Army Pfc. Thomas C. Joiner, son of Mrs. Willie Joiner, has been injured in Vietnam, according to a letter received by his mother.

He was reported recuperating from stomach wounds in Yaka Homa, Japan following surgery there and emergency surgery in Vietnam after being wounded July 27 at Laki Hae. He is expected to be hospitalized for two to three months.

Pfc. Joiner had been in Vietnam about two months and has been in the Army since Jan. 2.

New 'Consent' Law Helps To Combat Drunk Driving

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that the State's new implied consent law which becomes effective September 1, 1969, gives law enforcement a much needed weapon to combat drunk drivers.

"Depending on area, drinking drivers figure in 40 to 50 percent of the fatal rural traffic accidents in Texas," Speir said. "This is especially significant when you consider that traffic mishaps claimed 3,481 lives in the state last year."

Under terms of this law, a motorist is "deemed to have given consent" to a breath test if arrested for any alleged offense out of his actual operation or physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

If the suspect refuses the breath test, the officer certifies this fact in an affidavit, together with his probable cause for stopping the person, to the Department of Public Safety. This affidavit, when it reaches the DPS, forms the basis for a petition filed by the Department in the corporation or justice court of the county of residence of the person refusing the test to determine if the officer had probable cause for thinking the person was driving while intoxicated.

Should the judge find the officer had probable cause to arrest the person for driving while intoxicated, the Department of Public Safety, acting on the court's finding and the officer's sworn statement, that the subject refused the test, suspends the subject's driver license for the period set by the judge. The suspension, which may run for as much as one year, is subject to appeal to a higher court.

The implied consent law allows the person detained the right to have a test of his blood alcohol taken by his own physician, qualified technician, chemist or registered professional nurse, if taken within two hours after his arrest.

The law also places the responsibility with the Texas Department of Public Safety

to certify breath testing equipment and persons authorized to administer breath tests. Consistent with its policy of assisting local authorities whenever possible, the DPS will offer at least three schools to train city and county officers in operation of the Breathalyzer. These schools, which will be conducted at the Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, will be limited in enrollment to key personnel from localities which now possess, or plan to obtain, breath testing instruments.

Currently, the DPS is utilizing breath testing equipment in a voluntary program. The Breathalyzer instruments are located at central points in some 90 counties, and are operated by DPS officers who have completed an intensive training course. The instruments are checked and serviced weekly by qualified DPS chemists.

"With the advent of the new law, we hope to obtain at least one breath testing instrument for each county, and plan to train additional personnel in their operation," Speir noted.

Logistics Problem In Handling Trailer Caravan

BY J. W. Sitton
 SYDNEY, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia — A caravan of 361 travel trailers is quite a sight to see and creates a substantial problem in logistics. And it's quite interesting to observe as one of the participants and as a reporter.

The midway point has passed for the caravan of Air-stream owners that began July 14 in Bangor, Maine. Another stop on Nova Scotia and one in New Brunswick and several in Quebec will conclude the 42-day caravan of Canada's northeast (Maritime) provinces for some 1,000 U. S. citizens in the 361 travel trailers.

like. You have your butane tanks filled as they run empty. In Texas, it costs \$1.50 to fill your tank and in Canada it costs \$4.50.

As you drive along the roads between towns, children everywhere gather to wave greetings. Everybody is friendly in the towns. At each stop, local officials extend a welcome and entertainment often includes a fine Scottish Bagpipe Band in full dress kilts.

You soon learn that prices of most foods and other items are higher than in the USA.

and 57 cents for premium. If you want to air your tires, they have a place off to the side where you do the work. You also put water in your radiator if you need it.

Gas stations close at 5:30 p. m. daily and at noon on Saturdays. One station stays open in each town at night.

In the smaller towns, you can't buy anything at the stores from noon Saturday to Monday morning. In the bigger places, a few are open for a limited time.

of the newspapers print Sunday editions. You get your comic section in the Saturday morning paper, and they're thorough for the week . . . Scenery is one thing they have in abundance in all areas of the northeast provinces . . . Newfoundland is about 100 miles by boat from here and a good many caravanners made the trip . . . An attraction for our next stop will be a boat trip to Prince Edward Island, which just about everybody plans to visit . . . The radio music up here is a lot better than the USA. You hear far less of the hollering and screeching type of music and more of the good old fashioned songs . . . Television is not up to USA standards and the newspapers are far behind USA publications.

The state (or province) controls the gasoline stations up here. You see only Esso, Gulf, Texaco, Shell, Fina and local independent named Irving. The prices are identical at all of them — 52 cents for regular

Most towns have automatic washing machine centers and these are usually full of caravanners at each town . . . Most of the food items you buy (like breakfast foods) have the box top deals printed in both English and French . . . None

The caravan has an experienced traveler as its leader — a man who has led similar groups to Alaska and elsewhere. His trailer is the headquarters office. He recruited several committees of caravanners to handle details like parking at each town on the tour, looking after sewage disposal, water, bottle gas, entertainment, mail, children, and so forth.

A group of men with red flags send you out when the caravan moves and another meets them at the town and sees that everybody is parked in neat rows. The water is connected from trailer to trailer in each row, and your trailer has fresh running water during the one to three days that you stay in one town.

As you come in or leave, you can pull over a sewer opening and dump the contents of your holding tank. You carry 30 gallons of fresh water in another tank that pumps through your faucets plus a 9-gallon hot water tank full. You have two 30-pound butane tanks that supply your cook stove, refrigerator and other needs.

Each trailer paid \$50 into a "kitty" that pays for the parking spaces and entertainment, which includes bands and the

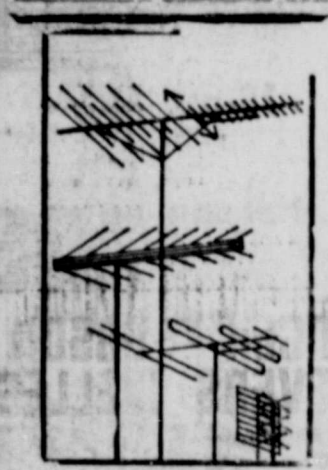
