the insects in 18 of the 20 fields checked last week. They seem to be doing more damage orchards last week. It was deseem to be doing more damage in dryland fields, but are also found in some irrigated peanuts.

Best control has been obtained with Diazinon or Parathion applied to cover the action of the best pecan crops found were in the Gorman area. Overall pecan production will be low this production will be low this year. Growers in this county expect only a 20 percent crop this year.

> This is the time of year that the hickory shuckworm and the pecan weevil begin doing damage to the pecan. The shuckworm causes the shucks to turn black and failure to turn loose of the pecan. For best control of the shuckworm the trees should be sprayed in late August with Guthion.

The pecan weevil lays eggs in the pecans. These eggs hat-ch into grubs which eat the kernel and then emerge leav-ing a little round hole in the pecan. They can be controlled by spraying with Sevin in early September.

Several meetings are being held in Eastland County to in-form peanut growers of the proposed "check-off' plan that growers will be voting on in September. About 35 growers attended a meeting in Rising Star August 21 and heard Ross Wilson explain the plan. If anyone has questions concerning the plan that growers will be voting on between September 9 and 24, I will be

glad to discuss it with them. Trees and shrubs, like hu-mans and livestock, are being affected by the continuing dry and hot weather.

The most common symptom of drougth injury to trees & shrubs is the dying around the margin of leaves with the dead area progressing into the leaf and causing dying of leaf tissue between the veins toward the mid-rib.

A deficiency of water affects the marginal leaf tissue most, as compared with other parts of the plant. If prolonged, the lack of soil moisture results in the death of feeder roots. When this happens, recovery of the plant to normal condi-

tion is slow.

Beautiful shade trees add much to the comfort and pleasure of the home, but they do need attention. Now is one of those times when water and attention may be necessary to pull them through.

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




