

MANY TEE PEE FAMILIES MOVING TO RANGER, AND ARE WELCOMED AS NEW RESIDENTS OF THE CITY

All of Ranger is joining today in extending a hearty welcome to the Tee Pee families who are moving from Thurber to Ranger, and are joining in hoping that their residence in Ranger will be a most happy one.

Between 19 and 20 families have already moved to Ranger, or are planning on moving to the city shortly after the first of the month while one or two others will remain in Thurber for a time, at least, it is said, and may move here later.

Ranger joins in welcoming these Tee Pee families, not only because they mean additional residents for Ranger, but also because it was the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company that took the lead in developing the once famous Ranger oil field, drilling in the first well in the field in October, 1917.

Since that discovery well was brought in the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company has been active in the Ranger field and still controls a large portion of the production.

Rumors which prevailed in Thurber last week to the effect that everyone who owned a rent house in Ranger had doubled the rent when it was learned that several families were to move into the town have been denied by real estate agents and the Chamber of Commerce. VACCINATION OF DOGS NOW COMPULSORY

At the regular meeting of the city commission, held Tuesday night, an amendment to the city ordinance pertaining to licensing of dogs in Ranger was passed, requiring, also, that all dog owners have their dogs vaccinated against rabies. It was pointed out that the original ordinance required that all dogs in the city be licensed, or the owners subject to a fine, and that dogs kept in houses or in pens or fenced yards were not exempt from this yearly tax. The amendment to the ordinance requires, in addition to the annual tax, that the dogs be vaccinated by a veterinary each year. In the future a certificate of vaccination, issued within the year, signed by a certified veterinarian, must be presented when the dog license is paid before one can be issued. Three Bills Killed Others Signed By Governor Thursday

AUSTIN, May 30.—Vetoes for three bills and approval for several others were announced today by Governor Allred. One bill permitting 99-year leases of some University of Texas land for the city of Fabens was filed without signature and permitted to become law. Vetoes bills included one to create a San Jacinto river water district, to create a special board for Palo Duro canyon state park and to fix salaries of district attorneys. Approved bills included the \$3,398,056 judiciary appropriation. The bill authorizing a district for constructing a water pipe line, a bill fixing rates of taxes on inheritances of step-children and bills validating road claims for highway building in Johnson and Real counties.

CANNER WILL BE OPENED ON NEXT FRIDAY

Announcement was made in Ranger Tuesday that the relief cannery, which is being installed in the Panhandle Refining company building on Marston street, would be open for canning for the public on Friday, May 31.

The cannery will be operated for the general public, anyone, whether on relief rolls or not, can take vegetables to the cannery, where they will be prepared and canned, with everything furnished, the owner of the vegetables keeping 40 per cent of the produce after it is canned, and the remaining 60 per cent going to the relief office to pay for the labor, cans, and other materials furnished.

It was pointed out that the strictest of sanitary measures would be enforced for the cannery and for all employees. Each employee must have a health certificate, must not use tobacco in any form and must keep his fingernails clean at all times, it was pointed out.

Mr. Lillian Neal Eastland will be local supervisor of the plant, under the direction of Miss Ruth Ramey, home demonstration agent of Eastland county.

Equipment is being installed and much work has already been done connecting up gas stoves, water and lights and screening the building proper in preparation for the opening Friday.

There has been considerable confusion as to who can have canning done at the plant, and it was pointed out today that anyone owning vegetables could get them canned by taking them to the canning plant.

National Guards Called to Mine Strike War Zone

PICHER, Okla., May 27.—Two companies of National guards were ordered here today to quell disturbances and clashes between two factions of striking lead and zinc miners.

As the guard was ordered out, state crime bureau agents and local officers were using tear gas to stop a threatened battle with clubs between A. F. of L. union men and members of a new, independent union.

A sheriff, a deputy and the chief of Picher police were taken to hospitals early today after union men attacked them with clubs.

The lead and zinc mines and mills have been closed since May 9 on a strike started for better working conditions and union recognition.

Texas Highways Builders Plan Mighty Program

"Highway building extraordinary" is the program outlined by the Texas commission. Harry Hines is the new chairman. Gobb Gilchrist continues highway engineer. A session was held Tuesday. The commission awarded contracts aggregating \$665,000, and made the interesting announcement that it would seek \$100,000,000 in federal funds for emergency construction. Mr. Hines and Engineer Gilchrist will journey to Washington where they will consult or confer with the powers that be. They are going to ask that Texas' portion of the federal government's \$4,880,000,000 work relief program be increased from a tentative \$46,000,000 to \$100,000,000.

Chairman Hines insists that Texas needs a minimum of \$100,000,000.

There will be a Centennial celebration next year. Highways of Texas, the main arteries of travel and traffic, should appeal to a vast army of tourists who are coming to Texas. There is one point the state legislators of Texas should not overlook. They have been reminded time and again that the principle of non-diversion of special highway user taxes was given masterful recognition by the congress in 1934 in the Haydon-Cartwright act, whereby any state will be denied a third of its federal aid fund for highways if by diversion of user taxes it reduces its contributions to the federal aid system.

A blind man should be able to decipher the words, and there is said to be only two blind lawmakers under the big dome of Texas when a legislator happens to be throwing bills into the hopper and winking at the diversion to other sources or departments of the highway tax paid by the motorists of Texas and all other American commonwealths.

Another Body Blow Given NRA Recovery Act

There is an election coming next year. A third of the membership of the senate will face the voters of their respective states for re-election. The United States senate voted to extend the NRA until April 1, 1936, after eliminating its price fixing provisions and limiting its regulations to interstate commerce. President Roosevelt asked for an extension of its life for two years.

All this happened after the senate had backed up the New Deal power program against in adverse court decision, voting 56 to 19 to give the Tennessee Valley authority specific power "to generate, transmit and sell electrical energy." Only a score of senators were in the chamber when the NRA extension measure was passed without a record vote. Senator LaFollette, progressive, of Wisconsin, warned that it "would kill the recovery law as dead as a doornail," but he said the house will grant the two years extension recommended and then the conferees named by the house and the senate will complete the job.

Texas are reminded that the senate resolution would extend the recovery law "with price fixing eliminated except in mineral natural resource industries and with purely intra-state business exempt from the code structure." Texas is the greatest of oil and gas mineral natural resource industries. Eternal vigilance appears to be the price of liberty today as it was in colonial times, when freemen were preparing to battle for a republic of their own.

John N. Edy Given Important Federal Post

John N. Edy is one of the famous city managers of America. A Missourian by birth and education. He held many posts in as many American cities. He was called to Dallas as city manager. He made a magnificent record. He was thrown out by the practical politicians. It appears to have been a promotion for him. Now President Roosevelt has appointed the Dallas castoff to be assistant director of the bureau of the budget. Flowers for the living. They will be sent to Washington. As for the wilted flowers handed to Edy by Dallas, "they are dust to dust," while Edy continues to march onward and upward in his chosen field.

Hope Makes Brighter Future Than Despair

A prophet may be without honor in his own country, but he generally has a good deal of fun. When you set out to tell what things are going to be like two or three centuries hence, no one can possibly prove that you are wrong, and to talk without fear of contradiction is one of the greatest pleasures known to man.

Rexford G. Tugwell apparently enjoyed himself very much when he told an audience at Albany, N. Y., the other day that the entire middlewest will be a trackless, treeless, waterless desert in 300 years unless something is done to conserve water levels and check erosion.

It put his prophecy in the form of some travel notes by a British explorer in the year 2235, and it made pleasantly shivery reading. He had his explorer poking about on the site of St. Louis, finding the Mississippi nearly dry, traversing a lifeless waste where the corn and wheat belt now lies, and meditating profoundly on the evils that arise from lack of national foresight.

However timely as a warning all this may be, it might be just as much fun to write a similar prophecy based on optimism rather than pessimism.

Let us suppose, for instance, that we heed all the warnings we have been getting in recent years—warnings about soil conservation, industrial waste, social injustice, the need for rehousing, and so on; let us suppose that we manage to do all the things which it is evident today that we need to do, and put our national house property in order.

What would the traveler of 2235 A. D. find then? It makes an enchanting picture. We can see him visiting great cities that are free from slums, with every family occupying a clean, decent home and every child having access to grassy parks and groves for play; cities which manage to get along without unemployment or soup kitchens or poverty, governed as efficiently and sensibly as a school of technology, say, is governed today.

Beyond these cities our traveler would find the world's happiest and most prosperous farm lands. Where the land is tilled, it is green with growing crops, and the farmhouses and villages are both lovely to look at and comfortable to live in; where the land is not tilled it is park-like, reserved for enjoyment of all the people—who, by this time, have plenty of leisure to enjoy such things.

A prophecy built along these lines is quite a contrast with the one Mr. Tugwell put together; and the comforting part about it all is that it is quite as likely to come true as his.

And that, after all, is what makes the present, with all its problems, a good time to be alive. Our destiny is in our hands as never before.

If we run the risk, through blindness and greed, of making Mr. Tugwell's doleful forecast come true, we also have the chance—and, all in all, a better chance—of building a future brighter than anything we dream of today.

35,000 Cans For Rehabilitation Clients Arrive

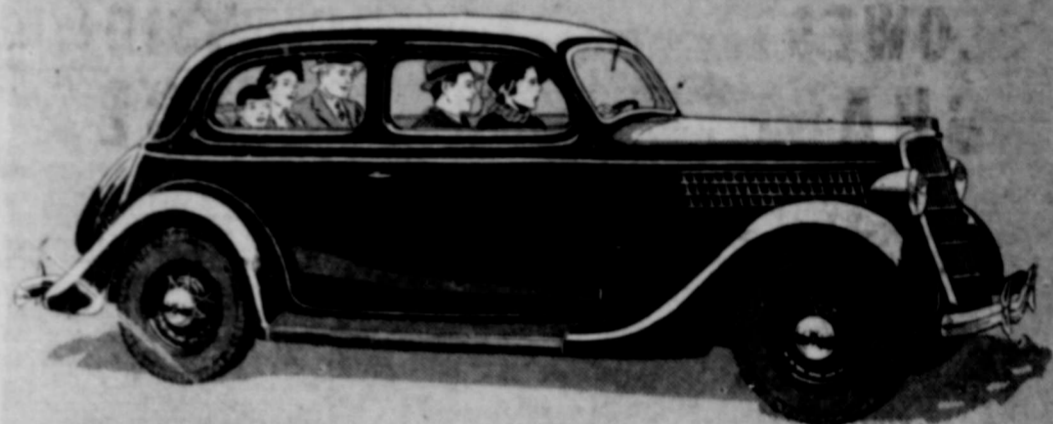
Arrival of 35,000 cans for rehabilitation clients for home canning purposes only was announced Monday by H. E. Driscoll, county administrator.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—President Roosevelt today offered cities an outright gift of \$405,000,000 as an incentive to join in the work relief program.

He ruled the \$900,000,000 public works money in the \$4,000,000,000 re-employment fund should be distributed to municipalities on a 45 per cent grant and 55 per cent loan basis. He set interest rates at 3 per cent.

PWA distributed its original \$3,300,000,000 by granting 30 per cent and loaning 70 per cent. The money drew 4 per cent.

Survivors include his wife, a step-son, "Snooks," in a CCC camp, and other relatives at El Paso and Cleburne.

cation had been made for the fund. They feared the activity by land speculators would prevent the program. Speculators were likely to raise the price of land so high to prevent construction of housing in slums, they said.

The biggest wells in the field make about 600 barrels a day through the same choke.

Weekly Sunday School Lesson OUR DAY OF WORSHIP

Text: Psalm 100; John 4:20-24; Colossians 3:15-17. The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for June 2.

BY WM. E. GILROY, D. D. Editor of Advance THE institution of Sunday is a Christian institution. We call it the Lord's Day, but it is inevitably associated in the Scriptures, and in conception and practice, with the Jewish Sabbath.

The institution in its historic and mechanical aspects needs no defense. We need only look at spheres of modern society where a day of rest is unrecognized, where men and women go hurrying on day after day in the mad rush of business, and the even greater madness of pleasure, to realize how ruinous such a course is to the individual and how destructive to the best interests of society.

Rest in man's life is as essential as work. Relaxation is as needful as energy. Man can no more live without rest than he can live without food. It is obvious that an institution, valuable for man's life, can become surrounded with formal and drastic rules that nullify in some degree much of its spirit and its value.

THIS was what happened with the Jewish Sabbath. Men became more concerned about its meticulous and formal observance, according to certain narrow ideas, than about the value and meaning of the day itself.

Because they believed that it was wrong to work on the Sabbath, they were ready to conclude that it was wrong to heal upon the Sabbath and to perform other acts of grace and goodness.

In worshipping the hulk of the institution, they had lost regard for its inner reality. So Jesus found it necessary to remind men that the Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath. By His specific acts he challenged the narrowness of unduly strict Sabbatarian conceptions.

It is not our great task today to restore to life the real values of Sunday as it has thus existed, and to avoid at the same time the making of the day a formal institution, a burden, rather than a relief, to be individual and to the community!

PREMIER ASKS FOR SUPPORT IN EMERGENCY

PARIS, May 28.—Premier Pierre Flandin appealed to the nation to support the currency today, as he staked his government life on a demand for emergency powers. As the cabinet met in preparations for the submission of his demand to the chamber of deputies, the government issued a statement blaming speculators for the crisis and said: "Resolutely hostile to devaluation of the currency, the government calls for support of all

Frenchmen to defend the nation's money." Directing his fight from his official residence to which he is confined by a broken arm, Flandin sought a blanket mandate to strengthen the currency and finance it by extraordinary measures.

Traffic Resumed After Storms Over Kansas, Missouri

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 28.—Railroad and air traffic resumed schedule today following an all-night tieup by a 1.83-inch rain. The storm flooded tracks in Kansas and Missouri, delaying trains and holding passenger airplanes on the ground. Trains at the union station last

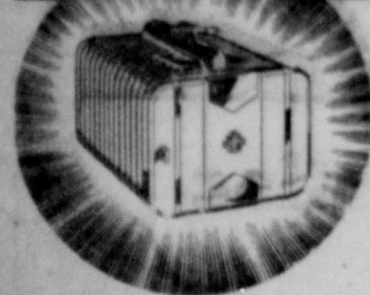
