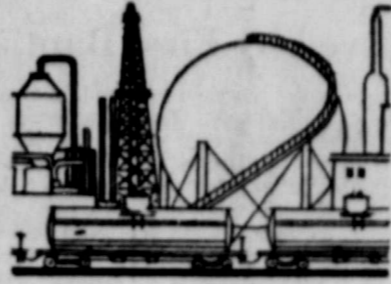

One of the first things to attract a customer to the store is the all-glass frontage, an invitation to enter. Inside, year-round air conditioning makes for comfort, vinyl as-

## Joe Hanna of Breckenridge Announces Here

Joe C. Hanna announced today that he would be a candidate for State Representative of the 53rd Congressional District in the coming election which is composed of Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford and Stephens Counties.

In announcing, Hanna, 49-year old Breckenridge business man, stated that he hoped to represent this district in Austin with mature judgment and fair and sensible thought and action.

Hanna recently sold his business, the Stephens County Abstract Company, after 24 successful years in Breckenridge.

"For the first time in my life I feel I have the time to become involved in public service rather than private business, Hanna stated.

"I feel very strongly that state government is important, and needs men with sound business judgment who are interested in making it work to the advantage of the people, instead of to the representatives themselves," he added.

Hanna attended John Tarleton College and the University of Texas. He went into the Naval Air Corps as a fighter pilot in World War II, and after four years returned to Breckenridge with a wife and a daughter. He bought into the Stephens County Abstract Company and later assumed full control of the business.

Hanna served on the school board 13 years, and has been active in the business and civic life of the area. He has three children, a daughter, Judith, 24, and two sons, Steve and Mark, 21 and 17. His wife, the former Betty Elliott was born in Breckenridge.

Stating that he would make a formal announcement later, Hanna said he planned to meet as many of the people of this district as possible, and personally visit with them.

## Pecans To Be 'For Sale' First Time At Local County Show Dec. 12 & 13

Pecans & pecan baked goods will be on display and for sale in the Eastland County court house Friday and Saturday, December 12 - 13. The event will be the seventeenth annual Eastland County Pecan Show sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

Ben McKinnis, Chamber of Commerce chairman for the event, says visitors will see some of the best quality pecans in Texas as well as prize pecan pies, cakes, candies, nut bread and cookies. A third feature will be a display of centerpieces using pecans in various forms.

Inshell pecans as well as baked goods will be sold at the pecan show reports Anton White, president of the pecan growers association. The H. D. members will operate a

concession where coffee and pecan food will be sold.

White estimates that about 160 entries of top quality pecans representing over 40 different varieties will be on display. Each entry consists of at least 40 pecans. They must

have been grown in 1969 by the person entering the pecans in the show. All entries of pecans must be entered by noon on Friday. Ribbons will be given to the top three places of each variety. Plaques will be awarded to the exhibitor of the champion shelling pecan, the champion in-shell pecan, the champion native pecan and the overall Grand Champion pecan entry of the show.

Top place entries in all varieties will be entered in the regional pecan show at Waco January 8 and 9.

The bake show and centerpiece arrangement division will be supervised by the county Home Demonstration Council. These entries are due on Friday, Dec. 12 at 11 a.m. in the courthouse lobby when judging will begin.

The division in the bake show are pies, cakes, candy, nut bread and cookies. All of which must feature pecans as part of the ingredients. The top three places will be awarded ribbons and prize money. Any adult or youth of Eastland County is eligible to enter.

The centerpiece arrangements must be composed with some part of the pecan tree such as leaves, wood or nuts. Prize money and ribbons are awarded to the top three places in this division.

Judging for the pecan show will be done Friday afternoon by Blueford Hancock, Extension Horticulturist of Texas A&M University and L. D. Romberg of Brownwood, Romberg, world known pecan scientist, developed many of the top varieties grown in this area such as Barton, Mohawk, Comanche, Sioux, Choctaw, Wichita, Apache and Shawnee.

The best time to see the exhibits, according to the officials is Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.

The new pecan queen, the runner up, and the 1969 pecan queen will be honored at the queen's luncheon Saturday at the White Elephant restaurant in Eastland.

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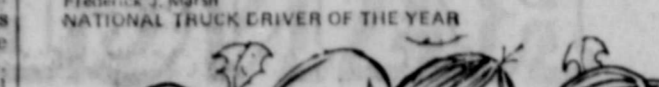

One of the most interesting and amusing events in Rising Star Sports history was a Soft Ball game played in 1937 at the "Wildcat Park" between the Fats and Leans.

All players were dressed in feminine attire. Many of the players wore Mother Hubbard dress while others wore dresses of their own choosing. The late Garland Branton was umpire and wore a pretty pink flowered lawn dress with a wide pink satin sash tied in a huge bow.

The Leans trimmed the Fats in a four inning game before a record breaking crowd. Players on the teams were: Fats—W. E. Ellis, John Joyce, M. D. Gibson, A. T. Shults, Hubert Jones, Mark Clark, A. P. Smith, Mun Hoses, John Millwee, F. J. Maynard, C. L. Wilson and M. E. Crossley.

Leans — Fred Cook, Dude Myers, H. S. Childress, Jay Koonce, Bus Crowover, Fred Siekman, Guy McDonald, John Leach and W. P. Small.

Fred Cook was outstanding Leans player while John Millwee was the popular Fat player.

One Saturday night in September 1937, officers Clifton Hord and Blake Forehand arrested three men from out of town for drunkenness and disturbing the peace and placed them in the city calaboose for the night. Next morning the officers came to town to see about their prisoners. They found one man suffering from a hang over. The other two were no where to be found. On questioning the one man, he told them that the others had prized the door at the top and made their escape, but that he "was not about to get out for he had a good job in another town and did not want to risk being fired by the company he worked for."

November 1937 was "Red Letter Day" at May, when the West Texas Utilities Co. formally introduced the installation of electric service to the town and community. A new line was built from Rising Star to May and May had electricity.

From 600 to 800 people gathered at May for the celebration. A ladies vocal quartet made up of Mrs. O. T. Jarvis, Mrs. H. E. White, Mrs. H. M. McDaniel and Miss Stapp was introduced, along with Mrs. Vera Shultz as pianist. This group delighted their audience with special vocal numbers.

W. R. (Bill) Chambers gave a very interesting history of May, its founding and development. Several out of town speakers were there. Mrs. White gave a solo. West Texas Utilities representatives gave household demonstration and passed out free gifts.

Rising Star High School annual May Fete was held on April 28, 1937, at the high school gym. The following program was presented:

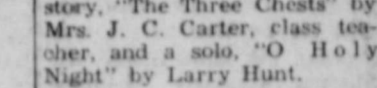

## Millionth Telephone May Have Been Installed In Ranger Area

Monday, December 1, "special" telephones were installed in Ranger to commemorate a milestone in the growing communications systems used by customers of Southwestern Bell.

Somewhere in the telephone company's five-state area the 10 millionth telephone was connected. According to James Grigsby, local manager, it could have been one of the new connections here.

"Since it is impossible for the company to determine the exact 10 millionth telephone installed, we are making all new telephones installed throughout the company symbolic of this growth milestone. A special gold-colored number plate will be placed on these telephones."

The first telephone in Southwestern Bell territory was installed in 1878. It didn't look much like a telephone by today's standards. It was more like a wooden box with a hole at one end which served as both the transmitter and receiver.

Over the years the quality has improved. Early telephone users had to shout to be heard.

Today, a whisper is audible across continents. As service improved, so did the telephone instrument. From the crank telephone of the early 1900's, the telephone has undergone numerous

changes in size and shape and color.

"Telephones in Southwestern Bell territory started to increase before the turn of the century and this growth hasn't let up. To reach the first millionth telephone in our service area took a period of 48 years, between 1878 and 1926. The five million mark was reached in 1956, 30 years later. To reach nine million took less than 12 years, an event which happened in April last year — just 20 months ago. The 11 millionth telephone will be installed in about 18 months."

"Here in Cisco, more than 100 telephones have been added this year bringing our total telephones to 2780. This compares with 1914 telephones in service just five years ago."

Grigsby also pointed out that Texas has the largest number of telephones of any state served by Southwestern Bell. In 1926, when the millionth telephone was installed, Texas had 337,000 phones. Today that number has risen to 4.8 million.

Throughout the company, this fantastic growth has resulted in expenditures of more than \$5 billion on construction during the past 35 years. This represents \$613 for each telephone added.

During 1969, the company's construction program required an expenditure of \$544 million.

Present forecasts indicate that 620,000 telephones will be added in Southwestern Bell territory this year. This is equivalent to more than the number of telephones now serving the Fort Worth and Austin metropolitan areas combined.

"Keeping up with the growth of such dynamic area on the way to this 10 millionth telephone milestone hasn't been easy," Grigsby said. "As expansion of our communications systems continues, we will keep on doing our best to achieve our goal of giving customers the kind of telephone service they want, when and where they want it."

Delicious refreshments were served from a table laid with a red cloth and beautifully decorated with Christmas candles and ornaments.

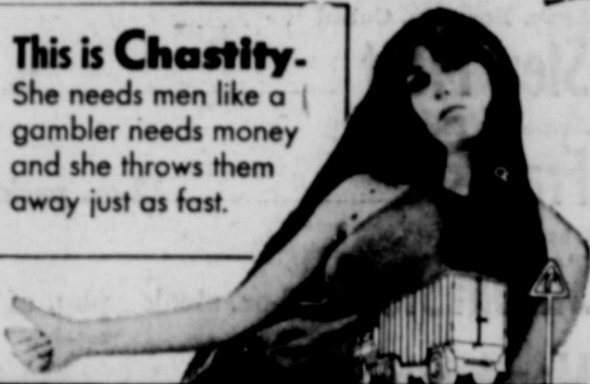
