LOCAL DAIRY SHOW TO BE HELD APRIL 11

The second annual Castro county Dairy Show will be held Friday, April 11. The location will be at the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. at Dimmitt, starting at 9:30 a. m. The purpose of the show is to improve and create interest in the Dairy business.

The show will be held on Friday the 11th so that those dairymen who plan to exhibit animals at the Plainview Dairy show on the 12th may take them from the local show directly to the Plainview show.

All dairymen in the county are urged to exhibit their animals. Animals do not have to be registered to be exhibited in the local show.

Classes for the Jersey and Milkings Shorthorn departments are: Bulls two years old and over, bulls under 2 years, bulls 6 mo. to 2 years; cows 3 years old and over, cows 2 years old and under 3; heifers 1 year and under 2; heifers 6 months and under 1 year and this year a new class for Dry cows has been added.

Classes for Guerneys are cows and heifers. A special Junior division for Club boys will be held. Ribbons will be given to adults and ribbons and some cash money will be given Junior exhibitors.

Dairymen who have not made entries are urged to do so at the County Agent's office as soon as possible so enough space can be provided for all entries.

Mr. J. M. Dixon of near Frio died in an Amarillo hospital Wednesday, April 2, at 12:40 p. m. He had been in failing health for many months and had been in the hospital since December 26, 1946.

Mr. Dixon was born at Bryan, Brazos county, Texas January 23, 1887. He was married to Mrs. Kate Childress at Lockney September 22, 1918, who survives him. He is also survived by a son, James Dixon, of Hereford, a daughter, Mrs. Lurline Cawthon of Canyon, and a daughter, Miss Wanda Dixon of Hereford, also two sisters, Mrs. Joe Hastings of Dimmitt, Mrs. Frank Barber of Hereford, two brothers, Willie Dixon of Alto, Texas, B. R. Dixon of Lubbock, Texas, also two half sisters, Mrs. Gertie Fuller of Bryan, Texas, and Mrs. Josie Crow, of Tyler, Texas, also one half brother, Claud Dixon, of Rockdale, Texas, and a host of other relatives and friends.

Mr. Dixon and his family had lived in Castro county for the past twenty-five years, and on their present farm near Frio for the past five years.

Twenty years
in west Texas

Counting from the founding of our company, we mark our twentieth birthday this month—on April 14, to be exact.
