



Nation Has Food Supply Enough For Normal Needs

The nation's food supply is be rapidly adjusted as between deficit and surplus, producing areas, and with sufficient food in the aggregate to meet normal conumption needs a slower rate of nerease in retail prices is expected during the remainder of this year than occured during the past three months, according to a re-port issued today by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

The Bureau points out that much of the reduction in the pro-duction of food crops in the ought areas has been offset to large extent by a bountiful production in eastern and far western States and carry-over stocks from previous years. The nation's food supply as a whole will be ample this fall and winter, it is stated, although consumers will have to make certain shifts in their usual diet because of the scarcity of some foods and the abundance of others.

The full effect of the drought on retail food prices will not be felt antil next spring, when supplies of meats, dairy products, and soultry products will by reduced. Nothing in the present situation, says the Bureau, indicates a reaext spring and summer in prices or bread and flour, fruits, vegetables, and canned foods.

Since food prices in cities withthe drought area have advanced more than in cities outside the drought area, the Bureau believes that supplies are being distributed in such a way as to avoid local ortages. The Bureau finds, also no indications as yet of any general widening of the spread between farm and retail prices since the beginning of the drought. Increases in prices to consumer since early summer have been closely in line with the prices paid farmers for food products.

Food prices for several years have been low in relation to prices of other commodities, says the Bureau. The latest cost of living index indicates that in June food prices were 9.1 per cent above the 1913 average, while clothing prices were 36.4 per cent above; household furnishings prices were 67.8 per cent above; fuel and lighting prices were 56.0 per cent above; and prices of miscellaneous items in the family budget were 95.9 per cent above. The recent advance has not brought about high food prices in relation to other commodities, but has somewhat reduced the disparity between prices of foods and prices of other things.

The total supply of wheat is large enough to take care of mestic requirements. The total meat supply, including meat pro-duced for relief purposes, for the remainder of 1934, is expected to be not greatly different from that during the corresponding period last year, since the prospective decrease in pork production and the 15 per cent decrease in commercial storage stocks of meats on Aug. 1 are likely to be offset by fincreased suplies of beef, veal, and

The supply of fluid milk for ale is expected to equal that in ecent years, since a larger than usual proportion of milk produc tion will be diverted to fluid uses. Production of butter this winter, however, may be the smallest in seven years, but should prices rise sufficiently to encourage imports, the domestic supply may be increased from foreign sources.

Fewer eggs will be produced this winter, and the supply of poultry for consumption will be the smallest in ten years, says the Bureau. The market supply of fruits this fall, winter, and in the early spring months next year is estimated at about 5 per cent less than in 1933, and about 13 per cent less than the average in recent years. All of the shortage is in supplies of applies, grapes, and cranberries; production of pears and citrus fruits is larger this year than last. People in the drought area are expected to draw more heavily than usual upon commercial supplies of canned fruits, and this, says the Bureau, will tend to strengthen the demand for canned fruits in general.
The combined supply of vege-

tables available from storage and from early southern fields seems y to be sufficient to meet all demands even in localities is drought areas where produce from home and local gardens has been seriously reduced. The total supply of canned vegetables is estinated at about 11 per cent more than in 1933, but 11 per cent less han the average of recent years.





Nature Reveals **Priceless Secrets**

AUSTIN.-Nature has revealed riceless secrets to students of nedical science, stated Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer. ROVED BY 2 GENERATIONS The Schick test is the key to one of these secrets. It determines whether children are susceptible or mmune to diphtheria. The mediine used consists of a highly diuted form of diphtheria texin, several drops of which are carefully introduced between the outer layers of the skin, one the inner urface of the forearm.

This susceptibility test is en-tirely harmless. Fifty times the amount used for a child would be necessary to injure a small animal such as a mouse or guinea pig. The red area is nature's danger signal. Such a child, if exposed to diphneria, might acquire the disease Seventy-five to 90 per cent of hildren under 12 are naturally usceptible to diphtheria. This information has been gained through Schick tests carried out on thousands of children in this country during the past decade or more. Young children should therefore eceive immunizing / treatments against the disease, without a preminary Schick test. Such a test should however, be carried out six onths after precentive treatnents ,to make certain that immunity has been established. In older children and adults, a preliminary Schick test is advisable. since immunity may already be


