Italian General Moves Against D'Annunzio's Forces

ROME SAYS ARTIST-HERO IS SEDITIOUS

PARIS, Sept. 15.—Captain Gabriel D'Annunzio, who entered the city of Fiume at the head of a large irregular troop of volunteer soldiers who rallied quickly to the standard of the Italian artist-hero, now has the Italian army to cope with. General Badoglio, deputy chief of the Italian army, who has been given broad powers to meet the situation arising in Fiume incident to Captain D'Annunzio's entry, has arrived in the city prepared to take immediate steps to quell what Italian governmental authorities term "a seditious act."

DUAL LYNCHING CAUSES BAN ON MEXICAN FETE

FUEBLO, Cal., Sept. 15.—Mexican residents of Fueblo have been advised by the Mexican consul at Denver to refrain from celebrating the anniversary of the independence of Mexico from Spanish rule. This is the only action taken by the consul in connection with the lynching here Saturday night of J. V. Gonzalez and Valverde, following their murder of Patrolman J. Evans.

ABILENE, Sept. 15.—W. E. Jones, local oil man, has bought the Mabee building at the corner of First and Second streets for a consideration of \$50,000. This represents an outlay of \$2,000 a foot, to let being 25,575 feet. It shows practically how Abilene is growing under the pressure of oil. Mr. Jones has bought considerable property here coming here a year ago.

M'CUMBER UP IN ARMS FOR LEAGUE PACT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—Calling attention to what he termed failure of the senate majority committee to explain the purposes of the League of Nations, Senator McCumber today made the following statement: "Not a single allusion is made to either the great purpose of the League of Nations or the methods by which those purposes shall be accomplished. Irony and sarcasm have been substituted for argument. It is to be regretted that animosity which centers wholly against the league should have been engendered against a subject so important to the world's welfare."

GOMPERS ASKS STEEL STRIKE POSTPONEMENT

CLEVELAND, Sept. 15.—It has been learned from an authoritative source that a meeting of representatives of twenty-four organizations affiliated in the proposed strike of steel workers, scheduled for September 22 has been called by President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor to consider his recommendation that the strike be postponed until after the industrial conference with President Wilson, October 6.

Wheat Embargo Proving Costly

ABILENE, Sept. 15.—The wheat embargo at Texas ports is costing the farmers of the Abilene country some real money. Being unable to get their wheat threshed and marketed here, the embargo forced local buyers to cease operations, many farmers are forced to throw their maize and fetaria upon the market to raise money to care for obligations which would have been met had wheat been available. As a result the local market for maize has dropped to \$16 a ton. Many carloads of head maize are being shipped here for the purpose of having the grain threshed for market. It is said by local dealers that as soon as the freight situation is cleared up no crop can be handled the price will go up rapidly. Some farmers in this section have not sold a bushel of wheat, because the embargo caused local buyers to cease operations.

Gulf Storm Has Effect on Ranger

The tropical hurricane which swept over the gulf coast Sunday, doing great property damage, has manifested itself in Ranger in the form of lowering temperature, high winds and a sprinkle of rain. The wind blew from the southeast Sunday night and Monday and many old-timers predicted a heavy rain before Monday night. The hurricane swept the gulf coast from the edge of Louisiana to Brownsville, on the southern coast of Texas.

BROWNVILLE UNHARMED.

BROWNVILLE, Sept. 15 (Via Army Wireless to Associated Press). Brownsville suffered no material damage from the high winds accompanying the tropical hurricane which touched the Texas coast early Sunday. The hurricane itself apparently did not hit the lower coast country, but the wind and waves caused some damage.

Steam Attack Extinguishes Flaming Well

Two days before officials of the Gulf Production Company hoped to have the roaring oil fire at the Calvia Perkins No. 5 under control, after the well blew in unexpectedly Saturday morning and caught fire from the hot plates under the boiler, the gusher was put out and the crew is at work to make temporary connections to the flow and storage tanks. The estimated production of the well is between 1,000 and 2,000 barrels. Nothing is left of the rig and the machinery of the original operation but a battered and twisted tangle of useless metal. At present, it is not known whether the well will be rigged up again and drilled to the regular pay depth, or whether the feck stratum which was found at 3,005 feet will be considered sufficiently productive. The fire was put out by the steam from a battery of boilers, which was stoked up to maximum pressure. Then the terrific column of live steam was turned onto the well, with the result that the tower of flames rising from the top of the casing was snuffed out by a candle in a puff of wind.

CISCO SCHOOLS EXPECT LARGEST ENROLLMENT

All the kiddies and further advanced scholastics are making ready for the opening. The school board is expecting a larger enrollment at this time than at any former time in the history of the city. Some twenty-five teachers will have charge of the various grades. Rooms and board for the instructors are being arranged by the school board and Chamber of Commerce. The ward building to cost some \$15,000 being erected in East Cisco is being rapidly built, for the new school building will be a grand one.

ENEMY ALIENS TUNNEL FROM WAR BARRACKS

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15.—Between seven and seventeen enemy alien prisoners in the war barracks at Fort Douglas, near Salt Lake City, escaped from confinement early today by way of a tunnel constructed underneath the wire enclosure of the prison. An early check on those missing indicates that none of the important prisoners escaped. According to the commandant there were 207 prisoners in the compound, mostly of the I. W. W. class. Police and sheriffs throughout Utah have been warned to be on the watch for the escaped prisoners.

EASTLAND COTTON SELLS AS FAST AS IT IS BALED

OIL MEN SAY SEARS WELL IS A REALITY

Special to The Times. ABILENE, Sept. 15.—The Sears well northwest of Merkel held the center of the stage in this part of Texas the past week and bids fair to keep on holding it for the time being, at least. It was reported that the well drilled another seventy feet Friday and Saturday, with the oil showing continuing. When drilling was suspended to brace the derrick in order to be able to handle the heavy string of casing for underreaming purposes, the drill was in blue shale. The hole now is well below 2,500 feet and it is indicated that the drillers are looking for a bigger sand, which was predicted by the local geologist as lying between 2,800 and 3,200 feet. Oil men who have visited this test are quoted as saying it is a well. Excitement at Merkel, as well as at Abilene, has been high ever since the sand was touched ten days ago. Leases have changed hands rapidly at figures almost unprecedented in wildcat territory and many of the purchasers have been oil operators old in the game. California men especially seem to be interested, as is shown by announcement that a group of Bakersfield men have obtained a drilling contract on a big block of land lying north of the town of Eskota, in southeastern Fisher county, thirty-one miles west of Abilene. These men are H. G. Moss, E. L. Foster, J. A. Porter, R. L. Glover, A. L. Hamell and others. Casing and tools for this new test have been shipped from California and the test will be sunk to 3,500 feet. A cash forfeit of \$5,000 has been posted, supplemented by a \$10,000 bond approved by a California bank. The location was made by Dr. H. E. Peters of Berkeley, Cal., and E. L. Foster of Bakersfield. Dr. Peters has worked six years in Texas territory and in his report on the Eskota well he says: "I am more firmly persuaded that this structure is one of the best defined that I have found in Texas." The ranch formerly belonging to T. J. Coggin of Merkel forms a part of the block and it is said that when a water well was being sunk there twelve years ago a flow of gas struck at 400 feet gave the driller a big scare. It is announced also that Ira Garrison of Merkel has let the contract for a block southwest of the town of Trent, a few miles west of Merkel. With the Sears, the Blaud, the Putman and the Eskota tests this will give the country immediately west of Abilene a thorough try-out. Casing has been received, after a long delay, for R. H. Allison's No. 1 Hamilton, located in Cedar Gap, thirteen miles south of Abilene, and is being set. Drilling will be started again this week. The casing in Allison's No. 1 Hale has been pulled apart and work is held up pending arrival of a nipple. Drilling has been resumed on the well at View, ten miles southwest of Abilene. At Fort Phantom Hill, an oil company's No. 1 Scott, fifteen miles north of town, drilling is progressing at around 1,900 feet.

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WIRES DOWN TO STRICKEN GULF PORTS

PORT ARANSAS DESTROYED. HOUSTON, Sept. 15.—Port Aransas, twenty-five miles from Corpus Christi, on the upper end of Mustang island, was completely destroyed by the hurricane Sunday, according to a wireless message picked up here, believed to have been sent from a ship on the gulf. It was signed "Deputy Collector of Customs for Port Aransas and Corpus Christi." The message read: "Port Aransas completely demolished by hurricane. Customs officer and all records lost." There are no positive reports of loss of life so far. Port Aransas had a population of about 600. It had a more exposed and lower position than Corpus Christi, which has 15,000 population. While it is thought that ample warning had been given the residents of Aransas Pass and Port Aransas, and it is believed that they have made their way inland, no wire communications to these places is operating and it is not known what story of loss later reports of the storm will tell. It is pointed out that it is likely that the residence districts of both those towns were inundated, as both those towns lie lower than Corpus Christi. Efforts made today to establish wire communication with Corpus Christi and Brownsville have been unsuccessful. Telephone and telegraph companies are unable to predict when lines will be put in working order again. Houston today reports that no wires are available from there to Victoria, Kingsville, Corpus Christi or Brownsville. Many smaller cities along the gulf are known to have suffered damage from the wind, which at the height of the storm, was at hurricane velocity. DALLAS, Sept. 15.—Telegraph companies today face the task of tangle the wire system in the Gulf section, from Corpus Christi to Brownsville, without a tropical hurricane sweeping the Gulf of Mexico, severing wire communication, overrunning houses and barns, flooding streets with water and threatening much damage. Moszer reports have been received today, telling of two islands off Point Isabel which are under water. No reports of fatalities have been received. The massive sea wall at Galveston, constructed after the costly lesson of the havoc the wanton gulf storms could work that city from extensive damage. 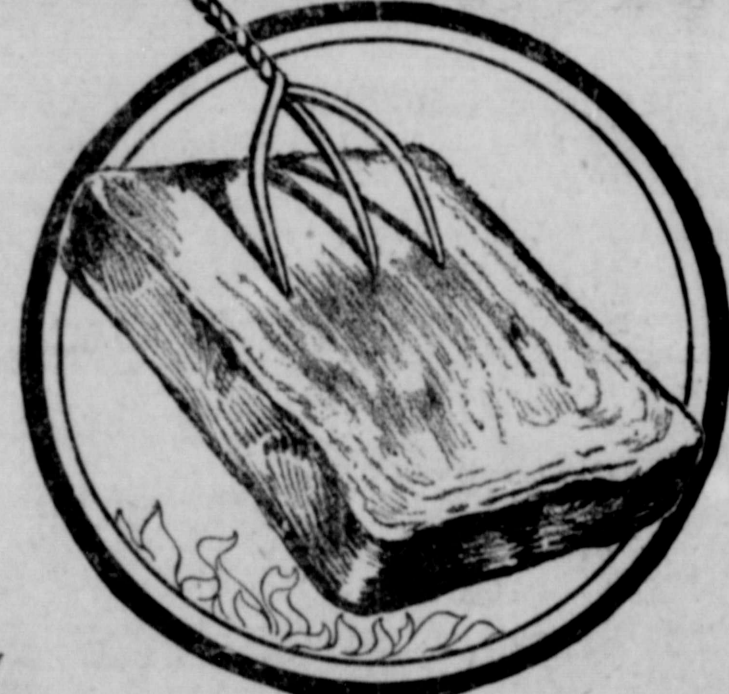

# GERMANS CAUSE OF TROUBLE ON MEXICAN BORDER

**DALLAS, Sept. 15.**—Trouble between Americans and Mexicans on the border and elsewhere is the result of quietly working German propagandists who are striving to stir up difficulties between Mexico and the United States in the hope of freeing Germany from many obligations incurred by the great war and with the intention of establishing strong trade relations between Germany and Mexico before the United States can put in solid bids, according to Dr. T. V. Neal, educational secretary of the Baptist general conference of Texas, who has just returned here after a trip through Mexico.

Citing an instance of alleged German complications in the activities of Francisco Villa, Dr. Neal said that before Villa arrived at Durango on September 2 a German lumber mill operator, apparently forewarned of the impending attack, sent his forty employees to a place of safety some forty miles out of Durango. When Villa assaulted the city which has a population of 60,000, with his 600 men, he was quickly and effectively defeated by the federal garrison, according to Dr. Neal, who added that he was in Durango at the time.

Reported "unsettled conditions" in Mexico are a "myth," resulting from actions of a few isolated bands of outlaws operating in Mexico and aided by a number of well-meaning persons, chiefly in the United States, attempting to solve a problem "that does not exist" and by methods that will not work, Dr. Neal declared.

"Villa's backing is waning each day," Dr. Neal continued. "The efficiency with which Carranza is handling the problems in Mexico of late has strengthened his government with the thinking people of Mexico so they do not want intervention by the United States, as they feel it unnecessary and would only needlessly arouse ill feeling between the two countries. Representative Mexicans are altogether friendly to us, in spite of reports to the contrary, and some of them told me they are gradually solving their problems in their own way by putting responsible men into office to work out their salvation by evolution rather than by revolution. Conservative Mexicans, Englishmen and Americans with whom I talked while in the southern republic, believe that Villa as a revolutionary factor is dead, although he may survive for a while as a bandit."

**ROOSEVELT MEMORIAL MEETING AT DALLAS**

**DALLAS, Sept. 15.**—The district meeting of the Dallas conference of the Roosevelt Memorial association, originally set for Dallas on September 15, has been postponed until September 25. District meetings scheduled for other Texas cities also have been postponed to later dates, while the proposed conference for Sweetwater has been definitely abandoned. The Dallas conference embraces practically the whole of North Texas.

The San Antonio conference, scheduled for September 16, has been set back to September 24 and the Houston meeting from September 17 to September 23.

In making this announcement the Dallas headquarters of the Roosevelt Memorial association gave as the reason the desire to bring conference dates nearer to the time of opening of the campaign to raise Texas' portion of the \$5,000,000 memorial fund and also to permit a longer period in which to organize the various counties. Col. Theodore Roosevelt had thousands of admirers in West Texas counties which were to have been covered by the Sweetwater conference, local headquarters announced, but owing to the distance the meeting was abandoned. The western counties will be covered by mail and through personal appeal, it was said.

Contributions to the memorial fund are being received daily at headquarters here and while funds will not be solicited until the beginning of the drive October 20, persons desiring to make earlier remittances may mail checks to Edwin Hobby, treasurer, Dallas.

**DRUG STORES CAN NOT SELL BOOZE ANY MORE**

**AUSTIN, Sept. 15.**—Revocation of permits of six drug stores in Texas to sell whiskey for medicinal purposes, under the war-time prohibition act, announced recently by the United States internal revenue collector's office here, were the first revocations in the state and probably the first in the United States, according to A. S. Walker, collector. Three of the drug stores were located at Houston and one each at Galveston, Victoria and Humble. Alleged excessive sales of liquor was given as the ground for the collector's action.

In addition to revoking the permits Collector Walker ordered inspectors of his department to seize the entire stocks of whiskey held in the stores affected. These stocks, Mr. Walker said, amounted to seventy-five barrels, forty of which were found in one drug store.

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"FLU" COMING BACK.

The "flu" is coming back. This is the prediction of the State Department of Health.

It made its appearance September 22 last year.

It made inroads by the thousands on the population.

It will be memorable to practically every family in all Texas because it either took a member from the home or left its impression upon them, turning stout and hale members of the family into invalids.

The "flu" was more destructive of human life than the great war.

And it's coming again.

It has been predicted that it will be more severe than it was last year. Some seem inclined to believe that it will not be so destructive.

But it's coming. That's the point.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Trite and ancient as the phrase is, it has lost none of its truth. It should be applied in the case of the "flu."

The State Department of Health, in making the announcement of the recurrence of the dread plague, has issued certain rules and regulations for the home and the city which will go a long way toward preventing it or will make its attack less severe than it would be if no precaution is taken. These rules are being printed in the newspapers throughout the state. The Times printed the article Sunday Read it. Digest it. Study it. Put it into effect in your home and in Ranger.

The disease seems to make its most insidious inroads in the congested places. Where cleanliness is below par it works doublefold and the number of deaths is increased correspondingly.

Ranger is badly congested. Ranger is not clean.

Therefore, It is time for every resident, who cares for his own health and life and for that of his neighbor to give renewed thought and concentrated action toward the elimination of every means of propagating the disease.

The habitation of every one must be placed in the best condition possible and all rooms should be swept and cleaned daily and ventilated so that the germs may be destroyed.

The city must resort to every means within its power to see that the streets are cleaned and maintained in that condition. Violations of the sanitary ordinances must be quickly perceived and the offenders given the maximum penalty. Every householder who refuses to keep his premises in sanitary condition should also be halted before the judge.

The crevices and cess pools must be obliterated. Garbage cans must be promptly protected. Woods which have stood all summer and caught every germ that swept through the air must be cut. Insofar as possible the dust nuisance must be swept away.

Unless the conditions are met there can be no telling what the fatalities may be here during the winter. One can never tell what the "flu" will do. It is asserted on good authority that the effects of the malady in West Texas last year were checked by a blizzard which extended over the entire state and took the great sting out of the "flu." It is those who live any old way and who care little for themselves or their neighbors who suffer most and bring death to other.

The warning has been sounded by the physicians and by the state department and by the government. They are telling on idle tale. They do not claim that it will be worse than it was last winter, but they do assert that the forces for its propagation are much more pronounced and

favorable for it than was the case last winter. At once, concerted action must be taken in Ranger and other towns in the oil fields particularly, if Ranger is to escape the severity of the plague and its people are to live useful lives further. In speaking of these conditions the Times is not trying to impress people with the fact that Ranger is more likely to feel the brunt of the "flu" than other towns, but being as it is looking after the interests of Ranger more than any other town, it must needs sound the warning and sound it with all its force in order that the "flu" may be prevented.

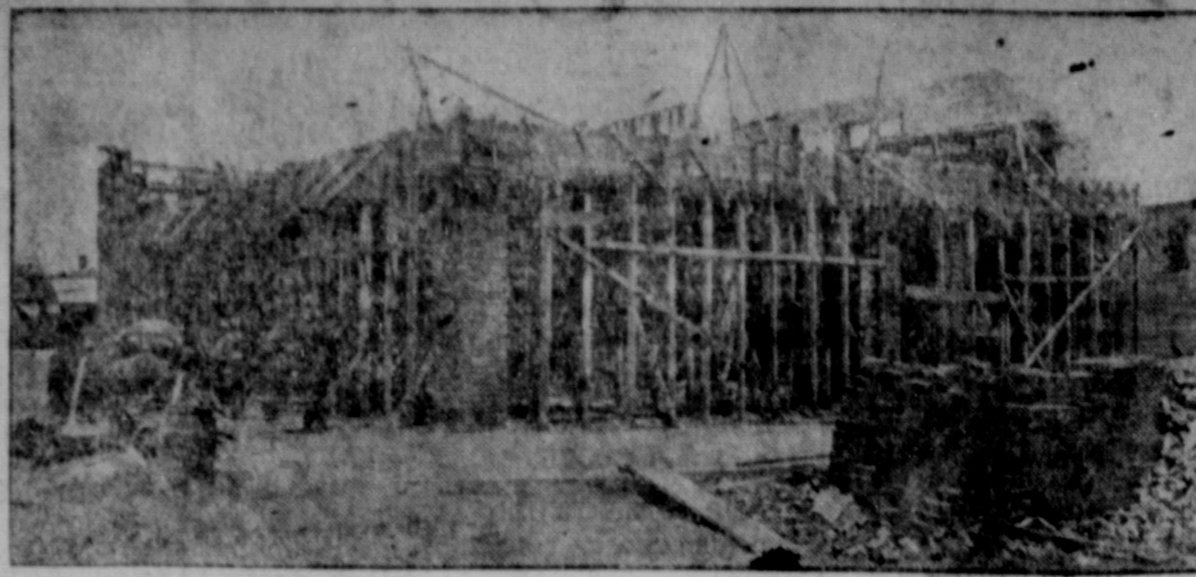
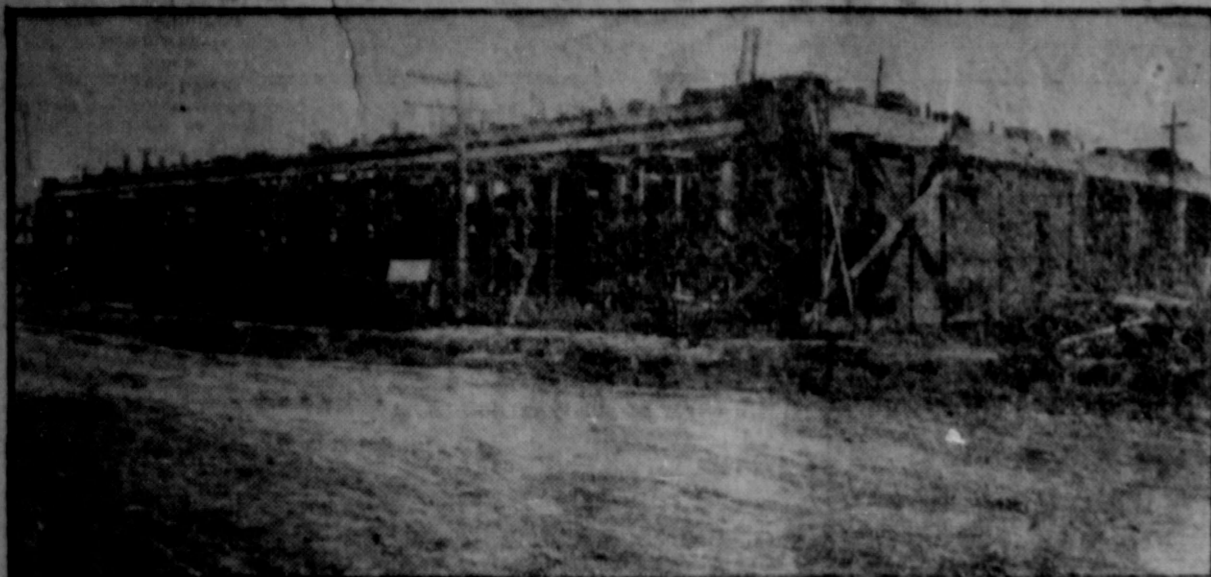

# Where Workers' Tools Sing Progress' Song



## RESIDENCE PERMITS SHOW BIG INCREASE RECENTLY; PERMITS FOR WEEK REACH OVER \$51,000

A large number of new residences is embraced in the building permits issued by building inspector S. F. Owens in the last thirteen days, aggregating around \$50,000. Permits for a number of new business houses, most of which are small structures, were also issued from the office of City Clerk Armstrong.

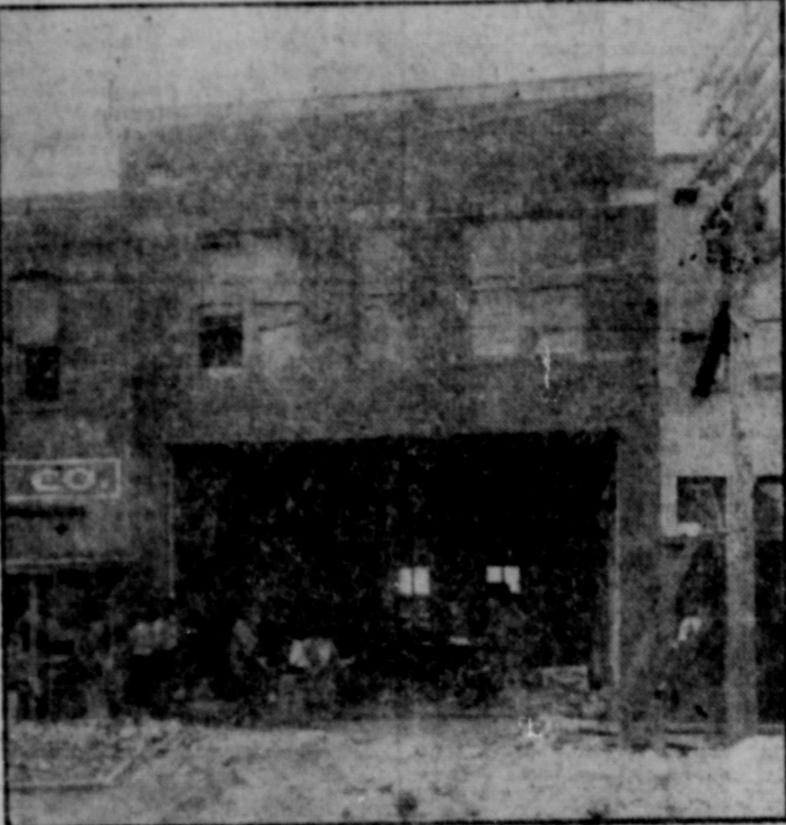
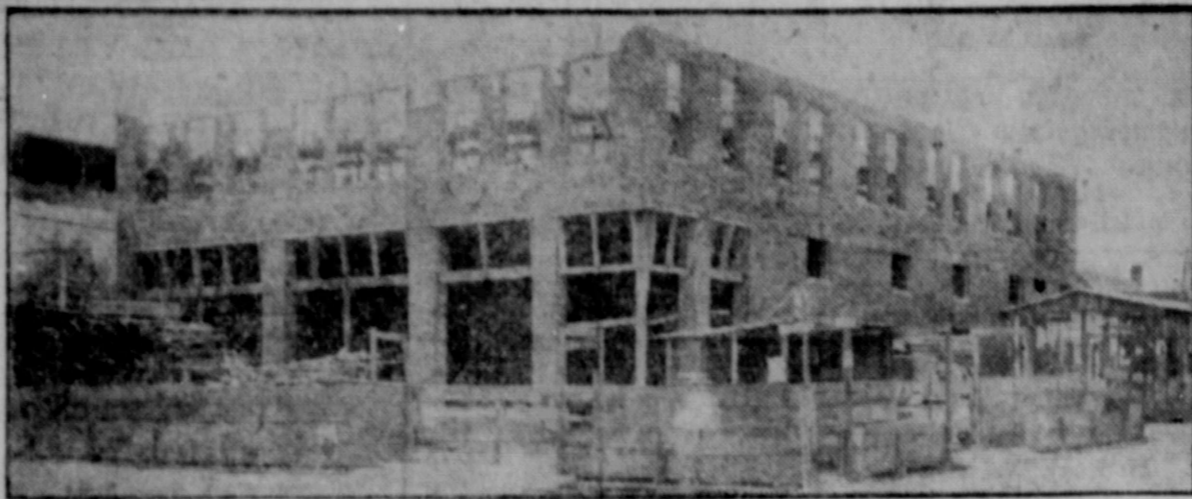
At the present time it is estimated that there is more than \$2,000,000 worth of new construction going on in the city. The fact that embargo has been maintained against Ranger for the last several weeks accounts in a measure for the delay to construction of a number of large buildings. Much material ordered for new structures has been held up at various places in the country. The fact that other material cannot be secured has caused a number of persons contemplating to build at the present time to wait a week or ten days until the present high tension in transportation is lessened.

Work is progressing on the Guaranty State Bank's new six story bank and office building at the southeast corner of Main and Austin streets. Part of the brick wall on the east has been laid up a story in height. Work on other large buildings in the city is keeping apace. Remarkable speed has been made on the Heffernan building—a three-story office structure—at the corner of Marston and Main streets. The brick for the third story has been practically laid and it should not be a great while until the roof can be put upon the large structure. Work is progressing laying foundations for the elegant new structure by White and Burney between Austin and Kunkel, on the north side of Main street.
