The minimum foundation Texas has made gigantic educational strides during the past simply as a bare minimum foundation on which a local community could build the kind of educational program it needs.

It is only a skeleton, in other words, and plenty of leeway is left to local districts in the matter of putting meat on the bones.

A fundamental concept of the Gilmer-Aiken laws is that the number of teachers should be determined by the number of children actually attending school. State funds, before adoption of the minimum foundation program, were distributed on the basis of population, now, distribution of funds and the on average daily attendance.


