Rail Service Hampered By Wednesday's Wreck

Workmen for the Texas Pacific Railway Company have been working continuously on the wreckage of the early Wednesday morning train derailment in Ranger which twenty-eight freight cars were derailed on the east side of downtown Ranger.

The wreck, estimated at \$200,000 damage to new automobiles and other freight being shipped by Texas Pacific Railway, occurred shortly after midnight Wednesday morning.

Some forty workmen have been working around the clock to get the rubbish cleared for thru train service. Some eleven hours after the wreck a spur was constructed by the workmen near the Hou-Tex Peanut Company.

Officials have stated it will take several weeks before the main track would be cleared and back in operation. "The derailment was caused by 'hot-box' on one of the freight cars, according to the conductor of the train.

County Will Host Be To Law School Aug. 4

Final approval has been given by the Eastland County Commissioners Court to a 20-hour law enforcement training school to be held in morning and evening sessions.

Aug. 4-15 in classroom space provided by Cisco Junior College, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

The Eastland commissioners are paying \$300 for the instruction, which will be provided by Arthur Butler of the A&M University Police Training Division headed by Ira Scott.

Individual students may take the course at no expense, Judge Bailey said, and all area law enforcement officers and interested private citizens have been invited to participate. Bailey said registration is now being conducted, and he asked potential students to contact him for applications.

CJC President Leland Willis volunteered the air-conditioned college classrooms for the sessions which will be held from 10 to 12 a. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m. weekdays. The separate sessions are intended to allow both night and day-duty officers and others to attend at least part of the courses.

Bailey said the courses will include three basic areas: a primary police training course (201 in the A&M Calendar), a primary criminal investigation course, and material in traffic law enforcement and accident investigation.

The primary law enforcement course will include material on constitutional provisions, laws of arrest, search and seizure, rules of evidence, the code of criminal procedure, patrol methods and procedures, preliminary investigation procedures, report writing and public relations.

Judge Bailey said particular emphasis will be given to the public relations material. He also said he hopes a number of private citizens attend the courses, possibly with a view to organizing a voluntary citizens' auxiliary to assist professional law officials.

The studies will end with an examination, and officers with

Grand Jury Members Ask Additional Deputy

The 91st District grand jury was in formal recess this week after completing an investigation of 23 cases, returning a total of 21 indictments and making a report to the 91st District Court Tuesday. The jury is subject to a recall during the remainder of its term if it is deemed necessary.

Three indictments were added Tuesday to the roster of true bills returned by the jury during its term. The indictments were for theft of property of over \$50 in value.

The jury returned one no-bill and passed another case to consideration by the next grand jury.

Members of the grand jury individually and as citizens, addressed a letter to the commissioners court recommending the appointment of another deputy for the sheriff's department.

The action, it was made clear, was not official and not associated with the function of the grand jury as a body, but was taken entirely within the capacity of the members of the jury as private citizens.

However, all members of the grand jury as private citizens, signed the letter, Mr. Freyschlag told the Ranger Times.

One man, being held in Eastland County Jail, was indicted for the theft from a pawn shop in Cisco and the Goodyear store in Eastland. The pawn shop theft came in April, while the Goodyear store theft was in May of this year. He was arrested June 1.

Earlier in the week the court levied a sentence of two years in the penitentiary and a \$100 fine in a felony DWI charge against David C. Schoenrock. The penitentiary sentence was probated and Schoenrock paid the fine.

Leslie Roberson paid fines of \$100 and cost in two cases involving illegal sale of beer in a dry territory and possession of whiskey for sale in a dry territory, and Raymond Eubanks of Moran was fined \$400 and costs in another felony charge of driving while intoxicated. He paid the fine.
