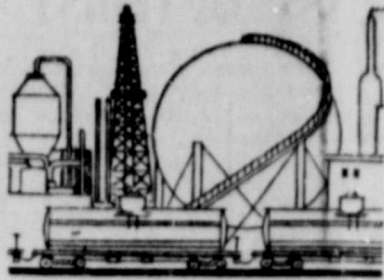

## VALEDICTORY ADDRESS

Ladies, gentlemen, parents, teachers, honored guests and fellow students: I stand before you in shocked amazement, for tonight we have reached the goal that was set before us some twelve years ago. Tonight marks the end of our years in high school. Now we face the problem of deciding what we want to do with our lives. This problem is ours. No one can tell us how to live our lives, just as they cannot live our lives for us. Graduation from high school is considered one of the major stepping stones into the outside world and so it is; for graduation marks the point when we began turning away from our parents and really prepare to face the world on our own.

Without the lessons of school, what chance would we face on our own? In school we learn, not only the subjects of English, Math and History, but also responsibility and leadership. We learn to make decisions on our own and stand by our decisions, no matter what the consequence. We acquire the ability to get along with people, and even some of our teachers. These social manners and attitudes we learn in high school will go with us through the remainder of our lives. What is life, but social intercourse? These are not only points that are stressed in education for all of us can remember occasions that were of a lighter and more pleasant nature than the hard lessons we must have in life. For most of us, these pleasant moments have been shared with classmates and are moments for this fact. Those football games, basketball games, band contests, will all bring back a number of fond mem-

ories, along with moments of bitter disappointment. What is a better way of learning to accept victory gracefully and defeat without bitter resentment? All of this is merely a part of the learning process.

We of the younger generation are being forced into a world that is not of our making. It is a world full of problems and social unrest. On our shoulders, and that of our children rest the heavy burden of righting the wrongs and injustices created by our forefathers. One of the major problems concerns race and prejudice, the making of America into a land of true equality. It is toward this that we are striving, but we are hindered by the radicals of both sides who do not want equality, but supremacy.

I see no sense in riots and demonstrations with all the killing and destruction which only makes bad matters worse, but possibly this is the only way that the leaders of our nation can be made aware of the true problems of our nation. Instead of taking heed and striving to solve these problems, they find a convenient scape-goat which is usually Communism, and blame all the destruction and revolt on the Communist. The Communist threat is an awesome menace, but why give them credit for things they have nothing or very little to do with? Because of this, many people cannot see the real problems, or maybe they do not want to see. Many of the leaders declare that prejudice has been done away with, and I will have to admit that giant strides have been made, but prejudice as such does still exist. Even someone of my years can see, and has seen, some clear examples.

Another of the problems facing our generation is the war in Vietnam. The bulk of this problem rests in our hands for we are the ones that are going to be doing the actual fighting. Even though, the major part does rest upon our shoulders, we still have to stay in the fight we are fighting. A lot of people just cannot understand why there is much unrest concerning the war. They survive with the attitude, that if the younger generation leaves us alone, and doesn't cause trouble, then we will let them live their own lives. How can we live our own lives, when the lives of our parents so overshadow our own? We cannot begin to live our lives until we clear up all of the problems that have been left by our parents. These are the problems and challenges that face us as we go out into the world.

Along with these problems and challenges are others of perhaps a lighter nature. We have been made quite aware of one of the challenges because of the recent accomplishments in space with the return of Apollo 10. This is a field in which we are pioneers. Space exploration and all of its broad opportunities offer us fields of interest for nearly everyone. Along with this is the great accomplishment that has been made in medicine in the past years. It is our challenge to solve these problems and bring about accomplishments that will overshadow those that confront us today. These are the challenges that are ours, along with the fate of the world.

## 3 of 5 Escapees Believed To Be Still in This Area

Felony jail-break charges have been filed against the five who broke out of Eastland County Jail this week. District Attorney Emory Walton reports.

Speculation grew Saturday that Baird might be dead in the Lake Cisco area as the result of gunshot wounds. It was not definitely known whether he had been hit, but indications were that he had been.

The district attorney hesitated to name numerous other charges which the jail-breakers could face as the result of their escapes and resulting escapades, stating that to do so might prompt them to even more brazen acts to evade recapture.

No sighting of the run-aways were reported at week's end after an intensive search of the Cisco Airport Area Thursday afternoon after one was reported seen there about noon. Two others were reportedly last seen heading west out of Sweetwater late Wednesday night.

"To his knowledge, the last two, (who broke out last Sunday) have not been seen, and may or may not be armed."

"An educated guess," Walton said, is that both are in the Cisco area.

The D. A. surmised that Webb and Richardson, who kidnapped the Cisco people and forced them to take them to Sweetwater, "are not likely to return to this area." Description and license number of the car stolen in Sweetwater has been given to all law enforcement officers.

Guesses late Friday were that Baird (the man seen Thursday) is still in the general Cisco area and is believed

by lawmen to be moving westward — toward Abilene, his home.

County Sheriff L. E. Sublett was reported in satisfactory condition at Eastland Memorial Hospital, recovering from severe bruises and pulled muscles in the arms and back, received in the forced break at the county jail Tuesday.

First Deputy Loy Williams, who directed the manhunt throughout the week, was still busy "checking out leads" Friday late, and was continuing to be assisted by city policemen, highway patrolmen, and area sheriff department officials in the investigations.

County Jailor John Shook and Jail Matron Mrs. Shook were back on the job at the jail after an interrupted vacation, and so far as is known the three remaining prisoners were securely locked up.

The five originally were being held as follows: Harvey Dale Webb; convicted rapist; sentenced to 75 years from this county and 23 years for kidnapping conviction in Tarrant County.

Wayne Baird; convicted burglary; sentenced 9 years from this county.

Donald Gene Richardson; convicted felony theft; sentenced seven years in this county.

Leroy Mangum; convicted attempted rape in Stephens County; sentenced to seven years; indicted Eastland County, for robbery; awaiting trial.

Kendell Seabourn; convicted attempted rape in Stephens County; sentenced to ten years; indicted Eastland County, for robbery; awaiting trial.

## Rising Star Soldier Awarded Bronz Star

For heroism in action against the enemy in Vietnam, a Rising Star boy has been awarded the bronze star medal with the "V" device.

He is Michael (Mike) Clark, grandson of Mrs. Clara Burkhead with whom he made his home until he went into the service in January 1967.

He is a member of C Battery, Second Battalion, 77th Field Artillery, 25th Infantry Division, with which unit he has been serving in South Vietnam for almost a year.

Announcement of the award is contained in a general order of March 29, 1969.

The action for which the award was made took place on

February 25, 1969 during attack upon a fire support base by a large enemy force.

The citation reads: "For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force: Specialist Four Clark distinguished himself by heroic actions on 25 February 1969, while serving with M Battery, 2nd Battalion, 77th Field Artillery in the Republic of Vietnam. C Battery was established at Fire Support Base Mahone II when they came under an intense mortar attack followed by a heavy ground assault by a large enemy force. When the insurgents began to infiltrate a portion of the perimeter, Specialist Clark immediately moved to the endangered section. With complete disregard for his own safety, Specialist Clark exposed himself to the holocaust of exploding projectiles as he placed an impregnable wall of fire on the aggressors. His valorous actions contributed immeasurably to the defeat of the hostile force and the successful defense of the base camp. Specialist Clark's personal bravery, aggressiveness and devotion to duty are in

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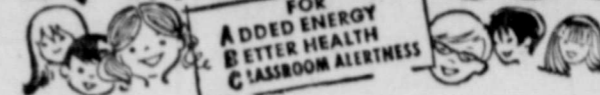

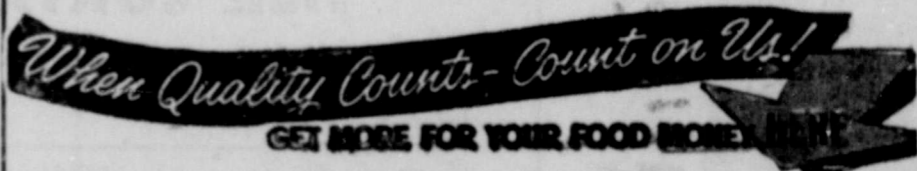
