CHANGES MADE IN ALL RELIEF IN THE COUNTY

Upon instructions received from Austin headquarters, effective imnediately, the following regulations will prevail with regard to all relief projects, excepting rural rehabilitation and education:

1. No further projects of any character will be approved exceptng: Supplements to commodity distribution projects, to handle such distribution; supplement to garden projects, or new garden projects, where seed has already en contracted for.

2. Effective Monday, March 4, requisitions for material, trucks, teams, or any non-personal service items will be approved for any project, and this includes sewnig room and administrative proj-

3. Administrators shall immediately discontinue all expenditures for owner-driven trucks and teams. 4. The Austin office will make no payments on any purchase or-

ders dated later than March 2, 1935. 5. Where it is necessary to close down projects by virtue of these instructions, any non-relief personal assigned to such projects will

be immediately removed from the 6. Rural rehabilitation projects are to be given preference in any continuation of the work program. 7. These instructions do not affect the emergency education program, which is financed through



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A Department of Public Safety to Combat Crime

A department of public safety to combat crime in Texas is on the way. Twenty-seven senators voted for the passage of the act and Senator L. J. Sulak voted against it. A reminder that the bill is the first step in a war on criminals. It provides for a department which will have three divisions-rangers, highway patrol and headquarters. Highway patrolmen under the bill will be given all the power now exercised by rangers. It will be a department of public safety which has made criminals wary of invading four or five of equipment. The governor will appoint a public safety committee of three members to administer the act. They will name a public safety director and division and bureau chiefs. Ranger and patrol field forces will remain at present numbers and new places created in other parts of the act will make places for 30 additional guardians of the people.




