## British Strike Over Arctic

Russian land lines are still holding, and British for the past 24 hours have been putting increasing pressure on the Germans along the Arctic coastline.

It was the first direct aid that the British have given the Reds. Heretofore, the British have only stepped up their bombing raids in the West in an effort to force the Germans to shift some of their fighting strength from the Russian front back to the West.

A report today said the RAF had hit five German ships in a north Swedish port. Sweden is supposedly neutral, but a few weeks ago did give Germany right-of-way for movement of troops from Norway to the Red fighting front.

British said at noon their fliers had wreaked devastating damage on Petsamo, Finland's Arctic port. Observers construed these favors as designed to lighten Nazi pressure on the Soviet port of Murmansk and not as blows aimed at either Sweden or Finland.

There were indications last night that British naval units are engaged in the Arctic, and some observers wondered if Britain would try, while Germany is occupied with Russia, to wrest Norway from the Nazis.

British admitted today that the Arctic thrusts had cost them 16 planes. Germans claimed the British loss was much greater.

Reds reported at noon that intense fighting had been resumed 145 miles south of Leningrad. Observers construed this as meaning that the Nazi blitz in that area was making no progress. Nazis claimed last night they were about to spring a trap on Leningrad, one of their major goals.

Soviets admitted heavy fighting still rages around Smolensk, on the road to Moscow; and in front of Kiev, on the Ukrainian front. Other sectors were relatively quiet.

Acting Secretary of State Welles made it plain today that the U. S. is not satisfied with Japan's informal apology for bombing of a U. S. gunboat yesterday on the Yangtze river, adjacent to Chungking.

Guymon will be here Tuesday with a motorcade and its renowned Cowboy band, according to Secretary W. W. Kennedy of the Guymon C. of C.

A group of 17 men, reportedly all Mexicans, arrived in Dalhart this morning on the Denver lines and left at noon via Rock Island for deportation at El Paso.

They were accompanied by border patrolmen, federal and special Denver and Rock Island officers, according to information given The Texas.

A good many aliens, it was learned, are going through Dalhart periodically for deportation.

## Boat Races, Polo Ready For Sunday

Sunday afternoon in Dalhart will be jam-packed with entertainment, planned especially for early arrivals for the Sixth Annual XIT Ranch Reunion Monday and Tuesday.

Pampa and Dalhart, both top-flight Panhandle polo clubs and matched within a score or two of each other, will play at 2:30 on the Dalhart field, northeast of Kella Hill school.

Four speedboat races will be run on Dalhart's Rita Blanca lake, but have been arranged so that the crowds can see them as well as the polo game. Everything is free.

Two races will be run at 1 p.m. and the other two at 4 p.m., according to Gomer Jones and Chas. Youts, who arranged them and are in charge.

There will be races for A, B and C hydroplanes and for service motors up to 33 horsepower.

L. A. Pitts of Amarillo is rounding up hydroplane racers, Jones said, and says he will have a minimum of five in each race. Walter and Bobbie Pyle of Borger are get-

ting racers for the service motor event. Probably, said Jones, both 22 and 33 motors will compete in this race.

The events will be over a four-buoy course of approximately a mile. The hydroplanes will run five laps, the service motors four. Prizes in each race will be a minimum of \$7.50, \$5.00 and \$2.50.

W. J. Saserta, Amarillo, superintendent of the lakes program for the SCS, is slated as official starter. Jones will be pit manager.

Dalhart and Pampa Sunday will renew an old feud that has already produced three slam-bang thrilling battles this season. Pampa captured both games last season. Dalhart took the two first ones this year, winning each by one point in an overtime period.

Pampa won the tie-breaking scrap 7-5 in an eight-chukker battle. Though a six-chukker game is regulation, both teams agreed on the eight. The game Sunday probably will be a six and may restore the edge to Dalhart.

The WASHINGTON GO-ROUND

WASHINGTON — When the Vice President of the United States gets on a train to make his speech at the opening of the new powder factory at Burlington, Iowa, today, it is significant that he will get off at a little station just outside of Burlington called Middleton.

There is nothing much at Middleton except a couple of freight cars, a house and a station sign. It is a typical country crossroad flag station.

Suddenly, out of the flat Iowa landscape a new industry has come to town. An industry as foreign to the Iowa belt as the philosophy of Wallace is to war.

Which is indicative of what is going on both in the heart of the West and in the heart of the East.

At the last war, munitions plants along the Atlantic seaboard. A few miles from the coast, Pittsburgh and Chicago, got a bigging of munitions orders, but never dreamed of locating their factories in Omaha, Tulsa, or Wichita.

Now the USA is confronted with bombing planes capable of flying 7,000 miles, and so the West has become like the Mountains of Russia, and the East knows that the more munitions plants Stalin has placed between the Urals, the better are Russian chances.

As great changes have taken place in the strategic location of munitions plants, so great changes have taken place in the mind of Wallace. War, even national war, always has been anathema to him.

He could see no reason for having an army and navy, regarded as destructive institutions.

Last winter he went to Mexico and came back a changed man. In the United States, he began to feel that perhaps the first time, could be a danger of invasion. The West no longer was made invulnerable by geographic luck. An invasion by air from South America, Mexico, was by no means an impossibility.

Henry Wallace, the Iowa farmer who returns to the soil of Iowa, will be speaking his own best convictions when he tells best farmers that the time has come to beat their plowshares into swords.

young Congressional lieutenant, 32-year-old Lyndon Johnson.

It also was a tough blow to eloquent Senator Tom Connally, who, while publicly protesting his neutrality, was plugging for Attorney General Gerald Mann of Texas, No. 3 man in the race.

With the race over, the President is resigned to O'Daniel's election, but Connally is still a bit miffed by the failure of his candidate. He voiced this disappointment when he accompanied a group of congressional leaders to the White House for a legislature conference. Spotting Connally, the President inquired cheerily.

"Tom, when is Pappy coming to town? I'm anxious to get a look at his band."

Connally cogitated for a moment, then shot back with a grin:

"I don't know, but I do know if you hadn't butted into the election, he wouldn't be coming to town at all."

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### STRANGE BEDEFELLOWS

There is one matter that is not on the agenda of the AFL building trades executive council meeting in Chicago this week, but about which labor chiefs are very curious.

This is the sensational inside word that William ("Big Bill") Hutchinson, boss of the carpenters, has been secretly pow-wowing with the man he once slugged in a spectacular Atlantic City fist fight—John L. Lewis.

Just why Lewis and Hutchinson have put their heads together is a mystery. But strongly suspected is a Lewis scheme to spring a surprise "peace" move with the AFL.

The AFLers are for peace, but not one that would enable Lewis to make himself the master of a united labor movement. This is exactly what he is believed to have up his sleeve.

The AFL chiefs recall very vividly Lewis' answer to Secretary Frances Perkins when she urged him several years ago to use his powerful influence to bring the AFL and CIO together.

"I will bring peace to labor," he rumbled, "when it suits my purpose to have peace."

Privately, AFL leaders make no bones that they are very leery of a John L. Lewis festooned with olive branches. They don't trust him and want no part of him in any guise.

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### KNOWN FACTS

Known facts about the Lewis-Hutchinson get together are the following:

"Big Bill" made the first overture in a telegram congratulating Lewis on his radio broadcast bolting to Wendell Willkie. Before that, for six years, they had been bitter enemies, although once close AFL and GOP pals. As late as 1932, Lewis and Hutchinson went down the line together for Hoover, again-

st Roosevelt.

The NRA, with its famed Section 7a, rescued the United Mine Workers from the scrap heap, switched Lewis to the New Deal. Turning on his old AFL buddies, and after swapping blows with Hutchinson at the Atlantic City convention, Lewis set up the CIO with the backing of Sidney Hillman and his independent Amalgamated Clothing Workers. Raging with vengeance, Hutchinson led the movement that expelled Lewis from the AFL as a wrecker.

For six years their feud flamed. In 1936, Lewis went all-out for Roosevelt, and Hutchinson did the same for Landon as chairman of the GOP Labor Campaign Committee. Then in 1940, they suddenly became friends again through their common hatred of Roosevelt.

Lewis answered Hutchinson's telegram with a cordial letter. This was followed several months later by a secret meeting in New York. They have had at least one other, more recently.

It is definitely known that at this meeting the re-united pals exchanged notes on their common hatred, "that man in the White House", and also discussed AFL-CIO peace.

Note: It has not yet been announced, but the CIO convention will be held in October in either Detroit or Cleveland. With Phil Murray in a hospital recuperating from a heart attack and barred by his doctors from any activity for several months, Lewis' "palace guard" has quietly started rigging the machinery to ensure his control of the convention.

It was he who carried on early experiments at Guantanamo, Cuba.

Bartlesville, Okla. — Phillips Petroleum Co. earnings for the first six months of 1941 were \$8,236,679.84, or \$1.85 per share, 42 cents per share higher than in the same period in 1940.

This increased earning, officials said, was due primarily to expansion of sales and more reasonable prices for petroleum and its products.

provisional Chinese capital. Welles said the U. S. made strong representations concerning the incident both to the Japanese ambassador in Washington and to the Japanese government in Tokyo. He said the Japanese in Tokyo had merely handed, in reply, an apology note to U. S. Ambassador Joseph Drew.

Japan today moved its first warplanes into Indo-China, setting them down at a big base at Saigon. Japanese land forces, meanwhile shoved through to bases at the Thailand border while 50 to 60 Japanese warships steamed along the coast.

Tokyo announced today it would freeze funds of Australia, Burma and British Malay, retaliating for similar action taken by those states.

President Roosevelt today geared up U. S. plans for waging effective economic war. He created an Economic Defense Board with Vice-President Wallace as chairman and with cabinet members as members.

He also acted to make more effective efforts to knit the Western hemisphere into a compact unity by setting up the Office of Coordinator of Latin American Affairs.

Chairman Martin Dies of the House committee investigating un-American activities said today that his agents had uncovered a gigantic Japanese sabotage plot on the West coast. He gave no details.

Federal Oil Coordinator Ickes and the oil industry today recommended that beginning Aug. 3 all gasoline service stations on the Atlantic seaboard be closed from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m. in a move to conserve petroleum, a shortage of which threatens in that area. If it developed defense industries would be hampered.

That is the least action that can be taken realistically about the situation as it exists today, Ickes said.

Mexico City. — About 1000 persons, only half of them Mexicans, today crowded a semi-private screening of the Nazi propaganda film, "Victory in the West."

It tells the story of the war, from the Nazi standpoint, from Sept., 1939, to March, 1941. The crowd cheered lustily whenever Hitler's picture was shown.

The German showing the film urged the crowd to tell their friends that more screenings would be offered. "Victory is ours," he said.
