they will be helpers and saviours of their sunshine state and county.

Why not a special day for the boys and girls some Saturday at the farmers meeting?

Bring your hides to the City Meat Market

The way the boys and girls joining the corn clubs, the baby beef clubs and the tomato clubs there is going to be something doing in the farming line this year so if there is any moss growing on your back you had better get up and be moving or these boys and girls will beat you farming.

Ducks? How many of you have the space to put twenty-five or thirty on your farm and make you ten or fifteen dollars per year? Think this over and try. Every little bit of stock helps to make a little more money.

Don't forget that the first requisite of a stand is healthy, vigorous seed, so it will be time well spent this wet weather in making a germination test of some of the seed that you are saving to plant this spring.

Seventh. Hogs are more responsive to good treatment than any other animals and if you will care for them properly they show the effects of that care almost instantly.

Eighth. Hogs can utilize feeds that no other animal can and can utilize pasture and grain better than cattle and horses. Experiment shows that hogs can make more pounds of meat for the pounds of food eaten than any


