STEPHENVILLE, Texas, Nov. 20 .- Indignant pecan growers of the Brazos valley are determined to find out if the federal government actually meant to say "nuts

The growers' complaint is that he federal government has given inancial assistance to pecan growers east of the Mississippi river while little has been done for the Texas growers.

Their complaint is supported by the fact, they say, that the Brazos valley is one of the largest pecan growing sectors in the nation. Drouth this year greatly damaged the crop and aid is needed, grow-

The growers, after their protest and organization meeting here, plan to bombard Washington with requests for aid.
