Texas became important for cheese production in 1928 when 983,000 pounds of cheese was made. In 1929 2,202,000 pounds was produced and 1930, 2,621,-

In 1931 the production figure jumped to 4,406,000 pounds and in 1932 8,095,000. No figures are

available for 1934. There are now 14 cheese factories in the state and the plant at Denison is reported to be the


