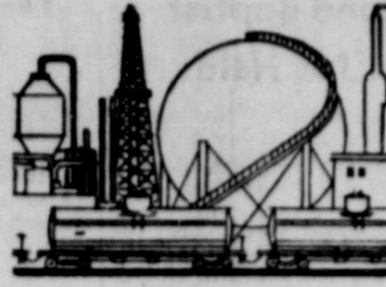

Officers Named For Ranger's Minister's Assn.

During a called meeting of Ranger Ministerial Alliance held at Bryan's Coffee Shop on Monday morning, officers for the coming year were elected.

Rumor Causes Much Talk In Ranger Schools

A rumor, apparently without foundation, has caused much conversation and speculation and moderate excitement in Ranger this week.

According to reports, Jean Dixon, nationally known self-styled prophetess, has predicted that a Texas town of approximately 3,500 population, whose six-letter name begins and ends with the letter "R," will suffer damages to its high school building by an explosion which will occur in late November. Re-telling added figurative reality to the story, folk becoming firm in the belief that Ranger, Texas was Dixon's target of prophecy.

In conversation with James W. Childress, Ranger High School Principal, the Times learned that such rumors seem to be a fad which had its beginning on the campus of Texas Tech College where it was rumored that a catastrophe would occur in one of the dormitories. Similar rumors have been circulated in other parts of the state, none of the predictions proving to be true.

Mr. Childress pointed out the fact that Jean Dixon's predictions concerned people and places of national and world-wide prominence rather than small communities, that no such prediction had, to the knowledge of the faculty, been released by any news media and that Ranger High School is in no greater danger than any building in any town in any state.

James Smith Is Given Promotion In Engineering

James E. (Jim) Smith, son of Mrs. Jimmy Smith and the late Mr. Smith, has been promoted to Senior Scientist in the Engineering Branch of the DPD reporting to Dr. Karl Hinrichs, Director of Engineering, according to an article appearing in the October issue of "Newsletter," published by Lockheed Electronics.

In his new capacity, Smith will be responsible for innovating new memory products and designs. Prior to his new assignments, Smith preformed conceptual designs of plated wire memory systems and designed the MAC 16 memory in the Advanced Development Department. In prior engineering work, he made significant contributions to new data storage system, three-wire memories that implement successful safeguard production contracts.

Smith has published papers on memory technology, and the patent on the three-wire 3D memory organization that DPD plants plan to produce in 1970.

A graduate from Ranger High School where he was known to his friends as "Snuffy," Smith is married to the former Virginia Washburn. The couple has four children and reside in Anaheim, Calif.

Let the Majority Rule

The majority of the Ranger voters have voted for a new hospital.

Plans for a new hospital are blocked by a minority. In the Sunday edition of the Ranger Times an article appeared on the front page concerning opponents' refusal to drop the suit attacking the vote for the new hospital district. The article was written by an opponent to the present hospital district.

This group has stated they are for a new hospital for Ranger, but have not stated how a new hospital can be built without creating a hospital district and without the issuance of hospital bonds. The opposition has been invited several times to meet with the hospital board and together seek a better way to build a hospital.

Since the vote has been placed in a contested suit it will cost the tax payers \$5,000, win or lose. This \$5,000 could be used to help in the building of a new hospital. The hospital board secured an attorney for \$2,500 to fight the case and it is understood the opposition has also secured a lawyer for \$2,500.

On Saturday, May 24, Ranger voters went to the polls and approved the creation of the Ranger Hospital District with a 2 to 1 win. Total votes for the Hospital District was 310 for and 232 against. The voting for the issuance of Hospital Bonds also carried in the May 24 election with 364 voting for the bonds and 209 voting against the bond issue.

This was a great step forward for Ranger. The votes were canvassed by the Commissioners Court and it declared the results of the election to be a favorable majority vote, and that the Hospital District be created, and the annual taxes levied within such District, and that the bonds be issued, all in accordance with law.

The suit alleging improper voting procedures in the May 24 election was filed in the 91st District Court in Eastland on June 20. The suit was filed by A. H. Powell. Eight Ranger residents contended that the election judge at the time of the election did not have an official list of qualified voters. The eight included Powell, A. E. Crawley, Don Adams, Charlotte Adams, Melvin Adams, Joe Young, Electra Pearson, and Charley Sutton.

They also alleged in the suit that Don Adams should have been election judge instead of V. V. Cooper because Adams had been appointed by the Commissioners. Adams is election judge for regular elections and not for special called elections, it is understood.

No date has been set for a hearing on the suit, which will come before Judge Earl Conner, 91st District Judge.

The opponents to the hospital district and bond issue have stated they will not drop the suit and this will just prolong the grant that has been applied for through the Hill-Burton Agency and the HUD Agency.

The voters of Ranger should look at the situation the present hospital is in for their Medicare patients and for the future of Ranger.

If Ranger doesn't get a new hospital, the patients will have to be hospitalized elsewhere.

When Ranger gets a new hospital, the entire city and surrounding area will benefit from it.

The majority of the people in Ranger want a new hospital.

A sensible, reasonable approach to achieving that new hospital is being halted through legal entanglement.

Perhaps the majority should be more vocal in their plea to "Get this thing rolling—we want a hospital."

\$158.70 Needed To Reach Ranger United Fund Goal

Ranger's United Fund drive for \$6,000 reached \$5,841.30 Thursday morning leaving \$158.70 needed to reach the goal set by the board of directors. \$5,256.55 has been deposited in the local drive and \$584.75 has been pledged to be given later through drafts on accounts or by donation outright.

Meeting Thursday morning the directors voted to pay those organizations due money from the drive.

The following has been budgeted for this year: Boy Scouts of America \$1,600, American Red Cross \$900, Salvation Army \$400, Texas United Fund \$50, Ranger Library \$400, Ranger Teen Town \$1,500, Child Welfare \$300, Pony League \$550, U.S.O. \$100.

Persons who have not given or who have not been solicited may send or leave their check with School Superintendent James R. Clark at 204 Main Street, treasurer of the United Fund.

Dr. E. W. Mince is president of the United Fund and Rev. B. Thomas Tribble is Drive Chairman. Both are serving their second term.

Ranger Police To Get New Chevrolet Auto

Other bidders and prices include Hood King-Ford, \$2,092.00; T. C. Fisher, \$2,195.00 and Fuller Motors, \$2,162.00.

Delivery of the car is promised within six to eight weeks. A 1970 Chevrolet pickup, also purchased from Smith Bros., has been delivered and is now in use.

Will Close Season Friday With Dublin

Friday night the Ranger Bulldogs lost a thrilling football game to the Glen Rose Tigers in District 10-A competition 14-13 in Tiger Stadium.

Ranger received the opening kickoff and raced 58 yards in nine plays to get a quick score as Quarterback Jesse Speer called on his Tailback Tom Fox, III, for the scoring run. Fox took the ball from one yard out and plowed his way into paydirt. Fox kicked the extra point to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead with 8:56 on the scoreboard clock.

The Tigers came back and with 1:38 remaining in the first quarter tied the score when Tailback Danny Thompson scored on a six-yard run off left tackle. The extra point kick by Gary Hill was good.

The Bulldogs took the point after kickoff and picked up two first downs before losing the ball on a fumble on their own 47-yard line.

Glen Rose took possession and raced 56-yards in 12 plays as Quarterback Gary Dempsey, on a sneak play, scored on a one-yard run. Gary Hill again kicked

the extra point to give the Tigers a 14-7 at halftime.

Following the third quarter Kickoff Glen Rose took the ball on their 44-yard line and raced to the two-yard line as the driving offense of Ranger lost the game and their season.

The Bulldogs moved the ball out from the two-yard line to the 40 before they were forced to give up the ball on a touch-down situation.

After three look possession of the ball on their own 20 yard line and moved the ball down to the Bulldogs 10-yard line before losing the ball on a fumble.

The Bulldogs put together a 40-yard drive in the final minute of the fourth quarter when they got the ball on the Glen Rose 30-yard line. A pass from Speer to Robert Cochran was good for 32 yards to set the Bulldogs up for a score.

With a first and goal from about the three yard line Glen Rose had out on fourth down spear called on Fox for the scoring drive. Fox plowed in for the score from four yards out.

The Bulldogs tried a two-point conversion to go a-need in the game but was cut down on about the one foot yard line.

Next Friday the Bulldogs will end their 1969 season when they play host to the Dublin Lions here in Bulldog Stadium. Game time is 7:30.

School Trustees Approve 1969-70 School Budget

Trustees of Ranger Independent School District in their last meeting approved a 1969-70 school budget for expenditures of \$361,936.

\$30,725 is budgeted for administration which covers all salaries and expenses of administration including the tax office and superintendent's office plus annual costs for the Consolidated Application Fund which is included in the total figure above.

\$294,338 is budgeted for instructional costs. Of this amount \$27,702 goes for salaries in the Consolidated Application Fund formerly called Title I, and \$24,016 is for regular salaries. \$25 is budgeted for textbooks, \$5,100 for library and audio-visual supplies, \$9,900 for regular teaching supplies and \$900 for C.A.T. teaching supplies while \$600 is budgeted for other teaching expenses and \$1,300 is budgeted for travel for the vocational teachers. This travel money is 100% paid for by the state.

No money was budgeted for attendance service and only \$25 for health supplies.

Pupil transportation will cost \$11,675. \$9,070 of this will go for bus driver and garage mechanic salaries. \$2,350 will go to pay on two new school buses bought two years ago. \$470 goes for insurance on vehicles and \$2,900 for gasoline, tires and other expenses of maintaining the buses.

\$38,940 will be spent for operation of plant. \$12,500 is for salaries of custodians. \$450 is for contracted services of plumbers or similar workmen. \$4,000 is for heat, \$6,990 is for water, \$1,400 is for supplies such as soap, towels, outs while \$200 is budgeted for other miscellaneous items.

It is estimated that \$5,300 will be spent for plant maintenance. \$900 will be spent for contracted services, \$2,650 for replacement of equipment such as the high school boiler and \$1,750 for other expenses.

\$3,100 is budgeted for insurance on buildings and pick up trucks and school car making a total expenses thus far of \$343,206 to be spent.

This is an average of about \$97 per pupil in operating costs.

In addition to money budgeted above \$600 is budgeted for furniture and equipment, \$14,000 for retirement of bonds on present buildings, \$3,520 for interest on the same bonds and \$610 dues to the Regional Educational Service Center in Abilene.

This is a grand total expenditures of \$361,936.

Revenue to cover these proposed expenses will come from a variety of sources Supt. James Clark said.

The Local Maintenance tax and delinquent taxes should total \$39,000 with the debt

service (bond) tax to total \$16,347. \$1,800 is expected from Kindergarten tuition and \$9,156 from various other local sources such as utilities from the college. This is a total local revenue of \$126,392.

\$399 is budgeted as revenue from the Eastland and Steephens county Available Fund.

\$76,514 is budgeted as income from the State based on 618 pupils at \$114 per student.

This is called per capita apportionment. \$115,930 is expected from the State for Foundation Fund Salary and Operation money. \$1,400 is anticipated from the State for Supplemental Salary Aid and \$9,320 for Transportation Aid.

\$1,400 is expected for driver training aid which includes last summer's course and next (Continued on Page Four)

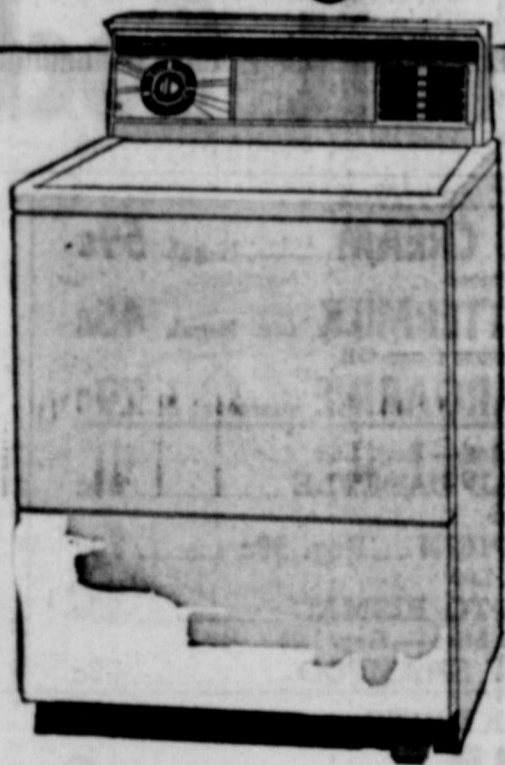

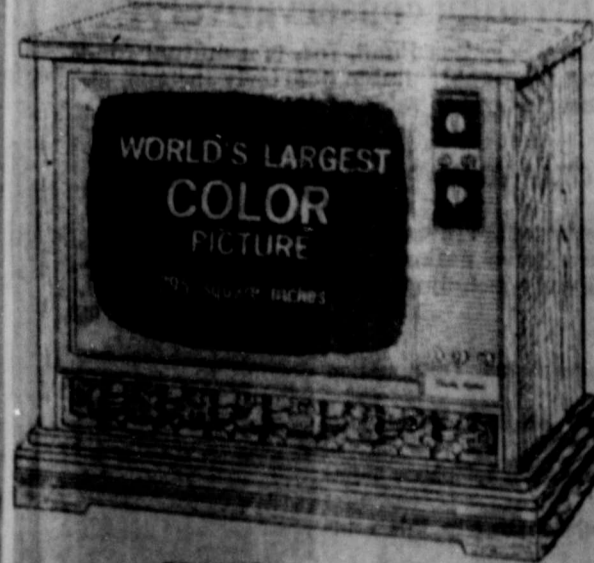
