SOME FACTORS IN CANTALOUPE INDUSTRY

E. E. Cadwallader, Representing Crutchfield and Woolfolk Presents Several Phases of this Business

PORTALES WILL HAVE A LARGER ACREAGE THIS YEAR

Election of Officers for the Ensuing Association Year to be Held Saturday and Cantaloupes Signed Up

It is a recognized fact that every line of business has become highly specialized. This applies also to agriculture, which in its largest sense may be divided into two, production and distribution, each of these in a way being largely dependent upon the other for success.

Now some of the most serious difficulties confronting the growers in attempting to successfully market their products: Their distance from markets, their liability to sudden and violent fluctuations, their inability to secure accurate and complete information in regard to the conditions of the various markets, the number of cars rolling and etc.

Successful marketing of large quantities of perishable products requires accurate information at all times, not only in regard to the conditions in the various markets, but in regard to rolling supplies, the production in various sections of the country and the volume of competitive produce. It also requires familiarity with the demands and capacities of various markets, the class of fruit each market will take to the best advantage, an intimate knowledge of conditions which can be acquired only from long experience in the business and the markets themselves.

Successful distribution has become essentially a matter for specialists and experts, and in addition to what has been mentioned they must have at their command a working organization and equipment which makes it possible for them to quickly readjust their plans, change the destination of their shipments as suddenly as changing conditions may necessitate, and be at all times ready to take care of any emergency that may arise. The advantage of organizations are of course apparent, and fully appreciated by us all.

Co-operation has been the key to success in practically every line of business. Co-operative work is of vital importance to all growers of perishable fruit. It is a case where co-operation benefits the individual shipper by enabling him to ship in carload lots. Co-operation means united effort, all working together. It is one of the greatest forces of modern civilization. All of the great business enterprises of the country are the results of co-operation: If you co-operate you can get almost anything you want. It will also provide for better equipment in handling a crop in a section and the purchasing of seed, fertilizer, crates and etc., besides co-operating with marketing agents and distributors and railroads in marketing their output. It will also give the growers in certain local-

ities a chance to establish a certain brand or grade of product to put on the market which will create a demand for their goods; it will also introduce better methods in dealing with buyers, railway companies and etc.

The putting out of a standard brand from any district, which is kept strictly up to grade in every respect, and the control of which so far as marketing is concerned, is placed in the hands of a single competent organization for the purpose, will permit a wide and profitable advertisement for the entire territory, not as respects cantaloupes alone but in other lines of fruit as well.

The grower who expects to make the greatest success should have only one standard and that is, the very best product possible both as respects the quality of the fruit itself and the character of the package which they send to market. However careful the farmer may be in the production of his crop, and however fine fruit he may produce, he stands little show for very great prosperities, if his fruit is marketed in a careless or haphazard manner. GEORGE L. REESE FOR DISTRICT JUDGE APPOINTMENT



Although this paper is not a paper to tell of the good qualities of men and of companies and although we have never done so and will not do so merely to get the patronage of these men or companies, we do go around this statement here and bring to the public one man who deserves at the present time to be brought more before the public and let more be known of him.

He should have the position because of the fact that he has been tried and proven and found wanting. JOHNSON BROTHERS PLAN MODEL FARM

Doctor Johnson of Gainsville, Texas and Carl, President of the Farmer's Association at Portales

PLAN A MODEL ALFALFA AND POLAND CHINA HOG FARM

Alfalfa and Hogs, with the Alfalfa Growing and the Hogs Bought, along with 25 Acres of Apples, Idea

Carl Johnson, the president of the Farmers' association, with his brother, Doctor Johnson of Gainsville, Texas, is probably doing as much for this valley as any one man in it.

Dr. Johnson has been here for the past few days looking over the work that has been accomplished since their beginning here some twelve months ago and says he is gratified at the results.

Carl and the doctor have a place known as the old Humphrey place out northwest of town, and are taking this place in charge and beginning work on it with the idea in view of making not only a modern home out of it but also a modern farm.

In commencing the work on the farm, the first step was the obtaining of water and the luck struck here has gone on down through all their operations and it is to be hoped will continue. Their water supply comes from a fifteen hundred gallon well that seems to have not the slightest idea of ever doing otherwise than getting better. Though they have a hundred and sixty acres they only mean for this half, or eighty acres, of it and will, as soon as necessity demands, put down another well on the other eighty. They pump their water with a solar oil engine and buy their fuel by the car along with three other progressive farmers.

The first year has seen some forty acres of alfalfa started and growing fine. This year sees them starting out with this field of alfalfa, several head of nice young heifers, three or four mares and last, but not least, some thoroughbred Poland China hogs. These hogs have not yet reached here but will be expressed here some time the last of this month. They were bought by the doctor at the Texas state fair and took away several blue ribbons. They are not to be excelled in Texas and that means they are good hogs. These hogs, the cows and mares will be the extent of the farming on the place this year, outside of the alfalfa that will be raised. There will be no truck planted at all but hogs and alfalfa will be given all the attention. There will be modern hog sheds with water connections and with every modern convenience and hog luxury. The Poland China's will be handled as they are handled in the old hog growing countries and the Portales Valley will in another year be more than proud of the blue ribbon hogs that she can get for stock purposes without having to send off for them.

The farm will be worked from the standpoint of a model farm and will be planted on all four

sides with mountain poplars. These trees will all be put out this fall and besides the hedge around the place, a twenty-five acre orchard will be put in. The trees for this orchard are already ordered and ready to be shipped out on a days notice. However, the Johnson's do not think that they will be ready for them before August but expect to have them all out by that time.

Dr. Johnson, who is a practicing physician in Gainsville, made a suggestion to the editor in regard to the advertising of the country and we will next week state that idea here for the benefit of others who probably as Dr. Johnson, would be glad to help in the matter.

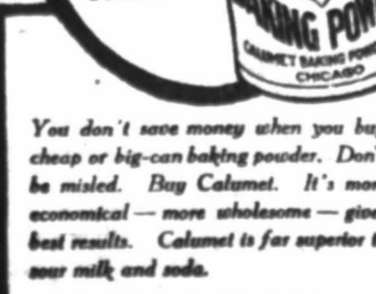
