'Aunt Lillie' Recalls 38 Years as Teacher

"Many of my high school students called me Aunt Lillie, but some of my college students probably call me something else."

The speaker is one of RJC's English teachers, Mrs. Lillie Robinson, a bouncy woman who has spent 38 out of her 67 happy years as a school-teacher.

As most people who have talked to Mrs. Robinson know, it is no trouble getting her to talk. Here are just a few of her memories of the past 38 years.

"In 1921, after graduating from high school, I took a normal course at Baylor and received a teacher's certificate. I took my certificate and began teaching in a two-teacher school in Coryell County. I taught there for two years, and then I met George."

George is Mrs. Robinson's devoted husband. They have been married for 45 years.

"In 1929, when my daughter was four years old, I began attending RJC. I went to school for a year and a half, but in March, 1930, I began teaching in Colony while finishing my semester at RJC."

Mrs. Robinson never attended another long term as she worked to finish her college education. As she taught

in Colony and later in Morton Valley, she drove to Abilene on Saturdays and during the summer to attend classes at Hardin-Simmons University. In September, 1940, Mrs. Robinson joined the faculty of Ranger High School. She remained there for twenty-two years.

She taught English and, during the war when the regular teacher was drafted, science. While at RHC, Mrs. Robinson sponsored many extra-years, she was the junior class sponsor. She also coached the junior play and Inter-scholastic League ready-writing.

She sponsored a ready-writing club, playground ball for girls, and she escorted groups to Casa Manana, Howard Payne, Hardin-Simmons and McMurry to watch performances of plays.

In 1966, Mrs. Robinson retired from the public schools and began teaching at RJC. Theoretically, Mrs. Robinson came to RJC as a part-time teacher, but she has never been able to convince the administration that five classes is not part-time.

"I enjoy teaching college students more than high school students. I also enjoy my association with teachers and students."

Mrs. Robinson feels that although she is 67, she can roll back to modern times (which is a mixed metaphor or something wicked and evil that would surely get a red mark in one of her English classes) and understand the problems that face the youth of today. She is always ready to listen to any student who has a problem, large or small, that is bothering him.

Mrs. Robinson has traveled in practically every state in the union. She thoroughly enjoys her travels and once sent a postcard to a fellow faculty member after a visit to a prison in Arizona. The card, which pictured the prison, said only "Wish you were here."

She has taken courses all over the nation and the world. She has taken an English course at the University of London and at Southampton, both in England, and she has done some work at the University of Alaska in Fairbanks.

She has managed to acquire a master's degree in English from Hardin-Simmons University and majors both in history and education from Abilene Christian College.

Mrs. Robinson has two poems published in the TEACHER'S ANTHOLOGY, and still writes poetry to fit various occasions. She is very active in the First Baptist Church in Ranger.

She admits to loving both cooking and talking — and to doing quite well at both.

She believes teaching is good therapy for a Grandma. "A teacher must have the patience of Job and the persistence of the Devil."

"I get a big kick from my teaching—and I often feel as if I had been kicked."

Mrs. Robinson loves her work. She feels she has taught her subject to the best of her knowledge. She hopes her students have learned as much from her as she has learned from them.

Is there anything Mrs. Robinson would like to have?

"I would like to have a nice new sunny disposition because my old one is about shot."

There are a bunch of Aunt Lillie fans around RJC and Ranger who would heartily disagree.

Also receiving 5 points named to the State Democratic Executive Committee at the party convention are Jerry Bloodworth, Ross Couble, Larry Steele, Max Colburn, and Mike Willis.

Each student in a government or history class who voted for Cook will receive an additional 10 points on his final.

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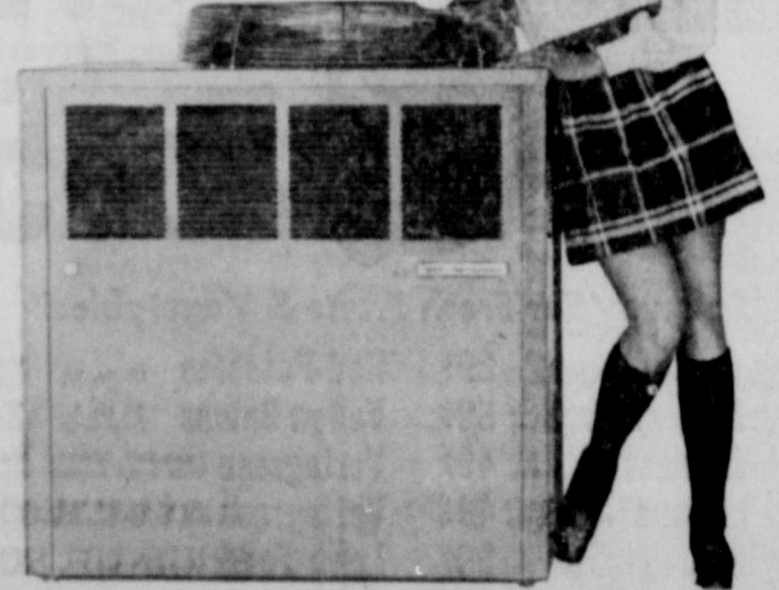
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\$375,000 Month Paid 5,013 In Eastland County by SS Agency

A record of \$375,000 in monthly social security benefits was being paid to 5,013 residents of Eastland County at the end of Dec. 1968, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security. This compares to \$303,000 to 4,902 persons for Feb., 1968, the month the 15 per cent raise in the 1967 Amendments became effective.

In Eastland County, 703 people under 60 are receiving benefits. That figure breaks down into 340 under 19, 74, 18-21, and some 294, 22-59. It may be surprising to some that of beneficiaries in the over 60 bracket there are 2,419 women and only 1,866 men in this County.

Many students would have been unable to continue their educations were it not for the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act extending survivors and dependents insurance benefits to students until their 22nd birthdays.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Such payments often have a potential total of as much as \$25,000 to \$100,000 and more.

June 14 the American Flag will celebrate its 192nd birthday. When Old Glory first flew back in 1777, perhaps even the men who hoisted her could not imagine the vast and wonderful nation that would evolve from the hope that she symbolized to them.

Although now days some men attempt to defame her in restless surges of condemnation, the American is still the emblem of the greatest sovereign nation on earth. She is the hope of the oppressed people of the world, and she has flown through peace and war, strife and prosperity offering her refuge. No matter how tattered or torn she may become, she still commands respect.

Her red stripes symbolize the blood spilled in the birth and defense of this nation . . . Her white stripes signify the burning tears shed by Americans who lost their sons . . . Her blue field is indicative of God's heaven under which she flies . . . Her stars clustered together unify 50 States as one, for God and country.

Underneath this Flag some of the world's greatest men have been reared, patriots who have put their country before their lives to preserve our freedom. In them we find a special quality. Tough as nails and unparalleled in bravery, they still thrill to the sight of their Flag for they know humility. One such man is Colonel John Glen. In a speech before Congress February 26, 1962, the astronaut said, "I still get a hard-to-define feeling inside when the Flag goes by, and I know that you do, too. Let us hope none of us ever loses that feeling."

Woodrow Wilson said, "The things that the Flag stands for were created by the experience of a great people. Everything that it stands for was written by their lives."

It is unfortunate that patriotism has become old-fashioned. Patriotism built the form of government under which this country has grown and prospered. It is interesting to note that we find those who clamor to destroy it offer no better alternatives. No person, no system can be without fault.
