Estimate Weight Silage

There is no market price for corn silage so it is diffcult to say how much one can afford to pay for it. In cow testing associations the cows are charged \$3.50 per ton for corn silage. It is usually figured that three tons of corn silage is worth as much as one ton of timothy hay; that is, the food nutrients is in one ton of timothy hay would amount to as much as the food nutrients in three tons of the average corn silage. It is probably worth the \$3.50 per ton which we charge our cows in the cows testing association. At any rate, the cows pay for it and give us a profit besides.
