Liberalism and conservatism are not words of very exact meaning. Nevertheless, they will have to do for want of better ones; and sooner or later they will have to be the unofficial labels of our two chief political parties, with one party standing for the one attitude and the other for its opposite.

For what the New Deal neds more than anything else is a critical and intelligent reappraisal that goes to the fundamentals beneath it. It did not get that in this recent campaign. It cannot get it until the two parties stand for something more than just two groups of assorted officeholders and officeseekers.
