Church holds first Bicentennial history program

The first in a series of Bicentennial History and Heritage Treasure Hunts was part of the Sunday morning worship services. The first emphasis was on the years 1921-1943. Mrs. L. B. Bowden read a brief history of the period with Rev. Raymond Jones recognizing those present who were baptized at the various places used in those days, those who attended services at the Congregational Church during those days or at the Sunnyside School, and those who attended Sunnyside Church between 1921 and 1943. The lake on the J. I. Phipps place was the first baptistry. No one present was baptized there. Noble Armstrong was baptized in Running Water Draw, but he was unable to attend. Mrs. Embree Roy Sadler and Mrs. Ezell Sadler were the only ones present who were

baptized in Tucker's earth tank. L. B. Bowden was the only one present baptized in the Dimmitt baptistry during that time period, and Mrs. Noah Spencer and Mrs. L. B. Bowden were the only ones present baptized in Ferguson's steel tank. Others present who attended the church during those years were Mrs. Alton Louder and J. Paul Waggoner, most of those previously recognized and Mrs. Milburn Haydon had attended services at either Old Springlake or the Sunnyside School in the early years. On display was the first church clerk book, two original gas lights, one of the original pews, some of the monks cloth curtains which divided the one-room building into four classrooms, the original stove, a replica of the first building, a Herald hymnal, which was the first hymnal, loaned to us by Mrs. Claude Johnson. Songs

used in the service were from this hymnal. Other items included a friendship quilt with the names of Mrs. M. H. Fowlkes' Sunday School class in 1932, several Sunday School and BYPU record books, several old hymnals, pictures of the time period, a 1919 Baptist Standard, and miscellaneous items. The date for the next emphasis has not been set, but it will cover the period 1944-1960. Rev. David Warren, missionary to the language minorities in Western Oklahoma, brought the morning message. He was a dinner guest of the Raymond Joneses.

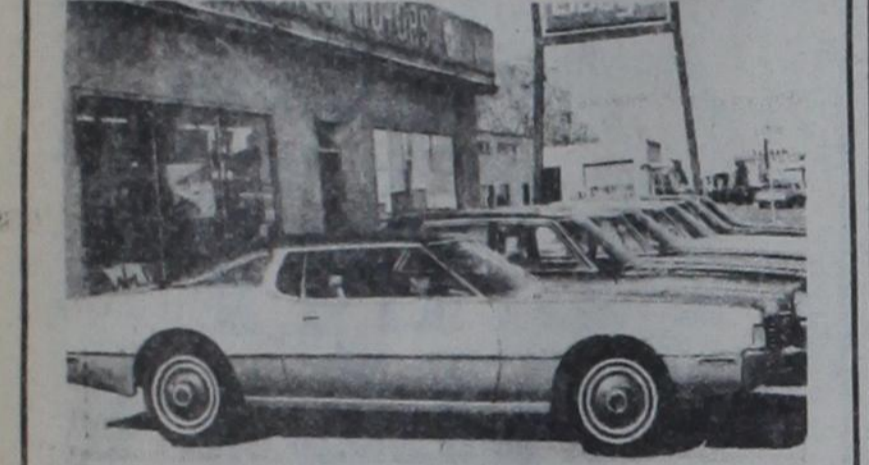



On Wall Street

The Panama Canal Company is under a Congressional mandate to run its operations on a break-even or better basis. In other words, not to lose money.

IN THE years since its construction, the Canal Company has been able to do that with ease. But now inflation, plus a world slowdown in shipping has put the Panama Canal in the red and may keep it there for several years.

The reopened Suez Canal has diverted traffic from the Panama Canal. Despite a 20% increase in the toll charge, the Panama Canal lost over \$8 million in 1975. It may lose \$12 million in 1976.

So, the government-owned Panama Canal Company will have to increase the toll charge again since wage and salary costs are locked. In fact, the company failed in an effort to put 2,200 skilled workers (out of a total work force of 15,000) on the Canal Zone wage base which is lower than the US wage base.

SHIPPING companies, unhappy with the toll charge increase in 1975 and the prospect of another in 1976 are threatening to sail around Cape Horn instead of using the Canal.

Surprisingly, the shipping companies estimate that this would increase a voyage from US Gulf ports to Australia by only 1 1/2 days compared to the length of the voyage using the Canal. That means an additional \$30,000 to \$40,000 in shipping costs.

The current toll set-up, based strictly on the size of the ship going through the Canal is about \$12,700 for the typical

containership. Increasing the toll charge to \$20,000 or more would narrow the advantage of using the Canal, instead of going the long way around.

THE CANAL also wants to base the toll charge on below-deck shipping space and especially on-deck shipping space used by containerships and not currently included in the computation of tolls. Containership companies argue that this makes it too expensive to use the canal.

The House Appropriations Subcommittee will hold hearings soon on the financing arrangements for the canal. Any decision to increase tolls requires President Ford's signature.

VETERAN'S SERVICES

Our office, closed for one week while we were out of town, will be open today.

We'll have information concerning any VA benefit changes made recently, from our attendance at the Waco Spring Conference last weekend.

CHECKS totaling \$233 million in GI insurance dividends will be mailed to approximately three million veterans by the latter part of March. Veterans need not apply for the annual dividends.

WACO Regional Director Jack Coker said the Veterans Administration accelerated dividend project is part of a record \$376.8 million dividend payout to veterans who have kept in force their policies from World War I, World War II and the Korean Conflict.

Veterans who have elected to have their GI insurance dividends used to buy additional insurance will have the additional amount credited on the anniversary date of the policy.

IN TEXAS, 5,836 veterans of World War I will participate in the 1976 dividend program, Coker said. Total dividends to them will amount to \$1,113,000, an average payment of \$191.

Approximately 180,428 World War II veterans in Texas will receive a total of \$17,386,000 in dividend payment, an average of \$96. Some 22,712 Korean Conflict veterans will receive \$423,000 in dividend checks, an average of \$19.

The accelerated dividend payments are in keeping, Coker said, with VA's traditional policy of making benefits and other payments to veterans "as speedily as is humanly possible."

COKER said an individual veteran might receive more or less than the average dividend payment depending on the insurance plan under which the veteran is protected, the amount of the policy, the veteran's age at issue or renewal and the length of time the policy has been in force.

VA insurance officials explained that a dividend represents a return of funds not needed to pay the cost of the insurance.

This includes both excess interest earned and any savings realized because actual death

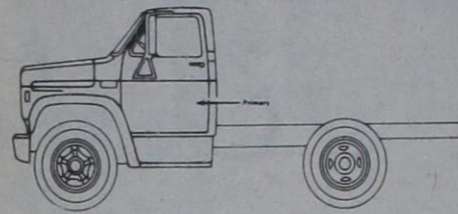
IT was named after Colonel Christopher Gadsden, who presented the original design to the S.C. Provincial Congress. A design used on many flags.

Terry's main hobbies are volleyball (he plays for R&R Aerial Spraying of Tulia), and riding his Honda 250 dirt bike.

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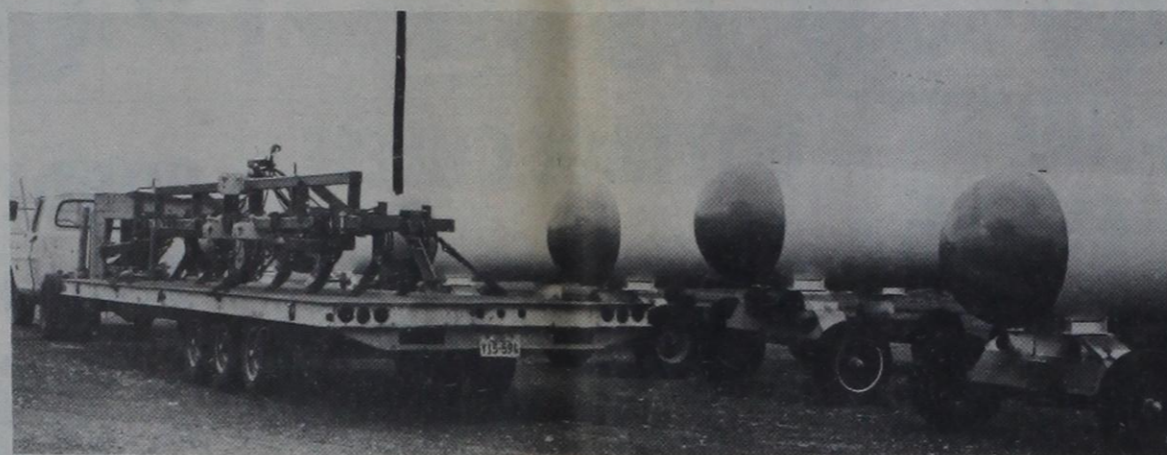
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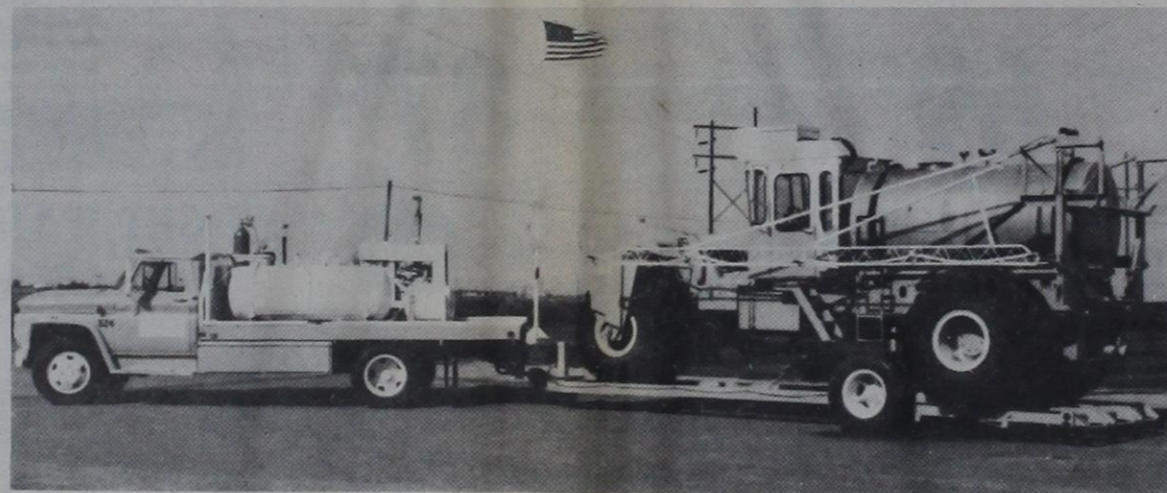


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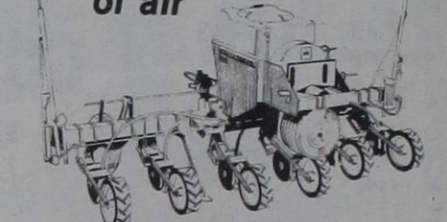

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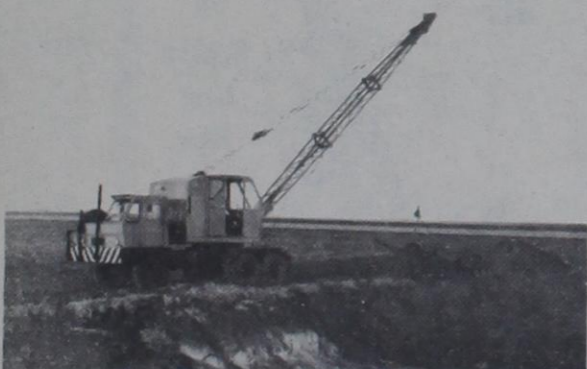
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Small Talk

Side-effects found in 'softener' sheets

The latest things on the market for getting clothes soft and static free are the sheets that are placed in the dryer along with your wet clothes. Presently one product is made of a sponge sheet that has a softener in it and another is a non-woven sheet of short fibers with the softener suspended in it.

IF YOU are using the latter product, you or some members of your family may be suffering from itchy skin. Medical doctors have found people are suffering from the use of the non-woven fibrous sheet because the construction of this lets it act as fiberglass does and parts of the fibers break off and get into your clothes, therefore causing itching.

There is an even newer product available for use in the dryer. That is in a small fabric packet. This has an adhesive back so it can be attached to a dryer fin. It will work for 40 or 50 dryer loads. The ingredients are activated by the heat in the dryer.

THE LIFE expectancy rate is continuously going up. More and more studies are being

done to see why some persons live so much longer than others. There have been some interesting results. Apparently there are several lifetime habits that affect longevity. I've heard that if your ancestors lived a long time you'll have a better chance of a long life. 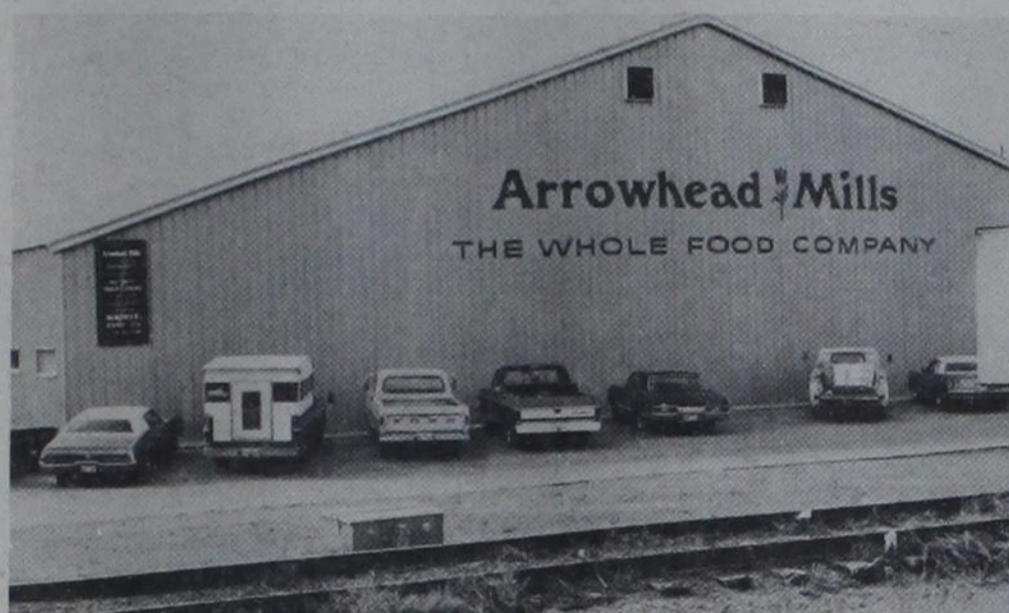

Castro ranks seventh in '75 wheat production

With a total crop of 3.7 million bushels, Castro County placed seventh in 1975 Texas wheat production.

ACCORDING to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, county farmers harvested some 91,000 acres with an average yield of 40.2 bushels per acre.

Wheat seeding started on the High Plains in late August following drought-ending rains, and most areas were generally behind schedule. As a result of the rains, surface moisture conditions were near ideal and underground water supplies were approaching normal. Drier weather in November allowed seeding to get back on schedule, and planting was completed by the third week in December.

The crop made excellent early growth and grazing was abundant with heavy stocking being evident around most of the state. Overgrazing was common as dry weather in the late winter depleted pastures, and high feed prices and low cattle prices prevented the normal culling of herds.

AS DRY weather, along with the normal crop dormancy, reduced grazing conditions, some farmers began the early movement of livestock off fields. Others, discouraged by the declining grain prospects and short grazing, plowed their fields in the hope of conserving moisture for a spring-planted crop.

Despite the period of dry weather, Texas wheat farmers produced a record 131.1 million bushels last year.

DEAF SMITH County led the state with a production of 10.2 million bushels.

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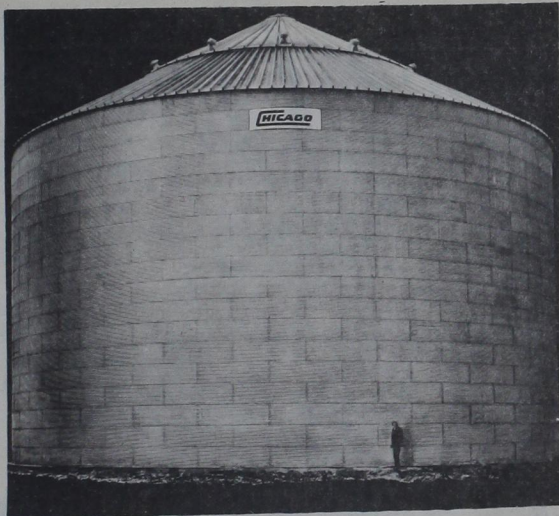
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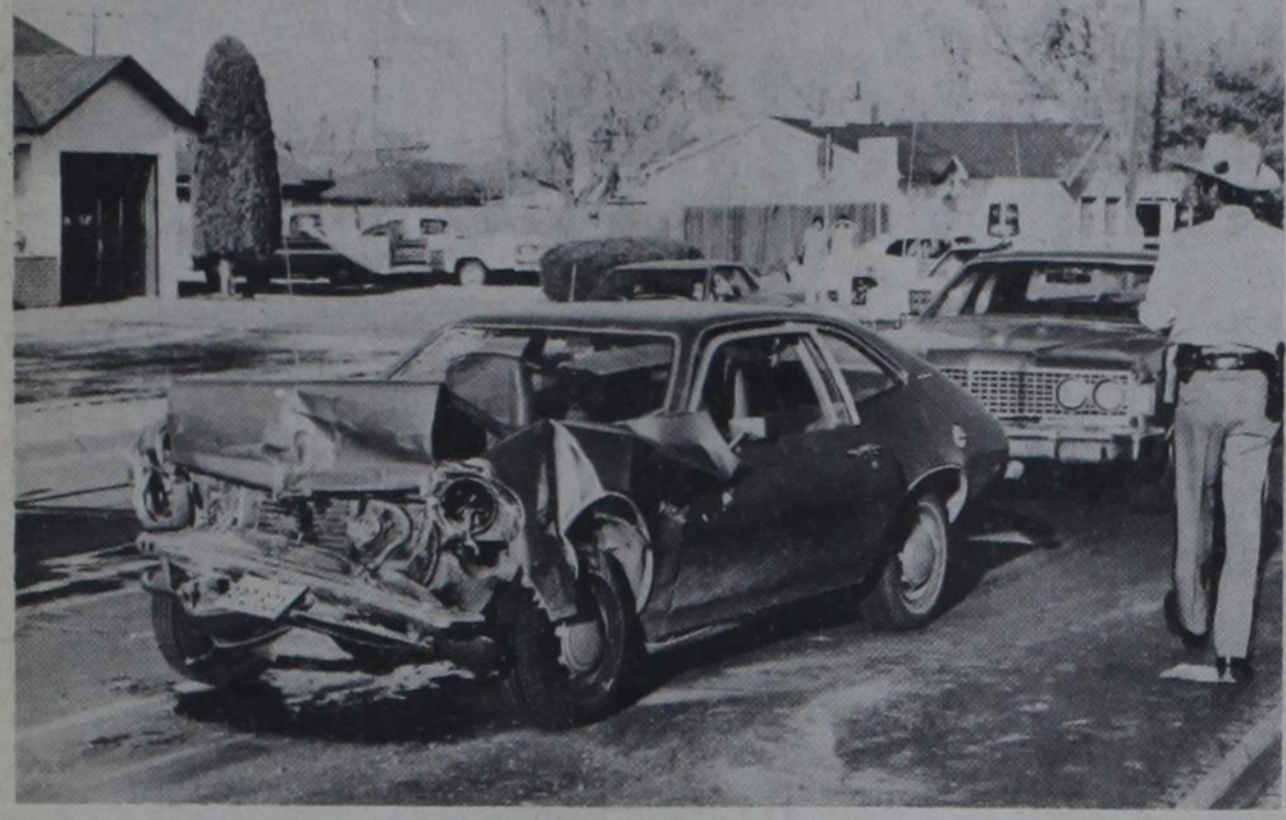
