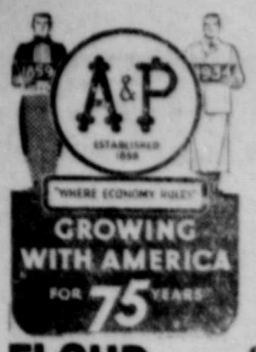

Copy of Almost Forgotten Portrait of Houston Found

HOUSTON.—A copy of an almost forgotten portrait of General Sam Houston that had rested for 82 years on the dusty shelves of an old New York print shop was presented to Capt. W. B. Woodson of the cruiser Houston during its recent visit here.

The presentation was made by officials of a welcoming committee during an intermission of a formal ball for officers of the cruiser that carried President Franklin D. Roosevelt on his recent trip to the Hawaiian Islands.

The portrait was found in New York by C. L. Plack of Austin whose hobby it is to collect anything that reflects truly the spirit and purposes of the first Texans.

While looking through the Old Printing shop of New York, he discovered an old lithograph made from a daguerrotype of Sam Houston. The lithograph carried a copyright date, 1852, from Hartford, Conn.

The portrait was believed to be hitherto unpublished. It was believed to have been made when General Houston was in Washington as Texas' first senator.

Arrangements were made to have the lithograph reproduced in oils. It was this oil reproduction that was presented to the cruiser Houston's executive personnel.

Alamo Has Become Shrine of Heroism

DALLAS, Oct. 22.—The Alamo, shrine of Texas heroism, has become a world-wide symbol of bravery, visitors to the Texas State Fair here revealed.

From the Canal Zone, the Orient and from Europe people came to see the exposition's replica of the historic fort.

Natives of foreign lands joined proud Texans in asking to see the rooms where slept William B. Travis, David Crockett and others of the tragic band of Alamo defenders.

J. E. Martin, keeper of the building, said more people visited the fair's replica than visit the original Alamo in San Antonio. The building here, is a faithful reproduction, reduced one-half in scale, of the mission built in San Antonio in 1744-1757. The mission was known until 1783 as the mission of San Antonio de Valero.

Ancient Teeth Are Found On Caprock

SAN JON, N. M.—Hundreds of teeth, 11 million years old, have been taken from the caprock south of here.

The molars, dug from an outcropping of reddish rock-hard earth, have been identified by Floyd Studer, paleontologist of the Panhandle Plains Historical society, as being from the eating apparatus of a "trassic reptile known as the phytosaur."

At first the teeth were believed to be those of sharks, but geologic and physical indications, Studer explained, show they came from fierce flesh-eaters of prehistoric times.

GAS ATTENDANTS' PAY RAISED

CLEVELAND.—Gasoline station operators and attendants won pay increases ranging from 10 to 35 per cent in an award handed down here by Dr. John A. Lapp, chairman of an arbitration board, at a meeting of company and union representatives. The increases were retroactive to May 16. All Cleveland filling stations were closed during part of last May when operators struck for pay boosts.

REPLICA OF TOWN SHOWN BRIDGEPORT, O.

A miniature replica of West Wheeling, in the days when it was an important river port, before railroads came, was constructed by Willis Fortney, of Lansing, O., for a Methodist church homecoming there. The replica included representations of the big warehouses which lined the Ohio river shore opposite Wheeling, W. Va.

RELIEF ROLL DECLINED VICTORIA, B. C.

—British Columbia relief roll registrations have declined steadily since March, Administrator E. W. Griffiths announced. Twenty-nine thousand persons were listed Oct. 1, compared to 51,000 March 1. The needy persons included 19,000 in municipalities and 10,000 in rural areas.

Prison Bars Mean Home to a Veteran

AMARILLO, Texas, Oct. 19.—Prison bars mean "home" to Owen Boulter, 61-year-old Spanish-American war veteran of Amarillo.

His attachment to the Potter county jail has presented a perplexing problem to county, state and federal officials.

Boulter, called "Major" by other prisoners, got into jail after he pleaded guilty to a charge of disturbing the peace and asked the judge to "give me the limit." He was sentenced to 71 days.

At the expiration of the term, he was turned out, penniless, homeless and forbidden to return to his cell cot.

He begged officers to allow him to stay, but they sent him to the county farm instead. That didn't suit him so he came back to the jail where he spent two nights. But officers refused to let him stay longer.

So the old man walked to the federal building and smashed two windows—admittedly to be sentenced again.

He is back in jail on a charge of defacing government property—and officers are scratching their heads.

Lady Luck Has Played Big Part In Oil Production

DALLAS, Oct. 22.—Lady Luck has been the Patron Goddess of Texas' most fabulous industry—oil. The American Petroleum Institute owes the convention to be held here Nov. 12-15 to a wave of that lady's hand at Corsicana in 1894, when she changed a water well into the first spigot to tap the greatest petroleum pool in the world. Townspeople of Corsicana were seeking a municipal water supply. They drilled a deep well, but into their shaft came a black, slick liquid they could not drink. Disappointed, they drilled deeper and found water, drank and were content. By the next year, however, East Texans began to realize the value of the vast sea of fortune that lay beneath their feet and wells were drilled in increasing numbers. The well that opened the Electra field in North Texas also was a water well. W. T. Waggoner, ranch owner of Wichita county and founder of Texas' first oil millions, promptly recognized the value of the oil and developed the field. It was named for his daughter. The Burknett field owed its being to a teamster's mistake in judgment. S. L. Fowler, a farmer, formed a pool for a test well from contributions of his friends and neighbors. The site of the well was selected but the teamster who hauled in the material dumped it far from the selected spot. Where it was dumped the field was located. The original site later was found barren. Trucks which could not navigate the rough and sandy lands of Reagan county provided a source of wealth for the University of Texas. The machines became hopelessly stuck on university land. In order to pull them clear they were unloaded. And where the materials were unloaded was found the oil. Visitors to the A. P. Funeral Is Held For Pioneer Citizen Of Eastland County

Death Sunday claimed John F. Patterson, one of Cisco's pioneer residents and outstanding citizens. Mr. Patterson, who was 84 years old, died at his home at 8:40 p. m. of pneumonia, after a long illness. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist church of Cisco at 3:30 p. m. Monday, with Rev. E. S. James and Rev. George W. Parks officiating. Following Masonic rites at the grave, the body was buried beside that of Mrs. Patterson, who died Jan. 5, 1931. Mr. Patterson is survived by five children, Judge B. W. Patterson, Eastland; E. R. Patterson of Escondido, Calif.; Mrs. W. E. Warren of Long Beach, Calif.; Mrs. O. C. Britton of Durham, N. C., and Mrs. C. S. Karkalis of Eastland. There are 12 grandchildren and two grand-grandchildren living. Mr. Patterson was prominent in civic, church and fraternal activities. He was mayor of Cisco when the city hall was built and once held the office of tax collector of Eastland county. He was a deacon in the Baptist church and was secretary of the Masonic organizations in Cisco until his retirement in 1930. He was a Mason for 63 years, a charter member of the Cisco lodges, and an active church worker from young manhood. When Cisco was destroyed by the cyclone in 1893 Mr. Patterson, who was in the mercantile business, threw open his entire stock to victims of the storm and headed the relief body that set about rebuilding the town. Mr. Patterson was born in Rutherford county, Tenn., Jan. 31, 1850, and married Miss Sarah C. Ripley, Sept. 1, 1870. To this union were born 11 children, two of whom died in infancy. He came to Texas in 1878, settling at Breckenridge. He went into business with W. C. Pulley and was postmaster there before resigning to go to Weatherford, then terminal of the Texas and Pacific railway. There he had charge of the J. H. Brown wholesale grocery branch house.
