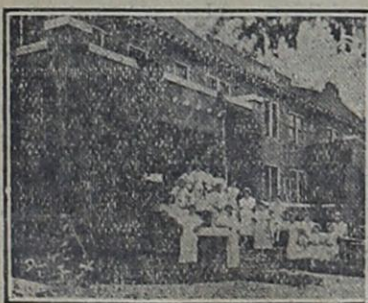

ROAD NOTICE TO LAND OWNER

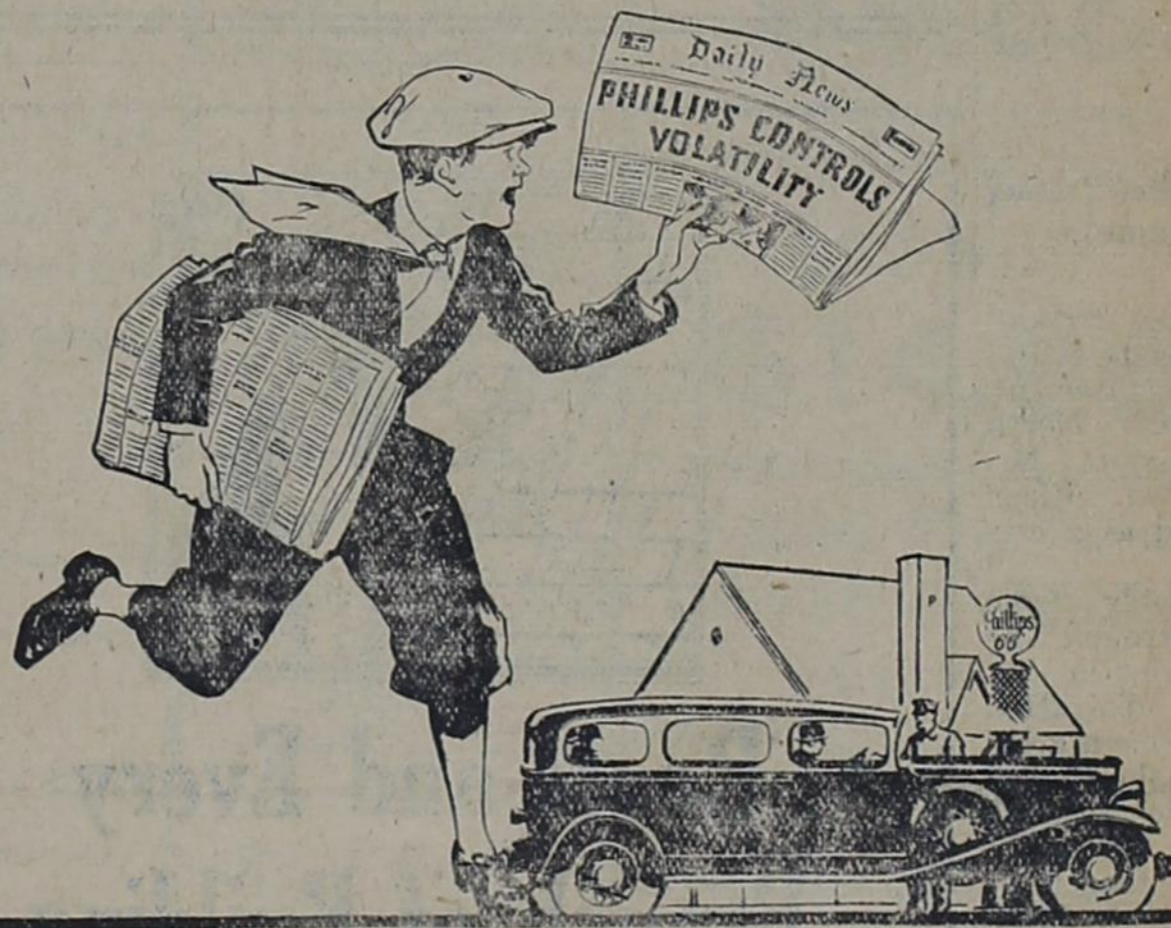

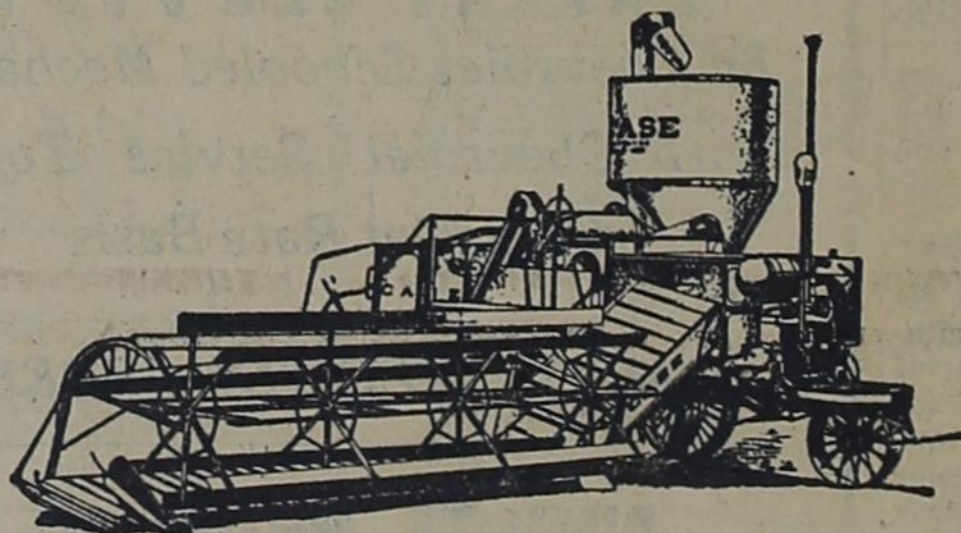

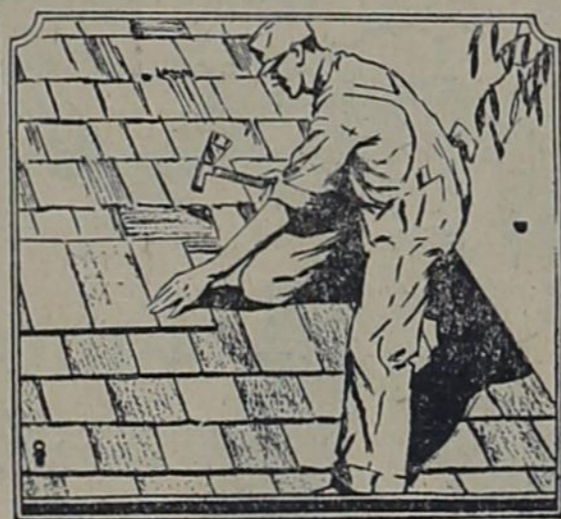

It looked fruitless, and fans had conceded the victory to the Dimmitt Club. * * * * * Prospects for an Athens victory loomed dark and heavy clouds hung over the Athens corner of the gym, where some ten or twelve ardent admirers of the red-jersied girls grouped in dismay."

In the Athens Daily Review, of Saturday, March 22, we find the Sports Editor talking about our team and town as follows: "The citizens of Athens were not as loyal to the Hornet Lassie club of 1930 as they should have been. Dimmitt, the club that took second place honors in the Celeste A. A. U. tourney, and almost whipped Coach Knight's Lassie crew until the final quarter when Miss Russell began hitting the sphere over to Misses Ellis and McGehee to come from behind, had all their home town and all of West Texas pulling for them when they left for the state meet and came back. The entire citizenship of Dimmitt, Castro county, was pulling hard for the Bobcats. They sent their club, an undefeated aggregation, to Celeste via special Pullman, and believed them to be the greatest basketball team in Texas. They are second best; Athens claims first."

Further, Miller says: "A number of copies of the edition of the Castro County News was received at this office, and from those we find that the Dimmittites were strong for their club."

And in reading letters just recently received by Supt. Cryer, we take the following excerpt from one received from Mr. W. F. Jacoby, Secretary-Treasurer, Texas Division Southern A. A. U.: " * * * * * At any rate, you may have lost a game by a few points, but you certainly won the tournament. Meaning, that the sportsmanship of your girls as well as their stellar playing and pleasing personality absolutely captured the entire crowd at Celeste. It was certainly a case of your team losing—yet winning the game. * * * * *"

During their stay here not a single criticism was made of them. 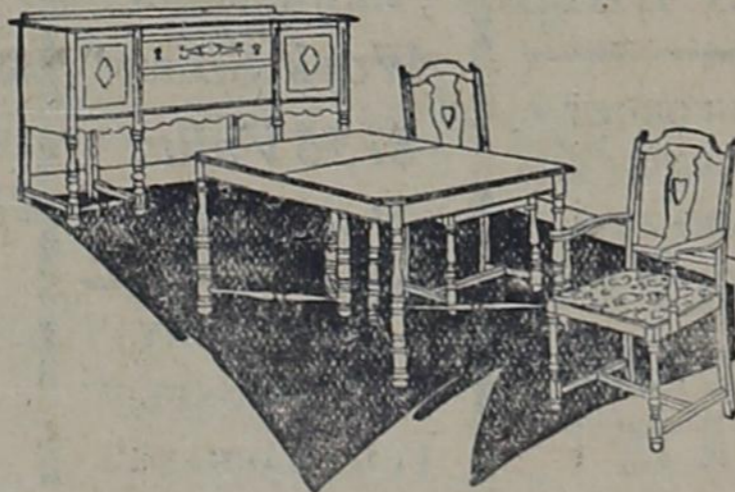

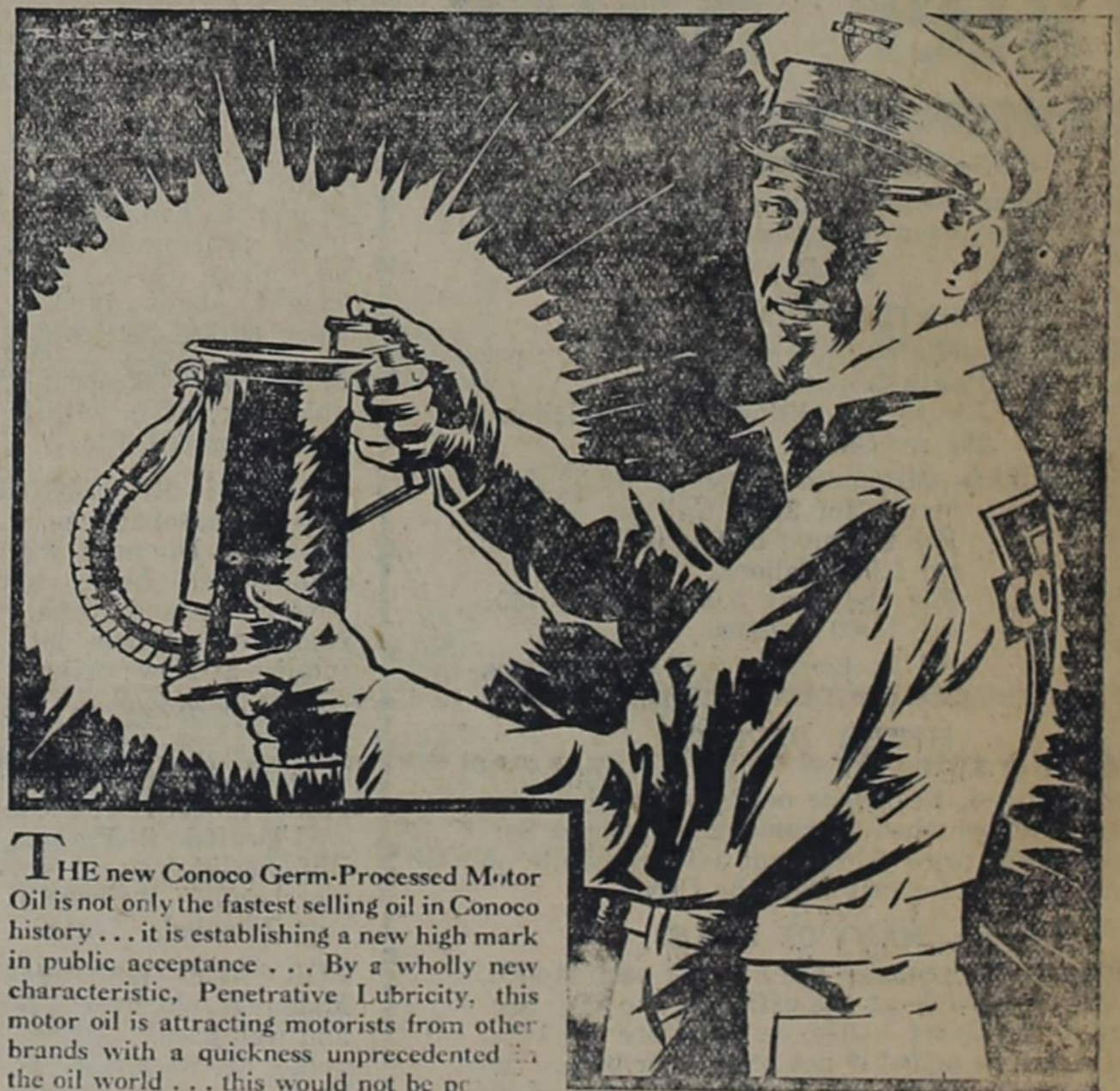
