## Four contested races on tap

Voters will go to the polls from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday to cast ballots in city, school board and hospital board elections. Four races are contested.

In Dimmitt, the polling site will be the Dimmitt City Hall meeting room for the city, school board and hospital district.

In Hart, polling for city, school board and hospital board offices will take place in the community room of the Farmers State Bank.

The homemaking department of Nazareth High School will be the polling site for city, school board and hospital board elections in Nazareth.

Twenty-one candidates have filed for the various offices up for election throughout the county. They are listed below.

### DHS, HHS get II's

### NHS Band earns top concert mark

Nazareth High School's band received its first Division I (superior) rating ever in concert performance Tuesday at the Region XVI North Zone band competition in Plainview.

The 45-member NHS Band was the only Class A group to receive a I rating in concert.

"The kids worked really hard and put in a lot of time, and I think that's what did it," Band Director Bernie Tackitt said.

The NHS Band received a II in the other phase of the spring contest, sight-reading.

For the Dimmitt and Hart High School bands, it was II ratings across the board. Judges' ratings can range from V (poor) to I (superior), with a II rating translated as "excellent."

The II ratings knocked Dimmitt High School's band out of its chance for a sweepstakes award, which requires straight I marks in the fall marching contest and spring concert and sight-reading.

Littlefield's band was the only Class AAA sweepstakes winner in the North Zone this year. The Friona and Lockney bands both received I ratings in both contest cate-

### Hall of Fame chooses Dimmitt All-American

Lometa Odom, former All-American basketball player from Dimmitt, will become the first woman inducted in the Texas Basketball Hall of Fame.

Her induction will take place April 14, during the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches' annual Hall of Fame clinic and convention.

The Hall of Fame ceremony will be in Waco, where Odom helped Dimmitt's Bobbies win three state basketball championships in the early 1950s. Waco was the headquarters of the Texas Girls Basketball League before the sport was taken over by the University Interscholastic League, headquartered in Austin.

Odom, a 1952 graduate of Dimmitt High, was an all-star three years as the Bobbies dominated Texas girls' basketball, and was later named to the TGBL's

All-Time All-State Team. She posted the all-time state tourney scoring record of 78 points in one game.

She went on to become an All-American post forward for four years with the Wayland Flying Queens, and in 1955 played on the US team that won the gold medal in the Pan American Games in Mexico City.

She was inducted in 1967 into the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame and in 1971 into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

She coached 18 years at White Deer, and now coaches in Plainview.

Odom is the daughter of Hiram and Opal Odom and the sister of Danna Beck of Dimmitt. Another sister, Margaret Parks (who was also an all-stater and All-American), lives in Corpus Christi.

A director of the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce and chairman of its industrial committee for the last two years, Lamberth is also president of the Castro County Development Corporation and the Dimmitt, Texas, Development Corporation.

He is a member of the Dimmitt Rotary Club, the Dimmitt Board of Adjustment, and served as president of the Castro County Unit of the American Cancer Society during 1978-1980. Two years of service on the board of directors of the Hereford, Texas, Federal Credit Union have provided him "with insight in representing the interests of others."

He and his wife, Sharri, and their three children regularly attend the Fourth and Bedford Church of Christ. The children are involved in many of the activities offered through the schools.

"I would appreciate an opportunity to serve all the citizens of Dimmitt as an alderman, and to help shape policies that will continue to keep us a strong, responsible community," Lamberth said. "I am vitally interested in helping the city progress in any way possible."

## Crime Line funds are running low

Local residents donated enough in 1982 to keep the Castro County Crime Line, Inc. going for two years. But now the Crime Line balance is down to \$1,061, and the project needs more donations, Crime Line directors said this week.

Treasurer Oleta Raper revealed that \$3,891 was received in 1982, with an additional \$565 received in 1983 and \$300 received through March of 1984, for total receipts of \$4,756.

Disbursements consist mainly of the \$2,950 paid out in rewards. Another \$744.97 went to postage, telephone, box rent and supplies. Broken down on a yearly basis, \$270.11 was spent in

1982, \$2,483.46 in 1983, and \$941.97 so far in 1984.

"This is a worthwhile project and we hope to see more added to the 11 crimes already solved through the Crime Line," a director of the project said. "We urgently request any who can to make a donation today."

## NHS's Cole accepts Sanford-Fritch post

Ken Cole, who guided Nazareth High School's football team to the best season record in the school's history this year, has resigned to become head football coach and athletic director at Sanford-Fritch High School.

He will assume his new duties at Sanford-Fritch April 16. The Nazareth School Board released him Friday from the year remaining on his NISD contract so he could accept the new post.

Cole said he views his new duties at the Class AA school as "an exciting opportunity."

"It's a much larger school, with a high school enrollment of 285, and they expect to go to Class 3A in two years," Cole said. "Although their program hasn't won many games in recent years, they have a lot of boys out for football, and they already have an established basketball program. They also have good facilities."

Sanford-Fritch's Eagles posted a 1-9 record last season and had a 2-8 mark the previous year. Cole became head football coach and athletic director at NHS three years ago after serving as an assistant coach two years at Dimmitt High School. The Swifts had posted a 4-6 record the year



## SAFETY TIPS from Bailey County Electric



When changing pipes, be sure to look up before standing the pipe up.

When moving pivot systems, be sure to re-connect all external grounds to avoid the hazards of electric shock.

Many types of farm equipment are of such height and length that they become an excellent path to the ground should you fail to recognize the danger of an overhead line.

Use extreme caution when using metal, metal-reinforced or wet ladders around electrical wires.

When grazing around irrigation equipment, make sure all controls are covered to prevent livestock from damaging switch gear, control panels or breaking grounding connections.

Consider any overhead line dangerous. Keep objects at least 10 feet away from powerlines.

Report any potential powerline hazard to your electric power supplier.

## Police calls

"The pickup will most likely be a total loss," a sheriff's deputy said, adding that it has not been recovered from the pit yet.

A 20-year-old Dimmitt woman was arrested for disorderly conduct early Sunday in a disturbance arising from a domestic dispute.

An argument early Monday in the parking lot of the Star Dance Hall ended in disorderly conduct charges being filed against a 22-year-old Dimmitt woman.

An 18-year-old Hereford man, stopped on a routine traffic check, was found to be wanted for theft by check on an Amarillo warrant.

A traffic accident last Wednesday morning resulted in light damage to two vehicles, but no injuries were reported and no citation was given.

A 1976 Chevrolet pickup driven by Virgle Ray Nelson, 57, of Dimmitt was northbound on Southwest Second Street when it was struck on the right side by a 1977 Ford Granada driven by Fay Scoggin Cline, 76, of Dimmitt. Cline failed to yield right of way in pulling into the street from a parking lot.

## Fire calls

A frozen regulator valve on a butane tank caused flames leaping four to five feet in the air in the Danny Reyes residence, six miles south of Dimmitt on SH 194.

The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. responded with three units and 17 men to the scene of the fire, which was reported at 10:30 p.m. Friday.

Mrs. Reyes and her daughter were home at the time, and had tried to extinguish the flames emanating from the hot water heater, cook stove and wall furnace.

Dimmitt Fire Marshall Steve Jameson said the appliances may have sustained some fire damage and there was minor damage to the house, but no injuries were reported.

The fire was brought under control when the valve was shut down.

## DHS all-staters now stand at 33

Dimmitt High School has now produced 33 all-state players in boys' basketball, dating back to 1944. Brad Holcomb and Dwight McDonald, named in this year's Texas Association of Basketball Coaches all-state selections, were the 32nd and 33rd.

In all, DHS has nailed down 36 all-state spots through the years, with three players as repeaters. They were Jim Birdwell in 1975 and 1976, and Kevin Cleveland and Jeff Watts in 1982 and 1983.

Coach Kenneth Cleveland has produced 25 all-staters since 1963, while Coach Johnny Ethridge turned out three in 1960 and '61, and Coach John Blaine five from 1944 through 1952.

Until the early 1960s, all-staters were chosen only from players participating in the state tournament, when the annual playoff was an eight-team, double-elimination affair.

When the state's schools were divided into more classes and the tournament was reduced to four teams in each class, the Texas Sports Writers Association started naming a post-season consensus all-state team, with a different regional daily newspaper conducting the statewide polling each year.

In 1978, the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches also started naming a consensus team in each class.

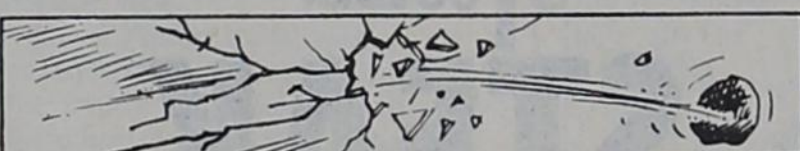

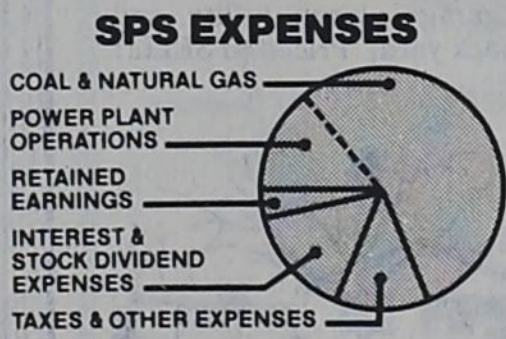



## Cancer Crusade to start

"Half of those who die from cancer could and should be saved," said Dale Wells, president of the American Cancer Society's Castro County Unit, in announcing plans for the 1984 educational and fund raising Cancer Crusade.

The test also contains sections that explain the answers and describes measures to take to help protect against these cancers.

The quick test for cancer risk is only one of the many Cancer Crusade activities Castro County volunteers are planning. Special education and fund raising activities will include the Cancer Run-for-Life on Saturday, April 28, under the chairmanship of Beth Buckley and Roger Malone. The business drive will be conducted under the chairmanship of Mrs. Donald Wright.

"These activities will help to further the Society's vital programs of research, education, and service to the cancer patient," explained Dr. B. D. Murphy.

"I hope that everyone in Castro County will have a chance to take this important test and give generous support to the 1984 Cancer Crusade," he added.

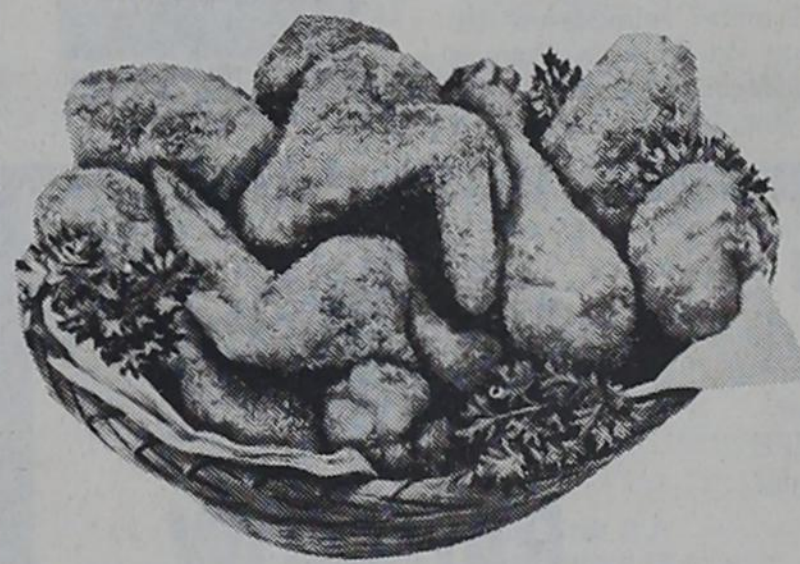

"A multi-media display of color slides will accompany many of the songs, and we will use colorful costumes, sets and lighting," said director Doug Henry.

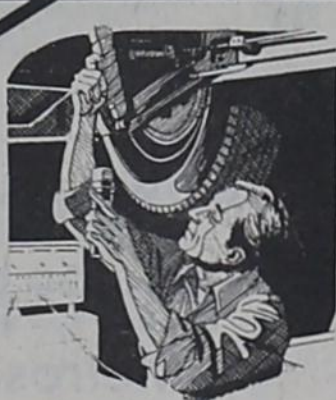

## Four local boys are named TABC all-staters

The Texas Association of Basketball Coaches has named two players from Nazareth and two from Dim-

mitt to its all-state boys' basketball teams.

They are Mark Huseman and Johnny Schmucker of the Swifts and Brad Holcomb and Dwight McDonald of the Bobcats.

Huseman was placed on the TABC's Class A first team and Schmucker was named to the second team.

Holcomb and McDonald were both named to the Class AAA third team.

Huseman, a 6-4 senior post, was the Swifts' leading scorer during the season, averaging 18 points per game, and was the highest-scoring Class A player in the state tournament. On defense, he averaged 11 rebounds and two blocked shots per game during the season.

He is the first Nazareth player ever named to a boys' all-state first team.

"Mark has been one of the best players ever at Nazareth," Coach Joe Lombard said. "I don't think there was a better post player in Class A in the state of Texas."

Schmucker, a 6-1 junior point guard and playmaker, carried a 50% accuracy mark on outside shots while averaging 10 points per game, and also was good for five assists per game.

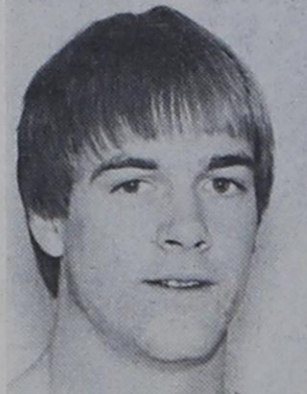
"Johnny was our best outside shooter," Lombard said. "He didn't always score a lot of points, but he scored when we needed it. He's one of those people who know when to pass and when to shoot. He did a lot of valuable things for our team."

Huseman and Schmucker also were both first-team



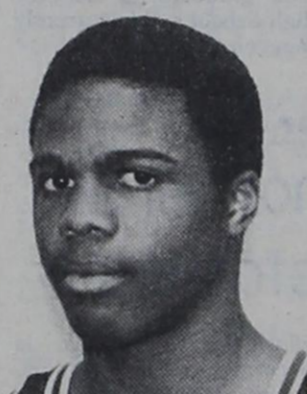
MARK HUSEMAN

picks for the All-Region I-A Team by the TABC, and Huseman has been picked to play in the TABC's Hall of Fame Game in Waco next week.

Holcomb and McDonald, Dimmitt High School's 32nd and 33rd all-staters in boys' basketball, made it because of their exposure in the playoffs, their coach, Ken Cleveland, said.

"The good part about getting into the playoffs is that your players get more recognition," Cleveland said. "This really pleases me, because one of those players (McDonald) didn't even make the all-district team."

Holcomb, a 6-3 senior forward, averaged 13 points and eight rebounds per game during the season, and in the playoffs he hiked his per-game average to 16 points on 56% field-goal shooting. He was the high scorer in the Dimmitt-New Boston state semifinals game with 22 points. He also averaged four credits per game during the regular season and five

per game in the playoffs.

McDonald, a 5-10 senior guard, averaged nine points and six credits per game during the season while quarterbacking the Bobcats out front, and in the playoffs he averaged 16 points per game on 52% shooting, including the dramatic last-second shot that gave the Bobcats the regional championship.

# 'Selfless' Swiftettes are all named to all-state

You've never heard of a high school girls' basketball team with five all-staters on it.

Until now, that is. All five starters on Coach Joe Lombard's Nazareth Swiftettes, the undefeated state champions, have now been named to one or more of the all-state teams. And Lombard himself has received another Coach of the Year award in the process.

Two sets of all-state girls' basketball teams have been announced during the past week — one chosen by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC) and the other by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Three Swiftettes were named to the TABC first and second all-state teams, and all five starters were placed on the Globe-News's first, second and third teams.

Sophomore Ramona Heiman and senior Shari Schilling both were named to the TABC first team, along with Missy Fisher and Sharla Harrison of Sudan and Pam Webb of Ponder. Leona Gerber was placed on the TABC second team.

Heiman and Gerber both were named earlier to the Class A all-state tournament team.

The Globe-News placed Gerber on its first team and named her the Class A

Player of the Year.

The Amarillo newspaper — which polled coaches, the news media and college recruiters — also placed senior Renee Ramaekers on its Class A first team, along with Harrison of Sudan, Cheryl Williams of LaRue LaPoynor and Belinda Duke of Midland Greenwood.

Heiman and Schilling both made the Globe-News second team, and junior LaDawn Schmucker was named to the newspaper's Class A third team. Heiman also was an all-state tournament selection earlier.

(Schmucker's brother, Johnny, is also an all-stater this year, named to the TABC Class A boys' second team.)

Lombard, who probably set a new state record this year by turning out seven all-staters — five girls and two boys — had praise for all his Swiftette honorees.

On Gerber's selection as the Class A Player of the Year by the Globe-News, he said, "I think Leona is very deserving. She was the catalyst that made us go. She also brought the ball down the court for us. She benefited the team in so many ways."

He said he felt that Ramaekers' placement on the Globe-News's Class A first team was delayed justice.

"I was very happy for Renee, since she got left off of the all-state tourney team, although she played as well in Austin as any of our kids. Her defense is outstanding; she rarely made any mistakes; and she is a great team player."

Heiman, who was Nazareth's leading scorer in the playoffs with an average of 21 points per game, was one of only two sophomores named in the TABC all-state selections.

"Ramona really came into her own in the playoffs,"

Lombard said. "I really think she's going to be one of the finest players ever to play at Nazareth."

Schilling not only has made three all-state teams now, but has played in one seniors' all-star game and has been picked to play in two more — the TABC All-Star Game later this month and the Hall of Fame North-South Game in July.

"Shari was a great offensive player — she could score both inside and outside," Lombard said. "She's very quick, a good jumper, and very tough to handle one-on-one. I think she'll be able to play college basketball."

Having Schmucker on the court, Lombard said, "is just

like having another coach on the floor, because she knows when to get the team together, and when to shoot or pass. She has a lot of leadership qualities." The 5-7 junior "is one of our best outside shooters, is also a good passer, and rarely

makes a mistake. She does a lot of things well," he said. The Globe-News named Lombard as the Class A Girls' Coach of the Year. It was his second such honor from the Amarillo newspaper, which earlier named him the Panhandle Super

Team Coach of the Year in both boys' and girls' basketball after guiding the Swiftettes to their first undefeated season and seventh state championship, and the Swifts to the state championship game.

"I was awfully glad to have five players on the Globe-News all-state team," he commented. "It was a great honor for them and for our program. Once you get to that level, there's not very much difference between first, second and third team."

## NHS: 19 all-staters in past nine years

Nazareth High School, in the course of winning seven state championships, has now produced 19 all-state girls' basketball players in the last nine years.

NHS, dubbed by one sports scribe as "the UCLA of Texas girls' basketball," has a program in which teamwork is everything and prima donnas aren't tolerated.

This year's Swiftettes, who marched undefeated to the state Class A championship, have now realized still another benefit of Coach Joe Lombard's strategy of unselfish teamwork: all five starters were named to at least one all-state team. And Lombard was named the Class A all-state Coach of the Year by the Amarillo Globe-News.

That's a record that probably has never been attained before in Texas girls' basketball, and can never be topped.

NHS's first all-stater was Elaine Schulte in 1975, under Coach John Blair.

Schulte repeated as an all-stater in 1976, and was

joined by Vera Birkenfeld and Cheryl Hartman. That was Cathy Wilson's first year to coach the Swiftettes.

In 1977, Rosemary Schulte, Karen Schulte and Cheryl Hartman were named to the all-state team. That was the year of the Swiftettes' first state championship.

When the Swiftettes won the state championship under George Cox in 1978, all-staters were Karen Schulte, Cheryl Hartman and Colleen Gerber.

Lombard has produced 13 all-staters since he became the Swiftettes' coach in 1978-79. They are:

### Jenkins tells about drug usage in county

"Roughly 60% of school-age youth from age 12 to 18 in Castro County use alcohol," Castro County Sheriff's Deputy Ron Jenkins told the Dimmitt Rotary Club Friday.

"When you hear about drug abuse, most people don't think about alcohol or tobacco, and those are probably the two most abused 'drugs' there are," Jenkins said.

The deputy also told the group that he estimates marijuana usage in the 12 to 18 age range to involve around 40% of the Mexican youth and 20% of the white and black youths of the county.

Jenkins told the Rotarians that it is difficult to make a case against the suppliers or pushers of marijuana and other drugs because "undercover work is too difficult in a small community where everyone knows everyone."

He related that outside undercover agents had been brought in in the past, but noted that funds for such efforts are usually directed to larger towns where the problem is more rampant.

"Educational programs are one of our biggest tools in fighting drugs," he said. "Informed kids are more able to make informed choices."

Jenkins stressed that an open, caring atmosphere in

the home is often a big deterrent to drug usage, because kids are more willing to ask parents' advice.

Rotarian Jack Thompson introduced the program. Fifteen club members were in attendance, along with six Rotari-Anns, and guest Lonnie Rhyne, Castro County Sheriff.

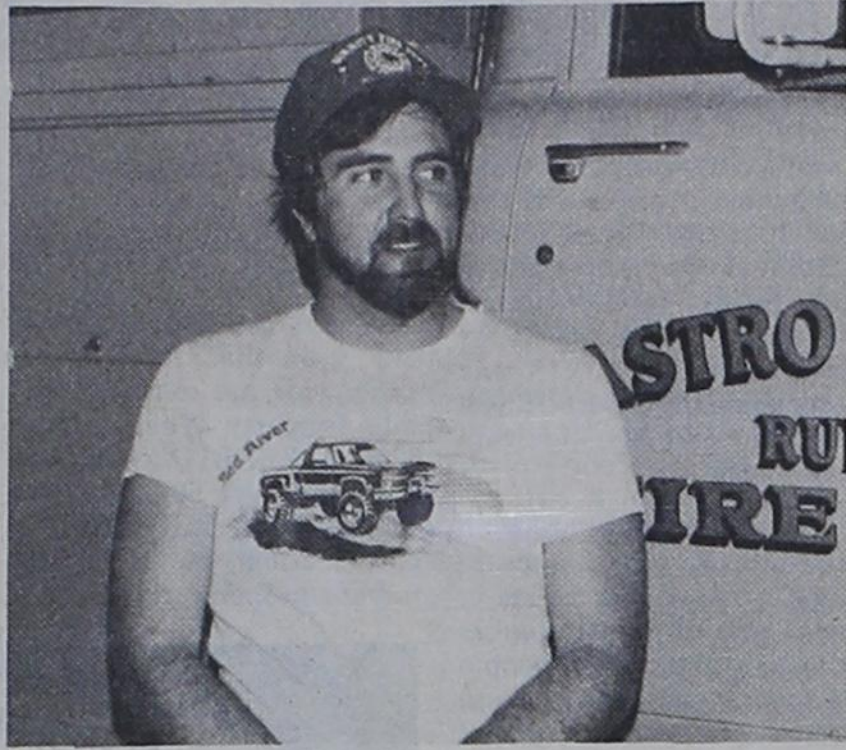
**Arce is in joint naval exercises**
