

Admitting that bad weather is hampering its mechanized forces before Moscow, Germans nevertheless insisted that the city's main defense had been reached at many points and that some Nazi troops were within 37 miles of the Kremlin.







Manufacturers are today using fully depreciated tools and machinery which they should trade in for new machinery so as to give the American people better goods for less money. Prosperity comes only from lower taxes and lower prices. Continuous employment is far more important than increases in wages or unit profits.





## **Hearings On Price Control Completed**

WASHINGTON - The House Bankng committee today completed hearings on the Administration's proposed price control bill.

Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, too ill to testify, sent the committee a statement saying some kind of price control is necessary to avoid inflation.

Secretary of Agriculture Wickard ealier this week told the committee that the nation is already starting on the same ruinous inflation surge and at about the same time as in World War 1. Parallels between conditions now and in World War 1 are too close for com-

He admitted a rapid rise in farm commodity prices, but said they still are not inflationary because they were so drastically subnormal when the upswing started. He said in 1939 the farm price level was on 75 per cent of the so-called parity base period of 1909-14.






