





Japan's spokesmen say that they are going to have naval equality. If America and England do not consent, they will have it anyway. The famous Washington treaty seems headed straight for the pallbearers.

That being the case, what do we do about it? Set out to outbuild the Japanese, regardless? In an uncertain world we can be sure of this that would be a sure road to trouble.

Admiral Sir Herbert Richmond, of England, recently wrote a book called "Sea Power in the Modern World." In it he pointed out the reasons for the existence of navies; and in this crisis his remarks are worth listening to.

A nation builds a navy, he says, to protect its shores from invasion, to keep itself from being starved by interruption of its sea-borne commerce, to protect its merchant ships and colonies, or to implement some overseas policy. The constitution of the Texas Republic was discarded in 1845 for a new one thought more suitabl for statehood. Praised by Daniel Webster as "the best of American state consittutions," it lasted only until the strife of the Civil war days. The war between the states and its reconstruction period re sulted in new constitutions in 1861, 1865 and 1869. The present cor stitution was adopted in 1876. None of its framers still lives.

Today's constitution, however, is but a battered fragment of the document of 1876. Sixty-one amendments, adopted by popular

Checks cashed by the Dallas Fed-

> eral Reserve bank which serves the Eleventh district totaled \$697,000,-000, 28 per cent above September and 8.4 per cent greater than in October last year, the bureau's re port said. Total deposits of \$28,-000,000 were up 4.1 per cent from September and 19.6 per cent above October, 1933, due entirely to the increase in demand deposits. Total loans of \$196,000,000 showed an increase of 2 per cent over September but a decline of 9.7 per cent from October a year ago. Commercial loans were responsible for the small increase over September while loans on securities other than those of the government showed a decline from September of the current year and October last year of 2 per cent and

18.3 per cent respectively. Government securities owned, totaling \$176,000,000, were down 1.7 per cent from September but still were 43 per cent above Oc tober last year.

quick-bread dough sweetened or of a cake dough made thick enough to roll and cut in rings. They're tried in deep fat. Cruller means twist. The dough is the same as that of fried cakes, so the shape is the cruller's distinguishing feature.

Temperature All-Important
It's the temperature of the fat that determines the digestibility spoon vanilla, 1-4 teaspoon grated

It's the temperature of the fat that determines the digestibility of the fried cake. If you haven't a thermometer, then use the bread crumb test. An inch cube of bread from the soft part of the loaf should brown in 60 seconds when dropped in fat of the perfect temperature. The themometer should register 375 degrees Fahrenheit when the dough is dropped in and should be kept at 360 degrees during frying. Rings and twists should fry in three to four minutes. Balls may need a minute or two longer.

Each ingredient should be thoroughly incorporated in the mixture as it is added, but prolonged stirring results in hard, tough fried cakes.

Chill the dough for an hour or longer before rolling. This makes it easy to handle with the minimum amount of flour and insures

Each ingredient should be thorough per. Dust with powdered sugar when cool.

If I tablespoon vinegar is added to the fat when it is put over the fire the fried cakes will have less fat flavor. Do not try to add cold vinegar to hot fat.

This recipe will make about three dozen fried cakes.
