Dallas Geologist Sees Many Perils With Byrd Party

DALLAS .- Secrets of science locked in the frozen expanse of Antarctica, hold a dangeruos challenge for Charles Gill Morgan, 28year-old Dallas geologist with the Byrd expedition.

Accompanied by three men and supported by four nine-dog sledges, Morgan will embark on a 1,300mile journey across the bottom of the world this month

His companions will be Ervin M. Bramhall, 29, a physicist of Palo Alto, Calif.; Finn Ronne, 30, ski expert and radio operator of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Albert Eilesen, ski expert of Tomsoe, Norway. The party will face the treacher-

ous task of scaling the Thorne glacier in the Queen Maude range of mountains, an ascent of 10,000

The journey was a three-fold

First is a geological study of the Queen Maude range in the vicinity of the ascent; second, to collect magnetic data in high altitudes and especially on the plateau bordering the South Pole to solve some of the problems of the earth's magnetism, and, to determine the thickness of the Antarctic ice cap and the delineation of its rock basement.

Morgan was member of the faculty of Southern Methodist university for several years, a mechanical engineer for Charles L. Kribbs of Dallas in 1932, and consulting geologist for Dr. Robert T. Hill of Dallas in 1932-33.

In the summers of 1928 and 1932, inclusive, Morgan led geological parties of Southern Meth-Spencer, Cisco; John Hart, East- odist university on expeditions in Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, and Arizona. He received his bachelor of science cegree from the university here in 1928.
