Hall Ferguson Has First Wheat

Hall Ferguson, who lives three miles south of Lockney, delivered the first wheat from the 1953 crop to a local elevator Monday. Mr. Ferguson brought his wheat into the Baxter & Smith Grain Co. Monday at noon. Moisture content was 13.3 and the wheat tested 60 pounds, according to Jerry Harder, manager.

Mr. Ferguson was harvesting about 10 to 11 bushels from irrigated wheat that had suffered 60 to 70 percent damage about a month ago from hail. He has between 150 and 160 acres to cut and was still cutting Wednesday.

The wheat crop in this section of Floyd County will be the poorest in many years, local elevator men say. They are estimating that it will not be more than 20 to 25 percent as much as last year's crop, which was not a bumper crop itself. The irrigated wheat that escaped hail is very good but there is very little of it. Hail wiped out most of the dry land wheat in this area.

The price of wheat is also hurting the farmer with a steady decline the past few weeks. A bumper crop in other parts of the nation is blamed with the lower price. It was quoted on the local market at \$1.93 Wednesday. It has been as high as \$2.30 here.

The harvest will not get underway here fully until the middle or latter part of June and it is not expected to last long. A few days of cutting will clean up most of the wheat.

First Load At Floydada

The first load of wheat for the county reached Floydada Wednesday of last week. It came to Farmers Elevator there from the Stringer-Mount farms southwest of McCoy.

Vote To Change To Independent School District

Voters of the Lockney Rural High School District last Friday voted nearly 5 to 1 to make the district an independent one. The vote was 124 for the proposition to make it independent and 28 against.

Election was held at the high school building with Frank Dodson as election judge and Mrs. Lula Woodburn and Mrs. Frank Jameson as clerks.

The district has had a rural high school status for about seven years. Previous to that it had assumed a common school district status for a short while and before that was an independent district.

The only difference to be found in the operation of the district will be in the matter of self-government, school officials said. The independent district has the authority to approach the state school officers directly while as a rural high school district matters went through the county school superintendent's office.

Audit Is Planned

Supt. W. C. Irons said last week that the school board planned to have an audit made soon of all local school funds from last September 1 through June 1. After this year an audit will be made each year for the fiscal year Sept. 1 to August 31.

Committee Sets Next Week As "Clean-Up Week"

A local "Clean-Up" committee composed of representatives of the various civic clubs in the community have set next week, Monday through Friday, as "clean-up week" and are requesting every resident and business-man in the community to cooperate by seeing that their premises are cleaned up, all weeds cut and trash piled in the alley for city trucks to pick up.

The committee is composed of Hershel Swebston of the Rotary Club, Tom Moore of the Lions Club, Audvie Barnett of the Fire Department, Mrs. M. E. Shipp representing the Business and Professional Women's Club and Mayor J. E. Cox.

Plans now call for an inspection tour by members of the committee and the local health officer on Friday of next week to determine the effectiveness of the campaign.

Plan of the campaign calls for residents to do these things: Cut all weeds and high grass on your property and on adjoining vacant lots.

Pick up and clean-up all cans, trash and junk on your premises, put it in boxes and stack it in the alley where city trucks may pick it up easily.

Business men should also clean up the lots at the back of their place of business in a similar manner, the committee said.

"We are not asking the business houses to close because we feel that they can clean up their places without having to close up," members of the committee said. "We feel that it is the duty of all citizens to co-operate in the campaign and clean up your premises. We also suggest that if you have a physically disabled neighbor or friend you might help them to get their premises clean also."

The city truck will be hauling off the trash and the city will furnish additional trucks to help do the hauling, Mayor Cox said.

Members of Boy Scout Troop No. 59 under the direction of Scoutmaster Leonard Finley will bring circulars around Monday morning reminding people that it is clean-up week and urging co-operation.

This is the annual "clean-up" campaign staged each year as a health measure.

Lockney Auto Co.'s Formal Opening Set For Saturday

Formal opening of the newly remodeled show room, offices and parts department of the Lockney Auto Company will be held Saturday of this week, June 6. The auto company will remain open until 9 p. m. Saturday for the convenience of visitors.

Favors of perfume for the ladies will be given to those visiting and refreshments will be served all during the day. Arthur P. Barker Sr., owner of the firm, and all other personnel invite the people of the area to come in and see the new building on this formal opening day.

Brought on by a collapse of the roof during a snow early this year, the front part of the auto company building has been completely remodeled and most of it rebuilt. Starting with a new roof and frame work the walls have also been refinished with a new veneer of brick on the outside and all offices have been rebuilt.

The parts department has been enlarged and new bins installed making room for more parts. In addition a storage room upstairs provides room for bulky parts.

The spacious show room is a thing of beauty. The interior decorating is very attractive in pastel colors while the ceiling is covered with an acoustic tile ceiling of asbestos and fibre glass, which is fire-proof and sound proof.

The floors are covered with Vina-Lux tile which is not only very pretty but is easily cleaned of oil and grease.

The Plainview Plate Glass and Mirror Company installed the plate glass in the windows and offices and also the attractive aluminum frame glass doors.

Offices for the owner, Mr. Barker, the general manager, J. E. Cox, the bookkeeper, Mrs. Rex Jackson, and the service manager, Bill Birdwell, are provided. They are all very modernistic and efficiently arranged.

Upstairs in addition to the bulky parts room is a conference



room nicely finished and furnished.

The remodeled part of the building contains nearly 3800 square feet of floor space allowing ample room for showroom, parts department and offices.

The exterior wall has a base of roman brick in a light red, a stone trim on top of that, white face brick on the upper wall and a white stone cap.

Other members of the firm, in addition to those mentioned above are Arthur Barker Jr., in the parts department, Barry Barker, salesman, Leonard Finley, parts department, Frank Messimer, shop foreman and mechanics, Doyle Poole, Bill Hill, Chester Leon Lasater, G. Organized in 1914 The Lockney Auto Company was organized in 1914 by the present owner. He and his brother were in the auto business at

Floydada when he came here and founded the Lockney Auto Company. At that time he built the tin building still standing at the corner of South Main and Bryant Street, just across the street in front of the Webster Service Station. Mr. Barker took on the agency here for Ford cars. In 1923 he remodeled the building standing where the Baker Hotel now stands and moved his agency into that location. In 1926 he built the old building at his present location, it being one of the most modern of the area at that time.

In 1930 Mr. Barker changed from the Ford agency to Chevrolet and has been local Chevrolet dealer since that time.

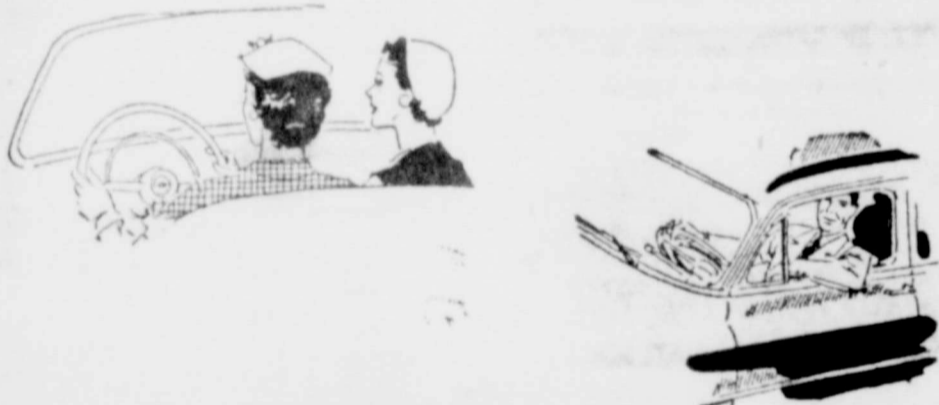

Lightning Kills 400 People Year

College Station. — Lightning kills 400 people and injures 1,000 others every year in the United States. And reports the National Safety Council, 90 per cent of these fatalities occur in rural areas. In addition, lightning is a major cause of farm fires — about 20 million dollars worth of farm property is destroyed annually.

According to W. S. Allen, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, here's about what happens in an electrical storm. As summer storm clouds gather on hot humid afternoons, electrical energy builds up in them. When the electrical potential becomes strong enough to break through the insulating layer of air, a giant spark — lightning — is produced.

Allen says lightning flashes may occur within a cloud, between clouds or between a cloud and the earth or projecting objects. The heated air along the zigzagging path of the lightning expands rapidly and the resulting rolling sound waves make thunder. Allen explains that sound travels 1,100 feet per second in air, so if there is a 10 second wait between the time you see the flash and hear the thunder, it means the lightning is about two miles away. And for what it's worth, he says if you are struck by lightning you'll neither hear the thunder or see the flash.

With millions of volts and thousands of amperes spent in a fraction of a second, lightning has tremendous power and will destroy or damage any object which tends to resist or obstruct its passage. In areas where thunderstorms are frequent and

intense, Allen says all important farm buildings should be protected against lightning.

If you have a choice of shelters during an electrical storm, choose them in the following order, says Allen. Get in a building that is protected from lightning or one constructed of metal or framed with metal; an automobile with a metal top and body or in unprotected buildings.

In every case, it is best to stay away from open doors or windows, fireplaces, stoves, pipes or other metal objects. Do not go outside nor remain out during thunderstorms unless necessary, says Allen. If caught in a thunderstorm, stay away from small sheds and shelters in exposed locations, isolated trees, wire fences and hilltops and large open spaces where protection is not provided by taller objects.

On the other hand, seek shelter in a cave, a depression in the ground, a deep valley or

canyon, the foot of a overhanging cliff or in a grove of trees, says Allen.

If the worst should come and a person becomes unconscious from a stroke or some emergency treatment is recommended for an electric shock. The immediate action of artificial respiration is very important, says a specialist for in addition to causing turns, the passing of electric current through the body often paralyzes the heart and muscles thus affecting heart and breathing mechanism.

Thunderstorms will be more frequent with the onset of summer weather, says Allen. When they are in progress, important buildings on farms are not protected against lightning. It might be a wise business investment to have them the needed protection.

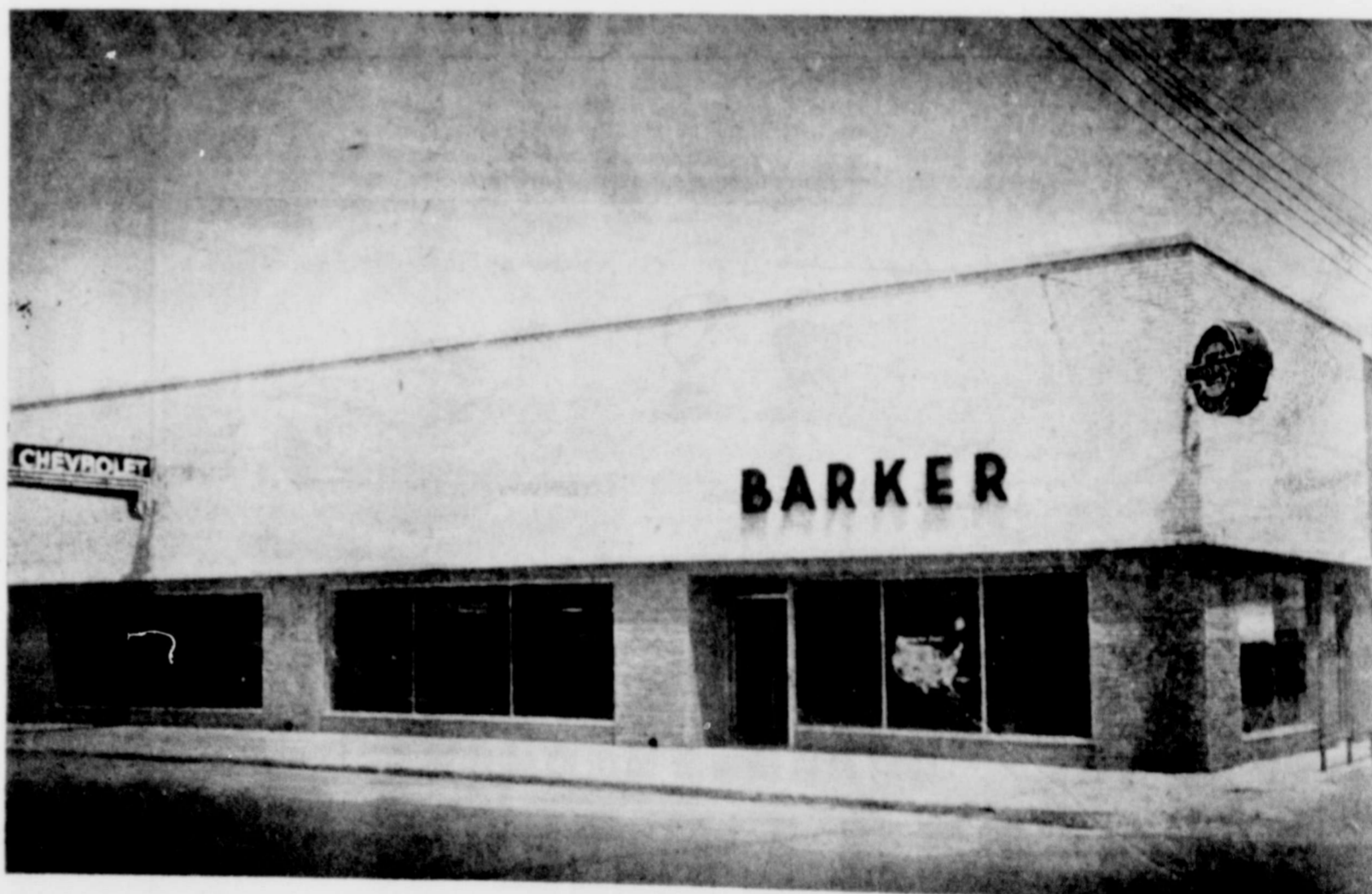

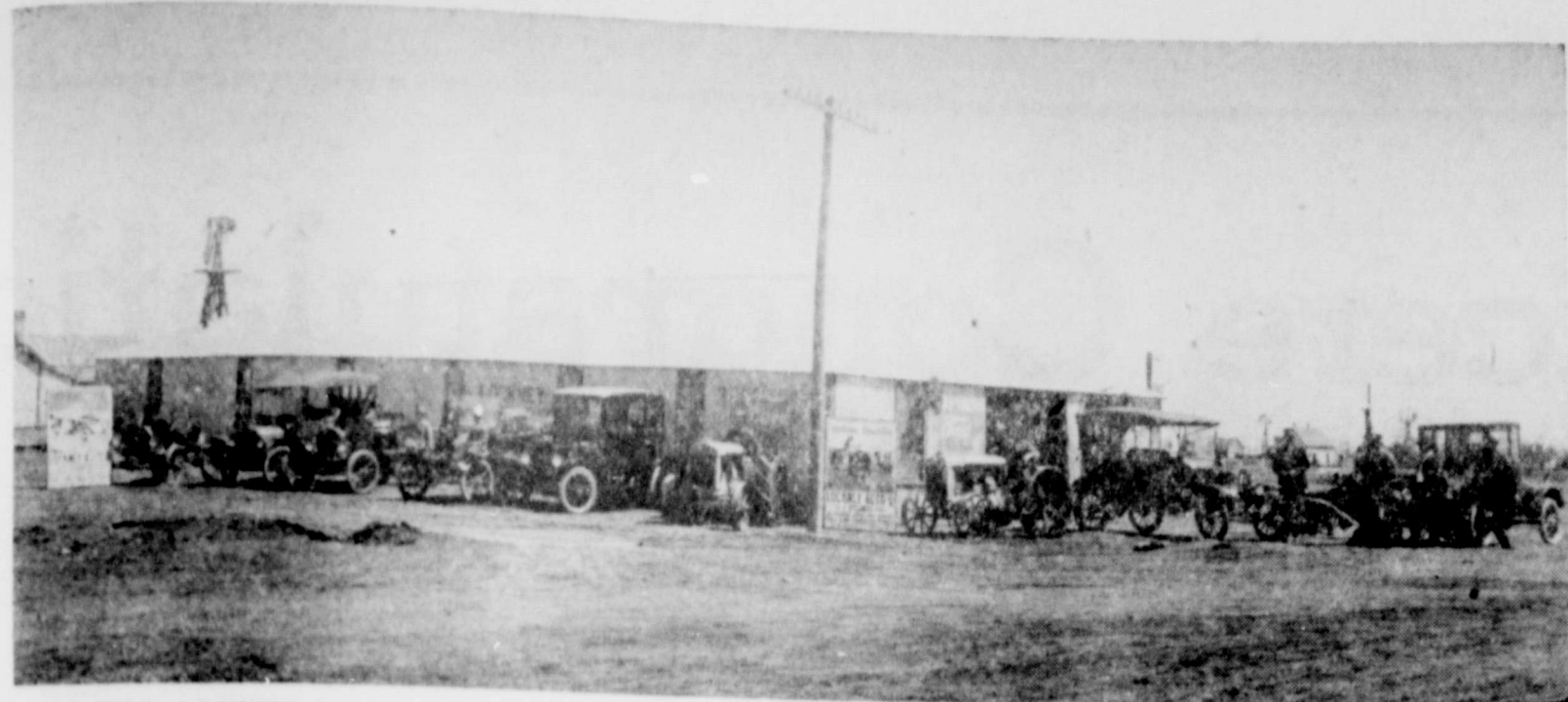
