a corn carry-over four times normal, or 700,000,000 bushels. The wheat carry-over is 400,000,000 bushels; while the government has 11,000,000 bales of cotton under loan or wholly owned, plus 372,000,000 pounds of tobacco, 2,735,000 pounds of surplus butter, 3,609,009 dozen surplus eggs, 37,000,000 pounds of surplus vegetables and 25,000,000 pounds of surplus fruit. In other words, the ever-normal granary is not normal at all. It is full and running over.

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS

Sales—or loans—to England will be chiefly in livestock products such as canned pork, dried eggs, evaporated milk, lard and cheese, which England once got from Poland, Denmark, and Holland, but doesn't any more.

Agriculture department experts who have been studying the question don't expect the British to ask for wheat or corn. England gets all it needs from the Dominions. But they figure that British purchases of livestock products, such as pork, will greatly help the price of corn and be a great boon to the corn belt.

Whether or not the British will pay for this later or make some kind of a swap, has not been decided yet. The matter is entirely up to the President, and he has kept completely mum on the subject.

NOTE.—Man at the head of the farm-products-for-Britain program is Milo Perkins, a dynamic young Texan, who as administrator of surplus marketing already is an expert on getting rid of Uncle Sam's perpetual excess crops.

HEALTH IN CONGRESS

Genial Congressman Sol Bloom celebrated his 71st birthday about the same time he helped bring the lend-lease bill to final conclusion and he went around the capitol kicking up his heels and crying, "To hell with vitamins!"

"Health is all a matter of circulation," opined Sol, lapsing into a rhapsodic account of the old days when he was a prize fight promoter, and they used to fight 60 and 70 rounds. "That was real fighting," says Sol.

"Now about circulation, tell you what to do. When you take off your shoes at night, rub your feet. Get 'em limbered up. Then rub your knees. Circulation, see? And then turn your head this way and that, easy."

"It's all circulation. Some garters prevent circulation. Now look at me." Sol pulls up his trousers in the capitol lobby to show a garterless sock.

"And if you wear a collar button at the back, throw it away. It's bad. Presses on the neck. Prevents circulation."

"I'm 71, but I can stand on one foot, without putting the other one down, for 15 minutes—maybe more." And just to prove it, the congressman from New York demonstrated in the middle of the corridor, while passing senators jostled by and nearly knocked him off balance.

Congressman Bloom's recipe must work, for despite hours of congressional battling and half a lifetime in the hurly-burly of the theatrical business, he remains as spry as ever.

BRITISH REAL ESTATE

Washington real estate owners have every reason to be pro-British, for the expansion of British office space in the capitol has been their greatest Godsend.

Though already occupying space in five buildings, the British purchasing commission has now taken over a new building at a downtown location—15th and M streets. It was recently sold for \$165,000. Now the buyer turns around and rents it to the British for \$40,000 a year, which

means he may get his money back in four years.

This building is used by the commission's heavy ordinance units, including two famous tank experts, General Douglas H. Pratt and Michael Dewar.

Other buildings being used by the purchasing commission are the Adams building, the Hibbs building, the building at 1518 K street, Andrew Mellon's old apartment house on Massachusetts avenue, and a whole floor of the Willard hotel. They have found the Willard space uneconomical, because "there are too many bathrooms."

In addition, the British embassy (distinct from the purchasing commission) has overflowed into a new annex, built last summer, and is now building an extension of the Chancery, to provide 18 additional rooms. Also, they have taken over the Wardman residence below the Rock creek bridge off Massachusetts avenue to provide quarters for the information and press section.

MERRY-GO-ROUND

An article in the Harvard Law Review by Julius Stone, Harry Hopkins' former assistant, on revision of private law has attracted so much favorable attention that the senate judiciary committee will invite him to appear and expound his proposed reforms. . . . Colorado's Representative Edward T. Taylor, 83 years old, is the wordiest man in the Congressional Directory. His personally penned biography, over 650 words long, takes up almost an entire page. Unlike 84-year-old Senator Carter Glass, who does not give the year of his birth, Taylor makes no secret of his. . . . Buy Stocks Now And Hold For Long Pull

Babson Park, Fla., March 20.— In spite of the highest rate of industrial production this country has ever known, the stock market shows but little signs of life. Furthermore, while prices have been falling on the New York stock exchange since last November, stocks in London have gone up and in Berlin have held at a very high level. Will U. S. and Canadian stocks remain at their prevailing low prices, slide off further, or is there a rise ahead? These are questions in which readers are interested. Let us look at the record.

Berlin—London—New York
Following the start of World War II in September, 1939, German stock prices reacted only a trifle the next month and ever since then have been climbing to new highs. Of course, the Berlin market is controlled. It is not the type of free market which exists in New York, Toronto, or even in London, despite the pegging of the British pound. From the commencement of hostilities, British stocks also moved steadily upward until March, 1940, when they took a nose-dive, reaching their low in the early summer of 1940. Since then, London prices have risen more than New York prices.

At the beginning of the war, the indices of New York and Berlin stock prices were the same, namely, 93. New York prices rose above those of Berlin for a month, then reacted and continued for six months a sidewise movement. In April, 1940, a month after the decline started in London, American stock prices fell sharply, showing a drop from a high of 95½ in October, 1939, to a low of 73½ in June, 1940. In the same period of time, London prices dropped from 72 to 64½, thus showing nowhere near the collapse experienced in the American market. New York prices rose from a low of 73½ in June, 1940, to a high of 82 in November, 1940. London prices started up a month later. However, in November, New York prices again declined until now they stand at 76 compared with 93 when the war started.

U. S. Investors Should Cheer Up
While New York prices have been declining, London prices have held up much better. Since the war started, there has been a net loss in London prices of less than 5% whereas the net loss in New York prices has been more than 15%. Over the same period, the rise in Berlin prices has shown an extraordinary gain of over 35%. This rise in German securities, while admittedly in a controlled market, should encourage American investors. Certainly, if controls are put into effect here to eliminate the dangers of inflation, higher taxes, or even more stringent SEC regulations, the Berlin market demonstrates that controls need not necessarily depress the prices of stocks.

Some of my readers are pleading that U. S. and Canadian stocks are already selling at bankrupt quotations; that much further drop will wipe out remaining equities. These readers are also pleading for a return to the old fairy-free form of margin buying and short selling. They want to buy stocks, but hate to put up the cash; that is they want to speculate. This is a dangerous and vicious practice. I never bought a share of stock on margin in my life. One of the best things the SEC has accomplished has been the stiffening of margin requirements and the practical elimination of stock market manipulation.

Are Equities Being Lost?
If any equities are in danger of being wiped out, they are individual and not the equities of corporations. Too many businessmen are worrying today about stock prices, failing to study the real value which these stocks represent. For example, General Electric remains as great and efficient an organiza-

tion and has the same amount of property and equipment whether its shares are selling for 41 or for 26. No form of equity is wiped out of a corporation by a slump in the price of its shares. However, individual equities most certainly can be wiped out when one trades on margin, whether buying or selling short.

I have no way of knowing, but undoubtedly shareholders in Berlin

are subject to severe restrictions or profits taxes which prevent them from selling securities today at 128 for which they paid 93 at the beginning of World War II. Hitler presumably is interested in having sympathetic Nazi investors maintain or increase their original equities in stocks. Their profits come in the form of increased dividends and thus, to a large extent, their income keeps pace with mounting prices and rising costs of living. Also the rising market in Berlin must please investors and free their attention for more important matters.

What's Ahead.
Some day there will be a terrific decline in German securities. When that time comes German investors

will probably be prevented from flinging their stocks on the market to be sold at declining prices just as they are now prevented from taking profits. Dividends may hold up longer than prices in Berlin, New York, Toronto, or London. In the seesaws of inflation, the average investor may be better off in the end, however, to ride the market up and to ride the market down without selling. If, without proper guidance, he sells, his money may not be worth much anyway. Also, the cash will burn a hole in his pocket and he will too quickly buy in again as most investors were doing in the decline in our market from 1929 to 1932. However, as I look today at our New York stock quotations, I can-

not help but believe that the investor who now has a little cash, faith, and courage, may well make some selected purchases. Some of these will be encouraging news from abroad with respect to the progress of World War II. Good news to the United States and Canada will be bad news to Germany. Berlin stock prices will fall and ours will rise. Wise indeed is the day's investor who sees that the inevitable is bound to happen and that those who have patience and courage can greatly profit when it comes.



Will Rogers Film Is Highly Praised

"In Old Kentucky," is doubtless one of the best pictures ever made by Will Rogers, and it may be the last of his pictures to show in Dahlart. It is the last one he made before he died in a plane crash in Alaska.

It opened at the Mission yesterday and will close this afternoon and tonight. As one would suppose — since Kentucky is the locale — the picture embraces horse racing, Southern colonels, beautiful women, a feud that is more fun than fighting, and dancing, including several specialty numbers done by Bill Robinson.

A rainmaker, trying to get water on the track at the Kentucky Derby, adds hilarity to the rest of the fun. This is one of those pictures that seems to have everything — including a tender romance.

The all-technicolor pictures of portions of the U. S. fleet, the naval training base at San Diego, and of boys being developed from raw recruits to finished sailors is not only a colorful saga of the spirit of America, but is delightful entertainment. One of the group shots includes Jimmy Cox, son of C. B. Cox, Dahlart.

The Mission Friday and Saturday will show "Little Men," and Saturday midnight and Sunday and Monday will offer "Tobacco Road."

The La Rita Friday and Saturday will play the Three Mesquiteers in "Lone Star Raiders," and will initiate a new 12-chapter serial, "Zorro's Fighting Legion."

"Little Men" is already an immortal story, having been read by thousands when and since it came from the pen of the gifted Louisa May Alcott. None of the richness is lost in the movie version, and it boasts an exceptionally bright galaxy of stars topped by Kay Francis, Jack Oakie, George Ban-

Willie, the Fox, (Jack Oakie) shows up to lend a helping hand and the story winds up in a delightful but touching climax.

"Lone Star Raiders" at the La Rita is packed with more than usual suspense and action, even for a Western. And the theme isn't cattle rustling, or even a range war. It revolves around the efforts of a shrewd and unscrupulous band of killers who employ every trick in the trade, including drugs, acids and guns to worst a harmless old lady and the men who are trying to help her win an Army cavalry contract. It's pell-mell drama from start to finish, and granny finally deals herself a hand in the game of six guns and hot lead.



**IN THE ARMY NOW!
WHY AND HOW**
By S. T. Williamson

A letter came the other morning from a young man who apparently isn't sleeping well at night. He figures that his selective service number won't be called for at least six months; but when he is summoned he knows that he cannot pass the physical examination. What can he do to prevent his local board from making public that he is unfit for military duty?

That revelation would hurt him socially and in his work, he writes, because he has been the life of many a recent party, joshing others who would soon be off to camp. I doubt that assurance that records of physical examinations for selective service are kept confidential, as are other items in a registrant's questionnaire, is much comfort to someone who fears a few chickens coming home to roost.

It is too bad that he won't pass the doctors when his time comes, because life in the Army generally works miracles with young men who like to dish it out, but can't take it. A soldier doesn't have much time to worry about his social position, but he is shown in many ways that if he can display an ability to take it, he may get a chance to dish it out. By that time, if he's worth his sergeant's stripes, he won't dish what he can't take.

What does the mail dish out? J. C. B., Butler, Pa.: The society editor of a small country newspaper persists in addressing grooms to be as Lieutenant "Doe." In one case she has repeated this at least five times in the same article. What I want to know is, is this proper? Some years ago a lieutenant was addressed as plain "Mister" and I think this still goes.

Both "Lieutenant" and "Mister" Doe are correct. The Navy runs more toward "Mister" while the Army favors "Lieutenant."

L. D., Wilmette, Ill.: Is it true that the Army is giving up bugle calls?

No. But in some camps an ingenious sergeant or two has rigged up electric buzzers to wake men up. Some airfields have no buglers but have a set of phonograph records of bugle calls which are played over loud speaker attachments. These are exceptions. The Army is not giving up buglers; most camps have schools for buglers and a great many buglers you hear could do with more time in the bugle schools.
