## FARMERS ASSOCIATION WORKING EARNESTLY

The Many Farmers are Flocking in to the Twice-a-Month Meetings and Much Benefit is Being Derived

### SEVERAL NOTED LECTURERS WILL SOON COME HERE

President Johnson is Pushing the Work and With Others is Making a Reputation for Roosevelt County

The farmers of Roosevelt county met at the courthouse at 1:30 p. m., on Saturday, February 22, meeting called to order by J. E. Brown, temporary pres. Minutes of the previous meeting were called for and read by Secretary McDonald. Then Dr. Stout, being first on program, was called and made quite an interesting talk on raising cabbage and advised the farmers to organize. Mr. Ryther then made an interesting talk on raising cabbage.

The report on organization was called for and the committee reported as follows:

Your committee on constitution and by-laws beg leave to report as follows:

Name—The name of this society shall be the Portales Valley Farmers Educational and Co-operative Association.

Membership—Only actual producers are eligible to membership.

Purposes of Organization—By having regular meetings at which to discuss problems of interest to all and exchange opinions on seasonable topics to bring about a better condition of the tillers of the soil and their families. To co-operate in buying supplies and raising and selling their products. To establish a standard of perfection for all products grown and shipped by and thru the association.

Officers—There shall be a president, secretary and treasurer who shall serve without compensation. A board of directors, consisting of three members, to be elected in open session. The board of directors shall be elected at each annual meeting, each to serve for a period of three years.

The membership fee shall be twenty-five cents, collected annually and assessments made at discretion of directors to meet the necessary expenses of the association.

Time of Meeting—The society shall meet in regular session every two weeks and at the call of the president.

Members may be dropped from the rolls of the society for committing any deed that would bring dishonor on the association and for failure to live up to and abide by the constitution and by-laws of the society. These by-laws may be amended by a majority vote.

## MR. BRYANT HAS GOOD IDEA OF IMPROVEMENTS

His Letter Was Met With Greatest Consideration

College Will Ask for \$10,000 from the Legislature

January 29th, 1913.

Mr. R. C. Bryant,  
Portales, New Mexico.  
Dear Sir:

Prof. Conway has handed me your letter of January 21st. Your idea is a very good one, but at the present time it is impossible for us to furnish a man to go as often as you suggest. The fact is we have no funds at all that are available for this extension work, and it is only by stretching a point that we occasionally send a man out for a few days. Our Federal funds cannot be used to pay either the salary or expenses of a man to do field work away from the College, and we have never yet been able to get the State to make an appropriation for that purpose. We are asking the Legislature this year to give us \$10,000 for extension work. Unless we can get some reasonable amount which we can devote to such uses, it will be impossible for us to render this kind of service, which you suggest, and which seems to me to be at the present time the most important thing we have to do. If you have any influence with members of the Legislature, I suggest that you get this suggestion to them. If the farmers of New Mexico really want this kind of work, they ought to ask the Legislature to take such action as will make it possible.

Meanwhile I will say that we are running a couple of farmers instruction cars on the Santa Fe Railroad, beginning next week, and will be in Portales for a day about a month from now. The exact date will be announced a little later, and I hope all farmers will come out and make the best possible use of that day.

## SAMPLING THE MILK FOR BUTTER FAT

This End of the Dairy Business Should be Given More Attention Than it Has Ever Been Given and

### MANY UNWORRY OF THE COWS WILL BE DISCARDED

In the Following Article an Experienced Agriculturist and Dairyman Gives the Exact Helpful Directions

Since dairying bids well to become one of the foremost branches of agriculture in New Mexico it is, all important that the farmer take his first steps rather cautiously. The success or failure will depend not so much on the price of feeds or the price received for butter fat and milk, as it will upon the careful management of his herd. It is necessary that the cows be kept that make the best utilization of their feed in the production of butter fat and milk. The "boarder cow" is not going to do a great deal toward developing the dairy interests in New Mexico; neither is she going to fatten the pocket book of the farmer. Careful selection must be the watchword, and this can only be followed by keeping accurate records of productions.

The Babcock system of testing milk and cream for fat is the one universally used at present, and gives satisfactory results when properly conducted. A number of farmers in New Mexico are already providing themselves with a small testing outfit, and requests have come from a college to test their milk and cream.

Taking Samples: The most important part of the securing of representative samples. Unless this sampling is done with great caution the test becomes valueless.

The milk or cream from which the sample is to be taken should be thoroughly mixed so as to get the fat evenly distributed throughout the milk. This is done by providing an empty can and pouring the milk or cream from one can to the other at least four or five times. It is impossible to thoroughly mix the contents of a can that is almost full, by any attempt at shaking. When the sampling is done at the creamery or on a route, thorough stirring is sufficient.

There are two ways commonly used for sampling and testing milk and cream. First by taking a sample of each milking, or of each can of cream and testing this. This method gives the actual amount of butter fat in the milk or cream. Second by taking a sample consisting of a proportionate amount from each can of cream, and adding these all together in one sample bottle. A sample taken by the latter method is called a composite sample and represents the average per cents of butter fat in the milk or cream for the period during which the sample was gathered. By the use of this second method a great saving of work is accomplished, and when aliquot parts are taken for sample, experiments show that quite accurate results are obtained.

Formaldehyde: This is used in about a 40% solution, and under ordinary temperatures of from 40 to 80 degrees F., five or six drops will keep a pint of milk in good conditions for eight or nine days. If nine or ten drops are used the milk should keep sweet for two weeks.

In order to secure an aliquot part for a composite sample some form of a sample tube is best. One form is graduated glass or tin tube and a sample is taken whose reading on this tube corresponds to the number of pounds of milk or cream in the can. Another form is a long metal tube, about three fourths of an inch in diameter. On one side is a more or less continuous opening which can be opened and closed before withdrawn. With this form it is necessary always to put the milk or cream in a vessel of the same size. The ordinary method of sampling is by use of a sample dipper. If the milk or cream is thoroughly mixed and when a composite sample is not wanted this method answers quite well.

Care of Samples: The samples of milk and cream must be handled carefully if accurate results are expected. A glass jar of about one pint capacity, fitted with a tight cover, and of such a form as to be thoroughly cleaned, is satisfactory. It should be kept perfectly clean, and when putting in the the sample care must be taken not to allow the milk to spill over the outside and about the mouth, as this usually starts molding, which may interfere with the testing. Keep the jar in a clean, fairly cool place, and shake it well each day. (A rotating motion is best for this as it does not produce the churning effect.) This is to keep the cream from raising and forming a leathery surface, which would be very hard to dissolve again in the milk. In case a film does form, heat the sample to about 110 or 115 degrees F., placing in warm water. This melts the fat and it separates more easily, but the sampling must be done quickly as some of the melted fat soon collects again on the surface. If the jar is not kept tightly covered, evaporation takes place giving a higher per cent of fat than should be.

Preservatives: In order to get the most satisfactory results in testing, the milk or cream must be in a sweet condition. Souring is due to the presence and development of bacteria in the milk and, to prevent this nearly all of these must be killed. Various inexpensive chemicals, which are used for purpose; some in most general use being given below:

Formaldehyde: This is used in about a 40% solution, and under ordinary temperatures of from 40 to 80 degrees F., five or six drops will keep a pint of milk in good conditions for eight or nine days. If nine or ten drops are used the milk should keep sweet for two weeks.

**SAMPLING MILK FOR FAT**

bichromate): As a destroyer of germ life this chemical has great power, and is the one used with satisfaction by a great many dairymen. It is rather cheap and is available in most places. One tenth of a grain is sufficient to preserve one pint of milk for about two weeks in ordinary temperatures. However, during hot weather in summer the author has not had as good success as with corrosive sublimate. If used in too great amounts, the curd which forms the acid is added, dissolves with difficulty. This chemical is put up in tablets of different sizes, making it very convenient to use.

Corrosive Sublimate Mercuric: The author has had much better success with this preservative than any other. It is a very powerful germ destroyer, and like the bichromate of potash, has the advantage of being put up in tablet form. Usually two sizes are offered for sale by the dairy supply houses, one size being sufficient to keep one pint of milk sweet for seven or eight days, and the other or larger size will keep one pint of milk for two weeks. These tables are more expensive than any of the other preservatives, but always give satisfaction. Corrosive sublimate is very strong poison, but the tablets are usually combined with coloring matter that gives a warning color to the milk.

Chloroform, Boracic acid, and Bicarbonate of soda, are used to some extent, but are not as satisfactory as the three mentioned above. Nearly all of the preservative are poisonous, and the samples should always be and kept out of reach of children.

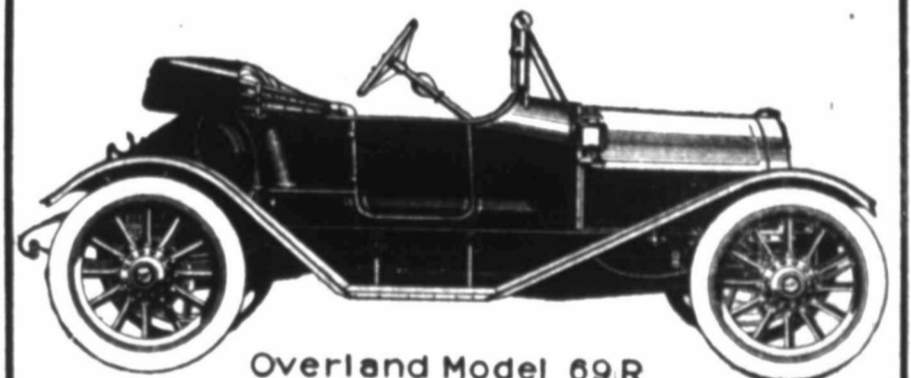
