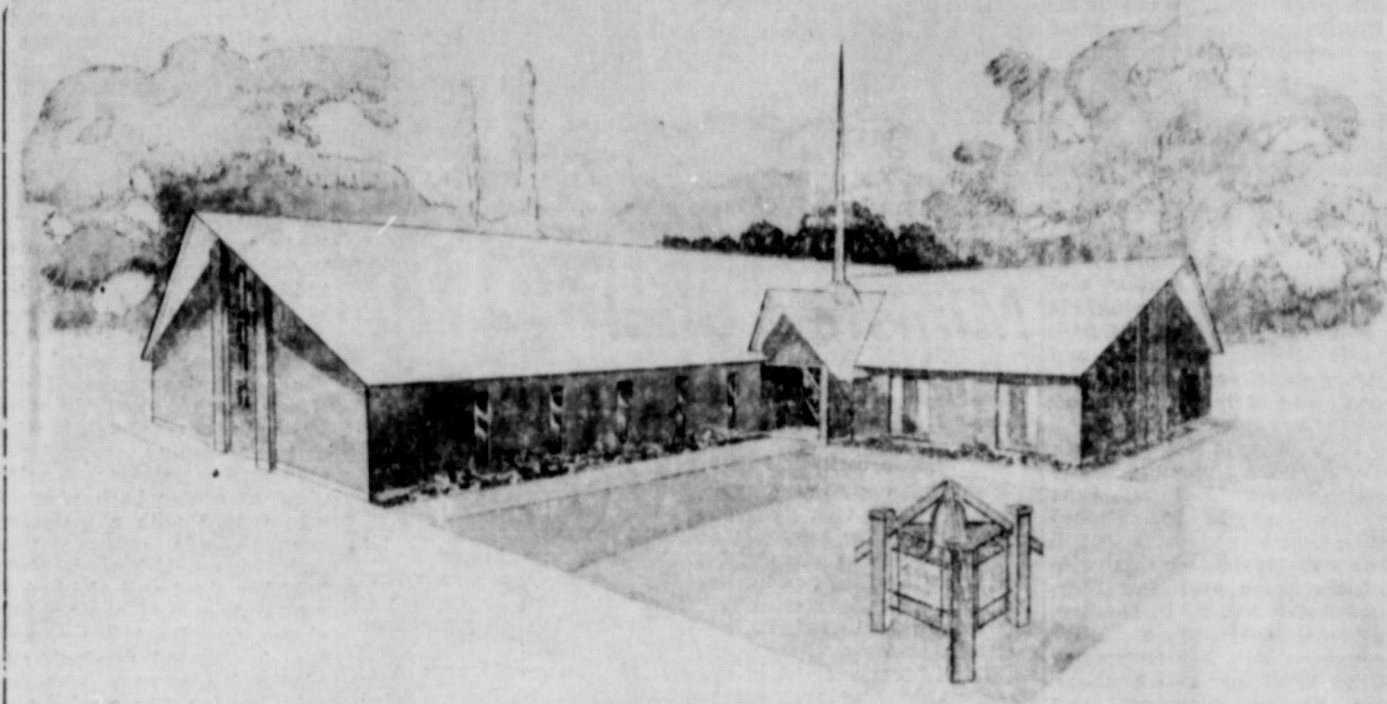

Two Avenues To Better Law Enforcement Being Considered By Commissioners Court, Bailey Says

The county commissioners court is considering two possibilities for improving law enforcement in Eastland County. County Judge Scott Bailey said following a semi-monthly commission meeting this week.

A large delegation of interested citizens appeared before the court Monday asking that more deputy help be provided for the Sheriff's Department.

"We're interested in getting more protection for the people of Eastland County," Bailey said, "not necessarily in getting more help for the sheriff."

Under consideration is the possibility of arranging professional training for present police officials in the county, possibly in conjunction with a West Central Texas Council law enforcement school.

"Upgrading, Judge Bailey explained Tuesday as being increasing the salaries of the constables (now paid \$125 a month) and allowing them some auto expenses. The five constables are Steele Hill of Eastland, Albert White of Gorman, W. H. Kornagay of Rising Star, A. W. Dawson of Cisco and Ralph Veal of Ranger.

"Several Rising Star people," writes Mrs. Minnie Hill of Cisco, "have looked for these graves often hearing me tell of them, and I thought it might be a good idea to identify them."

## Minister First To Be Buried At Rising Star

I remember my grandfather, W. T. Swindle, who lived one and a half miles southeast of Rising Star from about 1870, telling of the first two burials in the Rising Star cemetery. My father, Jack Swindle, repeated the story over the years until it is firmly fixed in my memory. Feeling that others with family burial plots in the cemetery might like to know something of its beginning history, I went to Rising Star on April 28 of this year (1969) and made pictures of the first two graves.

The first grave is of a young minister of the Gospel, Rev. R. W. Evans, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Anderson of Rising Star. He was visiting in the Anderson home in February, 1882 when he contracted smallpox from which he died on February 20. Mr. Anderson gave the first acreage for the original part of the cemetery and had his son-in-law interred there.

Rev. Evans' epitaph reads: "Rev. R. W. Evans, Son of J. K. and P. A. Evans, Born Oct. 7, 1851, Died Feb. 20, 1882." He was 30 years, 4 months, and 13 days of age.

Eleven days after the death of Rev. Evans, my uncle, James Marion Swindle, was interred in the second grave. James was within twelve days of his fifteenth birthday. "Jimmy" as James was called, was helping his father in the field when he started suffering from stomach cramps and vomiting and was sent to the house to lie down. His mother and a neighbor woman were making him a suit from home spun fabric. They had finished the trousers and were working on the coat. When Jimmy reached the house, his mother asked him to try on the coat before he lay down. He told her that he was too sick to stand. When she noted how ill he was, she called the father to the house. He went into town for the doctor. The doctor diagnosed the ailment as a "congestive chill" and stayed in attendance until around midnight when Jimmy passed away. Later, when the

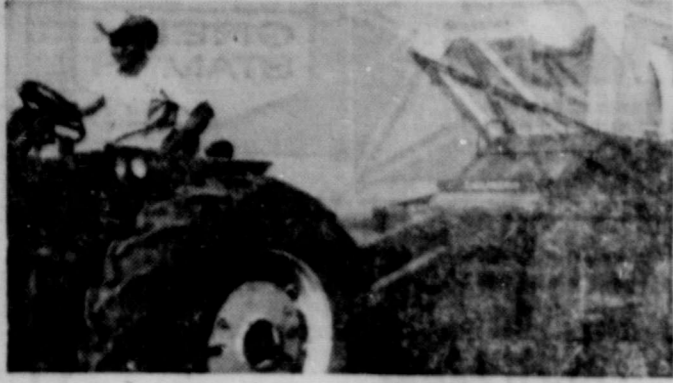

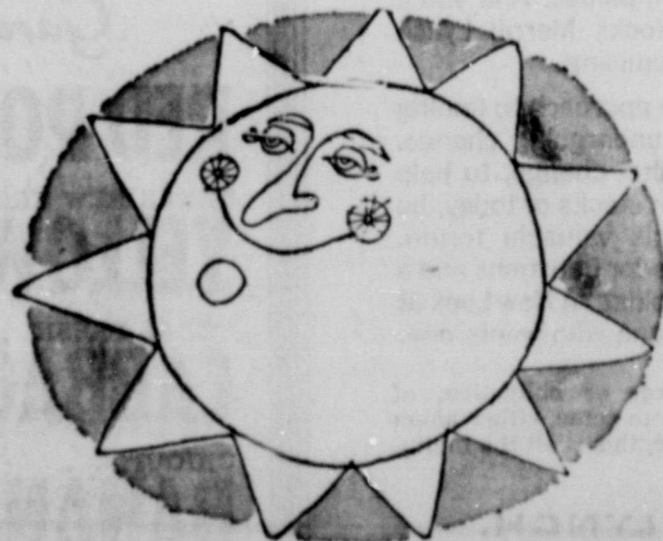

## Low Income Farmers Must File For Social Security

Are you a member of farmers in the Abilene area who are not getting social security credit for their earnings? R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager, said today that some farmers do not file tax returns because they don't earn enough to owe income tax.

These farmers are losing social security protection that they will need someday — or that their families may need tomorrow.

Tuley said even if a self-employed farmer does not have enough income to owe income tax, he still needs to file a tax return in order to receive social security credits.

If a farmer's gross profit is \$600 or more and his net profit is \$400 or more, the law says he must report his income for social security and pay the social security tax on his net earnings, Tuley pointed out.

If he has a net profit of less than \$400, or even a loss, but had a gross profit of at least \$600, he may file, using what is known as the optional method, and receive social security credits for his earnings.

Under the optional method of filing, Tuley said, a farmer whose gross profit is between \$600 and \$2,400 may report and get social security credit for two-thirds of his gross, regardless of the amount of his net income.

If his gross profit is over \$2,400, but his net is less than \$1,600, he may nevertheless report and get credit for \$1,600.

Tuley said that a farmer who has not reported his earnings for social security has about 3 years to make the report, pay the back taxes due, and get the earnings credit to his social security record.

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### Early Disability Filing Speeds Claims

"Claims for social security disability benefits should be filed early," R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security manager stated. They take a bit longer to process than most retirement and death claims, since the medical evidence in each case must be evaluated in detail to determine whether or not the disability is severe enough to meet the requirements of the law, he explained.

Persons having disability which will prohibit their working or 12 months or more ought to apply for benefits as soon as possible. Since disability payments can begin no earlier than the seventh month after the disability began, a disabled worker has six months in which to apply before any checks are due. "The earlier the claim is filed, the more time you and the claims specialists have to get all the necessary facts to pay the claim," Tuley emphasized.

He urged any worker who might qualify for such benefits to check with the social security office at Room 2301 of the Federal Building, Abilene, as soon as possible.

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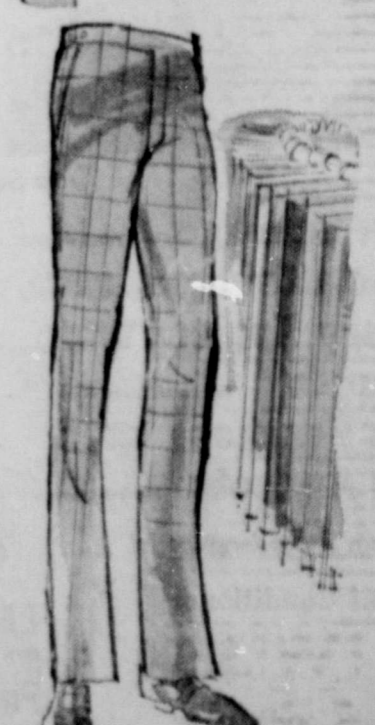
