Promptness is essential in the preparation of suitable projects to uphold the amount of money Eastland county receives each month, H. E. Driscoll, county administrator, stated.

Now look at it from the other angle-the case where a real criminal is convicted and appeals. In his case, too, there is a long delay. The deterrent effect of his sentence is automatically lessened.

If he awaits execution, he, too, suffers long-drawn mental torture; if convicted of a lesser crime, he may actually be out on bail for a year or more after his sentence. free to repeat the offense for which he was originally ar-

Either way, this long delay is an intolerable thing. If we are the efficient nation we believe ourselves to be, we should fuid some way of rushing things so that only a few weeks may elapse between sentence and final disposition of the case. The present system is unendurably clumsy.

Mix and sift pastry flour with selt and baking powder. Add dran and graham flour and mix well. Add dates and nuts. Mix. Add egg well beaten with milk and honey. Beat well and stir in melted shortening. Turn into well oiled and floured bread pans and bake one hour in a moderate oven. Kemove from oven and rub crust with melted butter.
