Minutes of the meeting for Nov. 18 were read and approved.

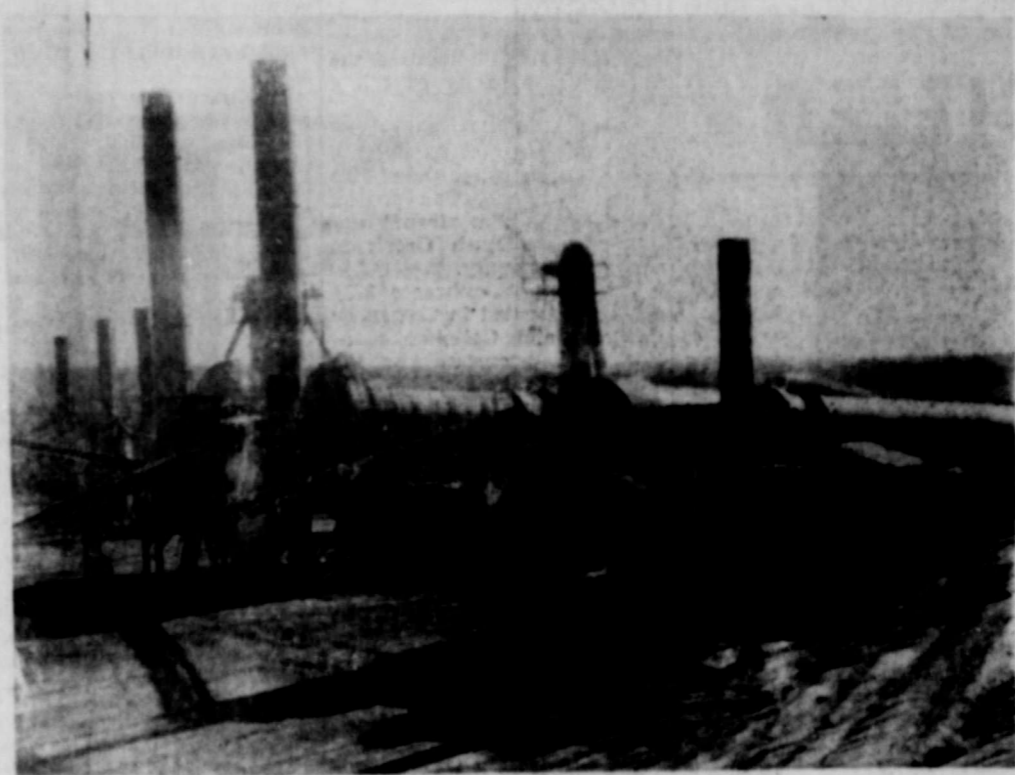

Featherlite Corporation In Midst Of Modernization Program Here

On Wednesday afternoon, December 10, the Featherlite Corporation invited all city officials and Chamber of Commerce Directors to inspect new plant facilities currently being installed at their Ranger plant.

Mr. Bill Marslender, Featherlite General Manager, gave a brief history of the Lightweight Aggregate Industry and of the Featherlite Corporation from its inception in Mingus and Straw, Texas to date. Mr. Marslender stated that the company had expanded its Ranger operation until it is now one of the largest light aggregate plants in the southwest.

Aggregate produced at the Ranger plant is used in structural concrete, all types of precast concrete such as concrete blocks and by the highway department for surface treatment of roads.

At the present time lightweight aggregate produced at the local plant is being used in all the concrete work for the new Shell building in Houston; which, when completed, will be the tallest building in Houston comprising 52 stories.

The Featherlite Corporation is in the midst of a modernization program and have just put a new 10 foot diameter x 150 foot long kiln in operation. The new kiln has a forced draft system and twin cyclone dust collectors. Instead of being omitted into the air, the dust from the new kiln is collected and mixed in a tank of water prior to being pumped to an old shale pit.

Mr. Marslender stated that similar dust collection systems will be placed on the two older 10x150 foot kilns which presently operate on a natural draft system.

Local officials were amazed by the growth of the company during the past few years as evidenced by the new facilities.

Sabanno Watershed Development Project Is Approved For Planning

A planning authorization for the proposed Sabanno Watershed Development Project has been made by the U.S. Department of Agriculture...

The project was proposed by an informal organization of farmers and ranchers living in the area to control flooding, counter soil damage and erosion...

Water would be conserved and flooding checked by a series of dams on tributaries of the Sabanno. The project is similar to that already under way on Rush Creek in Comanche County.

The project embraces 202,000 acres located in Comanche, Eastland and Callahan counties. It is sponsored by the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation district...

The party has requested to remain anonymous at the present time, and indications are that there are some good number of petitions being circulated...

"In reply to the article that was in the paper a few issues back about the petition that is being circulated to abolish the County School Superintendent office...

"Mr. Musgrove made two telephone calls to Austin. He talked to Mr. Bob Freeman, Legal Advisor for the State Legislators, and Mr. Olsen, Legal Advisor for the Texas Education Agency.

"In the New Education Code, Section 17.64 are the instructions for abolishing the County School Superintendent office, and it is done with a petition asking for the election.

"Also it states that the County Judge will then act as County Superintendent and the County School Board will set his pay for performing those duties not to exceed \$2,000 per year...

"Since the County School Superintendent's office is now being approximately 19,000 per year or \$76,000 per four year term of office the cost is expensive considering there are no more rural schools in the county...

New Game Warden Says County Deer Many, Fat

"There are quite a few deer in Eastland County and they are in very good shape," Game Warden Kenneth E. Payne says. "This has been a good year, with lots of grain and lots of cover, so the deer have had plenty of food and are fat now," Payne said.

Payne checked the Ranger locker plant the third day of deer season and found "more than a hundred deer there, probably 97 of them bucks, all of them in good shape."

A native of Sangor in Denton County, Payne has been with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for three years and moved from Wichita Falls recently. He and his wife, Jenny, have one son, Scott, two years old. They live at 303 East Sadosa in Eastland.

The enforcement of all game and fish laws and regulations and also water safety are Payne's responsibility. "There are practically no problems with water safety at this time of year," Payne said, "but we do have problems with night hunting and with killing antlerless deer without a permit. Either offense carries a maximum fine of \$200.00."

Booklets concerning hunting and fishing regulations may be obtained from Payne's office at the county sheriff's office in the courthouse, or requested by mail. Anyone who wishes more information may call Payne at 629-1774 in Eastland.

County Political Pot Is Faintly Simmering

With 1970 and the beginning of a new campaign year less than three weeks away there have been only faint signs of activity along the political front in Eastland County.

Twelve county offices, from county judge to justices of the peace are to be filled in the primary and general voting next year. All are for four year terms.

They are the offices of county judge, county superintendent of schools, district clerk, county clerk, county treasurer, the county commissioners of Precincts 2 (Gorman) and 4 (Cisco); justices of the peace at Rising Star, and the constable's office at Eastland.

Officers whose terms have still two years to go are district judge, county sheriff, county tax assessor-collector, county and district attorney and three constables.

Steel Hill, constable at Eastland is serving as an appointee following the death of Porter Woods last April, and he faces election for the remainder of the term at the polls next year.

Although none of the incumbents of offices to be filled in

a candidate for re-election. No other candidacies for the office have been reported and there was no known speculation concerning any opposition announcement.

District Clerk Roy Lane was likewise noncommittal about his plans, but it was generally regarded as almost certain that he would be a candidate for re-election. No possible rival candidates have been identified, even speculatively.

Mrs. Ellen Justice said frankly that she would be a candidate for re-election as county treasurer.

County Supt. O. L. Stamey, whose office has been the target of some petitions seeking an elective to abolish it, said that he was giving serious consideration to seeking re-election. His friends were confident, however, that Stamey, a veteran educator and former president of Cisco Junior College, would again offer for the office which administers large amounts of state and federal aid to the county schools.

Two Cisco offices will be filled in the 1970 voting and in both of them there were clear prospects of primary contests.

They are the office of Precinct 4, now occupied by Clarence (Runt) Dill.

Mr. Dill was regarded as certain to be a candidate for re-election, although he would not commit himself in an interview Friday. He pointed out that it was somewhat early to make any announcement that he would prefer to wait until the first of the year before making a definite statement of his plans.

A possible contest for the office loomed in reports that W. W. Sawyers would offer for the post. Sawyers admitted that he had been approached by some of his friends seeking an announcement for the office but that he has not yet made up his mind.

A similar situation exists in regard to the office of the justice of the peace in Cisco, now held by W. L. Lewis. Mr. Lewis indicated that he would have an announcement to make about the first of the year. It was regarded as highly probable that he would be a candidate

for re-election. He told this newspaper that he was giving serious consideration to such a decision.

The clear possibility of a contest for this office was presented by reports that Carl Lamb, a former county commissioner would offer for the office. Mr. Lamb said he was considering it but had not fully made up his mind.

All candidates are in the democratic column and their nomination in the primary election next May is tantamount to election in the general voting next November. The republican party is very much in the minority in the county and rarely has offered candidates for county office.

County Law Enforcement Association Is Formed

Meeting at the White Elephant Cafe in Eastland Friday noon, 32 peace officers, judges and city officials of Eastland county set up a temporary organization for what is tentatively known as the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association.

Purpose of the organization, as explained by District County Attorney Emory Walton, who presided, is "To bring about a closer cooperation between the various public officials charged with law enforcement in the county to the end of a better enforcement of the laws."

Named as temporary officers were:

President, Johnnie Morren, assistant chief of Eastland city police; vice-president, Sheriff L. E. Sublett; secretary-treasurer, Mayor Douglas Fry of Cisco, and Judge W. L. Lewis of Cisco, chairman.

A nominating committee consisting of Sgt. Jerry Matthews, Department of Public Safety, as chairman, and Chief Clyde Bryner of Cisco and Chief W. Vinson of Ranger, were named to suggest officers for a permanent organization.

In his remarks prior to the organization, Mr. Walton told the officers to urge the importance of registration as a qualification for voting in next year's elections upon all citizens.

Also discussed were some of the constitutional amendments to be voted upon in the 1970 general election.

Current annual taxes paid to various government agencies by Texas railroads in Eastland County total \$18,716, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

"We are very pleased that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in Texas go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "The future of our country depends to a great extent upon the education of our youth," he said.

"Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also continue to make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."
