## Longhorns Will Play At Dimmitt

The Lockney Longhorns will travel to Dimmitt Friday night to play the Dimmitt Bobcats in their second game of the 1953 season. Coach Johnny Truelove is preparing to throw a different offensive against the Bobcats than the one which failed to score against Paducah last Friday night, this one featuring Denny Quisenberry, last year all-district tackle. Quisenberry has been moved to the fullback slot and Truelove was well pleased with the way he was running this week.

Other changes have been made in the offensive line-up and the probable starting lineup will be as follows: Jimmy Scott or Billy McCada, right half; Allan Ray Pinner, left half; Jimmy Williams, quarterback; Marion Cross, center; Lerel Foster or Clifton Williams, left guard; Weldon Jones, right guard; Jimmy Rankin, right tackle; Roy Johnson, left tackle; Mickey Jones and Carrol Carthel, ends.

Eddie Joe Foster, who has been running in the backfield, has been moved to end to strengthen that position. The defensive line-up will be about as the offensive, Truelove said.

The Bobcats really put on the steam last week when they ran over an Amarillo 4th string squad 63 to 0. Local scouts say that the Bobcats have a pretty good team but that they didn't have much opposition in their game last Friday night. The Bobcats attack features Richard Wood, a broken field runner, and a good passing game.

The game will be called at 8 o'clock and a good crowd of local fans are expected to make the trip to Dimmitt to back the Longhorns.

### Eight Players Lost

The Longhorns reserve strength suffered a bad blow this week when eight boys dropped out of football practice. Coach Truelove said Wednesday. Two of the boys, Billy Rexrode and Cleon Wiley, were main reserve strength at guard positions. Other boys who dropped out were Donald Hill, Byron Golden, Ralph Hargrove, Doyle McCada, Charles Williams and J. W. Dippery. "The loss of these boys will certainly hurt our reserve strength and our chances of having a football team next year," Truelove said.

### B Came Thursday

The B squad will travel to Quitaque Thursday night for a game with the Quitaque B squad. However all other B squad games have been cancelled due to lack of sufficient players, Truelove said. Dempsey Alexander is coaching the B squad.

### Floyd County Will Have Exhibit At Lubbock Fair

Floyd County will have a county agricultural exhibit at the 36th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock, Sept. 28 through Oct. 3, it was announced this week by William G. Rodgers, Floydada, county agent.

The fair will open with a special parade Monday, Sept. 28, at 2 p. m. in downtown Lubbock, when more than 60,000 are expected to be on hand to watch the many area bands and giant balloons.

Contrary to reports here he did not have polio, relatives said.

Mr. Anderson was a painter and carpenter and had lived here for several years. His wife passed away a number of years ago. Survivors include two sons, Raymond and Marlin Anderson, both of Lockney, three grandchildren, a sister, Mrs. C. S. Sillcott of Olton and a brother, Iver Anderson who lives in California.

He was born in Austin, Texas, September 21, 1884.

Funeral services for Mrs. Alice Evans Thayer, wife of Ralph Thayer of Pleasant Valley community, were held in the First Methodist Church in Lockney Sunday afternoon, September 13, at 4 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. Burgin Watkins and Rev. Tilden B. Armstrong, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Floydada, officiated.

Interment was in Floydada cemetery, under the direction of the Carter Funeral Home of Lockney.

Mrs. Thayer died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Ernest Lee Thomas, south of Floydada, Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock after a lingering illness. Mrs. Thayer had been in a Dallas hospital for several weeks and was returned to the home of her sister a few days before her death.

Alice Evans Thayer was born in Vivian community, Foard county, Texas, on September 8, 1912, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Evans, pioneer Foard county residents.

She finished school at Paducah and completed a business course at Draughon's business college at LaJunta, Colorado. Mrs. Thayer was employed by civil service at Carlsbad, New Mexico, where she met her husband. She and Ralph Thayer were married in Roswell, New Mexico, on August 12, 1939.

Mr. and Mrs. Thayer moved to Floyd county in 1946, living at McCoy and then Pleasant Valley community, where they made their home at the time of her death.

Mrs. Thayer was a member of the Lockney Methodist Church. Survivors include the husband and a son, Fred Ralph, age 8, and a daughter, Veda Alice, age 4, also her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Evans of Floydada and three sisters, Mrs. E. L. Thomas and Mrs. W. R. Daniel, both of Floydada, and Mrs. Raleigh Luker of Brownfield; four brothers, Earl and Franklin Evans of Pecos, Milton C. Evans of Floydada, and E. T. Evans, Jr., of Amarillo.

## Neighbors Help Aiken Farmer

About 30 men of the Aiken community gathered at the home of Clyde Lucas last Thursday morning and shocked 10,000 bundles of feed for him. The neighborly deed came about after the infant baby of Mr. and Mrs. Lucas had passed away and Mr. Lucas had gotten behind in his farm work due to illness in his family. Mrs. Lucas is slowly improving at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Lucas.

## David Catlin Was "One Time" POW

Cpl. David Catlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Catlin, is believed to have been a prisoner of war at one time, according to a telegram received by his parents from Major General Wm. E. Bergin, Adjutant General of the Army, last Friday morning.

David has been missing in action since Chinese drive of late 1950 and the family has not had any word of his fate. They had just about given up all hope that he was alive until the Friday morning telegram gave them new hopes.

David is one of the more than 900 American soldiers for whom the UN Command has demanded an accounting from the Communists. They are soldiers which the Command has some proof that they were once in Communist hands but for which the Communists haven't accounted.

The telegram to Mr. and Mrs. Catlin said: "The Secretary of the Army has asked me to inform you that the name of Cpl. David L. Catlin was included in a list of servicemen who, there is reason to believe, were at one time in Communist custody but for whom no accounting has yet been made. This list has been presented to the Communists with an urgent request for such an accounting. All possible efforts are being made to obtain information regarding Cpl. Catlin and in the event any is received, it will be furnished you promptly."

Mrs. Catlin told The Beacon Friday, "I never did believe that David was dead and now we have high hopes that he is alive and may be returned home."

Mr. Catlin received the telegram as he went to work early Friday morning. He promptly took the day off and returned to his home to show the message to other members of the family.

David was a member of the 7th Infantry Division and was last seen still fighting the Chinese near the Changun reservoir. Only 15 members of his division were evacuated with the other fighting units.

### Floydada Soldier Also On List

Also on the list of those whom the Army believes were once in Communist hands was the name of Sgt. Omer L. Anderson, son of Wylie W. Anderson of Floydada. He is a brother of Mrs. Earl Baker, also of Floydada.

He was a member of the 41st Infantry Division and was among the first American soldiers to fight in Korea. He has been missing since July 1950 and the family has had no word from him.

A mysterious letter received by the Catlin family only last week has added to the confusion although it apparently has no connection with their son. The letter from a displaced person, now in Italy, was written to Mrs. Catlin, giving her name and post office box number correctly. The young man writing said that he was a Czech, who had one time been a student at the University of Prague but was forced to flee to Italy by the Communist. He did not ask for help but apparently was seeking some one to write to him. The mystery is how he secured Mrs. Catlin's correct name and box number.

### Seale Drive In Hit By Thieves

For the fourth time since its opening a little more than a year ago the Seale Drive In Theatre was struck by thieves early Sunday morning. Only about \$3 in cash was stolen from the cash register in the concession building and the cigarette machine was broken into and an undetermined amount of cash taken from there.

The thieves tore up three doors, J. B. Seale, manager said Monday. They broke open the door into the projection booth, then the door into the concession building. They also broke into the ticket booth in which nothing is kept, Mr. Seale said.

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## Drill Stem Test Shows Nothing

A drill stem test run on Sinclair's J. M. Massie No. 1 oil test Tuesday at a depth of 5724 feet showed no signs of oil or gas, it was reported here Wednesday. The drill hit salt water.

The test is located four miles north of Floydada. It is contracted to go at least 9,000 feet and may go as far as 14,000 feet reports here indicate.

## Ex-POW Arrives Here Wednesday

Sgt. Abner R. (Bob) Smith arrived at the home of his sister, Mrs. Vestal Eiland in Lockney Wednesday morning at 4 o'clock after landing at San Francisco last Sunday. He was met at the port by his brother, Lewis B. Smith and brother-in-law, Vestal Eiland who brought him back here by automobile.

The ship was originally scheduled to dock Thursday of last week but motor trouble caused a delay and it came in four days late. The local men had left Lockney Monday of last week to meet the soldier.

Sgt. Smith appears to be in pretty good shape physically, relatives here said. Lack of food was the big handicap that he suffered in his almost three years of captivity. "They fed us like hogs," he told his sister. "They gave us oats, rye and barley and we cooked it and ate it as best we could." He went on to say that sometimes the men were given sawdust to eat. They smoked turnip leaves and tree leaves since that was all they had to smoke.

Sgt. Smith appeared to be bitter toward the "progressives," or those soldiers who went along with the Communists in order to get better food and treatment, his sister said. Their actions caused the death of a number of American soldiers, he said.

The men were worked very hard and slept on the ground. They received absolutely no medical treatment during all the time they were captives.

Sgt. Smith spent Wednesday here getting papers fixed on a new Ford car he purchased from "Whitey" Baccus, local Ford dealer. He was very proud of the new car and he along with Mr. and Mrs. Eiland and their family and possibly Mr. and Mrs. Lewis B. Smith planned to leave Wednesday night for Fayetteville, Arkansas where his mother, Mrs. Alice Britt resides. It will be a family reunion and all members of the family are expected to be present.

Sgt. Smith has more than 100 days of furlough coming after which he will report back to Fort Smith, Arkansas. He doesn't plan to leave the Army if he can stay in and he isn't satisfied to drop the war with China. "Too many of our soldiers died back there," he said.

A few of the letters and small packages sent to him by his sister got through and they were appreciated very much, he said.

### Complete Concrete Elevator Foundation

The work of pouring the concrete foundation for the new elevator being built here by Patterson Grain Co. was completed Tuesday and the forms are now being built for the walls of the elevator.

The contractor, Chalmers & Barton, have about 20 men employed on the project, most of them skilled labor. The job is due to be completed by December 7th.

## Contract To Be Let On Floyd-Briscoe Road

A six mile gap in the road north of Lone Star to the Rock Creek store will be paved and contract for the job will be let on September 22 or 23. The paving of this strip will afford an all-weather road to Tullia, Canyon and Amarillo through this route, which is already used by many Lockney people in dry weather.

Three miles of the strip is in Floyd County and three in Briscoe. The road crosses a lake just about the county line which is always bad in wet weather. Existing paving in both counties has been down for several years.

Other paving projects in the county have recently been completed among these being the Rushing Chapel road in Precinct 4, a five-mile stretch of paving south of Highway 70, and the road from the Lakeview store south to the Crosby county line, also in Precinct 4.

Plans are being made now for the road east from Cedar Hill to the Motley county line and construction is planned for next spring. This new road will connect with a road west of Flomot making an all-weather road through to that community and on to the Turkey-Matador road in Motley county. Total construction in this county is 11½ miles.

Future plans also call for the building of three and a half miles of road west from Barwise to the Hale County line. Eventually this road is expected to connect with one in Hale County. Also in the future are plans to close the gap between the Cedar road and one running south from Quitaque into Floyd County across Lingham and Quitaque creeks.

## Minute Editorials

Let us search and try our ways, and turn again to the Lord. — Lamentations 3:40.

THE TEXAS EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION — commonly known as the TEC sends a news release to The Beacon saying "The Texas Employment Commission will again be called upon this year to make crop wage surveys in areas of the State where Mexican Nationals are to be employed in numbers to warrant a survey." The release goes on to point out that wages which the farmer pays to the Mexican National are subject to change, depending upon what other farmers pay their workers. The TEC then uses two and a half type-written pages saying that all this is for the benefit of the farmer and explaining how the TEC is trying to help the farmer.

TO THE AVERAGE unlearned person, such as this writer, it would appear that the TEC is

much more concerned about the Mexican National than he is the farmer. If this plan is carried out as it is explained in the news release the farmer may secure a group of Mexican Nationals at a given rate of pay to harvest his cotton and then if the prevailing wage rate goes 5c per hundred above that price, the Nationals wage must also be raised. If we remember correctly that same deal was attempted last year but the howl that was raised quickly put a damper on it. We don't believe that TEC or anyone else will get away with raising the wage rate of the Nationals after they get into the country. When a farmer signs a contract for labor he has a right to expect that contract to last for the duration.

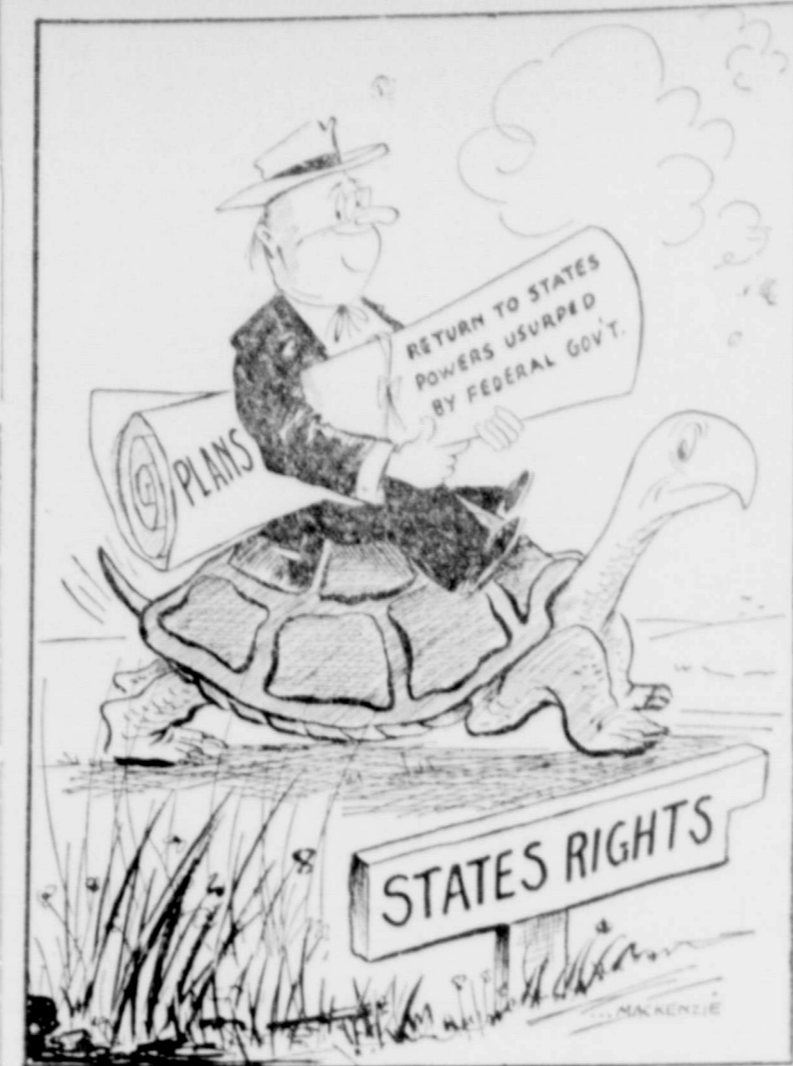
IT HAS BECOME very apparent to most people that the TEC and its papa, the United States Department of Labor, is much more interested in the welfare of the Mexican National who comes to this country and makes more money than he ever saw before in his life, than they are in the American farmer, who finds it harder each year to meet the ever-increasing expense of farming.

IT APPEARS that the good cotton crops now maturing in Central and West Central Texas may make it profitable for local farmers to secure Nationals to help in the cotton harvest. If the cotton crops in that area turn out as well as the forecast many native Mexicans that usually come to the plains may be working in that area and thus create a shortage of help here. If that is true Mexican Nationals will be a big help to local farmers — barring the meddling of TEC.

CREDO — I DO NOT CHOOSE to be a common man. It is my right to be uncommon — if I can. I seek opportunity — not security. I do not wish to be a kept citizen, humbled and dulled by having the state look after me. I want to take the calculated risk; to dream and to build, to fail and to succeed. We have been told several times that the drunk driving between Amarillo and Lubbock on Highway 87 is due to the fact that the counties in between are dry, that drinkers are forced to get their refreshments in Amarillo and as a result get pretty weavy by the time they reach Swisher county. These people argue that if all these counties were wet, there would be less drinking on the highways.

### LIABILITY INSURANCE

How's your liability insurance? Never a week passes that some

citizen of Texas is not required to post bond or deposit funds to cover legal action following a highway accident. This is the result of Texas new insurance law for drivers. If the driver has no insurance and fails to post funds established, he is then relieved of his automobile tags and his driver's license.

Drivers in this group, of course, immediately rue the fact that they did not purchase liability insurance as specified by law. The circumstance is, in most cases, due to carelessness. Cost of required liability insurance is comparatively small. It can save many headaches.

In addition, the law appears to us to be fair. Driving an automobile in these times is different from operating an automobile 25 years ago. The persons involved, whether innocent or guilty, are protected. The object of the regulation is to place responsibility upon all drivers and, considering the growing number of accidents on our highways, it would appear that owning and operating an automobile in 1953 has come to the point of demanding acceptance of responsibility. — Hereford Brand.

## NOT THE ONLY TOWN

There probably isn't a town of any size in the United States that couldn't join Wetumka, Okla., in celebrating "Sucker Day." Few, if any, towns or cities have escaped what happened to Wetumka.

In case you are not familiar with Wetumka's Sucker Day, its celebration started a few years ago after F. Bam Morrison, a city slicker, went there and talked the merchants into putting up money to bring a circus to town. One feed merchant even put up money to feed the elephants.

All this feed merchant and his friends were doing was feeding F. Bam, who disappeared as soon as he had milked the circus lovers dry.

But the merchants, instead of calling in the law, decided to hold Sucker Day every year to commemorate F. Bam's coup. The celebration has since gained national prominence.

The difference between Wetumka merchants and those of Post and other cities is that there they blamed themselves and decided to set aside one day every year for the "wearing of sack cloth and ashes" in atonement for their costly gullibility.

Of course, it isn't always a circus promoter who fleeces a town's merchants. It can be any one of a variety of smooth-talking floaters. Sometimes a town isn't "suckered" as completely as was Wetumka, but it's usually the same old story. Some fast-talker came in with something to sell and he sold it.

If every town whose businessmen have been "cypod" by F. Bam Morrisons would follow the pattern set by Wetumka and hold a special day in commemoration of the event, the "promoters" might soon find themselves facing the necessity of getting into an honest racket. We for one, would hate to try to "put over" something in Wetumka, now that the merchants have awakened to such schemes. — Post Dispatch.

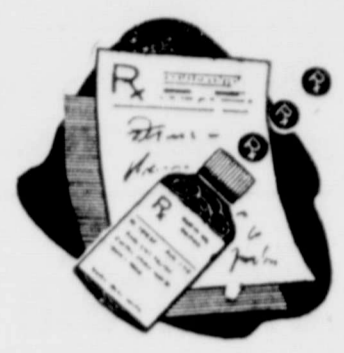

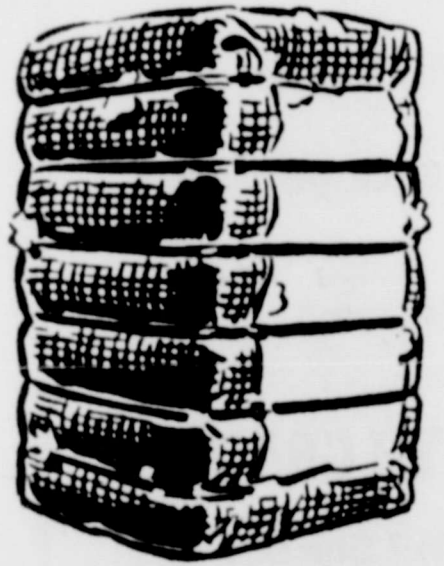

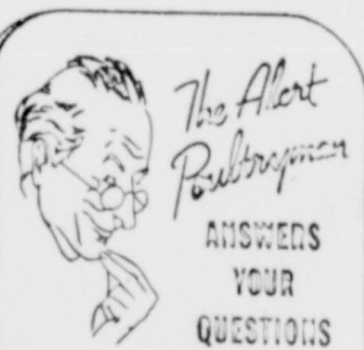

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CONVERSIONS

Apostles contains many cases of conversion. It is clear to some that different people were told to do things in order to be saved. Let us study together three cases of conversion and notice the harsh case.

Let us go first to the 16th chapter of Acts. Here we read the conversion of the Philippian jailor. Paul had been put in prison and during the night a great earthquake and all of the doors were opened and the bands were loosed. The jailor upon seeing the prison open would have taken his life but Paul said to himself no harm: for we are all here. The jailor asked to know what to "do to be saved?" "And they said unto him on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved: and they spake unto him the word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house. Here was a man that had to start at the beginning as an unbeliever, so he was told to believe and to do the word of the Lord unto him so that he might be saved."

Let us go to Acts 2. Here we see as the first Gospel is preached for the first time in fullness and all men out of every nation heard Peter and the things he spoke. We have recorded a portion of what Peter preached unto them the word of the Lord. About Jesus who they had crucified. It is evident that they BELIEVED the things spoken. They said, "Men brethren what shall we do?" Peter answered them in Acts 2:38. "Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins..."

Notice the difference in the answer given here and the answer given to the jailor. These had already believed, but they were not baptized.

Let us notice the case of Paul or, as he was known before his conversion, Saul. On the road to Damascus he shined round about him. Saul said, "Who art thou, Lord?" "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest: hard for thee to kick against the pricks." Saul asked, "What wilt thou have me to do?" He was told, "Arise, and it shall be told thee what thou MUST do." Saul as he goes into the city and it is evident that he was a penitent. Now as Paul in Acts 22:16 tells about his conversion he tells us what Ananias told him when he came to him to tell Saul what he "must do." Paul said to him and said, "Why tarriest thou, arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Now why didn't Ananias tell Saul to do that? Because he had already done both.

Notice these did the same things. Believed, repented, and were baptized. Friends, if you have never been baptized, believe in order to be saved, because unless you believe you will not repent nor be baptized. If you have repented and been baptized, if you are a true believer in Christ you must do what Peter told those who were to be baptized. "Repent and be baptized." If you are a true believer as was Saul, you must do what Ananias told Saul to do, "arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins."
