Senter, Dallas candidate for Governor, complains of the many approaches made upon the candidates, not for the reason that they are philanthropically inclined, but simply that when asked for help, the organization or persons knows that a refusal is rarely the outcome. Mr. Senter is right in advocating a rule that candidates not be requested to contribute for every conceivable thing that is started. Even down to County and Precinct office, is this custom abused.

To date, the News has printed, for County candidates alone, over 12,000 candidate cards. Sufficient, nearly, to go around, but it is going to take more cards and something else to get into some of the offices, judging by the number of candidates seeking favor at the July Primary!

As a direct result of the Dairy Night School, started last November by T. V. Weaver, Vocational Agriculture Teacher in the Dimmitt High School, and sponsored and financed by the Chamber of Commerce of Castro County, Castro County farmers are starting a dairy program which is destined to become county-wide within a short time.

Meetings have been held the past two Saturdays at the court house, with the result that a total of 28 head of fine dairy stock will be in Dimmitt on Saturday, March 1, when judging contests will be held, just east of the court house, and the animals placed on exhibition during the day.

Vocational Class Challenges
The judging team of Mr. Weaver's high school class has issued a challenge thru the News, that they will judge against any man or group of men of the county, during the day.

Dates for Tax Collector this District

The News is in receipt of a communication from John Toensmeier, deputy collector of internal revenue, that a deputy of that department would be in Tulia on May 3, and in Plainview on May 11 and 12, for the purpose of assisting taxpayers with their returns.

There will be no charge for this service, and all payers of income tax are warned to file their reports this year on time, to avoid penalty and interest.

NOTE—The above dates are published as furnished to the News, but since the limit for filing returns is March 15, it is evident that an error was made and that the dates will be on March 3, at Tulia, and March 11 and 12 at Plainview.

LOCAL GIRLS ENTERED IN DALHART CONTESTS

The following Dimmitt school students left Wednesday for Dalhart, where they will enter the piano and speaking contests in the Dalhart meet, being held this week:

They will remain over Friday and Saturday for the basketball tournament, some of them being members of the Bobcat cagers.

Assurance of a 500-gallon well for the Dimmitt Municipal Water System was given Thursday by D. L. McDonald, contractor, of Amarillo, after a test pump had been run on the well for three days, the depth being 263 feet.

Guarantee Fulfilled

Contract for this well was let by the City Commission on January 1, this year, and actual work started on February 5, after being compelled to make a small well for a temporary supply of water for work on the project. With day and night crawls on the job, a steady flow of water, covering his guarantee to the city of 500 gallons per minute, has resulted.

Work on Tank and Reservoir
Excavation is now being made for the 200,000 gallon concrete reservoir, and pillars are being placed for the 50,000 gallon tank, to be placed on a tower 100 feet high, both to be erected just south of the well, which is located on the city's three lots, east of the court house.

To Start Distribution System

Just as soon as the reservoir and tower are completed, and the booster pump installed, a thorough test will be made, after which work will start on the \$20,000.00 distribution system, covering every section of the city, including the Clifton Heights, Miller and Winona Additions.

It is estimated that 10 days will be required to make the tests, prior to starting the laying of mains.

Will Rush Work

With favorable weather conditions, it will require about four weeks to complete the distribution system, and but a short time then until all residences and business houses will have city water at their property lines, or within easy reach of same.

Announcement will be made in the News at an early date of the complete cost to consumers, covering connection, meter charges, rates, etc.

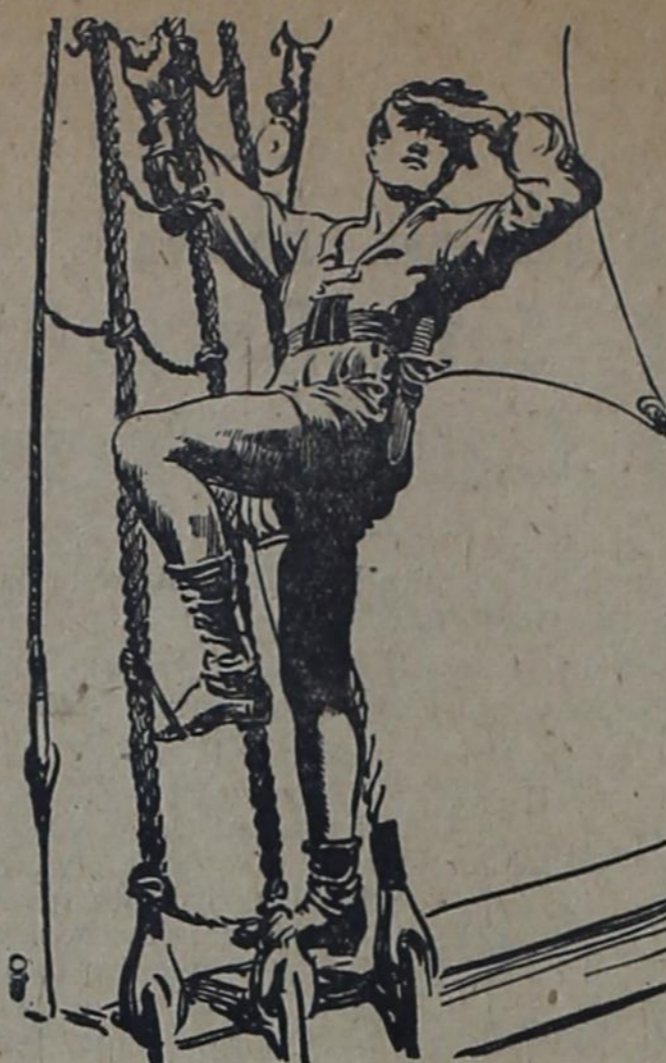

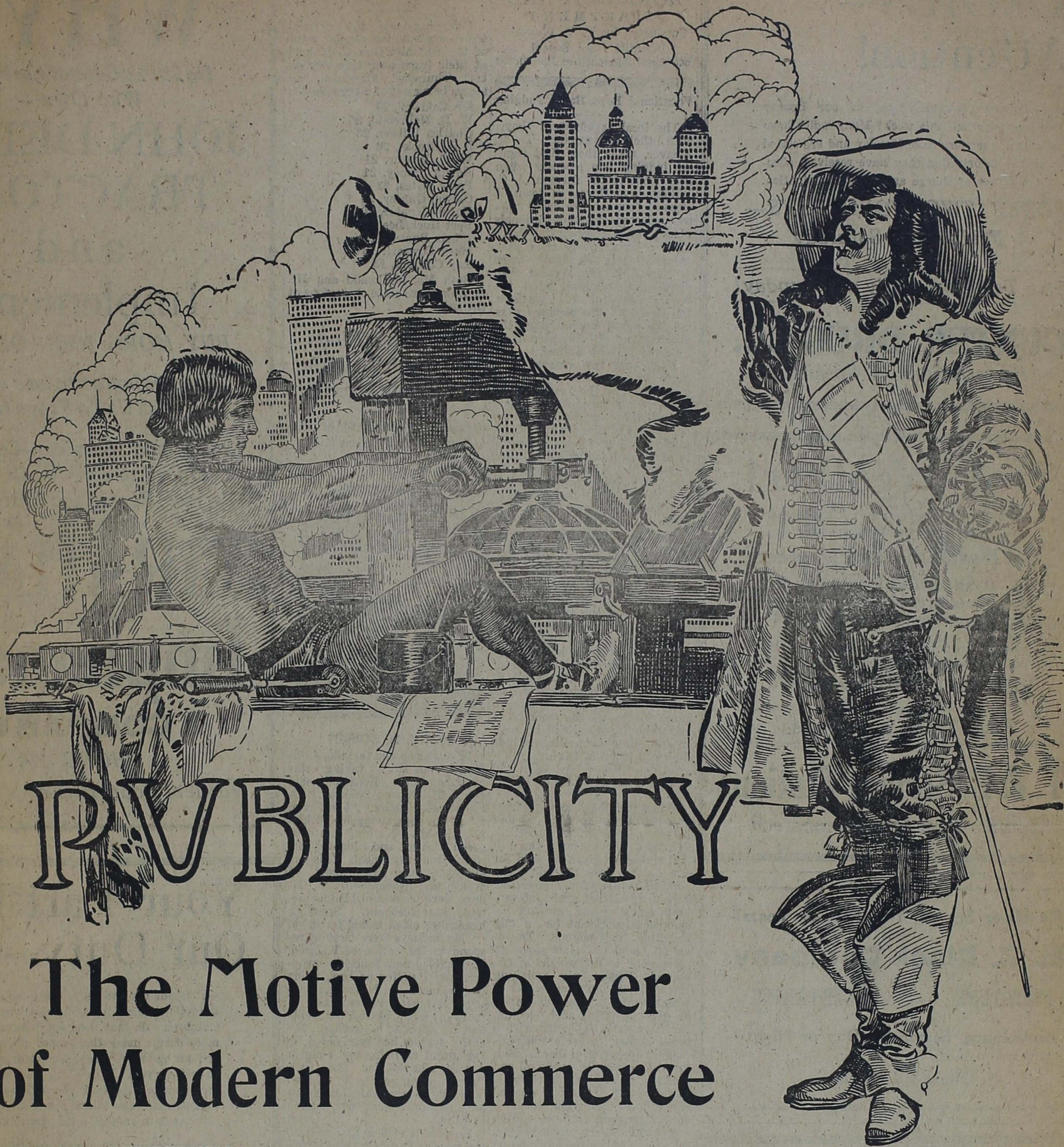

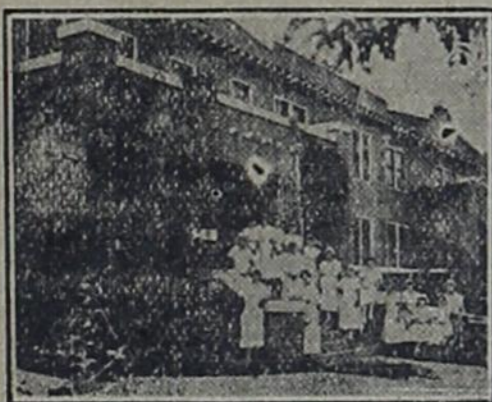

Vocational Boys Begin Judging

The local agriculture boys, with their instructor, T. V. Weaver, made their first regular judging trip recently when they went to the farm of J. C. Williams, southwest of town. A class of four mature dairy cows was selected and these animals placed on a comparative basis by the boys. They then gave reasons orally for placing them as they did. Mr. Weaver then placed the cows and gave the boys reasons for his placings. Of course all the placings were not the same, emphasizing the greater need of being able to select a good dairy animal.

There are two reasons why there are so many profitless cows, first, on the average farm cows are not cared for properly; second, there are being kept on the farms of the United States a vast number of cows so lacking in breeding, individuality, and ability, that it is impossible for them to produce profitably. It is estimated that out of 22,000,000 cows, that are being milked on farms in the United States there are 14,000,000 entirely unproductive of profit. Half of these would make a profit were they properly fed and cared for. The other half, or 7,000,000, cows are unprofitable because they belong to one of two classes of cows— either poorly bred or miserable individuals. Not until the farm boy realizes that the farm is a factory roof of which the sky and the wells of which are the horizon and that every animal is there for the same purpose as the machine in any other factory, will he really appreciate farm life and not desire to move to town.

For Worms and Lice on Hogs

When a pig has become affected with worms, medicine should be given in sufficient quantities to remove the worms. The animal should be given no food for one or two days preceding the administration of the medicine. Two and one-half grains of santonin and an equal amount of calomel is sufficient for a pig weighing fifty pounds. The amount should be increased to correspond to the weight of the animal. For a pig weighing from 100 to 200 pounds, 1-3 of a teaspoonful of santonin should be given morning and evening, for three days, following with a brisk cathartic, preferably calomel in teaspoonful doses. It is here recommended crude oil and creosote or two pounds of kerosene and one of hard oil applied to the hair and skin with a sponge or cloth for lice. Kerosene should never be used alone, as it will remove the hair and irritate the skin.

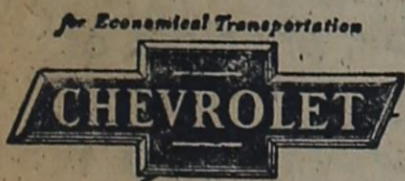

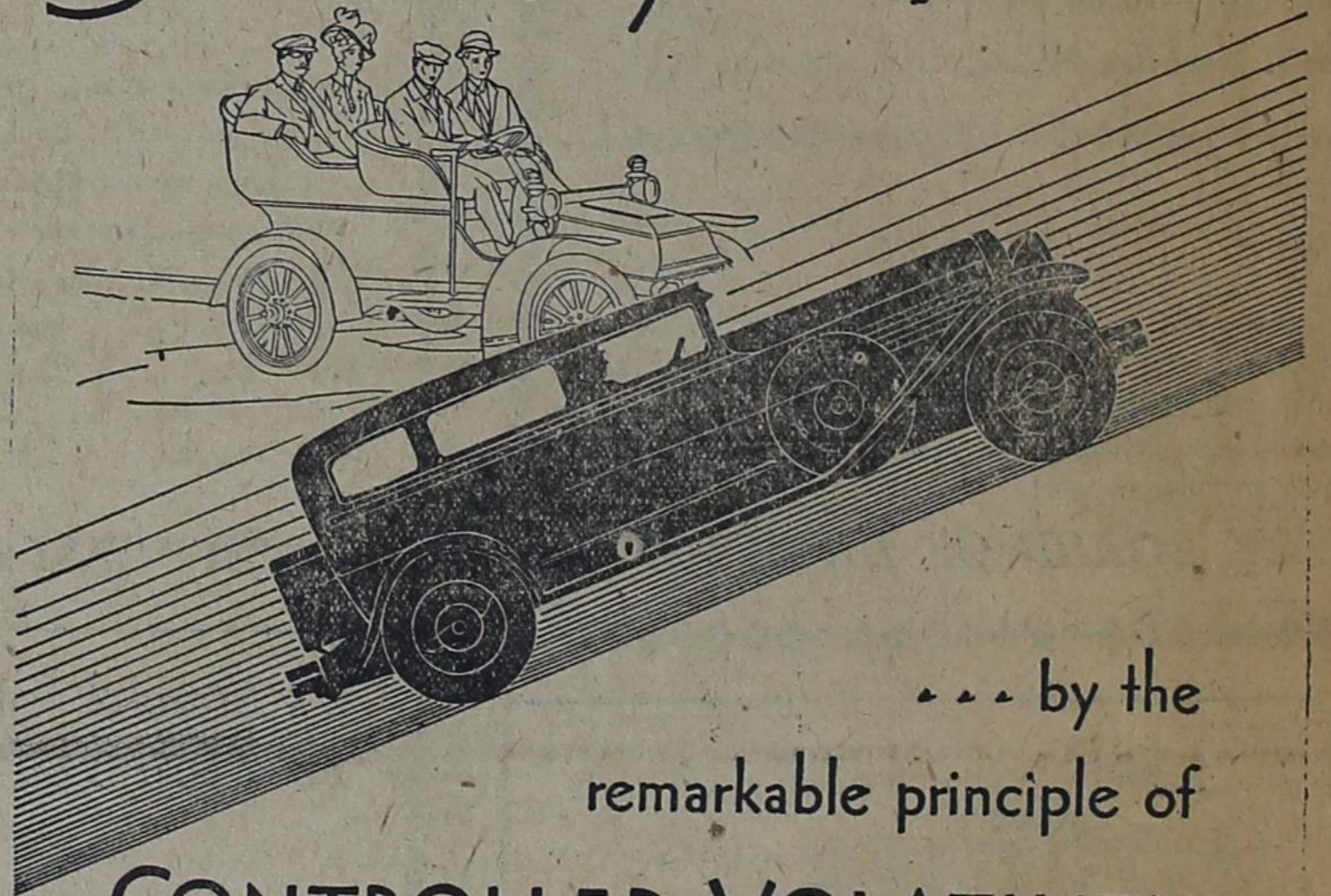
