From the dawn of history until today men have rendered grateful, admiring homage to the memory of those who had risked or laid nobly down their lives for what they believed to be the honor and safety of their fellowmen.

By these annually recurring memorial exercises we typify the beautiful ideas of a memory kept ever green in the minds, and the blossoms of gratitude and hope blooming in the hearts of a great, free people.

Certificate of Incorporation of Portales Utilities Company

We, the undersigned, in order to form a corporation for the purposes hereinafter stated, under and pursuant to the provisions of an act of the legislative assembly of the territory now state of New Mexico, entitled 'an act to regulate the formation and government of corporations for mining, manufacturing, industrial and other pursuits, approved March 15, 1905, do hereby certify and declare as follows:

I. The name of the corporation is Portales Utilities company.

II. The principal and registered office of the company is in the town of Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico, and the name of the agent therein and in charge thereof and upon whom process against this corporation may be served is A. A. Rogers.

III. The objects for which and each of which the corporation is formed and its powers are as follows:

(a) It shall have power to purchase, obtain by contribution or otherwise acquire, to hold, own, operate, improve and otherwise deal in, to sell, loan, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of lands or any interest therein, whether improved or unimproved, without limit as to amount or location, and to develop the resources or turn to account the lands, properties, buildings and rights of the company by colonizing, mining, drilling, pumping, clearing, irrigating, planting, farming, grazing, manufacturing, building and otherwise as may be deemed desirable.

(b) To discount, sell and assign notes and mortgages of any person, firm, association or corporation, either wholly or in part, and pay or receive pay for the same in cash, stock or bonds of the corporation or otherwise.

(c) To grow, manufacture, purchase or otherwise acquire vegetables, produce, supplies, feed, fruits, live stock, wares, merchandise, machinery and other property and by products of every class and description, and hold, own, mortgage, sell or otherwise dispose of, trade, deal in and deal with the same, acquire and undertake or sell franchises for lighting, heating, power and water supply, and the good will, property rights, franchises, contracts and assets of every manner and kind, and the liabilities of any person, firm, association or corporation, either wholly or in part, and pay or receive pay for the same in cash, stock or bonds of the corporation or otherwise.

(d) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, own, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage or pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock and bonds, debentures or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations or corporations, franchises or other property, including the while the holder thereof exercise all the power and right to vote thereon.

(e) To buy, sell, acquire, own, maintain, construct, control, manage, and otherwise deal in an irrigation pumping system or systems, water and water rights and to drill, buy, sell, lease or otherwise dispose of, water rights and to drill, buy, sell, lease and operate power stations and transmission lines, and to buy, sell, lease wells, for water and oil, pumping plants, and rent water or the use of water or electrical energy from power plants for all purposes and to take notes and mortgages on real estate and water rights as security therefor.

(f) To carry on the business of manufacturing, distributing and selling electrical energy, light, heat or power and for that purpose to build, purchase, own, sell, lease and operate for the manufacture, acquiring, generating, accumulation and distribution of electrical energy, gas and steam, and plants of any other character adapted to produce light, heat or power in any form, by telephone, telegraph, cable, and for any other purpose or purposes, and to acquire, hold, sell and assign municipal and other franchises and privileges necessary or convenient for such lighting, heating, power or other business to construct or otherwise own, maintain or operate, sell or otherwise

dispose of street or suburban railroads, cars and other fixtures and appurtenances necessary or convenient for the operation of such railroads or incidental thereto.

The corporation shall also have all the rights and powers granted by and under chapter 141 of the laws of 1909 of territory now state of New Mexico, and for that purpose states that the location of its plant or plants is Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico, and the general course and route its line or lines of pipes, wires, cables, or conduits is in all directions from said town of Portales in Roosevelt and Curry counties, and its operation are to be carried on in the town of Portales, and counties of Roosevelt, and Curry and the townships therein.

(g) The foregoing clauses shall be construed both as objects and powers, but no restrictive expression or declaration of specific or special powers or purposes herein enumerated shall be deemed exclusive, and it is hereby expressly declared that all other lawful powers not inconsistent therewith are hereby included and in general, this corporation shall have, and hereby adopts all rights and powers granted under any other laws of the territory, now state of New Mexico not inconsistent with the act under which it is incorporated.

(h) This corporation may conduct business in the state of New Mexico and elsewhere in the United States, or any of its dependencies and any and all foreign countries, have one or more offices therein, and therein to hold, purchase, mortgage and convey real and personal property, except as and when forbidden by the laws of the state of New Mexico and by other local laws.

IV. The corporation is authorized to issue capital stock to the extent of \$175,000, divided into 1750 shares of the par value of \$100 each. Of such total authorized capital stock, 125 shares amounting to \$12,500 shall be designated as class "A" preferred stock, and 1500 shares, amounting to \$150,000 shall be designated as Preferred Stock, and the balance of 588 shares shall be designated as Common Stock.

The holders of class "A" preferred stock shall be entitled to receive when and as declared from the surplus or net profits of the corporation, yearly dividends at the rate of seven per cent per annum and no more, the date from which said dividends shall be figured being July 1st, 1912, payable semi-annually January 1st, and July 1st if, when and as received. The dividends on said class "A" stock shall be cumulative, and shall be payable before any dividend on the other preferred stock shall be paid or set apart, so that if in any year dividends amounting to seven per cent shall not have been paid, the deficiency shall be paid before any redemption payments shall be made.

In the event of any liquidation or dissolution or winding up, whether voluntary or involuntary of the corporation, the holders of the class "A" preferred stock shall be entitled to be paid in full, both the par amount of their shares as issued and the unpaid dividends accrued thereon, before any amount shall be paid to the holders of the other preferred stock or of the common stock, and after the payment to the holders of the class "A" preferred stock of its par value as reduced and the unpaid accrued dividends thereon, the remaining assets and funds shall be paid to the holders of the other preferred stock to the amount of the face value of their shares, as reduced, and the unpaid dividends accrued thereon, and the remaining assets and funds shall be divided and paid to the holders of the common stock according to their respective shares.

Said class "A" and other preferred stock shall be subject to redemption at par as reduced and accrued dividends on the date of redemption, and shall be subject to partial redemption payments January 1st and July 1st of any year from the net proceeds of the operation of the property, from the collection of mortgages and from the sales of land and of other property which shall come into possession of this corporation. Said class "A" and other preferred stock shall alone be entitled to voting power, except that as partial redemption payments are made on account of the par value of each share, its voting power shall be reduced proportionately.

The common stock shall be issued, held and deposited in trust and shall be delivered to the party or parties entitled thereto and acquire voting power from time to time, only if, as and when and in amount equal to said redemption payments, as made on account of class "A" and other preferred stock. Said common stock shall not be entitled to dividends until all of said class "A" and other preferred stock has been redeemed and paid in full, together with dividends as thereon provided.

I. The name of the corporation is Portales Power and Irrigation Company.

II. The principal and registered office of the company is in the town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico, and the name of the agent therein and in charge thereof and upon whom process against this corporation may be served is A. A. Rogers.

Cheesemaking

The process of the manufacture of cheese is the coagulation of the casein and butter fat with rennet and the development of natural acid by artificial heat, and the individual who can best control the manufacture of the cheese is considered to be the most capable cheese-maker, and to this he must learn to work in harmony with the climatic conditions under which he is situated. And the climate has more to do with the manufacture of cheese even than the cheese-maker. Yet neither can make a cheese alone but must work in harmony. You all know that there is nothing more easily affected by unsanitary conditions than milk.

"Having spent fifteen years in the manufacture of cheese in Iowa and upon coming to New Mexico I was very much impressed with the climate here as being ideal for cheese-making, and after living here six years and enjoying our pure air and cool nights my faith is six times as strong now, as then.

"The greatest hindrance to the best results in cheese making in the north and east where it is carried on most extensively is the hot sultry nights in summer and the cold winters. During the hot summer months, the hot nights are very detrimental in the caring for the milk, and the winters are so cold that natural acid in the curds cannot be developed successfully. But in this climate with our cool nights milk would be easily cared for and our winters are so mild that then we ought to make our best cheese.

"It is my opinion that a higher grade of cheese can be made here than is made in Wisconsin or New York, and consequently would command a higher price on the market.

"We have a consuming market in the Pecos valley of about 500 pounds each day—but could be increased to 1,000 pounds, especially if they increase as they have at Hagerman the last 30 days, and over in the large cities of our sister state—Texas—there is a market for 5,000 pounds per day awaiting for us. Why not furnish it? We can at a good profit, if we will.

"The cost of manufacturing

cheese is small as a large per cent of the cost is labor. A first class cheese factory fully equipped for making 500 pounds per day, can be built for \$5,500 and the cost of making from 11-2c to 30c per pound, depending much upon the output. One man can handle 3,000 pounds of milk per day. It takes on the average of ten pounds of milk to make one pound of cheese during the summer months. The yield runs as low as 12 pounds of milk to one of cheese in the summer months, and in the winter months as high as 8 pounds. Another advantage for winter dairying here in New Mexico. A good cheese cow should produce 40 pounds of milk per day, or four pounds of cheese or 80c per day, less than the cost of making which would be 10c. So a good cow should net the dairyman 70c per day or \$20 per month. I have in my dairy at home cows that will net \$25 per month. All the farmers in the valley can be doing this if they will. Why not? We have the feed, the climate, the hustling farmers. We lack the cows, and the farmer lacks the money to buy them. What can we do? If the alfalfa grower continues to ship his hay at ten or twelve dollars per ton, when he can get \$30 per ton by feeding to dairy cows he will have less money each year and finally will be swallowed up by his own negligence and shortsightedness.

"Let me tell you what we should do—we should get together and organize several cheese factories in the valley. Co-operative within themselves and co-operative with one another and manufacture this hay in to cheese and butter. One hundred and fifty dollars' worth of cheese, can be made from one acre of first class hay. Our land none too high is it? Not if we use it with our brains. The trouble is, we have been shipping everything we produce, and giving nothing back to our land. If we continue this way our farms will become poverty-stricken and lose much of their value. When we should be giving back to our farms in fertilizer what they give us as feed, as would be the case in dairying.

West Point Pictures

The remarkable series of West Point pictures now running in the Popular Mechanics Magazine are published for the first time. Never before has the public had such an opportunity to follow the cadet from the day he reports for duty at the U. S. Military Academy until, four years later, he receives his commission as second lieutenant and is welcomed into the army by the Secretary of the War. There are nearly 150 views, and they show the cadet in his drills, his study, his athletic training and his play. The pictures published in the June number cover the cadet's first winter. An article states:

"The first of September finds the West Point cadet back in barracks, after his summer in camp. Now he begins the classroom work that is to give him the necessary mental equipment for handling troops as an officer of the army. The new cadet, if he has not already made the discovery, quickly finds that West Point is no place for a lazy boy. Classes begin at 7:55 a. m. for everybody, and before that the cadet must have sprung out of bed at the sound of 'revellin' washed, shaved, and dressed, set his room to rights and eaten his breakfast. With an hour and a quarter off for dinner, beginning at 12.30, the day's school work lasts until 3:45 p. m. but for the cadet who is ambitious to advance, there is little time for play between that hour and 'lights out.'

"The first year cadet gets no vacation. Classroom works and exercises are suspended, as far as practicable, on New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas, but the fourth-class must spend his holidays at West Point.

"The first year's work ends with the successful passing of the June examinations. The daily drills and exercises have given the future officer a military bearing. He has added to his store of knowledge, not only of things military, but in many other lines, and he has become thoroughly familiar with the meaning of the word 'discipline.' His life as a third class cadet will be illustrated in the July number."

The name of the corporation is Portales Utilities company.

The principal and registered office of the company is in the town of Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico, and the name of the agent therein and in charge thereof and upon whom process against this corporation may be served is A. A. Rogers.

The objects for which and each of which the corporation is formed and its powers are as follows:

(a) It shall have power to purchase, acquire, hold, own, operate, improve and otherwise deal in, to sell, loan, mortgage, lease or otherwise dispose of lands or any interest therein, whether improved or unimproved, without limit as to amount or location, and to develop the resources or turn to account the lands, properties, buildings and rights of the company by colonizing, mining, drilling, pumping, clearing, irrigating, planting, farming, grazing, manufacturing, building and otherwise as may be deemed desirable.

(b) To discount, sell and assign notes and mortgages and other securities; to borrow money and to execute notes, bonds or mortgages or deeds of trust, and to secure the same and to hypothecate any securities it may own or hold as securities for loans, notes or bonds.

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Cheesemaking

The process of the manufacture of cheese is the coagulation of the casein and butter fat with rennet and the development of natural acid by artificial heat, and the individual who can best control the manufacture of the cheese is considered to be the most capable cheese-maker, and to this he must learn to work in harmony with the climatic conditions under which he is situated. And the climate has more to do with the manufacture of cheese even than the cheese-maker. Yet neither can make a cheese alone but must work in harmony. You all know that there is nothing more easily affected by unsanitary conditions than milk.

Having spent fifteen years in the manufacture of cheese in Iowa and upon coming to New Mexico I was very much impressed with the climate here as being ideal for cheese-making, and after living here six years and enjoying out pure air and cool nights my faith is six times as strong now, as then.

The greatest hindrance to the best results in cheese making in the north and east where it is carried on most extensively is the hot sultry nights in summer and the cold winters. During the hot summer months, the hot nights are very detrimental in the caring for the milk, and the winters are so cold that natural acid in the curds cannot be developed successfully. But in this climate with our cool nights milk would be easily cared for and our winters are so mild that then we ought to make our best cheese.

It is my opinion that a higher grade of cheese can be made here than is made in Wisconsin or New York, and consequently would command a higher price on the market.

We have a consuming market in the Pecos valley of a bout 500 pounds each day—but could be increased to 1,000 pounds, especially if they increase as they have at Hagerman the last 30 days, and over in the large cities of our sister state—Texas—there is a market for 5,000 pounds per day awaiting for us. Why not furnish it? We can at a good profit, if we will.

The cost of manufacturing

cheese is small as a large percent of the cost is labor. A first class cheese factory fully equipped for making 500 pounds per day, can be built for \$5,500 and the cost of making from 11-2c to 30c per pound, depending much upon the output. One man can handle 3,000 pounds of milk per day. It takes on the average of ten pounds of milk to make one pound of cheese during the summer months. The yield runs as low as 12 pounds of milk to one of cheese in the summer months, and in the winter months as high as 8 pounds. Another advantage for winter dairying here in New Mexico. A good cheese cow should produce 40 pounds of milk per day, or four pounds of cheese or 80c per day, less than the cost of making which would be 10c. So a good cow should net the dairyman 70c per day or \$20 per month. I have in my dairy at home cows that will net \$25 per month. All the farmers in the valley can be doing this if they will. Why not? We have the feed, the climate, the hustling farmers. We lack the cows, and the farmer lacks the money to buy them. What can we do? If the alfalfa grower continues to ship his hay at ten or twelve dollars per ton, when he can get \$30 per ton by feeding to dairy cows he will have less money each year and finally will be swallowed up by his own negligence and shortsightedness.

Let me tell you what we should do—we should get together and organize several cheese factories in the valley. Co operative within themselves and co-operative with one another and manufacture this hay in to cheese and butter. One hundred and fifty dollars' worth of cheese can be made from one acre of first class hay. Our land none too high is it? Not if we use it with our brains. The trouble is, we have been shipping everything we produce, and giving nothing back to our land. If we continue this way our farms will become poverty-stricken and lose much of their value. When we should be giving back to our farms in fertilizer what they give us as feed, as would be the case in dairying.

West Point Pictures

The remarkable series of West Point pictures now running in the Popular Mechanics Magazine are published for the first time. Never before has the public had such an opportunity to follow the cadet from the day he reports for duty at the U. S. Military Academy until, four years later, he receives his commission as second lieutenant and is welcomed into the army by the Secretary of the War. There are nearly 150 views, and they show the cadet in his drills, his study, his athletic training and his play. The pictures published in the June number cover the cadet's first winter. An article states:

"The first of September finds the West Point cadet back in barracks, after his summer in camp. Now he begins the classroom work that is to give him the necessary mental equipment for handling troops as an officer of the army. The new cadet, if he has not already made the discovery, quickly finds that West Point is no place for a lazy boy. Classes begin at 7:55 a. m. for everybody, and before that the cadet must have sprung out of bed at the sound of 'revell' washed, shaved, and dressed, set his room to rights and eaten his breakfast. With an hour and a quarter off for dinner, beginning at 12:30, the day's school work lasts until 3:45 p. m. but for the cadet who is ambitious to advance, there is little time for play between that hour and 'lights out.'

The first-year cadet gets no vacation. Classroom works and exercises are suspended, as far as practicable, on New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas, but the fourth-class must spend his holidays at West Point.

The first year's work ends with the successful passing of the June examinations. The daily drills and exercises have given the future officer a military bearing. He has added to his store of knowledge, not only of things military, but in many other lines, and he has become thoroughly familiar with the meaning of the word 'discipline.' His life as a third class cadet will be illustrated in the July number."

He was very conservative in his figures and has made a study of the dry land dairys of the state and is in a position to know whereof he speaks. Therefore before some outsiders come in and sell cows at two prices to you, you had better do a little investigating.
