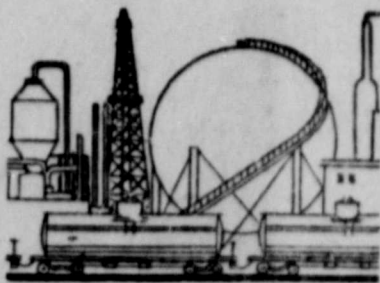

Judge Earl Conner, Jr., made Mangum's sentence of 35 years to run concurrently with a sentence he received in 90th District Court at Breckenridge. Seabourn's sentence will not run concurrently with one he also received in the Breckenridge court.

Seabourn was tried on the armed robbery charge on July 7 when a jury in 91st court found him guilty and assessed the 20-year sentence. Mangum was tried by a different jury on the following date and received the 35-year sentence.

Both men filed motions for new trials, motions which they withdrew when brought into court Wednesday morning.

Both men filed motions for jail break in connection with an escape from the Eastland county jail a few days before the Carbon Baptist minister and his wife were forcibly detained in their Carbon home by two men who took their car and escaped.

Arkansas police arrested Mangum and Seabourn a day later and they were returned to Eastland county.

Mrs. Pruett died at 5:35 a.m. Tuesday in Ranger General Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Born April 22, 1898 in Ax-tell, she married Elzie Pruett May 7, 1911, at Jacksboro. He preceded her in death Dec. 3, 1962. She had been a resident of Ranger for 56 years.

Survivors include two sons, K. E. of Abilene and E. J. of Lone, Calif.; four daughters, Mmes. H. L. Tudor of Hamlin, W. D. Key of Fort Worth, B. W. Johnson of Ranger and B. B. Willingham of Odessa; a brother, Jim Crawford of Ranger; two sisters, Mmes. Mary Caraway and Eura Glenn, both of Ranger; a foster-brother, Clifton C. Smith of Ranger; 22 grandchildren and 31 great-grandchildren.

## RANGER BEGAN TO BUILD FOR THE FUTURE IN 1921

In 1921, Ranger began to build for the future.

Multitudes of migrants moved to other oil booms, but many people, like "Poor Old Calijah" stayed. Unlike the wooden Indian of song, they determined to rise above the mud and misdeeds which plagued the area and build a community worthy of the highest aspirations of home, civic, social and religious life.

The Ranger Times moved to a downtown location — to the Weir Building on Elm St. across the street from the Masonic Temple (present location). R. B. Waggoner was president and general manager; Walter Murray, vice-president and advertising manager; Bessie E. May, secretary and H. E. Bozeman, managing editor.

The establishment sponsored a tree planting campaign with black locust and poplar trees for sale at the office for the price of 50c to \$1.00 for trees ranging from six to ten feet in height.

Road improvement was the major project, with Methodist and Baptist Churches devoting one Sunday morning service to endorsement of the move. A party of 2,000 citizens responded to a "work-nic" and, armed with picks and shovels, made great improvement on the road between Ranger and Caddo. An automobile stage line between Ranger and Eastland was proposed.

The Chamber of Commerce went on record as favoring reduction of rent, utilities and labor and Ranger's voting strength of 2,000 was urged to pay poll tax.

Ranger hosted the third annual Convention of West Texas Chamber of Commerce. New switchboard equipment promised better service for telephone subscribers and one department store ran a two-page ad announcing "Ye Old fashioned Revival" sale, practicing the principals of the Oldtime Religion. The police department reported a lull in activity with only one car theft in two weeks.

Ranger boasted 21 barber shops with 107 chairs (definitely pre-hippie) a first class postoffice with 35 employees, seven moving picture shows and regular services at Baptist, Catholic, Church of

SP5 Johnny M. Vasquez of Ranger recently received the Army Commendation Medal for service as follows:

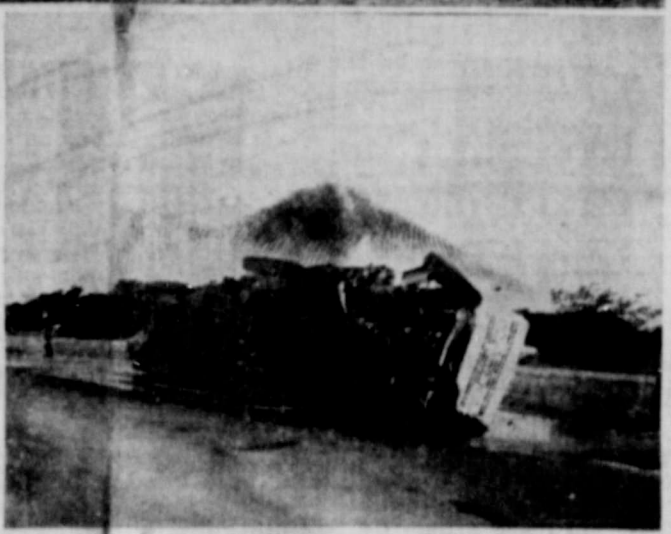

**FLOWER TALK**  
By OPAL MARSH  
THE MUSTARD FAMILY

The mustard family is one that is enormous and consists of a large number of weedy plants. Some of these plants are watery but none of the juice contained in them are poisonous.

The Latin name for this family is cruciferae, which comes from the word crux. A crux is a cross and the four opposing petals on the flowers resemble a cross. These are generally small flowers.

## Cisco Man Still Hopeful After 13 Years In Brooklyn Ghetto

With cautious hope still evident in a tone of frustration, the Rev. Erwin Prange, a native of Cisco, told the Cisco Press Thursday that after 13 years in the darkest ghettos of Brooklyn he is convinced that the lack of love and understanding is the "basic" flaw within the "static institutions" of our society.

The Rev. Mr. Prange, son of Mrs. Dorothy Janzow, herself the widow of a Lutheran minister, is pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Brooklyn, "right in the heart of the Brooklyn ghetto." He has been so for 13 years.

The district, a tri-lingual area of whites, blacks and Puerto Ricans, is an area of violent and constant protests, torn by conflicts of racial and economic interests. "It is as much as your life is worth to be out alone there at night," said Rev. Prange. "The police can give you no protection."

The minister conducts services variously in English, German and Spanish, all of which languages he speaks. The church also has a parochial school of 200 pupils with a waiting list of 400. "We could teach 1,000 if we had facilities and the room," he said.

referring to the chaotic state of the New York public school system. An assistant pastor of his church is principal of the school.

Rev. Prange also serves as Protestant chaplain of the Greenpoint City Hospital and the Lutheran Hospital in Brooklyn.

He and other members of the clergy in the Brooklyn area — a city within a city and the fifth largest in the nation — serve with the police in organized cooperative efforts to deal with conditions that seem almost incapable of solution.

Prior to going to Brooklyn, Rev. Prange served for three years in a St. Louis parish.

He is married and he and Mrs. Prange have four children, two daughters, 14 and 15, and two sons, 9 and 12. While here the minister was looking into the possibility of sending his daughters to Cisco Junior College for their early college schooling, thus getting them out of the unpromising conditions in the Brooklyn area.

There are cross currents of ethnic interests involved in the protests which have brought on the bad state of affairs in Brooklyn and similar areas of racial and economic trouble, the minister said. But principally, he believes, these protests are violently related to the "static, unchanging conditions of social institutions created "under the theory that things do not change," and that the social order they represent and serve will continue without any adjustment to new conditions.

Asked if he felt that there was any substantial response to the gospel he sought to preach and demonstrate, the minister seemed uncertain.

"It depends," he said. "If we cannot say 'Our Brother, we cannot say 'Our Father.' He felt hopefully that the example lived by those who seek to bring the Christian message offers the best chance of making a slow impression upon the "stubborn pattern of hate and violence."

And yet, he explained, his own church has often been robbed and defaced by street gangs.

He admitted that decentralization of the removal of the underprivileged from the crowded ghettos and their distribution among other and more rural areas might offer an important means of solution.

But the important thing, he feels, is for the established institutions to become more flexible and to accommodate themselves to the voiceless need of the underprivileged blacks, Puerto Ricans and whites for a satisfying identification with society.

A sister of the minister, Mrs. Ernest Reich, is a member of the faculty of Cisco Public Schools. Other sisters are Mrs. Mary Karou of Pembroke, Ontario, Canada, and Miss. Edna Lou Prange, member of the faculty of a Dallas Junior College.

The youth, unharmed, was found in the vicinity of the camp, Chief Bryner said.

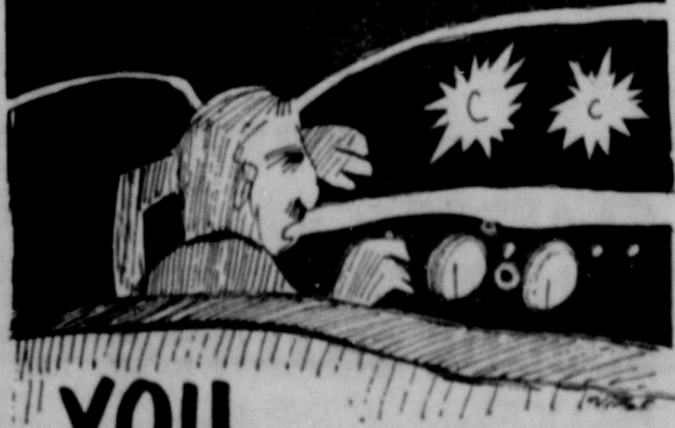

## Timely Tips Of Tornadoes

Offered, not to alarm, but to inform, the following information from the Federal Civil Defense Administration is of particular interest to residents in Eastland County at this time in view of recent weather conditions.

**TIME OF THE TWISTER**  
Summertime is tornado time.

In the unstable transition from winter cold to summer heat, great masses of cold and warm air collide. When the heavier cold air is forced above the lighter warm air, funnels sometimes form to relieve the topsy-turvy situation. This is the twister.

Some 600 tornadoes boil up each year in the United States.

Summer is the time for a special weather eye to the tornado-prone southwest.

There is no way to prevent a tornado. But early warning proper precautions and speedy rescue of victims can save lives.

### WHAT TO DO IN A TORNADO

People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.

The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).

Medicare enrollments should be made before age 65 for maximum effectiveness.

## Deadline Nears For Farm Crop Certification

"The time to certify crop acreage is now!" This statement comes from the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. "To receive history credit and be eligible for price support, acreages must be reported by August 1," Mr. Jesse G. Meredith, county office manager announces.

He goes on to state that if a farm has either a 1969 effective peanut or cotton allotment, acreages must be certified even though a farmer did not plant. Also, if the farm is participating in the feed grain program, the diverted acres and/or any planted acres must be certified in the county office.

Mr. Meredith further states that if a farm received measurement service, the operator must still certify to planted acres. He reports that as of July 11, only one-third of the farms in the county had certified.

"Accurate reporting is a must," states Mr. Meredith. "Requests for measurement service was available prior to July 15 and the county office cannot assume the responsibility on measurement requests after this date due to the heavy workload the county office is carrying. I am assuring all farmers that the office personnel will make every effort to help the farmers file an accurate report."

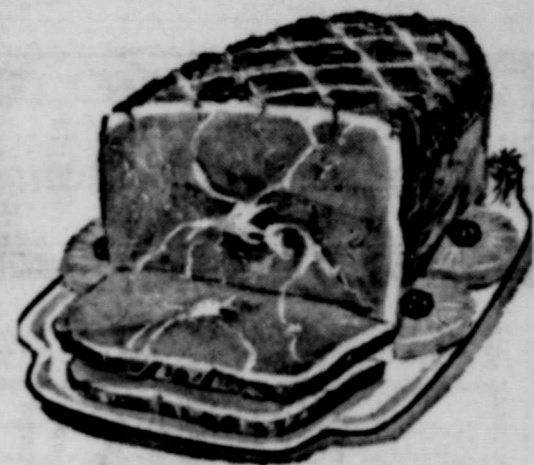

Miss Kilgore has efficiently supervised under the Federal Canning Program the operation of canning centers in Oklahoma where food of all kinds were canned. She is well known for this work as well as her work in food preservation in many states.

In 1962 Miss Kilgore Home Economist in charge, of the Field Services Department, covering all states of the United States. In this public relations work she has worked with the United States Department of Agriculture, State Extension Service Departments as well as with professional home economists, magazine and newspaper food editors, and others who are working and writing in the field of food preservation-canning and freezing.

**Musgrove Backs Smith On 2-Year State Budget Issue**

AUSTIN—Stepping into the two-year versus one-year State budgetary battle between Governor Preston Smith and Lieutenant Governor Ben Turner, State Representative Musgrove this week in Austin sided with Governor Preston Smith, and labeled the one-year spending proposal a liberal approach that would eventually "burn the pocket of every Texas taxpayer."

Musgrove tagged Governor Smith's two-year State budgetary plan as the conservative approach to State fiscal spending, and the one-year plan backed by Barnes as a maneuver to "live high on the hog and pay later."

The Breckenridge Representative stated that he still has strong reservations, though about the justifiable need for additional revenue funds that would necessitate new taxes under each of the two budgetary plans. "We are a growing State, producing each year more tax revenue from the same tax base, and we should attempt to budget the operations and services of this State within his growth factor," Musgrove explained. "Only in one area can I become convinced of the need for substantial increased ap-

provisions, and this is in the area of State employees salaries (legislator's not included). There should be some other areas of spending that should yield to this priority so that a net revenue need would not exist.

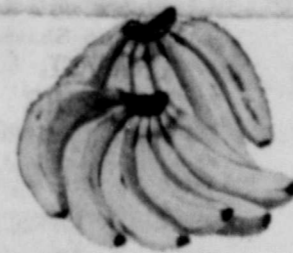

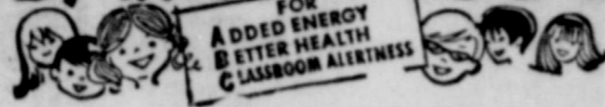

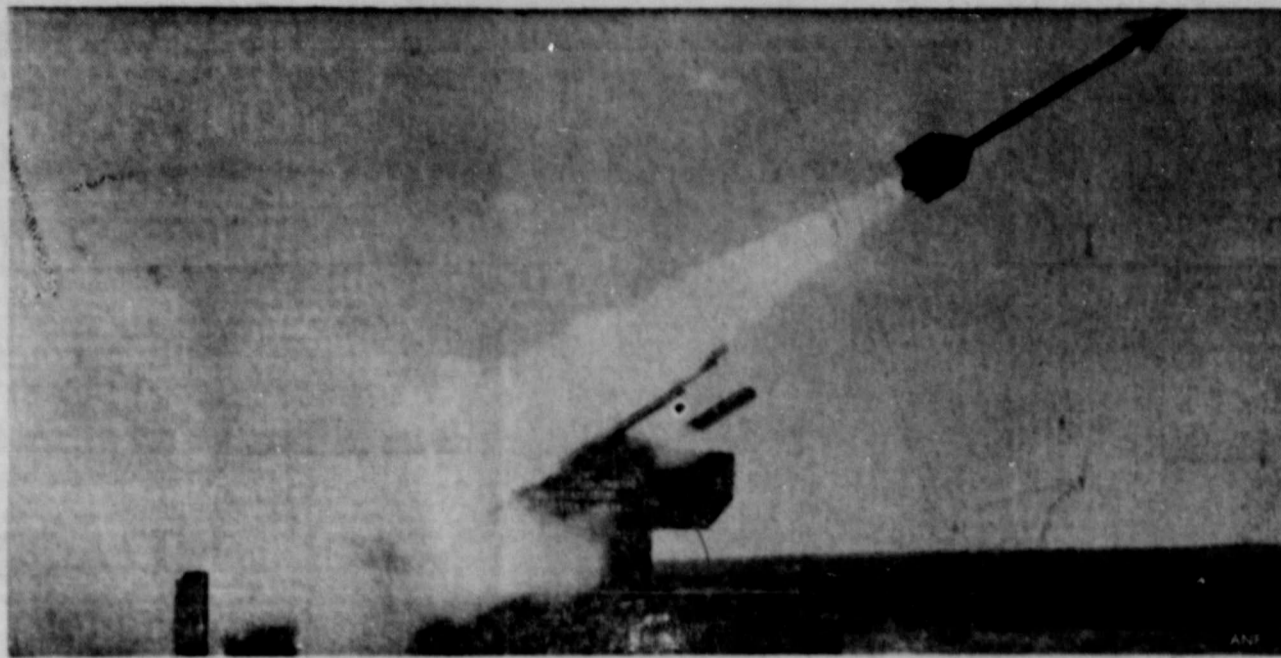
